Charlotte Lodge No. 1088 Selected

On Monday evening, December 16, 1985, at the Annual Meeting and Election of Officers, it was decided to merge with Charlotte Lodge No. 1088.

The search committee presented its findings on the four lodges under consideration to the members present. Each member of the committee reported on their findings contained in questionnaires which were exhibited for all the members to see. The lodges were graded from 1 to 4; 1 being the highest grade possible. In this way it was charted on a graph: 1 with a value of 20 points, 2 with 15 points, 3 with 10 points and 4 with 5 points. Charlotte received 90 points with a grading of 3 members showing 1 for their grade and 2 members showing 2 for their grade. This was 20 points above the next highest point standing of a lodge.

The membership of the Lodge is divided geographically in half between the two highest lodges in the point standing. Because those lodges are at either end of the city it now becomes a hardship for those living at the opposite end. The thing to consider, expressways make it possible to travel great distances at a shorter length of time. It is hoped that our members will consider this in their attendance with their new lodge and home.



TEMPLE TRUSTEES NEWS

In keeping with the finest traditions of the Temple Trustees, they reversed the decision made in November to hold a decision regarding the sale of the Temple to the church group, and decided to continue negotiations.

Many present were lame ducks, so stay tuned. Who knows what decisions lurk in the hearts of our erstwhile group?

From our minutes of December and January:

1. The manager's contract was renewed for one year.

2. One delinquent body requested some additional time to pay the 1984 assessment. It was granted with certain conditions, and it was paid, leaving Damascus Temple as the sole delinquent.

3. The church group wrote us seeking a reconsideration of the six month moratorium on the purchase offer. After a heated discussion, it was decided twelve to three with three abstentions to continue to negotiate (see above first two para-

4. The house committee presented a report concerning Temple lighting and future rental potential of the building.

5. We have engaged the services of an attorney to handle purchase offers and related subjects.

6. The manager reported anticipated auditorium income for December to be about \$13,500 and ballroom rent of about \$1,100.

A nominating committee was appointed to propose officers for 1986.

From our January meeting:

 We are receiving some activity regarding additional offers to purchase the building.

2. The church group negotiations are continuing.

3. The manager reported that auditorium income for January should be about \$7,700 and ballroom income should be about \$900.

4. In view of Damascus Temple not paying their 1984 assessment and moving from the Temple, they were removed as an owning body by a vote of sixteen to two.

5. It was decided at the December meeting to hold in abeyance the 1985 and 1986 special assessment. Those who have paid will have their funds
