

205th Annual Communication One Month Away . . .

Brethren

By the time this reaches you, you will in all probability have received a solicitation letter from the Monroe Masonic Service Bureau, requesting a contribution to support its work. It is through this Bureau that the Masons on Monroe County reach out to those less fortunate then themselves in this area, and is worthy of our support, I would remind you that you can designate all or part of your donations to the United Way to this organization by availing yourselves of Option 2 when you are contacted by the representatives of that appeal. Please try to be generous in this as well as in your contributions to the Brotherhood Fund; both of these appeals are worthy of your wholehearted participation.

All Masters aware that the 205th Annual Communication of Grand Lodge is just one month away, and it is important that they have direction from their Lodges concerning the decisions they will be called upon to make. Amendments to the Code of Procedure (Sec. 92) and the Constitutions (Sections 102, 111, 112 and 600) which have already been passed on first reading will be presented for final adoption. These amendments are: (1) That the standard of proof to be observed by Trial Commissions shall be by a fair preponderance of creditable evidence, (2) That the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge may be held at any place in the State designated by the Grand Master a year in advance. (3) That the Grand Master shall appoint a Deputy Grand Standard Bearer, (4) That the titles of Grand Pursuivant and Grand Tiler shall be Right Worshipful, and (5) That the annual per capita dues shall be increased from \$7.50 to \$12.50. This last item is probably the most significant one and the Master should know the sentiment of the Lodge

and vote accordingly.

Several functions are being planned by the Inter-Lodge Fellowship Committee, which is now being chaired by W: Vernon Goodrich, and the Committee needs a representative from every Lodge to assist and to report back to the Lodge. The kinds of activities that this Committee promotes are extremely important in promoting friendship and brotherly love in our fraternity, and your participation is invited and necessary.





'We Can't Close The Door Upon Life!"





In Memoriam

It is with deep sorrow that we announce the passing of Rt. Wor. Herman A. Sarachan on March

Rt. Wor. Herman A. Sarachan, better known as "Brother Herman," was raised in Flower City Lodge 910 on March 23, 1926. He was elected Master of Flower City Lodge in 1939, and was appointed District Deputy Grand Master of the First Monroe District in 1942. He took over as Secretary of Flower City Lodge in 1942 after Wor. Bro. Jacob Rosenszweig passed away suddenly and was elected Secretary of Flower City Lodge for the next thirty-three years.

Brother Herman's educational endeavors began early in his Masonic career. In 1932, he organized an educational program in Flower City Lodge to implement the Lodge system of Masonic Education recommended by Grand Lodge. In 1940, he organized the Bureau of Masonic Education with the aid of the Ruling Masters and was asked to be President of the newly formed Bureau. In 1948, he founded the School of Ritual and was appointed Assistant Grand Lecturer in charge of the School by Rt. Wor. Henry Meachem, Grand Lecturer. In 1954, he organized the School of Lodge Administration to help educate Lodge officers in their functions and duties. He was honored in 1969 by the Bureau of Masonic Education for twenty-nine years of devotion and dedication to teaching Masonic education in Monroe

In the early sixties, he decided to compile information on important Masonic events which occured in Monroe County, and in

1971 published the "History of Masonry in Monroe County" (1810-1970). His "Dear Brother Herman" column in the Monroe Masonic News was one of the most popular features on Masonic questions and memorabilia and in 1979 "Dear Brother Herman" Answers to Questions Relating to Freemasonry was published.

Brother Herman was a member of several Grand Lodge Committees: Board of Relief 1943-1953, District Service Representative and Board of General Activities 1944-1958, Assistant Grand Lecturer 1948-1958, Library and Museum 1954-1968, Custodians of the work 1968 to

He was also active in many Concordant Bodies. In the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite Bodies he was orator of Rochester Consistory for several years and was coronated Thirty Third Degree in 1961. He was a member of Damascus Temple, Doric Council No. 19 R & S. M., Hamilton Chapter No. 62 R. A. M. and was a charter Commander of the Judas Macabee Degree.

His span of sixty years of Masonic Service to Masonry, not only in Monroe County but everywhere throughout the State, will always be remembered for his knowledge of Ritual and his expertise in teaching Masonic Education. He was known as "Mr. Mason" and always demanded perfection from all who had the pleasure of working with him.

Marshal Mike Stewart has announced the date of Aug. 16 for a bus trip to Toronto to see a baseball game. More details later.







FROM THE RECORD

It was a cold winter's night Dec. 26, 1885. The steam was rising from the horses that pulled the sleds and carried the Brethren to a special communication of Penfield Union Lodge #154 for

the installation of officers for 1886. The Brothers stomped the snow from their boots, hung up their heavy overcoats and entered the Lodge room on the second floor of their building which the Lodge had purchased from Joseph Rich in 1856. That building stood about where the Lincoln First Bank now is on Penfield Road. They crowded around the big potbellied stove, and since it was the Tiler's duty to provide heat he took the usual WHERE'S THE HEAT comments

After the opening of Lodge Wor. Abram Becker as installing Master and Wor. John S. Beaty, as installing Marshal, the Officers for 1886 were installed.

George P. Strowger, WM; William B. Ely, SW; Walter C. Miller, JW; Elisha Lamb, Treas; John Chadsy, Sec.; William H. Raymond, SD; Charles P. Bancroft, JD; Harmon S. Knapp, SMC; W.W. Bows, JMC; John Beaty, Mar.; Hiram Auchampaugh, Tiler; and Rev. T. J. Parker, Chaplain. More about him later. After the installation the Wor. Master and brethren EXEMPLIFIED THE FIRST DEGREE. What would happen if we tried that today?

On the 6th of Feb. 1886 a petition for affiliation was received from our Rev. T. J. Parker. It was referred to committee and approved on Mar. 6th. On April 3rd Penfield Union received a DIMIT from Walworth Lodge #254 for Rev. Parker. They had the cart before the horse but Walworth is still speaking to us.

In June the Lodge voted that he Trustees BE REOUIRED TO MEET and take such action as they deemed adviseable for repairs necessary to the property of the Lodge. Things don't seem to have changed much in 100 years. However, in October the Trustees submitted their bill for \$47.87. Not even the Do-All Construction Co. can beat that.

The late 1870's and early 1880's were not good years for Masonry. Grand Lodge records show a loss of membership. Only one new brother was raised in Penfield Union, and 7 members were unaffiliated in 1886. In spite of all this the Lodge voted that they would have a Public Installation on Dec. 30, 1886 for the officers for 1887. Their spirit and confidence continued today and shows that our Light of Masonry cannot be dimmed.
