Facts From the Deputy Grand Master

FACT SHEET ON THE PROPOSED GRAND LODGE \$5 PER
CAPITA FEE INCREASE

BACKGROUND

Grand Lodge has one principal source of operating funds -- per capita dues (presently \$4.25 x current membership of 141,551), and we are losing about 5,000 members a year.

The remaining \$3.25 of the present \$7.50 per capita dues is mandated by the Constitutions for the use of the Trustees of the Masonic Home. It cannot be touched by Grand Lodge. (It has been suggested that this amount can be taken as a tax deduction to a charitable organization, if the Lodge secretary so indicates on each brother's dues envelope or statement.)

Recently, Grand Lodge has operated "in the red" on its annual budget. We have dipped into our reserves, but only an amount equivalent to one year's budget remains as a reserve. It is not an adequate reserve.

Grand Lodge per capita dues should have been substantially raised several years ago. The last increase was 75 cents in 1981, which was not enough, given the impact of inflation on costs and the declining revenues from a falling membership.

It is clear that a substantial increase is critically needed now, if Empire State Masonry is to upgrade its operations to meet the needs and demands of its constituent members, respond to external challenges and move forward with the times.

THE VOTE AT GRAND LODGE IN MAY, 1985

At a series of meetings in the Spring of 1985, the Grand Line and the Board of Grand Masters discussed in detail the over-all financial picture, and agreed that a significant increase in per capita dues was essential. It was the majority view that a total of \$5 was needed, and this was to be derived from a \$3 increase and a transfer of \$2 from the Trustees' portion. The day before Grand Lodge convened, the Constitutions Committee considered this proposal and decided not to touch the Trustees' money, in view of the potential from problems with government agencies that administer funds paid to the Trustees for the operation of the Home at Utica. Accordingly, it was moved to amend the original proposal by making the dues increase \$5 instead of \$3.

It was obviously a surprise to the Grand Lodge assembled to learn, with virtually no advance notice, that they would be voting for the first time on a \$5 increase in per capita dues. This move undoubtedly came as a shock to a substantial number of attendees who had previously been told by the Grand Line that a vote would be taken on the "\$3 & \$2" proposal. Nevertheless, the first consideration by Grand Lodge resulted in the approval of the \$5



proposal. It will be submitted to a second and final vote in May, 1986 at Grand Lodge, and if passed will require the payment of per capita dues of \$12.50 in March, 1987 on lodge members on the rolls as of December 31, 1985.

REASONS FOR THE PER CAPITA INCREASE

During the past year, meetings have been held in each District and at the Regional level to elicit grassroots ideas for consideration by the special Long-Range Planning Committee. A preliminary report of this information-gathering process was given by the Chairman at Grand Lodge. Running through the District and Regional reports and the Committee's own deliberations were several ideas and suggestions. Significantly, all of these would cost money -- money not currently available in the Grand Lodge budget.

Here are some reasons why the proposed dues increase is needed:

- 1. You have expressed a need for a completely new Statewide communications program, possibly employing paid advertising, to tell the story of Freemasonry to the general public. It would have to be created and carried out by professionals, and would cost money which we do not have. Some elements of this program might include:
 - new brochures and booklets
- an audio-visual presentation for use in the Lodge and with outside groups
 - a stepped-up "outreach" program involving speakers' kits
 - paid advertising in print, broadcast and billboard media
- the issuance of press releases and background press material tied-in to Lodges at the Community level
- the preparation of a series of public service TV and radio spot announcements
- 2. Augmentation of the Grand Lodge headquarters staff is necessary, to replace personnel in the Grand Secretary's office who have left, due to retirement or death, and were not replaced. One or two of these new staff people would specialize in servicing District and Lodge needs, assisting Lodge officers with programming and other problems. As necessary, they would be available to travel across the State on trouble-shooting assignments.
- 3. It is a time for a revamping of the Empire State Mason magazine, eliminating advertising and devoting the entire 32 pages (or more) to Masonic editorial material. District news would be restored. The 50-cents-per-capita present allotment would have to be increased to 75 cents to cover the entire cost of this revised
- 4. Our internal communications require the creation of a new monthly Grand Lodge Newsletter, a 4-page, offset publication to be sent to all Grand Lodge officers and committeemen, as well as to each Worshipful Master. Its contents would include current news, a message from the Grand Master, a schedule of coming events, special articles, etc. This Newsletter would eliminate the need for the many mailings each month, and concentrate attention on the most important developments.
- 5. The computerization of Grand Lodge records has to be continued and expanded to include a complete registry and other information of use to Grand Lodge and individual Lodges.
- A fund should be established to assist Lodges whose temples. are in serious financial difficulty. A loan system should be set up to 'bail out' local situations until a permanent remedy is found.
- 7. The movement of the Annual Grand Lodge Communication to locations other than NYC, if approved on the second vote in 1986, would involve increased costs that would have to be met from the per capita dues.
- 8. The need to increase the reimbursement of travel expenses of Lodge representatives attending the Annual Communication of Grand Lodge must be considered.
- 9. Grand Lodge participation in the State Fair and County Fairs should be increased through additional funding and the creation of professionally-designed displays.
- 10. The present educational programs should be revised and expanded. This would entail preparation of new printed materials for distribution to Lodges.
- 11. There is a need for an Assistant to the Grand Master to help with the great volume of correspondence and other administrative chores. A paid staff position.

These are just some of the activities and projects that should be undertaken and which cannot be done unless the \$5 per capita dues increase is passed. Failure to do so would greatly curtail Grand Lodge activities, and make it very difficult to achieve the desired "turn-around" of Freemasonry in New York.

IT SHOULD BE NOTED THAT NO MENTION HAS BEEN MADE OF NEEDED IMPROVEMENTS IN MASONIC HALL AT 23RD STREET IN NYC. The title to this property is held by the Trustees who maintain and manage it, and no part of Grand Lodge dues, present or future, can be used for this purpose.

The Grand Line and Past Grand Masters support the \$5 per capita increase as a necessary move at this time.

Freemasonry is being attacked by many church organizations and other groups today around the world. Our answer must be a positive program of correct information about the Fraternity. If we want a thriving, growing Craft in the next few years, we must have the financial resources to meet this challenge. It is up to each of us to carry this message back to the officers and members of our lodges.

My Brethren:



Greetings:

Now that you've had a calm, restful, and enjoyable summer, let's get back to the real world.

While you folks were enjoying life, we, the trustees, were meeting making news for this column.

From our minutes of June and July (the August meeting is two days hence):

1. An offer to purchase our building was received from the Bethel Full Gospel Church group. Although it is an offer, we are very far apart, and much discussion and deliberation will be forthcoming before we can take it seriously.

2. A letter was received informing us that W.C. Hubbard is merging with Wakan Lodge, so we will lose a tenant and owner next year.

3. The rodeo idea was dropped before it really got off

the ground.

4. The proposal received regarding the erection of a sign on the College Avenue side of the building was sent back to the drawing board for more work.



Can Life Be Extended?

National Institute on Aging

Why do people grow old and die? Can anything be done to slow aging or extend life? These questions have been around as long as man himself, but there are still no simple answers.

Each day scientists learn more about changes in the human body as it ages. But why these changes occur is still a mystery. Most scientists believe that aging is a complex process involving many body systems.

What Causes Aging?

There are many theories about why aging and death occur. All of them focus on what happens in the body's cells as time goes by. Changes occur which alter the cells' ability to function. When enough cells are altered, aging changes - and finally death - result.

Some theories of aging suggest that such changes are due to a built-in genetic program. Just as early growth and development follow a set timetable, so do maturity, aging, and death. (The life-life timetable, however, is much more variable than the early-life one.)

Other theories assume that aging is caused by damage that occurs in various body systems throughout life. Such damage could be caused by "wear and tear", harmful substances that we breathe and eat, or natural processes within the body. The "damage" theories hold pro-mise that such changes might someday be corrected or avoided and life expectancies extended. However, they also have opened the way for aging 'treatments' that scientists do not endorse.

Proposed "Antiaging" Treatments

One damage theory says that aging is caused by free radicals. These chemicals are produced naturally in all animals that use oxygen. They bounce around inside body cells, often damaging their membranes and the vital proteins, fats, and DNA

(deoxyribonucleic acid) within them.

To protect itself, the body "antioxidants", compounds which block much of this free radical damage. Some antioxidants, such as SOD (superoxide dismutase), are produced in the body. Others (vitamins A and C and the minerals zinc and selenium, for example) are gotten from food.

Based on this theory, some people suggest that you can extend your life by taking large amounts of antioxidant supplements. There is no evidence that this will work. The body's needs for antioxidants can be met by eating a variety of nutritious foods. There is no reason to believe that extra amounts will do a better job of fighting free radicals. Furthermore, taking large doses of some of these vitamins and minerals can be harmful. Oral supplements of antioxidants such as SOD have no effect because they are digested before body cells can use them.

Another theory says that aging results from a slow buildup of damage to the DNA in body cells. DNA directs the machinery of every cell. Eventually, DNA damage would cause cells, then body tissues and organs, to break down or die.

Supplements containing DNA and RNA (ribonucleic acid, which works with DNA in the cell) are being sold to slow aging, cure senilty, and treat skin and hair changes. Again, there is no scientific evidence to support such claims. Like SOD, DNA and RNA preparations are useless because the body cannot absorb them.

According to another theory, changes in body hormones are responsible for aging. At some point, a gland such as the pituitary releases a hormone (or fails to produce one) and aging changes begin.

For example, scientists have shown that a hormone called DHEA (dehydroepiandrosterone) which is pro-

duced in the andrenal gland may play a role in aging. Young humans have higher levels of DHEA in their blood than do older ones, and DHEA supplements seem to help laboratory rats stay healthy and live

Because of these findings, a preparation labelled DHEA is being sold as a life extender. However, the tablets contain such small amounts of DHEA that they could not possibly have an effect. Furthermore, DHEA supplements have not been tested in humans. Scientists do not even know if large amounts would affect longevi-

Another theory of aging foces on the immune system, which is the body's weapon for fighting disease. As people grow older, this system becomes less effective, opening the way for infection by viruses; bacteria, and other disease-producing organisms. As the immune system ages it also tends to lose the ability to tell the difference between the body's own tissues and foreign substances. As a result, cells of the immune system tht once would fight invading organisms now attack the body itself, producing diseases.

A way to extend life by delaying aging changes in the immune system was proposed recently. The technique involves reducing the amount of food eaten so that a large percentage of body weight is lost over a period of years. Dietary restriction is known to extend the lives

of laboratory mice and rats, but there is no evidence that it has this effect in humans.

Scientists are studying the aging theories described above. But even if they discover which one (or ones) is correct, there is no guarantee that a way to extend life will result.

Check with a doctor before buying a supplement or making a dietary change. Be suspicious of any product that promises to slow aging, extend life, or produce major changes in appearance or vigor.

Can Anything Be done to Extend Life?

There are no known "antiaging" treatments, drugs, or supplements that slow aging or extend life. But your chances of staying healthy and living a long time will improve if you:

- Don't smoke

- Eat a balanced diet and maintain your desirable weight

- Exercise regularly

- Have regular health checkups, see a doctor when you detect a problem, and follow a doctor's advice when taking medications
- Stay involved with family and friends

What types of research are carried on?

The Laboratory is currently engaged in the studies of Cardiac Arrhythmias; Gerontology; Hypertension; the relationshp between Cancer and Aging; Blood Substitutes.

Have there been any breakthroughs lately?

Scientists at the Laboratory have developed diagnostic techniques for distinguishing between various types of abnormal heart rhythms. These discoveries are saving countless lives all over the

A method has been found to recycle the hemoglbin of "old blood" that has been discarded. The hemoglobin is extracted, freeze-dried and stored. When needed, this oxygen-carrying molecule is complexed with starch polymers and reconstituted into a solution having the properties of whole blood.

One of our scientists, working in conjunction with colleagues in Sweden, has developed the basis for a cure for Cholera.

There is work being done with Vitamin "A" which may play an important role in preventing Cancer. The staff is also investigating the mechanisms of production of Cancer by a variety of chemicals called "Carcinogens".

The Laboratory is currently testing compounds that act to remove toxic substances that accumulate in the body with age. In some cases, administration of these agents in combination with specific restrictions of dietary intake have resulted in the doubling of the life spans of the animals studied. These studies have significantly advanced our understanding of the dietary requirements of the elderly.

Studies in the area of Hypertension have been adopted by a major company to develop a new cardiovascular drug.

Not a week goes by without some "breakthrough". Each successful experiment answers another question, and adds another bit of information to the mosaic of scientific information.

How is the laboratory staffed?

Currently, there are 11 professional scientists, Ph.D.'s and M.D.'s; supportive technicians plus administrative and maintenance personnel.

Is research the only function?

Although research is the primary function, the Laboratory is also an education institution. The Laboratory provide a ten-week summer fellowship program for students interested in biomedical research careers. Since 1961, a total of 173 individuals have benefited from this program. Our most significant educational activity is vested in the Post-doctoral Fellowship Program. Since its inception, 50 young Ph.D.'s/M.D.'s have spent a period of two years actively working on research problems. Can I get a speaker from the Lab?

Our Director of Development and Communications, Ronald Kamp, is available to speak throughout the state at any lodge or district function or any of our Board members will do a presentation. We ask that you give the speaker alternate dates to speak with at least 2 weeks advance notice.

We also have the film the "Good Old Days" or a slide presentation available through the mail.

Aging Research Studied At MMRL

There are now more than 25,000,000 Americans over the age of 65 and 32,000 Americans have passed the 100 year old mark. Never before in all of human history have so many people lived so long. the average person in 1900 lived to be 45 years old and during the height of the Roman Empire the average person lived to be only

The social and medical Sayville, NY 11782 problems presented by this unprecedented growth in the number of older Americans will be enormous. Fortunately, the founders of the Masonic Medical Research Laboratory had the foresight to prepared for some of the needs of the elderly more than 26 years ago when they initiated a research program in gerontology, the study of the aging process. The work in gerontology at the Masonic Medical Research Laboratory began at a time when few people had even heard the word. Today gerontological research at the MMRL is well known to scientists and social planners all over the world.

Medical problems for young people have been primarily infectious diseases and accidents. We now know how to prevent and control most of these problems. For older people (and this group probably includes everyone over 40 years of age) the primary medical problems are cancer and heart disease. Bone and muscle problems are also of concern to mature adults. For many people the so called golden years aren't so golden. At the MMRL we are attempting to define what aging really is. When and if we are

able to do this we then will have the means for possibly eliminating many of the physical problems associated with aging.

Our major areas of emphasis now are:

1. We have found that mitochondrial DNA breaks down with aging. This type of DNA is found outside the nucleus but within the cell. If you don't have this DNA you lose the information for how to make the energy molecule, ATP, which keeps us going.

2. The real question now is what causes the mitochondrial DNA to break down in the first place. If we can find the answer to this question then we may have the answer to the even more interesting question of what causes us to grow old. We are experimenting with the idea that certain metal ions (an ion is just a form of any metal which dissolves in water) can destroy this type of DNA. One of these metal ions is cadmium. It accumulates in your body as you grow older through eating foodstuffs. Cadmium causes aging, cancer, and high blood pressure. With a little effort most of us can keep our cadmium intake to a very low level. Meanwhile we are trying to find a way for removing the cadmium already in your body.

We've also found that aluminum and iron ions can increase the rate of aging. We consume aluminum from some products packaged in aluminum containers, and digestion of antacids.

Iron is necessary in our diet but there is no need for supplements unless you're sick. Iron can be toxic and it too can accumulate in the body as we grow older.

In the future we hope to be able to tell all of you how to live a long and energetic life. With your continued support, that goal could be achieved sooner than most people believe.

Dr. Harold R. Massie directs the Lab research in the field of Gerontology. Dr. Massie received his Ph.D. in 1967 from the Univ. of California, San Diego. Before coming to the Masonic Medical Research Lab in 1970 he completed his Postdoctoral studies in Biochemistry at Harvard Univ. He and his wife have four children 9, 13, 22, and 24 and reside in New Hartford. Dr. Massie is a member of Amicable Lodge

CIRCUMAMBULATION

Circumambulation did not begin with Masonry nor will it end with Masonry. As a matter of fact, the rite of traveling around the altar in a clockwise direction had its beginning in the earliest religious rite.

The custom of traveling in a clockwise direction symbolize the path taken by the sun over the earth. Rising in the east it travels by way of the south of the west and sets, only to return by way of the north or the dark side of the earth to rise again the following day.

In the mystic rites of the ancients the number of times with which the High Priest circumambulated the altar indicated the number of days he wishes to indicate in his religious rite.

Circumambulation was and is practiced by many religious cults. To list a few of the more commonly recognized examples besides the Roman Catholic processions, there are the African tribes who, to this day, always dance around a fire or

religious symbol in a clockwise direction. All of the American Indians traversed their fires in a clockwise direction. The Pueblo people always circumambulated their fields before planting. By the way they held there hands while ambulating the fields they indicated how many days of sunshine and how many days of rain they desired of the great spirit. Each trip around the field indicated one day.

From the early Egyptian dancing to the present day dancing in all countries the custom of moving in a circle has continued down through the ages. But during the evolution of man the original religious meaning of circumambulation has been forgotten and today in the Christian nations the direction of the ambulation has been changed to counter-clockwise.

But to the student Mason let me say that circumambulation is a religious rite and regardless of how it is used symbolically in the Masonic order it will always indicate the path of the sun around the earth and each circle will indicate one day of time.



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
