Masonic Endowment Committee Report

The ever watchful eyes and inherent talents of our Masonic brothers in the fields of finance have come up with a remarkable method of philanthropy, that not only permits one to make a contribution to the Masonic Medical Research Laboratory, but at the same time, to reap interest benefits for as long as you or your spouse lives. All this with the blessing of the I.R.S. It is called the "Pooled Income Fund."

Let us use a basic example: a typical Masonic brother, having drawn up his will, specifies that, upon his death, or the death of the surviving spouse; a bequest of \$5,000.00 is to be made to Masonic Charities; or, more specifically to the Masonic Research Laboratory in Utica. Now there is a better option. This same bequest can be made while he still lives. It is turned over to the "Pooled Income Fund" which is then handled almost like a mutual fund. As long as the donor and his wife live, they receive income from the amount, and upon the death of the surviving member, the principal will revert to the Masonic Medical Research Laboratory. In the meantime, the donor had the privilege of using the bequest as a deduction during his lifetime, when he most needed it; all at the direction of his accountant or

Grand Master Praises Masonic Open House

Area Masons received highest compliments from Most Worshipful Ernest Leonardi for their support and participation in Rochester's Sesquicentennial (1834-1984) celebration Sunday afternoon, April 8th, in the Temple Civic Center. "This building is the finest and one of the most architecturally pleasing Temples anywhere in this and nearby states," according to the Grand Master who was keynote speaker in the spacious Cathedral hall with its 3-story high vaulted Gothic ceiling.

An unexpected guest was put promptly on the program - Rt. Wor. Calvin Bond, Deputy Grand Master. Other notables were Bro. Jack Slattery, Master of Ceremonies; Rt. Wor. Ken Crawford, Past Senior Grand Warden; Rt. Wor. Frank Horton, Congressman 29th District; Bro. Barber Conable, Congressman 30th District; Bro. Sheriff Andrew Meloni; Mayor Tom Ryan and Deputy County Executive Ralph Esposito (acting for Lucien Morin) presented a joint City/County Proclamation declaring April 8th as Masonic Temple Day in the City and

A presentation to the Rochester Historical Society and to R.I.T. was made by Bro. Jim Crockford, for the Masons, in appreciation of their combined efforts in recreating the Wells Lodge Charter, dated June 5, 1817 in the Village of Rochester, Genesee County (at that time). The Charter was authorized by Governor and Grand Master DeWitt Clinton, and so began Masonry in Rochester. The Charter is now permanently mounted in the Temple lobby.

The programs also included: guided building tours, under the direction of Rt. Wor. Bill Zufall and assisted by a number of "Blue Coats" - the Senior Wardens of the 1st & 2nd

burns prevention was shown by Bro. Bob Green; the historic George Washington Bible was displayed in the first floor lounge under the watchful eyes of five Brothers from St. John's Lodge #1 in New York City. The cost of bringing the Bible to Rochester was underwritten by The Masters & Wardens Association; Wor. Cy Kloner hosted the New York visitors and also provided personal security for the historic treasure. Bro. Jim Crockford was in charge of obtaining and setting up all the signs, and the 36 booths which displayed historic Masonic artifacts by many Lodges, ladies' and youth organizations, concordant bodies, and by local Councils of the Knights of Columbus. In addition to Rochester Theatre Organ Society providing an artist at the mighty Wurlitzer in the Auditorium, three of our own Brothers were at the organ consoles in lodge rooms - Wr. Bob Cook, Bro. David Cordy, and Bro. Jim Branigan. Youth activities in Gothic Hall were initiated and organized by Wor. Ron Bertie.

Open to the general public, an estimated 1,600 people attended between 1 and 5 pm. Reports have been received that about a dozen men made inquiries regarding the procedure to gain admission into Masonry.

The local TV Station (Channel 10), under the direction of Gabe Dalmuth, not only covered the Open House but also produced a mini-series about the Craft entitled, "Masonry Comes To Light" which was on the air during the early and late newscasts from Sunday thru Friday. The programs covered current and historic aspects of Masonry and presented our Fraternity in a friendly manner.



FREEMASON'S IN IRAN

Perhaps because the Grand Lodge of Iran belongs to the Scottish Rite family of Freemasons the ignorant revolutionaries on Ayatollah Khomeini's council associated its members with Scotland and England . . . and it came to the conclusion that the Masons of Iran were British spies.

A list of Masons in Iran was extracted by torture and pieced together from seized documents. When it was published in Teheran newspapers the public learned that the high officials had already been executed. The Masonic Temple was destroyed on orders issued by the Ayatollah Khomeini.

Questioned about the executions, Minister of Foreign Affairs Sadegh Ghotzabadeh who himself was later executed for treason replied; "The Freemasons were British agents. That is why we had to denounce them before the public."

SCOTTISH RITE

The word Scottish has led many Masons to believe that the Rite originated in Scotland. Such is not the case. Actually, the first reference to the Rite appears in old French records where the word "Ecossais" (meaning Scottish) is to be found. During the latter part of the Seventeenth century when the British Isles were torn by strife, many Scots fled to France and resumed their Masonic interests in that country. It is felt that this influence contributed to the use of the word "Scottish".

The earliest documented records trace the actual beginnings of the Rite to Bordeaux, France, about the middle of the Eighteenth century. From there it was carried to the French possessions in the West Indies and then to the United States. The first Supreme Council was established in Charleston, S.C., in 1801, and all other regular Supreme Councils throughout the world are decended from

The Supreme Council for Scotland did not come into existence until 1846. Antecedents of Scottish Rite existed in Albany, New York, as early as 1767. The first Supreme Council was organized in 1801 (Charleston, S.C.) to cover the United States. In 1813 the Northern Juristiction came into being as the United States expanded and as an offshoot of the Charleston group. There are now two Supreme Councils in the United States. The Northern Juristiction is headquartered in Boston and covers 15 Northeastern, middle Atlantic and Midwestern states. The Southern Juristiction is headquartered in Washington D.C. and covers the remaining 35 states, the District of Columbia, and its U.S. territories and possessions.
