He states, "the lodge notice is the one regular point of contact between the lodge and its members. It should be used to communicate important information about the following: (at the minimum)"

- Type of program for each meeting
- List of officers and key addresses

 - Future events
- Important district and grand lodge functions and ap-

- Major committees

"The lodge notice need not be fancy, lengthy, or expensive, but it should be neat, eyecatching, and informative. The basic purpose is to attract the member to attend his lodge."

Greetings:

It is again time to announce dates and plans for "Camp Turk," the Masonic Youth Camp. The low cost is only \$120.00 for 2 weeks of camping, PLUS a \$20.00 registration fee. The \$20.00 registration fee must accompany the application and the \$120.00 balance may be paid prior to or on arrival at camp.

If a camper desires to stay a second 2 weeks, there would be an additional charge of \$140.00. If they register for both sessions, be sure they enclose the registration fee for both sessions. Make all checks payable to GRAND LODGE YOUTH COMMITTEE. Please forward applications to the Chairman by June 1, to give the committee time to balance attendance, complete staffing and send necessary information to the campers.

Camp is held on the Masonic Home Camp Grounds, Woodgate, New York. There will be two camping sessions of 2 weeks each for boys followed by two camping sessions of 2 weeks each for girls. Campers may register for either 2 or 4 weeks of camping. The dates for 1985 are:

Boys Camp - First session - June 30-July 13. Second session - July 14-July 27.

Girls Camp - First session - July 28-August 10. Second session - August 11-August 24.

Instructions are given in swimming, water skiing, soccer, archery, tennis, basketball and many other sports. We have a music program, an extensive arts and crafts program plus presentations on many professions, vocations and avocations. In girls camp, we also include color guard, cheerleading, sewing, ballet, and modern dance. There is something for everybody.

Participation is open to children and grandchildren, nieces, and nephews of Masons and to the members of the four Masonic Oriented Youth Groups: Constellation, De-Molay, Rainbow and Triangle. Campers must be 13, 14, 15 or 16 years of age as of the opening

Camp Turk will welcome visitors any day while in session. However, we would especially welcome delegations on Grand Master's Day, which this year will be Sunday, July 21. There will be a ballgame, campers versus Masons, a religious service, open swimming, guided tours of camp, plus an area for tailgate picnics.

Symbolically the Statue and the Island are our monuments of Freedom and Hope. To accomplish our task funds must come from the private sector, the grass roots - from you and from me.

You may ask, "If I pay toward this thing what do I get in return?" A fair question in our kind of economy - receiving value for value. Perhaps we can find the answer; let me take you back three score years.

Many of us have parents or grandparents who were among the 17 million people who came past the Statue of Liberty, thru the adjacent Ellis Island on their way to a new life in a new land. If they were like my parents and myself, they came to this country with very little in the way of money or possessons.

Their goals were really very simple. They wanted only to provide an opportunity for their families and their children to improve themselves, and in doing so, they established a freedom of spirit that prevails in no other country.

They also came with deep traditions - and they lent those traditions to their new country.

They came with skills and

They were hardworking in a time when hard work was not something to be avoided.

They were builders.

Our job now is to bring a new life to these symbols of America's heritage. It is also our job to bring new life to the principles, long espoused by our Masonic Fraternity, that sustained our parents and grandparents, and guided this country to greatness.

Sure, that was a long time ago, but allow me to advance the clock 20 years to the Autumn of 1945.

The huge ship churning into New York Harbor was greeted by hundreds of vessels large and small, and glistening geysers spraying from the Fire Boats. What a great welcome for us, the 4,000 troops who for years dreamt of seeing the New York skyline again. We had seen the

New York State Masons have Tower of London, the U-Boat pens in Brittany, the Eiffel Tower, the Remagen Bridge over the Rhine, and the Beer Hall in Munich.

And now the most glorious monument in all the world the Statue of Liberty! Our ship listed to port as we strained to see her greet us with upraised-

We saluted each other. We wept unashamedly.

This feeling, these experiences, mulitplied millions of times, are the values that will be cherished and recounted for generations.

One hundred years ago American school children sacrificed their precious pennies, nickels and dimes to help build the statue pedestal. We can do no less; please contribute your dollars, even one dollar shows you care.

Lets Push Community Service

I send sincere best wishes to our Brothers and Sisters out of State. Those who have retreated to the south; sunshine, warm days, dry roads. As some of you will soon be departing for your northern adventure, I ask that you do one thing special and timely for those who wintered here. BRING SUNSHINE AND WARM DAYS with you.

The news articles in the February and March issues have seen dedicated to Fellowship and Youth respectively. It is important that we push ourselves to work harder and more often to support/participate in these Masonic projects. We've also talked all year about Communications and communicating masonry internally and externally. What better way can we accomplish these principles than thru Community Service, "with our hands and hearts."

What service to your community can the members of your lodge promote and engage themselves in? Let me tell about some projects around the state:

Warsaw Lodge 549 Warsaw, N.Y., Genesee-Wyoming District. For its program called "Alive 55." It sponsored a safe driving course in co-operation with the Traffic Safety Board of the American Association of Retired People. This course enabled persons over 55 to learn safe driving, get a 10% reduction on their Auto Insurance and removes points from driving violation.

Bethlehem Lodge 1096 — Albany District — Sponsors a "Neighborhood-Girl Scout Craft Fair" at the Masonic Temple. This Program promotes the Girl Scouts and helps the local "Tomboy Baseball League".

Belmont Lodge 474, Allegany District; for its organized project to help repair damage to the local cemeteries.

Sullivan District; Masons of this mountain area get together in "work parties" to chop wood which is then distributed to the needy and the handicapped.

O-AT-KA Lodge 759 — Second Monroe District — For its program of repairing and painting homes of the disabled in the town.

Yonnandio Lodge 163 — First Monroe District — For its Program of classes the elderly, the young and the disabled in Rochester.

An unusual project came from Morning Star Lodge 524, in the Second Onondaga District, where they teach a "Bowhunters Course," soon to





The Missing Links of Masonary

In the year 1888, Dr. Petrie, an archeologist, discovered a sunken depression of many hundred square miles in the Libyan desert, in which he found evidence of the existence of a number of cities which at one time had rich civilizations.

In his excavations, Dr. Petrie located the remains of a large irrigation system which supplied the entire area with water. This vast irrigation system proved that a highly intelligent group of builders had constructed it in the year 300 B.C., an engineering feat which would rival the T.V.A. project of today.

April 22 — Third Degree (Tux) Dinner Later, in 1889, Dr. Petrie uncovered a tomb in one of the cities identified as Hawara. In it he found many cases filled with papyri (paper) on which in Lonie, a form of Greek, was written a form of diary of the period 100 B.C.

Later, in 1896 Dr. Petri with two of his assistants, Arthur Hond and B.P. Grenfell, and with the assistants of the documents he had previousely found, excavated a city by the name of Oxyrynchus, in which he made one of the greatest discoveries of actual written proof of the existence of an Ancient Mysteries Cult or guild which existed in the year 2000 B.C. It told of these ancient guilds holding secret meetings in much the same manner as they were held in the 200 B.C. That organization had a dual purpose: First to control hours, wages and rules for daily labor. Second, it had a chapel in which it worshiped, and set up relief for widows, orphans and other workers in distress. It also stated in the old records that the guilds had a Patron Saint, with feasts and holy days at set times of the year. When these guilds met they had the equivalent of Masters and Wardens. They gave relief and also had burial

It is interesting to note that the large deposit of papers found were an assortment of what we might call today trash from our attics or basements. They included notes and business transactions of the day, letters, business ledgers, poems, songs, tax receipts, daily news, financial reports, and sermons or speeches. In fact, it was the daily picture of the business man in the year 300 B.C. to 300 A.D. Just scrapes of paper with

These records were translated and digested by scholars. A manuscript called VOLUMES OF THE PAPYRI was written and printed. It is in the British Museum today.

an age of knowledge.

The Oxyrynches manuscripts, as they are called, gave clear proof of the existence of an organization or craft in 2000 B.C. which closely resembled the operative Masons of 1600 and 1700 A.D. It also proved to be a high form of education which being kept secret for 2000 years was lost at some period around 300 A.D. When that civilization died, the secrets of the building of the pyramids died with them.


