CORNERSTONE LAID FOR LAB WING

The cornerstone ceremony for the new \$150,000 Royal Arch Masons Wing of the Medical Research Laboratory and the investiture of upwards of 300 Grand Lodge line and staff officers including 64 new District Deputies, marked the St. John's Day program at the Masonic Home in Utica.

The occasion was the annual visitation of Judge Arthur Markewich, newly elected Grand Master of New York State Masons, who presided at both the cornerstone ceremony and the investiture.

More than 2,000 Masons, representing all districts in the State, were on hand for the ancient Masonic rite. The new one-story brick labora-tory wing is the gift from the Royal Arch Masons to the Masonic Foundation for Medical Research and is to be used exclusively for experiments in the gerontology (aging) program, according to Dr. Harvey Samis.

The structure will be isolated from the remainder of the laboratory complex and the research to be conducted will deal with cancer causing chemicals which affect the

The presentation was made by Deputy Grand High Priest Ira Etner of the RAM and was accepted by Dr. Morris Jacobs, President of the Masonic Foundation for Medi-_cal Research:

Markewich, in his address, described the gift as a worthy one in that its purpose is to serve and benefit all mankind.

While the laboratory is located on the Masonic Home grounds in Utica, it is not a part of the home. It is a separate facility with its own board of directors, its own administration headed by Dr. Gordon K. Moe, director, its

own staff and its own budget currently amounting to more than a half million dollars annually.

It was brought out that the laboratory is supported by contributions specifically allocated to the Masonic Foundation for Medical Research and Human Welfare. Through the Brotherhood Fund, special memorial gifts and testamentary bequests.

THE NEW GRAND **MASTER**

Judge Arthur Markewich Holds Highest Masonic Position

Masonic Background Judge Markewich has been active in Masonry since 1930 and is an honorary member of more than forty Masonic Lodges in counties throughout the State. Most recently he has served two terms as Deputy Grand Master, the second highest office among New York Freemasons.

Markewich was raised in Shakespeare Lodge No. 750 and was its Master in 1937. His father, Samuel, has been an active member of this Lodge since 1907; a brother, Robert, and both sons are also members.

His activities in the Sixth Manhattan District led to his election as District Deputy, 1948-49. He later was subsequently elected chairman of the board of directors of the Sixth District Association and was founding member of its scholarship assistance board. He served on the Abraham I. Feldbin, and Grand Lodge committee on Judge Advocate Vincent constitutions for nine years until his election as Grand Treasurer in 1970.

Since 1972, Markewich has been a 33° member of the Valley of New York City,



Scottish Rite; a Noble of Mecca Temple Shriners, and its representative to Grand Lodge; a companion of Zerubbabel Chapter No. 147, Royal Arch Masons, and of Manhattan Council No. 95, Royal and Select Masters; and honorary member of DeMolay Legion of Honor; and a charter member of the Lawyers Square Club.

Career Background

He became a lawyer in 1929, and has held a distinguished professional career, including eight years as Assistant District Attorney and over 25 years as a Judge. He is now Associate Justice of the Appellate Division, the State's second highest court.

Since 1947, Markewich has been successively City Magistrate, City Court Justice, Justice of the Supreme Court and since 1969, Justice of the Appellate Division, First Department by designation of Governor Rockefeller.

He is a member of the American and State Bar Association, the New York County Lawyers Association,

and the Association of the Bar. In the latter, he has been a member, chairman, and secretary of several committees, also serving on its executive committee.

Other Biographical Data A native of Manhattan, Judge Markewich was educated in its public schools, graduated from DeWitt Clinton High School, and completed his education at Cornell University (A.B.) and Columbia Law School (LL.B). He continues to be active in alumni affairs of all three institutions and is vice president of his college class.

He is married to Dr. May Elish Markewich, a certified psychologist. They reside in Manhattan. They have two sons, Maurice, apsychiatrist, and Daniel, a lawyer, and five grand-children. Fraternally, he is a former national president of his college fraternity and of Bnai Zion. American Zionist fraternal Organization. He is a trustee of Congregation B'nai Jeshurun and a director of its Mens Club.

Dear Brother Herman

A brother who wished to affiliate with my Lodge presented what he called a "demit." At the school you use the term, "dimit." Is there any difference?

The question whether the word should be "demit" or "dimit" was argued heatedly during past years. The early form was "demit," and was first used Masonically in Anderson's Constitutions of 1738 to mean, "separation from membership." This spelling was followed by succeeding writers. When or how the form "dimit" came into usage in this country, is uncertain.

Albert G. Mackey, distinguished Masonic writer, in his monumental Masonic Encyclopedia, published in 1874, states categorically that "demit" is the correct form for a Mason who "withdraws from membership," and is "the document granted by the Lodge." Mackey goes on to state, "the word 'dimit' is an American, and wholly indefensible corruption."

Perhaps the best explanation was given by the late Harry L. Haywood, eminent Masonic scholar, on the distinction between the words "demit", and "dimit." "Dimit" is derived from the Latin "dimissorius," and means to "send away, to dismiss." The word "demit" is derived from the French "de" and "mettre" and could be translated as to "depart from." Hence its meaning Masonically would be to "resign." According to Haywood, the shorter Oxford Directory gives the definition for "demit" as "to abdicate, to resign." If these distinctions had been preserved, "to demit," would have meant, "to withdraw voluntarily from membership," and "to dimit" would have meant, "to be suspended or expelled."

In this country, the Grand Jurisdictions use either "demit" or "dimit" to signify "voluntary withdrawal," and "unaffiliation, suspension or expulsion," to signify "involuntary removal from membership." Of the 49 Grand Jurisdictions, 41 use the word "dimit" and eight

use "demit."
Finally, it may be noted that while the official designation in our Grand Jurisdiction is "dimit", the Handbook of Masonic Law in the index lists "Demit - see Dimit, which would imply that either may be used, which is something of a paradox.

CHAPLAIN'S MESSAGE

by Rev. William H. McKee

CAN THESE DRY BONES LIVE?

We frequently note that Jesus used parables to illustrate and emphasize some lesson he was telling. In the Old Testament we find the prophets using visions for the same purpose. Ezekiel was one of the most successful in this field.

In the 37th Chapter of the prophecy bearing his name, we find him in conversation with the Lord in a valley covered with a great number of dry bones. Such a scene was quite possible in his day when the great armies of Assyria, Babylon, Persia and Macedonia swept across most of the known world leaving destruction as their trade mark. A great battle could have taken place with all on the losing

side killed, leaving none to accord decent burial.

Do we have valleys of dry bones today? I believe we do but not in the same form. We had great bank failures last year in San Diego, presently a near even greater one in New York City, some great holding companies, and many chains of discount houses, all of which leave empty buildings, ever increasing unemployment as well as many

whose life savings have been lost.

We have dry bones in our educational system when students have been able to purchase term papers and receive credit for work not of their own research or study. Degrees have been granted by certain organizations whose whole physical equipment consists of an office, no faculty, library, class rooms, merely an engraver, and officers and I expect a good sized bank account. A beautifully engraved, framed diploma stating that the person in whose office it is displayed may be obtained for \$35, EXPERENCED PROFESSIONAL COUNSELOR. The professor in one of our religious magazines who wrote about it did not approve or send for one.

We have valleys of dry bones in our political world according to reports from top to bottom in the seats of government. When the excuse is given that wrong was carried on before, it does not make it right today - rather a greater mistake. We should learn from the past.
Can these dry bones live? I believe we have started to

correct some of them. Recently a high school head in New York City refused to enroll quite a number of Junior High students who were assigned to his Senior High. Very bluntly he stated their records indicated that they could not read.

God said to Ezekiel, "Son of man, can these bones live?", and he answered, "O Lord, Thou knowest." Then follows the miracle step in fulfillment of the old Jewish proverb that God is a creative agent working through His prophets - God's voice was more than a sound disturbing the tranquility of the atmosphere. We note the miracle of restoration, the bones came together, sinews came upon them, then flesh and skin, but there was no breath in them. God spoke to the prophet, "Speak to the breath and say Jehovah commands, come from the four winds, breath, and breathe upon these slain that they may live." Upon Ezekiel's call, the breath came into them, and they lived and stood upon their feet, in exceedingly great multitude.

God was fulfilling His promise of a restoration of His people, a continuing restoration which has never ceased one which we are priviledged to share in 1974. Recent religious national conventions point the way to reunion accompanied by a great forward movement in all of our various groups. The differences, we realize are not important but the common beliefs we share, are indeed an avenue to pursue and build on anew. There is a plea today to be a part in reclothing the various dry bones found in our various temples of worship by calling for God to stir and renew life in places of inaction, unbelief and simple resting on past accomplishments.

That day long ago, Ezekiel did not know whether or not his congregation would ever come alive, but he was aware that God knew and he hastened to carry out God's

What was his reward! Suddenly the scene of desolation became sublime. The dry bones became a vast army of living men. Listening to God's voice had wrought the miracle from a sad scene of utter desolation.







REMOVAL OF SHOES HAS SYMBOLIC AND SECULAR MEANING

"We read in the book of Ruth that it was the manner in former times, concerning redeeming and changing, that, to confirm all things, a man plucked off his shoe and gave it to his neighbor; and this was a testimony in Israel."

No explanation is given in Masonry as to the use of the paragraph. No hint is given as to its symbolism. Just where the practice of removing the shoe came from and why it was used in the lecture of the first degree is still a question among students.

One thing is agreed upon. The act of removing the shoe or shoes is known as the Rite of Discalceation. The practice was widespread among the early peoples.

At least three different shades of meaning are given by scholars for the practice of the rite - some of which exist and are practiced even

Probably the most generally known reason behind the act is that of a religious context. In addition to the Book of Ruth, the Bible contains several allusions to the Rite.

The removal of the shoes is taken as a token of respect whenever we are on or about

to approach holy ground.

The angel of the Lord said to Moses, "Draw not nigh hither; put off thy shoes from off thy feet, for the place whereon thou standest is holy ground.'

In the Book of Joshua is found the following: "And the captain of the Lord's host said unto Joshua: Loose thy shoe from off thy foot for the place whereon thou standest is holy."

An injunction given in Ecclesiastes says, "Keep thy foot when thou goest to the house of the Lord."

Pythagoras directed his disciples, "Offer sacrifice and worship with thy shoes off."
It is noted among the early

writings that the Gentiles were commanded by their priests to put off their shoes. Among the early eastern nations and Jews, it was the pious duty of the people to tread the pavement of the temple with unshod feet.

Mohammendams of today leave their slippers at the door of the mosque when entering or about to perform their devotions.

Writers and students gen-erally agree that the removal had a direct religious connotation and that the practice was so general that it deserved at that time only a mention.

Another allusion indicates that the act was one of humility and respect and had existed as an ancient and general tradition since time immemorial. It is quite certain that the removal was as much a secular and very practical custom as it was reli-

gious. It was universally the practice to remove the shoes (generally sandals) outside the door of a private house, even one's own, for, after traveling unpaved roads or dusty streets the footwear was unacceptable indoors.

This ceremony undoubtedly originated in some common everyday useful purpose, it being so prevalent that the ritual writers and compilers felt it was not necessary to discuss its meaning or symbolism except to call attention to the general usage of the rite by saying, "it was the manner in former times."

In a search for symbolism the student realizes that another secular meaning may be attached to the rite. The scene is changed from the temple or holy place or pri-vate home to the marketplace or money exchange.
The reference to the shoe

is really a symbol of a covenant to be entered into. This was not the religious rite of tradition, but a somewhat later practice. The giving of a shoe to a neighbor was not the decalceation but a strictly secular action. It was much like the "I.O.U." sometimes given today - the entering into an agreement. Apparently only one shoe or sandal was involved.

The religious connotation lay in the traditions from time of great antiquity.
