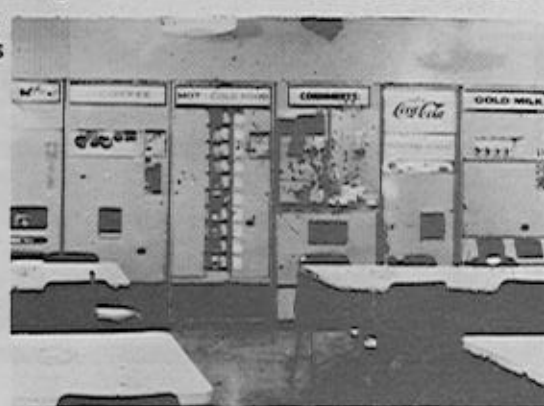

daical attendance. It might be better to send the minutes to the secretaries so that they could read them at lodge).

5. Revenue for February was \$6,450 from the auditorium and \$2,500 from the ballrooms.
