### Hanukkah

On Sunday, December 8, 1985, brethren of the Jewish faith, in common with Jews throughout the world, will celebrate the festival of Hanukkah, an event which many people surprisingly believe is the Jewish equivalent of Christmas. This is a myth, and has no foundation in fact or in history.

Hanukkah predates Christmas by almost two centuries, and is regarded as a festival rather than a holy-day, since it is intended to celebrate a noteworthy event in Jewish history, characterized as a "miracle." The only possible association between the two is that frequently Hanukkah and Christmas occur very close to each other, and that it is a time for Jewish children traditionally to receive gifts, usually of money, in honor of the occasion.

The word "Hanukkah" means dedication, and the festival so-named commemorates the victory almost 200 years before common era (175 B.C.) by Jewish stalwarts who revolted against the brutal tyranny of their Syrian-Greek oppressors. These occupying forces had pillaged the holy sanctuary, erected profane statues and other idolatrous figures, and subjected the people to the most humiliating servitude.

The revolution was successful, the occupying forces were dispersed, and the leaders proceded to the sanctuary for the purpose of cleansing and re-dedicating the holy shrine. One of the most sacred objectives was the "eternal light," which burned perpetually, and which was fueled by an oil the ingredients of which could only be prepared by the priests, who alone knew the secret. oil to burn for one day, and it would take several days for enough supplies to be prepared to keep the light burning.

Nevertheless, the light was kindled, and to the amazement and delight of the people, the small supply actually burned for eight days. In their eyes, this was regarded as a miracle, and to celebrate the event, it was decreed that there should be an annual commemoration to last eight days, during which lights (candles) would be lit, one the first day, two the second, and so

One of the major items closely associated with Hanukkah is the candelabra known as the menorah, and which today is identified with many things Jewish.

From the religious standpoint, Hanukkah, as explained above, is not a religious holyday (in the same sense, e.g. as Yom Kippur, Passover, Tabernacles, etc.) and Jews are permitted to go about their daily routines as in any ordinary

For those who may be further interested, references to the festival can be found in the first four chapters of the First Book of Maccabees, and also in the Bible, Numbers (chapters viiixii), which give a fuller account of the historical background to Hanukkah.





### Give Our New Brothers Responsibility In Lodge

Brethren:

A recurring problem in all Lodges seems to be that many of our newly raised brethren fail to become active in Lodge activities and become "card carriers" rather than involved Masons. Somehow we must generate greater interest in these new Master Masons. I feel that the best way to do this is to give these new members responsibility in line with their capabilities. For example, I would suggest that if there is a vacant chair on any given evening, have him fill that chair. The Master or one of the Wardens should coach him quietly to avoid his being embarrassed by any mistakes that he might make. Or, he could be put on a Committee with more experienced brethren to help give him an insight as to the workings of the Lodge and to make him feel that he is making a meaningful contribution. Again, he could be asked to help coach candidates that immediately follow him in receiving their degrees. You are aware, I am sure, that Grand Lodge wishes to increase the per capita dues effective in 1987. There are many reasons why this increase is needed, and over the next few messages I plan to outline some of these reasons as presented by Grand Lodge. Right now, the per capita for Grand Lodge is \$7.50, of which \$3.25 is mandated by the Constitutions for the use of the Trustees of the Masonic Home, which means that Grand Lodge currently is operating on \$4.25 per member. With this present per capita fee,





### racts about AIDS

AIDS is a serious condition, characterized by a specific defect in natural immunity against disease. People who suffer from AIDS become susceptible to a variety of rare illnesses. These illnesses are not usually found in people whose immune system is normal; if they occur, they are relatively mild. The two diseases most commonly found in AIDS patients are Penumocystis carinii pneumonia, a lung infection caused by a parasite, and Kaposi's sarcoma, a rare form of cancer or tumor of the blood vessel walls.

What causes AIDS?

Researchers at the National Institutes of Health, an arm of the Public Health Service, have discovered the probable cause of AIDS, a close relative of a known human retrovirus associated with adult Leukemia/Lymphoma. It is called HTLV-111, and was isolated by Dr. Robert C. Gallo, Jr., of the National Cancer Institute.

In addition, Dr. Gallo and his associates have developed a new process to mass produce the virus. This has made possible the development of a blood test that will indicate exposure to the AIDS virus. The test is expected to be widely available very soon.

What are its symptoms?

Many AIDS patients recall having some symptoms before being diagnosed. These symptoms may include fever, night sweats, swollen glands (enlarged lymph nodes) - in neck, armpits, or groin, unexplained weight loss, yeast infection diarrhea, persistent coughs, fatigue and loss of appetite. Anyone with prolonged, persistent symptoms should consult a physician.

Who gets AIDS?

Nearly 95% of the AIDS cases have occurred in people belonging to one of six distinct groups.

- Sexually active homosexual and bisexual men with multiple sex partners. This group accounts for more than 70% of all reported cases.
- Present or past abusers of intravenous drugs, 17%;
- Haitian entrants into the United States, 4%;
- Patients who have been transfused with blood or blood products, 1%;
- Steady sexual partners of persons with AIDS or persons in groups at high risk for AIDS, 1%.
- Hemophiliacs, 0.7%.

Although recent Haitian entrants are considered a high risk of a acquiring AIDS, the reasons for the incidence of the disease in this group remain under investigation.

Some patients have not been from these groups, but researchers believe that transmission occurred in similar ways. Infants and children who have developed AIDS or a syndrome similar to AIDS may have been exposed to AIDS before or during birth, or have a history of transfusions. Some patients died before histories could be taken.

Risk groups have been established for epidemiologic and surveillance purposes and to track the occurrence of AIDS. The fact that a group is considered at high risk for AIDS should not be an excuse for discrimination.

How is AIDS transmitted?

AIDS is transmitted primarily through sexual contact or through blood from a person who has AIDS. Most of the cases have been in homosexual and bisexual men with multiple sex partners.

AIDS has also been found in intravenous drug abusers, leading investigators to suspect that AIDS is transmitted by blood on contaminated needles that have been shared. Other evidence for transmission of AIDS through blood products was found in the occurrence of AIDS in hemophilia patients receiving large amounts of Factor VIII, a clotting substance in blood.

How contagious is AIDS?

No cases have been found where AIDS has been transmitted by casual or normal household contact with AIDS patients or persons in the high risk groups. Although HTLV-lll virus has been found in saliva of some persons at risk for AIDS, there have been no cases in which saliva was shown to be the route of transmission. Ambulance drivers, police, and firemen who have assisted AIDS patients have not become ill. Nurses, doctors, and health care personnel have not developed AIDS from exposure to AIDS patients.

Is there a danger of contracting AIDS from donating blood?

Absolutely not. Blood banks and other blood collection centers use sterile equipment and disposable needles. Thus, there is no chance that a needle used for one blood donor would be used for another. The need for blood is always acute, and people who are not in the high-risk groups are urged to continue to donate blood as they have in the past.

What about receiving blood transfusions?

The discovery of the AIDS virus now makes it possible to have a blood test which should make it possible to identify people with antibodies to the AIDS virus, to help assure that blood for transfusion is free from contamination. Thus, many transfusion-related AIDS cases, including those which might appear in hemophiliacs, may be preventable.

Few cases of transfusion-related AIDS cases have occurred, and most occurred before blood banks began asking persons who are at risk of AIDS to refrain from donating blood.

Even before the availability of a blood test for AIDS, the risk of contracting AIDS through a blood transfusion was very slight. The medical necessity of blood transfusions far outweighed that risk.

How is AIDS treated?

Many biomedical investigators are working on methods of treating the specific immune defects found in AIDS patients. Although no treatment has yet been successful in restoring the immune system of an AIDS patient to normal function, doctors have had some success in using drugs, radiation and surgery to treat the various illnesses suffered by AIDS patients. Pneumocystis carinii, for example, can be treated with antibiotics. Interferon, a virus-fighting protein produced naturally by the body, has been used with some success against Kaposi's sarcoma. Natural and recombinant interleukin preparations are being used in an attempt to. repair the immunologic deficiencies in AIDS patients.

Identification of the HTLV-lll virus as the causative agent of AIDS has led to clinical studies of suramin, an antiviral agent. Therapeutic agents are needed for all stages of AIDS infections, to block action of the virus once infection has occurred, and to build up immunity in patients who have developed AIDS symptoms.

Can AIDS be prevented?

The recent discovery of the AIDS virus and methods for producing large quantities of the virus for experimental and production purposes enables scientists to work at developing a vaccine for preventing AIDS.

Availability of the blood test for antibodies to the AIDS virus, mentioned above, will also help prevent transfusion-related AIDS, and AIDS in hemophiliacs.

In the meantime, the Public Health Service has recommended that the following steps be taken to prevent spread of AIDS:


- Avoid sexual contact with persons known or suspected of having AIDS.
- Avoid having sex with multiple partners who may be in the high-risk groups, and avoid sexual contact with persons who have multiple partners in the high-risk groups.
- Members of high-risk groups should refrain from donating
- Physicians should order blood transfusions for patients only when medically necessary. Health workers should use extreme care when handling hypodermic needles.
- Don't use IV drugs unless ordered by your physician. If you use IV drugs, then don't share needles and syringes (boiling does not guarantee sterility). Don't have sex with people who abuse IV drugs.

In addition, the FDA has advised blood and plasma collection centers to provide information on AIDS to potential donors, asking those in high-risk groups to refrain from donating. Blood bank personnel have been advised to learn to detect the early signs of AIDS.

What is the hope for the future?

Scientific research often does not provide quick solutions to problems as complex as AIDS. But the recent discovery of the AIDS virus, coupled with the scope and sophistication of current investigative efforts, gives reason for hope and the expectation that they will lead to steady progress against this devastating illness. The blood test that will be available soon may make it possible to detect AIDS in patients at a very early stage, when treatment may be more effective than it has been among present day patients whose illness was detected only after the immune system was severely affected. The further hope is that a vaccine will be developed to prevent AIDS within the next few years.

Religions are maintained by tithing, and it is time we maintained our Temple in the same manner. Tithing is 10%, but knowing the length of our cabletow, even if every Mason in Monroe County could give 1% per week, we would be answering THE GRAND HAILING SIGN. There are 6,500 Masons in the County, if each gave \$2.00 a week, that would be an income of \$13,000 weekly, \$52,000 a month, and \$676,000 per year to repair, maintain, and pay for the operation of the Temple.


