Dear Brother Herman

QUESTION: I attended a meeting at which the Tiler announced that three candidates were waiting to receive the degree. When the candidates were admitted there were four. We were told later that the fourth had arrived later. Isn't this a announce that the Service bit irregular?

ANSWER: It was highly irregular. Under Masonic law, when candidates are announced, every member has the right to object to any one or more receiving the degree, which must be respected once, (H.B.Sect. 662); or may demand a ballot, which must be respected every time (H.B.Sect. 1079). There was no such opportunity in the case of the fourth candidate, nor had the Master authorized that he receive the degree.

The proper method should have been, when the candidate appeared, for the Tiler to make the report in the usual manner to the Junior Deacon, and he to the Master, and if no objection is made, for the Master to direct that the candidate may join the others.

QUESTION: A brother living in Utica tells me that Utica is one of the safest cities in the country in which to live. Do you have any information?

ANSWER: In my files is a clipping from Ark Lodge News, Geneva, of which Rt. Wor. and Dr. John H. Stelter is editor. It lists the 50 safest cities in the United States in order of relative freedom from crime.

- 1. Lakewood, Ohio
- 2. Rome, N.Y.
- 3. Weymouth, Mass.
- 4. Utica, N.Y.

The only other city in New York among the 50 is Schenectady, which is No. 44.

We have no information on where Rochester ranks.



4. Would the regular employees of the building go on unemployment one-half of each month?

5. You do not promote something by minimizing it. One meeting a month would make it easier to "get out of the habit" of attending lodge.

I have had the privilege of sitting in on two of their meetings and I have a very high regard for their dedication and capabilities. We must remember that they need encouragement and constructive suggestions from us. I strongly feel that Masonry, with its high ideals and teachings, will survive with or without our ever, if our temple is to survive we must all take an interest and support the who has been appointed to a committee in any way we can.

You will be hearing more about the Brotherhood Fund soon. We have reached 91.5% of our total goal for the Think Big and Build Campaign! We are so close and Zetland Lodge can be rightfully proud!


