The Masonic Service Bureau of Rochester awarded scholarship grants of \$1,000.00 each to eight graduating seniors from Monroe County high schools. This is the second year that the Bureau has awarded scholarships under this program and brings the total number of awards to thirteen.

The scholarship awards are based on academic achievement, general character, financial need, and involvement in extracurricular activities such as school organizations, youth groups, church groups, community groups, and volunteer services. Applications for the scholarship are available from each high school in Monroe County in the latter part of February and must be accompanied by a letter of recommendation from a school administrator. Each school is asked to submit the name of only one applicant.

In 1987, applications were received from students in 26 Monroe County high schools. During the two years of this program, applications have been received from 31 Monroe County high schools.

The eight recipients of \$1,000 each for 1987 are: Tiffany M.R. Becks of Aquinas Institute, who will be attending Duke University; Vicky E. Coon of East High School, who will be attending Alfred University; Carol R. Dannenberg of Charlotte High School, who will be attending Houghton College; Gayle Erwin of Edison Technical and Occupational Center, who will be attending SUNY Binghamton; Jennifer L. Graham of Irondequoit High School, who will be attending James Madison University; Anju Gupta of Rush Henrietta Sperry High School, who will be attending the University of Rochester; Daniel E, Svitavsky of Hilton High School, who will be attending Cornell University; and Laura L. Wolter of John Marshall High School, who will be attending Wheaton College.





We Need Masonic Education

Dear Brethren,

"Before embarking on any great or important undertaking . . ." those are familiar words to all of us. In reading about the Constitutional Convention of 1787, did you notice how important they were to Bro. Benjamin Franklin?

Early in the convention, when it seemed that the rival factions from the different colonies would never reach agreement, he moved that each morning the session be opened with prayer for God's guidance.

It is interesting to note that in 1730, Bro. Daniel Coxe, first Provincial Grand Master of Masons in New York, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania, proposed a plan for the union of the colonies. In 1754, Bro. Benjamin Franklin, Grand Master of Masons in Pennsylvania, highly recommended the Coxe plan. On Sept. 17, 1787, 39 delegates signed the United States Constitution—13 were Freemasons! George Washington, our first President, was a Mason.

Realizing the powerful force for good of Freemasonry, doesn't it make you feel very proud to be a Brother Mason? Especially at a time when we joyfully and thankfully celebrate the bicentennial of that magnificent document which has been the supreme law of our land for 200 years.

Let's all celebrate on September 17, 1987, and rededicate ourselves to the high ideals of Freemasonry.

I deem it an honor and a privilege to serve as Grand Lodge Staff Officer under the inspiring leadership of our Grand Master, Robert C. Singer. He is the most enthusiastic and dedicated Brother Mason I have ever known. Take time to read his message - the Good News about Freemasonry in the Summer issue of The Empire State Mason. Trustee's Report

The following report is given to inform the members what is being done to beautify the temple. During the summer the work that was done is as follows:

1. The Lodge room, anteroom, preparation room, coat room, Purple room, dining room stairs, and kitchen have been completely painted.

2. New ceiling panels were installed in the kitchen.

3. New tile floors were installed in the coat room, men's room, and kitchen.

4. The stove was partially painted.

These projects were in addition to the installation of glass block windows across the front of the building, a new fire door in the lodge room, suspended ceilings in all the front rooms and the dining room stairs, and a new furnace which now heats the entire building so that the boiler does not have to be used. All the rooms were carpeted wall-to-wall. These modernizations cost \$10,000.00, and there are still some projects left to do.

1. Install new windows in the storage room.

2. Refinish the front steps and install carpeting on them.

3. Rebuild the shed over the back

4. Possible repair to the roof after it is inspected.

5. Refinish the dining room floor. When all of the projects have been completed, it will then be a long time before any other work will have to be done. The big thing in industry today is the preventive maintenance of buildings to make them last longer, and this is the objective of your trustees.

With the approval of the lodge, the Eastman Kodak stock was sold and invested in Government Securities which pay a high dividend. This drastic move was necessitated by the low interest rates that our Certificates of Deposit were getting.

Although the lodge works on a budget, and the members dues that are collected are supposed to balance the budget, the sad story is that not all dues are paid, and arrears are still owing from last year. The Treasurer has no other recourse but to ask the trustees for money. To compound this problem, the rent that we receive is not sufficient to balance our income, so that also adds to the shortage in the General Fund.

Our earnest desire is that other lodges or star chapters will consider our facilities in the event that they have to move out from the downtown temple, which would make all our rents that much less.

Special thanks to Wor. R. Keith Stambach, Bro. Harry Lake, and Bro. William Hinds for their invaluable help during the remodeling period.







A Grand Representative's appointment comes from the Grand Lodge he represents, but his original recommendation and his eventual tenure must be determined by his home Grand

It is no part of a Grand Representative's duty to visit the Grand Lodge he represents, and he should not plan to do so without invitation, or some arrangement through the Grand Secretary. His duty is in his own jurisdiction, where he should strive at all times to be the kind of active, faithful. respected member that any Grand Lodge would be proud to have as representative. That is presumably the kind of Mason he was when he was recommended, and it should be his highest priority to maintain and deserve that

Every discussion of Grand Representatives includes a reference to their value as symbols of the universality of the Fraternity, living evidence of the relationship of every individual Grand Lodge to all the others, worldwide.

Grand Representatives are symbols, and as a fraternity of symbols we should value Grand Representatives as what they are, not as what we have mistakenly and vainly tried to make them.

You are cordially welcomed to our Grand Lodge official family. Your appointment comes from the Grand Lodge you represent, but it was made possible by the recommendation and accrediting of our Grand Master, who chose you for your proven value to our Grand Lodge, which he expects to continue.

Your office is honorary, but it is important for upholding worldwide Masonic relationships.

And there we leave him, a symbol in place, a communicator maybe, an honored member certainly, a living answer to the original question, "What useful purpose does a Grand Representative serve?" Symbols are useful.

Grand Representatives (and Past Grand Representatives, as well as Past Deputies and Past Staff Officers) are the living strengths of their Districts, were so when they were appointed, and should continue to be, even in retirement.

Our Secretary tells us that the October 27 Ceremonial has been cancelled due to a conflict of dates. The Auditorium has been rented for that



Dr. Frank Annunziata To Be Guest Speaker On Constitution Day

Dr. Frank Annunziata, Professor of History and Chairman, History Faculty at Rochester Institute of Technology, will be the speaker at a special Constitution Day program on Thursday, September 17, at 8:00 P.M. in Cathedral Hall at the Masonic Temple in Rochester. This program is being hosted by the Scottish Rite Bodies, Valley of Rochester, and is open to the general public as well as all members of Masonic organizations and their families.

Dr. Annunziata was born and educated in New York City. He received his Master's Degree from City College of New York and his Ph.D. from Ohio State University. He also received a Post-Doctoral Fellowship from the National Endowment for the Humanities for studies at the University of Michigan. Dr. Annunziata has written many articles for publication in the field of American History and was selected a Project 87 Fellow by the American Historical Association and American Political Science Association for Constitutionrelated activities. His teaching specialty is American History, and in particular American Political History and American Studies with an emphasis upon American ideas and institutions. His teaching experience has been at Ohio State University, Eisenhower College, Hobart and William Smith, and Rochester Institute of Technology. The title of Dr. Annunziata's September 17th address will be: "Power and Principles 1787-1987: Reflections on Two Hundred of American Years Constitutionalism".
