Receives Distinguished Achievement Award

The Penta Hotel in New York City was the site of the Grand Master's Dinner on Tuesday, May 5, at which the Grand Lodge Medal for Distinguished Achievement, the highest honor that can be awarded by our Grand Lodge, was presented to R. W. and Hon. Frank J. Horton, Past Master of Seneca Lodge no. 797, in the presence of a huge throng, including a large delegation from the Monroe Districts.

In receiving this prestigious award, R. W. Bro. Horton joins a select band of distinguished Masons from all over the United States who have previously earned this distinction: Former President Gerald Ford, Senator John Glenn, Dr. Norman Vincent Peale, General Jimmy Doolittle, former cowboy star Gene Autry, and many others. The list has also been enriched this year by the addition of M. W. Wendell Walker, Grand Secretary, and M. W. Raymond Ellis, the Dean of our Past Grand Masters.

R. W. Frank Horton has for many years been the Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of Ohio near the Grand Lodge of New York, and is a member of various Concordant bodies in the Rochester area including the Shrine, Commandery and Consistory, in which he has been coronated a 33rd Mason. He is a Past President and Director of the masonic Service Bureau, which honored him in 1981 with the Distinguished community Service Award, which he himself has presented annually to distinguished citizens in the Monroe County area.

In Civil life, Bro. Horton is the U.S. Congressman for the 29th District, and is now serving his 25th year. He is the ranking Republican member (Vice-Chairman) of the powerful Government operations Committee, and under his leadership, the country has been saved billions of dollars as a result if fer-

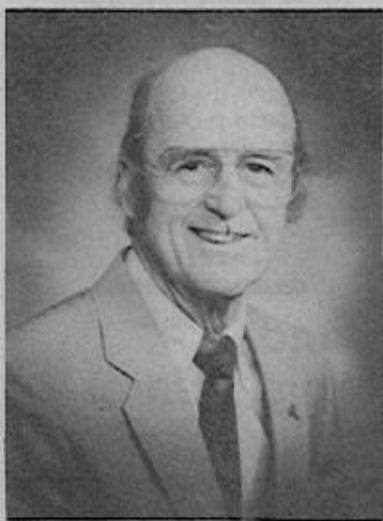
R. W.: Gerald J. Glaser has been appointed District Deputy Grand Master of the 1st Monroe District.

R. W.: Paul A. Robertson has been appointed Grand Sword Bearer. R. W.: Bro. Robertson was born in Norwood, Mass. in 1919, and became a Mason in John A. Robertson Lodge no. 1032 in 1946. New York City-M. W. Robert C. Singer was elected Grand Master of Masons in the State of New York for the second term.

At the 206th Annual Grand Lodge Communication held in New York City May 5 and 6, R. W. the Honorable Frank J. Horton was presented with the Distinguished Achievement Medal. While R. W. Brother Horton was the speaker at the Grand Master's Dinner, he was not alone in being awarded this prestigious medal as M. W. Raymond C. Ellis and M. W. Wendell K. Walker were similarly honored.

As a result of actions taken at the Grand Lodge session, the proposal to move the penalties of the degrees to a different place in the ritual was narrowly defeated; a proposal to lower the age of petitioners to 18 years was defeated; mileage reimbursement for Grand Lodge

was increased from 5 to 10 cents per mile and the per diem was increased from \$10 to \$25; the first vote to add the Grotto to the constitutional list of recognized organizations passed; the first vote for a constitutional change to increase the number of black balls necessary for rejection of candidates from one to three was favorable; Library trustees and Research laboratory Directors are to be given the title of Right Worshipful.

Other actions taken were the election of R. W. Frank B. McLoughlin as President of the Trustees, R. W. Murray Goldstein as Grand Treasurer and R. W. Robert P. Zabel as a trustee of the Robert Livingston Library.

The Grand Master made many other presentations during the Grand lodge session:

**Yonnondio . . .
Why?**

As Master of Yonnondio Lodge, the second oldest in Monroe District, I am frequently asked, "why Yonnondio?". "where did your name come from?" "Who named your Lodge?" "What does it mean?" "How did you get your name?" As a new Mason and a member of Yonnondio Lodge, I also asked these questions, but the information was sketchy. When compared to the names of most of the other lodges in the district, it was unusual, to say the least! To satisfy my curiosity I did some research which uncovered the following information;

Yonnondio Lodge was founded in 1850 when a group of members of Valley Lodge No. 109 decided to organize a second Lodge in the city of Rochester. They secured consent from Valley Lodge and they drafted a petition to Grand Lodge to charter a Lodge to be called Yonnondio.

At that time, Ely S. Parker, a full blooded Indian and Chief of the six nations, was a member of Valley Lodge. Ely Parker wa the grandson of the famous Indian Chief, Red Jacket. Red Jacket was a very close friend of President George Washington, which probably explains Mr. Parkers introduction to the craft. Ely Parker was

In 1850, when it came time to name the new lodge, Ely Parker proposed the name "Yonnondio", a word of Indian origin which translates into English as "Great Mountain". It is believed Mr. Parker proposed this name because of his familiarity with the highest point in the city of rochester, Pinnacle Hill.

So to all of my inquisitive brothers in the Monroe District, this is, "Why Yonnondio?"

The sum of \$1168⁷² was transferred to the home endowment fund. Last but not least, effective as Grand Lodge, 1988 - the daily stipend will go from \$10 a day to \$25 a day and the mileage to go from 5¢ a mile to 10¢.

For the history buffs from the archives. You remember from past news letters that W.: "Jay" McCullough is working on a combination 1987 History/Directory? Some items of interest he came up with. There is a brass plaque on the "outer" door dedicated to Brother John Sutphin. But nobody any longer knew who he was. It turns out that Br. Sutphin bequeathed 50 acrs of land to Monroe #173 in his will, dated July 1926. The land was subsequently sold and the net applied to reduce the temple mortgage from the rebuilding after the 1915 fire. In appreciation of his love for Masonry, the trustees erected the bronze plaque

to his memory. Brother Sutphin was born 1834, raised in 1865, and died 1927.

As long as we are talking about our outer and inner doors, the iron door knockers on these doors were hand wrought and presented by Past Master George C. Brown Sept. 25, 1928. I was six months old.

The display case in the dining hall was a gift from most illustrious and R. W. Brother Harold G. Dobson in Sept. 1937. The case came from his drug store on the West side of Main Street, now occupied by Mackler & Cody - Attorneys.

Also, the picture of Monroe #173 First Master W. Joshua Field (1850-1851) was presented by P.M. Fred B. Richards, March 23, 1920, as a gift from Fields grandson and brother, Henry Harrison. This helped create a gallery, in our foyer, of photos of Past Masters covering approximately 90% of Monroe's Pastmasters over 137 years. The largest group of missing photos is from the decade of the 70's.

Under sickness and distress Brother Laurence "Pat" Pender was called home to rest by the Great Architect on April 30, 1987. A Masonic service was provided May 3rd. Our sincere sympathy is offered to his wife Esther, daughter and son-in-law Gail and David Staley of N. Chili, and the remainder of the family. Pat was our Master in 1965, a 32 Degree Mason, and received the distinguished service award apron in 1985. Pat's colored photograph, hanging as P.M. in our foyer, was the first of the colored photographs. Pat was also a member of Mary Jane Holmes Chapter OES #440.
