He served as Master in 1974, and again in 1984, and also belongs to the A.A.S.R. and Damascus Temple of the Shrine. Bro. Goodrich was educated at Monroe Community College, and Rochester Institute of Technology, and holds several degrees, including an MBA. He is President of Delta Computec Inc., Rochester, N.Y., and is also a Director of several other Companies, and includes in his activities membership in the N.Y. State Society of CPA's, American Institute of CPA's, Eastern Director of American Cut Glass Association, and has also served as an Instructor at S.U.N.Y., Brockport.

Med. Res. Lab. Gets \$175,000 Research Grant

Dr. Charles Antzelevitch, director of the Masonic Medical Research Laboratory, has been awarded a \$175,000 grant by the National Heart Lung and Blood Institute of the National Institutes of Health.

The grant is an Institutional National Research Service Award that will provide funds for the research training of postdoctoral fellows in cardiovascular physiology and pharmacology over three years.

Assisting will be Dr. Gordon K. Moc. emeritus director of research; Dr. Jose Jalife, Dr. Richard S. Tuttle, Dr. Gray Gintant and Dr. Silvo Litovsky.

Each postdoctoral fellow will be assigned to one of the many on-going research projects. Within six to 12 months he or she will be expected to pursue an independent project under supervision of the research

Master of Masons in the State of New York, was elected to the highest Masonic office in the State at the 205th annual meeting of the Grand Lodge in May,

The Grand Master became a Mason in 1953 in Publicity Lodge No. 1000, N.Y.C. After eight years service as an officer, he was elected the Worshipful Master of that Lodge in the Fourth Manhattan Masonic District.

In 1965, M:.W:. Bro. Singer was appointed District Deputy Grand Master, serving under M:W:. Clarence J. Henry, and he is a former President of the Past District Deputies Association. He holds dual membership in Nassau Lodge No. 1016, Floral Park, in the Second Nassau Masonic District.

Since 1968, M:W:. Bro. Singer has served on several Grand Lodge committees including: Communications (Chairman 1975-82); Grand Master's Ad-

Floral Park, New York, Grand pire State Mason magazine Advisory Committee as Editorial Director since 1979; and most recently as Vice Chairman, Statue of Liberty, where he was the principal architect of the New York and National Masonic fund raising programs.

In 1982, he was elected Grand Treasurer, and he received the Grand Lodge's Robert S. Emslie, Jr. Award in 1983, and The Chancellor Livingston Medal in 1985. He was elected to the Honorary Legion of Honor, International Order of Demolay in 1985, and was coronetted a 33° Mason at the Supreme Council (AASR-NMJ) session at Detroit in 1985.

Singer was educated in New York City Schools, receiving his Bachelor's and Master's degrees in Journalism and Mass Communications from New York University, where he was later on the political science faculty. 
R.W. Donald W. Wright

He is now an independent consultant on communications and government relations.

In 1981, as an avocation, he founded the Floral Park Dispatch, a weekly community newspaper with a paid circulation of 3,000. He was its editor and publisher until September, 1983, when re relinquished ownership, due to the pressure of his business and Masonic duties.

During his business career, M:.W:. Bro. Singer was a member of several professional societies, including: Public Relations Society of America, American Society of Association Executives, and International Association of Business Communicators. He is listed in "Who's Who in the East", "International Who's Who in Public Relations," and "Who's is Who in Freemasonry".

He comes from a Masonic family. His father, W:. Henry A. Singer, was Worshipful Master of Publicity Lodge in 1970. His late uncle, Worshipful Maurice A. Singer, served the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania for many years, and was President of the Philadelphia School of Masonic Instruction for two decades.

M:.W:. Bro. Singer and his wife, Elna, have resided in Floral Park, Long Island, for over 30 years, where they have both been active in First Church of Christ, Scientist. He has served as First Reader, President, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Sunday School Superintendent and Sunday School Teacher. In community affairs, he was a three-term elected village Trustee, Deputy Mayor, Police Commissioner, Public Works Commissioner, Recreation Commissioner and Zoning Board member.

He served in the U.S. Army Intelligence Reserve from 1948 until 1960, with an active duty tour of two years during the Korean Conflict. For eight years, thereafter, he was a Strategic Intelligence Office on reserve and active duty with a top secret clearance. During this period, he was assigned to the 434th Strategic Intelligence Detachment, G-2, Headquarters, First U.S. Army. He also attended the Strategic Intelligence School in Washington, D.C.

The Grand Master is a frequent and popular visitor in this area, and it is expected that he will continue to honor these Monroe Districts with his attendance at various meetings and functions. > East Rochester Lodge 1020, A communication had been mailed out and at precisely 8:00 p.m. there was the sound of the gavel in the East. Then and there Worshipful Master J. H. Cairns with the help of his officers, Senior Warden H. L. Brainerd - Junior Warden J. Boyce — Treasurer L. H. Hoffman - Secretary G. H. McInerney - Junior Decon William Barker - H. G. Cooper Senior Master Ceremonies -Junior Master Ceremonies Frank Karge - M. B. Furman was Chaplin. The two Stewards were James Lynch and Charles Cobb - The Tiler was C.A. Deming, give birth to our lodge. There were 23 Master Masons from all parts of Western New York and the records show that there was one from as far to the West as Cleveland. All the Brethren were introduced and later District Deputy Grand Master William McFarlane. The District Deputy presented a special dispensation to Worshipful Master Corins after receiving the special dispensation he appointed the officers named above, it was then and there that life was given to our

The records show that the first stated communication of our lodge was mailed and the meeting was held on Tuesday, January 9, 1923. It was that day that the new Masonic Lodge was named East Rochester and was still unnumbered. You will note that at the December 30, 1922 meeting that as of that time there was no name or number of the lodge. The lodge was operating at that time with the letters. U.D. meaning it was Under Dispensation. To be continued.

The lodge both inside and outside has had a face lift. The outside has vinyl siding all around except for the brick front. It is one of the best looking buildings on the street. For the inside at this writing progress is being made at completing the floor in the kitchen and the hallway between kitchen and the bathrooms.

Hope to hear soon that Jim (Buckshoot) Smith is on the road to recovery. I hear from his son Bruce that he is a little better than he was. Bruce said he was able to get out to buy a new chevy station wagon.

Also am waiting to hear how Brother Howard Wood is doing. he has been laid up in the hospital with a heart ailment. Woody I look forward to our going to an auto show with you and your pride and joy "old Betsy."

And to our Brother down Clemens, South Carolina, who is an officer in the Clemens Lodge, Harry Seifert, hope you have recovered from your early this year operation.

Our sympathy goes out to Brother Louis McKie on the loss of his mother. For those who remember Brother McKie and. have lost track of him. You can reach him at 8160 Stalder Street. LaMessa, Calif. 92041. I know he welcomes old friends.

There is a fine man and Mason from this lodge who is one of the faithfuls for showing up in lodge, has been a member since February 8th 1949. He was a die sinker in the former New York Central Car Shops. His name is Burton F. Winebrenner. Burton is the white headed gent that sits in the same seat in the lodge on almost every second and fourth Tuesday for more years than I can remember.

It is now into the month of May and several of the boys are already back from the sunny states. Hope to see you retired folks out to the free steak dinner your lodge is hosting on June 10th and those of you from out of Monroe County (anywhere) we want you to show up. 
