
The honor was presented at the annual preceptory steak roast hosted by Jim & Myrt Gisleson on July 28th.

## Just For Today

"Some Examples"

Character is not hereditary, but its example is. Our parents, grandparents, and friends stand forth as teachers, but their greatest lessons are those which they do not talk about — but prove by example. And so it is that we read of those who have done good things, and great things, leaving a trail of light behind their years of activity. We watch those about us for light, and listen to them for some guidance, enriched as they have become, through test and experience.

The child looks up to its parents, which is natural, and is guided by example more than those parents ever realize. Yes, we watched our parents and derived satisfaction from their doing things that have a permanence to them. Working merely to make money, or to enlarge out earning capacity, has little, if any, permanence to it, for a great fortune can be swept away almost over night. But the reputation for kindliness, for steadfastness of faith in the higher things of life, and for ideals pursued, live long after, all else has been forgotten.

It is written of Jesus that "he was tempted in all points as we are, yet without sin." The example of his life is the perfect one to which we can safely follow.

When I came to the pastorate of the Hilton Baptist Church in October of 1938, there were men on the Board of Deacons and Trustees who were Masons. By their example of faithfulness, hard work in implementing the program of the church, and pride which they had in belonging to the Masonic Fraternity, led me to ask for membership. Had their example been lackluster, or lacking in warmth, or a desire to serve — who knows! I might never have had the marvelous opportunities which Masonary has given me.

Someone has said: "After all, what do we ask of life, here or indeed hereafter, but to serve, to live, to commune with our fellowmen and with ourselves; and from the lap of earth to look up into the face of God."

## What is Masonic Discipline?

Masonic discipline is a rather broad subject. More time will be spent at the next Leadership Workshop on November 29, 1984. Masonic discipline is divided into at least two parts. The first is that which a Mason imposes upon himself and is best described as his own endeavor to obtain personal perfection. This is demonstrated by our own actions as Masons and not only in our Lodge rooms but outside our Masonic circles within the community. Our actions in the Lodge, the way we give Masonic signs and meet our brothers demonstrate our devotion to these Masonic principles.

There is also the discipline of Masonic Law. New York State Masonry recognizes Masonic Law as it has developed since 1717. There have been many interpretations through Masonic Trials, Grand Masters and other Grand Committees since that time. Like civil law they become somewhat complicated. Even today many points can and will be subject to further clarification. Scholars will not always agree on their meaning.

A Mason may be subject to discipline before he becomes a Mason and after he has demited from the craft. His offenses may be founded solely upon Masonic procedures or upon his civil actions. Circumstances may be such that civil guilt may not prove Masonic guilt. Each offense must be considered upon its own merit.

The infliction of punishment upon an offending Mason is limited to the Master of the Lodge, but his ability to inflict punishment is very limited. The Grand Master has the greatest authority as he can reject the charge, decide to handle to handle it himself or to bring it to Masonic Trial. If he does bring it to trial there are very detailed procedures are outlined in the constitutions which must be strictly adhered to. Masonic discipline is not a subject to be taken lightly. It requires much study and a detailed understanding of Masonic Law and procedures.
