MASONIC GRAND MASTER AND WASHINGTON BIBLE HERE ON APRIL 8

Area Masons will celebrate Rochester's Sesquicentennial with an Open House at the Masonic Temple 875 East Main Street at Prince Street on April 8 from 1 to 5 P.M. to which the general public is cordially invited.

The Grand Master of Masons in the State of New York, M.W. Ernest Leonardi, will be present, and will speak at 2 P.M. and again at 4 P.M. in Cathedral Hall on the 4th floor. At the same sessions Congressmen Conable and Horton together with Sheriff Meloni will participate. The Mayor of Rochester, Thomas P. Ryan and County Manager Lucien A. Morin will present a formal proclamation to the Grand Master at the 4 P.M. session designating the day as Masonic Day in the City of Rochester.

In observance of this historic celebration, the George Washington Bible that was used in the first and subsequent presidential inaugurations, will be brought to Rochester by St. John's Lodge No. 1 of New York City and will be on display.

Most of the Masonic Lodges and allied organizations from this area will have booths on the



lower level of the Temple displaying historic artifacts.

Conducted tours of the building, movies, refreshments and continuous organ music in the Lodge rooms and the Auditorium Theatre are also part of the celebration.

This is a once in a lifetime opportunity for the fraternity to present Masonry and its history to the community at large. Bring your family and extend invitations to all your friends and neighbors.

Brethren:

Usually we are too busy, "just getting things done," to reflect on our experiences and truly organize our thoughts. I have tried to do this during the past year and evaluate, from time to time, the activities of Freemasonry at all levels. More and more, one theme or problem keeps recurring and surfacing. It appears to me that our most urgent need is to start effective:

COMMUNICATION

Three words are important in this statement. The first is, "communication." In many areas we are not even trying to communicate. Some notable, but by no means all, examples are: (1) Grand Lodge to Lodges and more importantly vice versa, (2) between Lodge officers/Masters and Brethren in both directions, and (3) within Lodges between various groups (Past Masters, Secretary, Master, and Officers).

The next significant word is "effective." Usually the breakdown in transmitting thoughts is the fault of the receiver not the sender. Letters which are written but not read, statements which are spoken but not heard or understood, occur routinely in our Fraternity and are examples of complete breakdown of communication.

Possibly the key word in all of this is "start." Let's look at this as a serious problem, NOW. I hear officers complaining that Masters are not giving them anything to do. Brethren report that they are not aware of what's going on. Your 1983-1984 Grand Lodge officers have tried to send out messages in many ways. Few have been received and then only in isolated cases. If Masonry is to prosper, we must all work together. Before we can do that we must start to effectively communicate.

Voting members will be the Beloved Queen, Senior and Junior Ladies of Triangle; the Master Councillor, Senior and Junior Councillors of DeMolay; and the Exalted Star of Light and Love, Star of Happiness and Star of Mercy of Constellation. Just For Today

"The Penitent Mood of Lent"

"Asking Little and Giving Much."

"Behold, we go up to Jerusalem." Luke 18.31

Sunday, April 15th is Palm Sunday, the anniversary of the day when Jesus rode into the city of Jerusalem. You remember that as he rode people who loved him spread palm branches in his path to honor him.

Why did they spread palm branches before him? Well, it was the custom in those days to welcome famous men to the city by spreading palm branches before them, just as New York City today welcomes famous men by filling the air and the streets with ticker-tape, confetti, and torn-up telephone books. Palm trees were plentiful in Palestine, and presumably also at Jerusalem. The people had to show honor and devotion to Jesus as he rode into the city, so they stripped branches from the palm trees and spread them in his path, as a sign of their love and devotion.

In all the vegetable kingdom there is no other tree that takes so little and gives so much.

In some parts of the world people couldn't live at all unless the palm tree was there to provide for them food, drink, clothing and shelter. Someone has listed 300 uses of the palm tree in the time of Jesus and I think there are many more uses now. Let's mention a few: — it is used for lumber, roofs, fans, baskets, hats, clothing, ropes, arrow tips, fish hooks, collar button, street-cleaning machines, fuel, and so on. Perhaps you have eaten the dates of the date palms and coconut of the coconut palms. In some places of the world, the palm tree is the chief source of food. It gives so very, very much.

One of the strange and wonderful things about the palms is this — that although they give so very much, they take for themselves very little. They take very little or no care at all. Most of the many kinds of palms grow wild and get along without all the coddling that apple and peach trees demand. They take very little water from the soil — they can grow in dry sandy soil. There is no tree among the thousands and thousands of trees that asks so little and gives so much.

Isn't it appropriate, then, that the people of Jerusalem should honor Jesus with branches from that palm tree and that in honor of him we should decorate our church with palms? He, like the palm tree, asked so little for himself and gave so much for others.

He asked that people give everything for the Kingdom he wanted to build — their money, their families, their highest loyalty, even their lives; but what did he ask for himself? I can remember only two things that Jesus asked for himself. He asked a Samaritan woman for a drink of water. And he asked a man named Zacchaeus if he could stay at his house for a day.

Jesus, like the palm tree, asked very little for himself but gave so much — all he had, his time, his talents, his prayers. He gave healing, friendship, peace of mind, and finally he gave his life. We do well to honor with palm branches on Palm Sunday him who asked for so little for himself and gave so much for others.

CABLETOW

According to the ancient laws of Freemasons, every brother must attend his lodge if within the length of his cabledow or a cables length. It was taken to be three miles for an Entered Apprentice. Originally, the cabledow was as long as an hours journey or three miles. The word is seldom found in dictionaries and is peculiarly Masonic. The word cable refers to a rope. The word tow refers to drag. Masonically, it is the scope of a man's reason or ability to accomplish his objective. A cabledow may have many lengths according to the man's ability or the scope of his desires. That is to say that the word Cabledow is a general term with no set length. It may be said, it is the length of a man's conscience between himself and his God. Only the individual can be the judge as to the length of his cabledow.

Masonically, this word has

many definitions, from the original CONSTITUTIONS it was intended to mean three miles. By 1785 it meant a day's journey. By the turn of the century (1800) it was defined as the distance a man could reasonably travel to his lodge on meeting nights. Some lodges even mentioned the requirement in their by-laws (within the town or city limits).

Originally (1717), it was called cable-rope. Then it was changed in the old ritual to cable-tau, which was defined as being taken from the German KABEL TAU which in German meant the cord which attached the infant to it's mother when first born. Symbolically, to the early Masons it meant the tie between the initiate and his mother lodge. At the Baltimore convention it was defined as "the scope of a man's reasonable ability."
