Rochester's Ronald McDonald House Opens

Spotlighted inside the main entrance to the new Ronald Mc-Donald House is a beautiful bronze plaque. The upper part features an enlarged photo of the Grand Master and the Grand Lodge Officers during the cornerstone laying ceremony. RW Robert Zabel took this picture.

The lower part of the plaque is inscribed:

The Vestibule is dedicated to the love and generosity of the Free Masons of greater Rochester.

Their ongoing project, Have-A-Heart -- Buy-A-Heart has provided funds for the construction of this area.

Near the office is a large display listing various categories of donors: Sponsors, Patrons, Associates, Benefactors, Builders, Founders, and, at the very top with gifts over \$50,000, is the Cornerstone Club. Prominently listed with a few others in the Cornerstone Club is our Craft - FREEMASONS OF GREATER ROCHESTER.

The Masons and their families have collected over \$75,000 for this worthy project during the last three campaigns. The first campaign was planned late in 1987 by the Masters and Wardens Association. The 1988 incoming Masters and Officers of the Association: Gary L. Burke, Charles C. Spiegel, John T. Keller, and Steven C. Daycock were the prime movers and organizers. John Keller served as General Chairman of the project which was a huge success. Worshipful Keller is still on the Board of Directors of the Ronald McDonald House. Since its inception the HAVE A HEART undertaking has gained wide-spread admiration and praise for each year's Masters and Wardens Association and other Masonic groups (Shrine Clowns, Lodges outside Monroe County, etc.) who devoted their time and energy to help bring this Home Away From Home into

Today, there are Ronald Mc-Donald Houses in the United States, Canada, Europe and Austrailia. The 128th House is in Rochester at 333 Westmoreland Drive, corner Kendrick (about 1/2 mile south of Strong Memorial Hospital). As occupancy increases it is advisable to telephone ahead if you wish to visit the House. The number is 716-442-5437.

Rochester's 15,000 square-foot Ronald McDonald House will provide cheerful, residential accommodations for up to 20 families at a time. The three-story House offers cooking and laundry facilities, informal rooms where families can gather to share a triumph or a tear, and a landscaped garden for the quiet times when one needs to be alone. There are two day rooms for those parents who don't require overnight accommodations but do need to relax, shower, and freshen up while remaining near their hospitalized children.

EDITORIAL

The Masonic Service Bureau has been serving Monroe County since July 7th, 1927. The purpose in founding the Bureau was "to provide means for carrying out the work of Brotherhood and charity without duplication of expense or effort by uniting the efforts of the Masonic Fraternity and all organizations contributing to the corporation and to carry on and perpetuate the benefits of the charitable work established by Wells Lodge #282, F. & A.M. continued under the new charter of Valley Lodge #109, F. & A.M."

Through the years Brothers and Lodges have contributed over \$175,000 to endow the work of Brotherhood and charity. Last year the Bureau gave over \$25,000 in the form of scholarships and charities from the income of the endowments.

However, last year the operation of the office cost \$45,000; the Brothers and related organizations contributed over \$33,000. The printing of the Monroe Masonic News cost \$33,900 and subscriptions amounted to \$22,500.

This meant that we had to borrow from the Charitable Endowments Fund \$23,000 dollars. WE CANNOT CONTINUE TO BORROW FROM THE CHARITABLE ENDOWMENTS. We cannot continue to violate our charter of incorporation and borrow from the charitable endowment to pay for office operation and publishing the Monroe Masonic News.

In a recent address to the Annual Conclave of the Grand Grand Chapter Royal Arch Masons of the State of New York, our Grand Master emphasized the importance of Masonic unity. His concern was about the potential for disharmony between the Symbolic Lodges and the Concordant Bodies. Present on the dais that day were the representatives of both the York Rite and the Scottish Rite. Both pledged their support of the symbolic Lodges. They realize that the survival of their own organizations depend on the good health and well being of Symbolic Masonry. All of the Concordant bodies, recognize or not recognized by Grand Lodge, are aware of this simple fact.

For some time now, these organizations have been trying to stem the decline in membership. The initiation of new candidates has not kept pace with the demits, unaffiliations, and deaths. The percentage of Masons that join these organizations has always been low in New York State. In fact one of the points made in their recruitment programs is the large

pool of Masons available for membership. But, yet, they have not been able to attract any larger percentages. It appears that only a few are willing to spend the time and money to pursue other avenues of interest in the Fraternity. I am not saying that the Symbolic Lodge does not represent the whole of Masonic philosophy. But, I am saying that there is more to the Masonic experience that what is contained in the Symbolic Lodge. That may seem like a strange statement coming from this writer, but, you cannot deny the existence of the Scottish Rite, the York Rite, the Grotto, the Shrine, Tall Cedars of Lebanon, the Order of Judas Maccabeus and many other related Organizations. I would probably get in trouble if I didn't mention the Eastern Star, Nile, Cauldron and all the other Ladies organizations under the umbrella of Freemasonry.

With all this diversity, there is no wonder that some may feel resentment toward organizations competing for the Symbolic Lodge Brothers time. A competition that at times becomes quite heated. The point that the Grand Master was trying to make, I believe, was that we are all Masons and that we should support one another no matter what affiliation we pursue.

We all share the same roots and profess the same virtues; of that I am sure. We all want to improve the state of the World and promote peace and goodwill; of that I have no doubt. The problem is that we sometimes lose sight of the larger picture. We become so busy promoting our own Masonic organizations that we do not see that we really need one another. Each separate entity is really a part of the whole. When we encounter "that

The "practicing" of our Craft should be a happy, uplifting experience. Let's each see where we can focus on the positive aspects that this "way of life" teaches us.

Set the timer. Turn on the SELF-DESTRUCT switch. It appears that we Masons find these easy to do. We work at it with such consistency. The phrase "like a bunch of little old ladies" lingers these days on some lips but that's really passe. It should be "like a bunch of busybody Brothers!" As I travel the Districts this year, I have found there's no greater tendency to GOSSIP, than exists in the Masonic community. Ask your ladies! Don't be surprised when they let you know you out do them or the teenagers, hands-down, when it comes to telephone use and overheard sketches of conversation to do with "who's doing what, when, with whom, how and where". INFERENCE, INNUENDO, SUSPICION; all hung out on the Masonic Grapevine". Wouldn't it be great to have the GOOD NEWS of Masonry travel as rapidly as can the unpleasant news. The not-so-good seems to have managed the speed of light, and the good barely gets out from under the bushel. (Let's each reading this make a call to a Brother in the next two weeks telling him something GOOD that happened in the Craft!)

We MUST learn how to use our Fraternity as the "escape" from the stresses and strife of life and let it be that special place, that for a time, frees us of wordly disarray. Last year at the investiture of Grand Lodge officers in Utica, one of the final phrases of Grand Master SWITS was "let's work hard and have a lot of fun doing it".

Another way in which we self-destruct, or are self defeating these days (while I'm on my soap-box), is the way in which we "DIVIDE AND CONQUER" ourselves. We seem to have a wide range of "special interest" groupings. We don't need an outside enemy bent on destroying the Craft. We seem to be very capable. Lodges are consolidating due to shrinking numbers of members. Those remaining "retread" the active members who are the participants in the special groups we've created. These "actives" BURN OUT after heavy involvement that has sacrificed family and avocational time. They start learning to say NO and are only heard from thereafter when they pay their annual dues.

When are we going to learn to CONDENSE the "splinter groups" we have, into a FOCUSED EFFORT of achievable objectives and goals? Right now, too few are trying to do too much and are spread too thin. Look through a directory of Masonic basic, related, concordant and allied bodies and you'll see what I'm driving at, both in a recurrence of the names and the volume of separate units that specialize. All are calling out to those who are their members, and a in constant drive to add to that membership, to sustain their organizational base and purpose. Shouldn't we be looking at how we can bring the family "home" (to the Lodge) to reinforce the FOUNDATION of Masonry, as they would come home in the event of catastrophe? If we skeletonize the bureaucracy we've heaped on ourselves, wouldn't that help it happen? We committee ourselves to the hilt, and subdivide the talents of the few, to a point where, if we're not careful, the timer could run out on us. This all represents one man's opinion, and I'm pleased to have had the forum of the Monroe Masonic News this year, in which to express it. I love the basic elements of this Craft. I'll continue to take advantage of the Chancellor Robert R. LIVINGSTON Masonic Library and keep the reading lamp lit. I'll continue to listen to the learned Brethren in our midst, and there are several. We should all be continuing "to subdue our passions and improve ourselves in Masonry".

May the Great Architect help us be "off and running to a better and stronger Fraternity and a better world", as the Grand Master has said. And I add, "we ask His blessings on our work, but we are not asking Him


parts of the United States and





We want you to be aware that follow up was made when a feature was printed about the House on February 15, in the Democrat and Chronicle, and no mention was made of the Have A Heart solicitation. Publicity staff for the House did include a paragraph on the Mall drives, but when Masters and Wardens President Bruce Chilton called the paper, he was told it was omitted due to "LACK OF SPACE".

It behooves us to remember the BASIC REASON we volunteer to solicit in the Malls - we want to help fund "the House That Love Built". In addition, while we volunteer time and make our own dollar contributions, we must remember it is the PUBLIC that should be recognized for those dollars they place in our containers. They deserve to be thanked by those who collected their contributions, and presented them to Martha Tack, President of Home Away From Home, on February 27th.

In that light, we reprint here a letter that was sent to the Letters to the Editor on February 18th, where the purpose was to let the Public know they have our collective appreciation for their outpouring of generosity.

Democrat & Chronicle Letters to the Editor

During the past 3 years in February, John Kraus of Genesee Management has provided space in Eastview, Marketplace and Greece Town Malls for community service. The Masonic bodies have provided volunteers to man booths for the "Have a Heart" drive. The firms of Canfield and Tack, Kanty Paper Box, Label World and Hoffend Party Supplies have contributed materials, such as display paper hearts and sticker hearts worn by donors. This cooperative spirit has all been for the purpose of collecting contributions for the Ronald McDonald House, opened this month in Rochester. This year, the Masonic Service Bureau provided over 25,000 Lifesaver Tags which were distributed by the volunteers to be sewn into clothing and shoes of youngsters and used for identification by law enforcement and medical emergency personnel, acting as a consent form for child safety.

During the 3 years, the people of the community who frequent these Malls have been very generous in their support of this worthy cause. They donated \$21,400 this year and more that \$75,000 over all. The Masons along with the named organizations have covered all costs so that every cent collected could be turned over to the Home.

It is unfortunate that space did not permit inclusion of this information in the articles about the McDonald House on Thursday, February 15th, since all volunteers who worked on this campaign, and staff from the Home Away From Home, want the public to know their generous support is highly prized and deeply appreciated.

We also want to thank Channel 10 News for their promotion of the event, and Gabe Dalmuth who has been among the volunteers at the Malls soliciting contributions, each of the past 3 years. This year, Laura Saxby of News 10 was also a volunteer solicitor.

In addition, Eyewitness News Channel 8 found time to do a spot at Marketplace with an interview of solicitors, which was equally appreciated.

The Masters and Wardens Association of Monroe County submits this article so the Masons of the Monroe Region know their volunteer efforts are appreciated. At the same time, your officers are mindful of the original motive of our campaign in providing some respite for families facing traumatic times in their lives.

What Is Freemasonry?

Freemasonry, or Masonry, is the oldest and largest fraternal organization in the world, a universal society of friends who seek to become better men through their association with one another and their families. It is a 600-year-old fraternity with a 3,000-year tradition, the prototype of most modern fraternal societies and service organizations. In a society whose moral values are being severely tested, Masonry brings men together for fellowship and the promotion of integrity and good citizenship. Masonry requires a belief in God and urges its members to be faithful to their own religious beliefs, but it is not a religion.

It encourages its members and their families to be good citizens and to choose their own best means of political expression, but it is not a political organization.

its charitable activities and good works are for the benefit of all humankind, but it is not a benefit society or welfare institution.

Will I Be Asked To Join?

No, not directly. And you should not wait to be asked! Some men who would like to become Masons never do because they are unaware that a Mason is not permitted directly to solicit new members. Regrettably, it is not uncommon to hear a man say that he waited in vain to invited into the fraternity.

if you are interested in membership, or desire more information, feel free to approach a Mason and satisfy yourself concerning what Freemasonry is all about. Or possibly one of your Masonic friends may introduce the subject in conversation with you. But, he won't actually ask you to join because Freemasons believe that a man should seek membership only of his own free will and accord, not because he is solicited.

What Are The Requirements For Membership?

Membership in a Masonic lodge is open to men 21 years of age or older, without regard to race, color or religion. Those accepted for membership must be of good character and reputation, and believe in a Supreme Being and the immortality of the soul.

A candidate for membership is first recommended by a member of the Lodge he wishes to join. His application or "petition" is read at a meeting and referred to a committee, usually composed of three members, who interview the applicant, normally in his home, so that the applicant's wife and family may become familiar with the organization and its activities. After the committee reports back to the lodge, the applicant is voted on by a secret ballot of the lodge members and, if accepted, begins the process of becoming a lodge member.

What Happens At The Initiation?

There are three basic degrees of Masonry-Entered Apprentice (First Degree), Fellowcraft (Second Degree) and Master Mason (Third Degree)-which are conferred at three separate meetings over a period of several weeks or months. The solemn process is an enlightening and interesting experience for the candidate with no embarassing moments. Between meetings he is given further instruction concerning the meaning of the ritualistic ceremony in which he has participated. He will also be asked to memorize a few key passages of the ritual.

The Masonic ritual dramatizes its philosophy of the importance of a moral life. It uses the tools of ancient stonemasons as symbols to teach these ideals. A Mason promises to build his life and character with the same care and precision that stonemasons used to construct the great cathedrals centuries ago.

Where Did Freemasonry Start?

Because Freemasonry is many centuries old, scholars do not agree about precisely when and where it began. The most commonly accepted theory is that the origins of Freemasonry reach back to medieval times when the great cathedrals of Europe were built. The stonemasons who created these awe-inspiring Gothic structures formed craft guilds to protect the secrets of their trade, to help one another, and to pass on their knowledge to worthy apprentices.

In 17th century England, these guilds began accepting honorary members, men of learning and position. These new members were not working stonemasons or even associated with the building trades. As "accepted Masons," they eventually grew into a separate organization called Free and Accepted Masons, or Freemasonry.

What Do Freemasons Do?

Masons are dedicated to becoming better men. Like many people, Freemasons try to live in accordance with high moral principles as good citizens. They do not claim to have a monopoly on these ideals, but they do join together in lodges to help each other intensify their devotion to these enduring values.

Freemasonry teaches and practices the principles and ideals of kindness, honesty, decency, courtesy, fairness, understanding and concern. It upholds the belief that we are all a part of a Brotherhood of Man under the Fatherhood of God.

Masons practice patriotism and shape their lives in accordance with the best practices of civilized society. They do this in lodges for men, but there are many family activities as well.

Answers to Questions about the MASONIC FRATERNITY

Is Freemasonry A Secret Society?

No, this is a mistaken notion although it has been widely believed from the beginning. The membership, meeting places and activities of the Masonic fraternity are actually well known to anyone who is interested.

Many books have been written about Freemasonry, and you can probably find several in your local library. Even the constitutions, rules and regulations of the Fraternity have been published.

it is true that Masons have private modes of recognition and ceremonies for some meetings, but the Fraternity is not otherwise secret. Masonic halls and temples are often made available for community activities. Many members wear distinctive Masonic rings or lapel pins to show their pride in being a part of this ancient and honorable fraternity.

Who Are The Freemasons?

Men of every walk of life belong to Masonic lodges. They may be highly visible as Shrine Masons ("Shriners") in costume, or as lodge members wearing Masonic aprons in civic processions or Masonic funerals, or at special Masonic ceremonies such as the laying of cornerstones. For example, George Washington officiated at the Masonic cornerstone-laying of the U.S. Capitol in 1793.

The recognized Masonic fraternity in the United States

includes 3 million members in 14,000 Lodges. There are about 4 million Masons and more than 100 Grand Lodges worldwide. New York has 136,000 members in over 800 Lodges, which belong to the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of the State of New York.

George Washington and 13 other Presidents of the United States, as well as 18 Vice Presidents and 35 Justices of the Supreme Court of the United States, have been Masons. Washington took his first Presidential oath of office on a Bible borrowed from a Masonic Lodge in New York City, and the oath was administered by Chancellor Robert R. Livingston, another Mason and, at the time, Grand Master.

Are Religion And Politics A Part Of Freemasonry?

Freemasonry welcomes men from every religious denomination or creed, requiring only that they affirm their belief in a Supreme Being, and that they are of high moral character and are good citizens. Masonic lodges are non-denominational and non-political. Partisan and sectarian discussions are not permitted in Lodges.

Masonry is not a substitute for church or religion. The fraternity urges its members to practice their own particular religious beliefs in their daily lives.

What Happens At Lodge Meetings?

A Masonic lodge usually meets one or two evenings each month to conduct its business, vote on petitions for membership, and do the work of conferring the three degrees. If no degree work is being performed, the meeting may include a program of interest, sometimes open to the ladies, and refreshments. Good fellowship is an important part of Freemasonry, and life-long friendships are often by-products of lodge membership.

How Do Masons Help Other People?

A basic teaching of Freemasonry is charity. The tradition of its members helping one another and humankind in general is practiced extensively.

In the United States alone, Freemasons provide over \$1 million a day, year after year, for charitable causes. These dollars go to support scholarships, medical research, hospitals for crippled children, facilities for those who have speech disorders or mental illness. Masonic groups also help people with serious eye problems and with respiratory difficulties. They provide retirement homes for members, their wives and widows.

Masonic volunteers are active in Veterans' Hospitals, sponsor summer camps for children, work with the handicapped, and perform many public service activities in their communities.

in New York, Freemasons created and support the world-renowned Masonic Medical Research Laboratory at Utica, where basic research is conducted by professionals in the areas of heart disease, problems of the aging, cancer, hypertension and blood substitutes.

When the ideas of liberty, equality and fraternity were novel, Masonry helped promote them. The Grand Lodge of New York, for example, was in the forefront 150 years ago supporting the movement to establish free public schools in New York, an idea which soon spread to the other states.

Beyond Lodge Membership

Lodge members may Join Masonically-related organizations outside of the Lodge. These groups include the York Rite (Royal Arch Masons, Cryptic Masons, Knights Tempiar), Scottish Rite (4th to 32nd degrees, and the honorary 33rd degree), square clubs, and the Shrine Masons, Grotto and others.

There are related organizations for women, the most widely known being the Order of the Eastern Star and the Order of the Amaranth. Similarly, for young men there is the Order of DeMolay, and for young women in New York, the Constellation of Junior Stars, the Organization of Triangles and the Order of the Rainbow.

At our April 17 meeting. W. Don Carlile will present a program on the Masonic Home in Utica. Come out and hear about what you are supporting.



Community Affairs Committee V.A. Hospital Canandaigua, N.Y.

Brothers, this month I received a special letter from the Community Affairs Committee of the V.A. Hospital, requesting me to inform you of the recent appointment of Mrs. Mary Simon.



Mrs. Mary Simon, RN, of Rushville, New York, has been selected as the Assistant Chief of Nursing Service at the Medical Center at Canandaigua, effective January 28, 1990. Mrs. Simon has been employed with the Canandaigua V.A. Medical Center for the past twelve years.

Throughout her career with the Medical Center, Mrs. Simon has served in progressively responsible nursing positions. From 1977 to 1979, she was a Clinical Nurse Specialist in Psychiatry; from 1979 to 1984, Psychiatry Nursing Coordinator; From 1984 to 1989, Clinical Nurse Specialist; and from September 25, 1989 to January 1990, she was Acting Assistant Chief of Nursing Service. She is certified as both an Administrator and Clinical Nurse Specialist, and is a member of the National Nursing Honor Society Sigma Theta Tau.

Mrs. Simon received her Bachelor of Science in Nursing from Keuka College in 1947, and her Masters in Nursing at the State University of New York in Buffalo in 1968, specializing in psychiatric nursing. She says she feels very fortunate to have chosen a career that has been very fulfilling both professionally and personally. She said that she chose a career in nursing because both her mother and aunt were nurses and were excellent role models. She says nursing is a wonderful and versatile career, offering many opportunities for both men and women.

She chose to specialize in psychiatric nursing because she said the human mind is a wonder-

ful thing, as is human behavior, and that she found it a challenge to understand. When not working, Mrs. Simon enjoys reading, sailing and doing many different kinds of crafts. She and her husband, Harry, an Electrical Engineer with Naval Underwater Systems Center in Dresden, have four children, three boys and a girl.

Those of you Brothers involved in V.A. service may wish to take note of this announcement, as it is in your interest to be knowledgeable of the arrival and departure of department and service heads at the Medical Center. You may also wish to inquire as to the availability of Mrs. Simon as a program speaker and guest.

In its ongoing mission to provide our nation's veterans with the best possible medical services, the Canandaigua V.A. Medical Center will be expanding its alcohol, drug and substance abuse treatment program. Included in this expansion are numerous program enhancements and the establishment of satellite clinics not only in the greater Rochester area, but also Geneva and Penn Yan.


The V.A. Center at Canandaigua has been awarded an additional \$200,000 in annual funding to expand its alcohol, drug and substance abuse treatment programs to reach out to veterans who are suffering from drug and alcohol addiction. The expansion includes hiring five additional staff, the establishment of satellite clinics, and a van to assist in transporting veterans receiving treatment. The alcohol, drug and substance abuse program treatment services are free of charge to most veterans.

The Canandaigua V.A. Medical Center, which is a primary treatment facility for veterans suffering from alcohol, drug and substance abuse in Upstate New York, will establish specific treatment programs for poly substance abusers recovering from heroin and cocaine; provide preventive education on high risk medical conditions resulting from addictions, such as brain damage, cirrhosis, hepatitis, and aids; provide more intensive after care services for graduates of the inpatient program; and increase the number of services to outpatients who work during the day.

The Center's Alcohol/Drug Substance Abuse Treatment Program has been in existence for over 20 years. It consists of a 10bed detoxification/medical evaluation unit, a 30-bed alcohol dependence treatment program, and outpatient follow-up services. The inpatient rehabilitation program lasts 21 days. The program includes medical evaluation, psychological assessment and testing, individual and group therapy, family education and therapy, and alcohol/narcotics anonymous meetings.

Masters of Lodges and heads of the other Masonic bodies: as always you may contact me concerning a speaker on this or any other V.A. subject for your meeting program or occasion. With advance notice, V.A. Medical Center officials and others are available as speakers on a wide range of subjects concerning the interaction between veterans and the V.A. Medical Center Hospital. Have suggestions, ideas, complaints? Let me know and I will relay the same to the Community Affairs Committee at our next meeting.





The following article pertains to the son and his friend of our Past President, Ron LaDue, retired fire fighter from Greece Ridge Fire Department.

January 31, 1989

Mr. Jason LaDue and Mr. Chris Handley

Re: Serious MVA - Redman Road on 1/30/89

It has been brought to my attention by my Deputy Chief that you gentlemen deserve a pat on the back for your action yesterday morning at the accident

Upon Deputy Chief Vaughan's arrival, it appeared that it was serious. He told me he remembered people asking for "rescue equipment" as soon as he got out of his vehicle, but he did not remember who they were until he started asking around when the situation was under control.

From what he has told me, both of you happened on the scene within seconds of the impact and immediately took emergency action. The patient was stabilized and supported so an airway was maintained. It was also noticed that smoke was coming from the dash area of the right side of the car. One of you flagged down a Barclay and Fowler Oil truck and promptly used the extinguisher to eliminate the smoke and more assuredly prevented a fire. Larry told me that they could not figure out where the dry chemical powder had come from and nobody at the scene had any idea as well.

When Larry started looking around for people who had assisted prior to the arrival of our crews, it was found the most everyone had slipped

away before THANK YOUS could be passed out.

The gentleman involved in the accident were members of the Brockport Fire Department Explorer Post. I know that in the time of an emergency situation, my Explorers would react with the same professionalism as both your young men did yesterday. The driver was Larry Brien and he received minor injuries. The passenger was Keith Vink and he was not as fortunate. He received a broken arm, broken pelvis, lacerated spleen, internal injuries and a broken femur (leg).

Undoubtedly, your actions kept Keith from further injury and may have just possibly saved his life. The Brockport Fire Department and Ambulance Corps thanks you for getting involved.

What is Scottish Rite?

The Scottish Rite is one of the two branches of Freemasonry in which a Master Mason may proceed after he has completed the three Degrees of Symbolic or Blue Lodge Masonry. The other branch is known as the York Rite, consisting of Royal Arch Masons, Royal and Select Masters, and Knights Templar. The Scottish Rite includes the Degrees from the 4th Degree to the 32nd Degree.

The use of the word "Scottish" had led many Masons to believe that the Rite originated in Scotland. There was also a false belief which persisted for many years, that a man had to go to Scotland to receive the 33rd Degree. Neither of these statements is true.

Actually, the first reference to the Rite appears in old French records where the word "Ecossais," meaning Scottish, is found. During the latter part of the 17th Century, when the British Isles were torn by strife, many Scots fled to France and resumed their Masonic interests in that country It is believed that this influence contributed to the use of the word "Scottish".

In 1732, the first "Ecossais," or Scottish Lodge, was organized in Bordeaux, one of the oldest and most influential Masonic centers in France. The membership included Scottish and English Masons. In 1761, certain Masonic authorities in France granted a patent to Stephen Morin in Bordeaux to carry the advanced Degrees across the sea to America. In 1763, Morin established these Degrees in the French possessions in the West Indies. What he estab-

lished consisted of a system of 25 so-called higher Degrees which flourished in France, and which were known as the "Rite of Perfection."

Within a few years after 1763, other Degrees were added, until the Rite had a ritual structure of 33 Degrees - the first three being exemplified in a Symbolic Lodge, if a Grand Lodge with subordinate Lodges existed in the area.

In 1767, Henry Francken, who had been deputized by Morin, organized a Lodge of Perfection in Albany, New York. This was the forerunner of what was to become the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite in the United States. During the Colonial Period, other deputies, appointed by Morin, organized Masonic groups which conferred the advanced Degrees at other important points along the Atlantic seaboard, including Charleston, South Carolina. These groups were independent and without centralized supervision or control, however, they all agreed that their authority came from Stephen Morin in Jamaica in the West Indies.

On May 31, 1801, the Supreme Council of the Thirty-third Degree for the United States of Americathe first Scottish Rite Supreme Council in the world-was founded in Charleston, South Carolina. Its aim was to unify these competing groups and to bring Masonic order out of chaos. The full membership of this Supreme Council consisted of 11 Grand Inspectors General.

Of these 11-John Mitchell, Frederick Dalcho, Abraham (Continued on Page 19)

Alexander, Emanuel DeLaMotta, Thomas Bartholomew Bowen, Israel DeLieben, Isaac Auld, Le-Comte Alexandre Francois Auguste de Grasse, Jean Baptiste Marie Delahogue, Moses Clava Levy and James Moultrie- nine were born abroad and only Brothers Isaac Auld and James Moultrie were native born. In religion, four were Jews, five were Protestants, and two were Roman Catholics.

On August 4, 1813, Emanuel De La Motta, 33rd Degree, of Savannah, Georgia, a distinguished Jewish merchant and philanthropist, and Grand Treasurer General of the Supreme Council at Charleston, organized in New York City the Supreme Council of the Thirty-third Degree for the Northern District and Jurisdiction of the United States of America.

The first Sovereign Grand Commander was Ill. Daniel D. Tompkins, 33rd Degree. He filled this office 1813-25. He was at the same time Vice President of the United States for two terms, under President Monroe. The first Grand Secretary General of this Supreme Council, its Conservator during the era of anti-Masonic attacks, and its third Sovereign Grand Commander from 1832-51, was Ill. John James Joseph Gourgas, 33rd Degree.

Both the Northern and the Southern Jurisdictions made slow progress in unifying the scattered Degree-conferring groups, and in standardizing the rituals. They were handicapped by the pride in the local organizations; by leadership jealousies; by the anti-Masonic agitation of 1826-40, which almost destroyed Freemasonry; by the War between the States, and by other matters. The process of unification, however, was completed in the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction by the Union of 1867, when the last irregular Supreme Council finally acknowledged the authority of the regular Supreme Council. From that Union, there arose what is the present Supreme Council for the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction of the United States of America.

Since it is now officially recognized as beginning in 1801 in Charleston, South Carolina, the Scottish Rite has spread throughout the world. At the present time, the Supreme Council for the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction officially recognizes and enjoys friendly relations with the Supreme Councils of the Scottish Rite in 39 other Jurisdictions, and the higher Degree systems (Swedish Rite) administered by the Grand Lodges in the four Scandinavian countries (Denmark, Iceland, Norway and Sweden).

The Northern Masonic Jurisdiction specifically covers the 15 states East of the Mississippi River and North of the Mason-Dixon Line and the Ohio River, including Delaware. Its headquarters is in Lexington, Massachusetts, a suburb of Boston.

The other Supreme Council in the United States is that of the Southern Jurisdiction. It has its headquarters at Washington, DC and covers the remaining 35 states, the District of Columbia, and the United States territories and possessions.

At present, there are 460,000 Scottish Rite Masons throughout the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction.
Of this number, there are approximately 3,700 Thirty-third
Degree Masons, comprising the
membership of the Supreme Council. There are Scottish Rite
centers, called "Valleys," in 110
cities and towns in the 15 states of
the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction.

The Scottish Rite membership of the Southern Jurisdiction is better than 625,000, so that the total Scottish Rite membership in the United States is over one million.

One important point which must be recognized by all Masons is the fact that the Scottish Rite shares the belief of all Masonic organizations that there is no higher Degree than that of Master Mason. The Supreme Council and its subordinate bodies acknowledge the Masonic supremacy of the Symbolic Grand Lodges, and the Grand Master of Masons is recognized as the ranking Masonic officer present when in attendance at any Scottish Rite meeting.

Our Degrees are in addition to and are in no way "higher" than Blue Lodge Degrees. Scottish Rite work amplifies and elaborates on the lessons of the Craft. It should never be forgotten that termination of a member's Symbolic Lodge standing automatically terminates his Scottish Rite membership, whether his rank be 14th Degree or 33rd Degree.

There are four coordinate divisions in the Scottish Rite:

 Lodge of Perfection, 4th Degree-14th Degree (presiding officer-Thrice Potent Master)

 Council of Princes of Jerusalem, 15th Degree-16th Degree (presiding officer-Sovereign Prince)

 Chapter of Rose Croix, 17th Degree-18th Degree (presiding officer -Most Wise Master)

 Consistory of Sublime Princes of the Royal Secret, 19th Degree- 32nd Degree. (presiding officer-Commander-in-Chief)

Some Valleys do not have all four divisions. In such cases, their candidates receive Council, Chapter or Consistory work in neighboring Valleys.

Lessons of the Scottish Rite Degrees

Lodge Of Perfection

4th Degree Secret Master. The Fourth Degree emphasizes duty, fidelity, integrity, and the necessity for secreey in all confidential relationships.

5th Degree Perfect Master. This Degree teaches that trustworthiness is more precious than life and is the foundation of Masonic honor. Also, we must pay due respect to the memory of a deceased worthy Brother.

6th Degree Intimate Secretary.

This Degree teaches that devotion to one's friends and zealousness in performing one's duties are rewarding virtues.

7th Degree Provost and Judge. This Degree teaches us to judge righteously, without respect to person, and that one law and one custom shall apply to all. Let justice be impartial, tempered with deserved mercy.

8th Degree Intendant of the Building. This Degree teaches that each new honor is meant to be a step toward perfection in the moral code; each a development of a particular duty; and that benevolence and charity are necessary virtues of leadership.

9th Degree Master Elect of Nine. The lessons taught in this Degree are what we should be careful not to be too zealous in executing justice, even in a good cause, and that we should avoid injuring or harming any person by hasty or irresponsible action.

10th Degree Master Elect of Fifteen. The teachings of this Degree are that ambition and jealous can tempt men to evil deeds, that righteousness will eventually triumph over evil, and that evil doers will be punished.

11th Degree Sublime Master Elected. This Degree dwells on good citizenship. Evil doings should be punished. Honesty and respect for others should be rewarded. Be earnest, honest and sincere.

12th Degree Grand Master Architect. This Degree teaches that the Mason, as he learns to use the tools and instruments of his trade and skill, also learns to contemplate the many aspects of life and deal with them as a child of God, steadily advancing to those heights of experience which we call perfection.

13th Degree Master of the Ninth Arch. This Degree teaches that difficulties and dangers, however great, should not deter the true and faithful Brother from progressing onward to perfection. It teaches the great truth that the finest things in life come only as the result of constant and often painful effort.

14th Degree Grand Elect Mason. In the Scottish Rite, this Degree is the summit of Ancient Craft Masonry. As the crowning Degree of the Lodge of Perfection, its essence is the holiness of God and reverence of His Holy Name. God will not hold him guiltless that taketh His Name in vain.

Council of Princes of Jerusalem

15th Degree Knight of the East or Sword. This Degree teaches the important lessons of loyalty to conviction and devotion to right.

16th Degree Prince of Jerusalem. This Degree teaches loyalty to truth and fidelity to duty. Chapter of Rose Croix

17th Degree Knight of the East and West. The lessons of this Degree are that loyalty to God is man's primary allegiance, and the temporal governments not founded upon God and His righteousness will inevitably fall.

18th Knight of the Rose Croix of H.R.D.M. The lessons taught in this Degree are that man must have a new Temple in his heart where God is worshiped in spirit and in truth and that he must have a new law of love which all men everywhere may understand and practice. This Degree affirms the broad principles of universality and tolerance.

Consistory

19th Degree Grand Pontiff. This Degree proclaims the spiritual unity of all who believe in God and cherish the hope of immorality, no matter what religious leader they follow or what creed they profess. It is concerned primarily with the perennial conflict between light and darkness, good and evil, God and Satan.

20th Degree Master ad Vitam. This Degree is a drama of the American spirit confronting the challenge of disloyalty and treason. Masonic principles and leadership are subjected to a crucial test. The Degree demonstrates the Masonic condemnation of all who conspire against the security of the nation and the happiness of our people.

21st Degree Patriarch Noachite. This Degree teaches that Freemasonry is not a shield or evil doing and that justice is one of the chief supports of our fraternity.

22nd Degree Prince of Libanus. In this Degree, the dignity of labor is demonstrated. It is no curse, but a privilege, for man to be allowed to earn his sustenance by work. Idleness, not labor, is disgraceful.

23rd Degree Chief of the Tabernacle. This Degree teaches that impure thoughts and selfish, unworthy ambitions are corrupting and destructive, and that a man who forgets his duty to family, country, and God will be morally and spirtually destroyed.

24th Degree Prince of the Tabernacle. This Degree teaches that a mutual belief in one true, living God should bind men together in the service of humanity and in a worldwide Brotherhood.

25th Degree Knight of the Brazen Serpent. This Degree teaches that there are desert stretches in every individual life in the history of every nation, with a resultant breakdown of discipline and loss of faith. This Degree is a clarion call to faith-in ourselves, in each other, and in God.

26th Degree Prince of Mercy. This Degree teaches the quality of mercy; that it is a spirit of compassion and a tenderness of heart which dispose us to overlook injuries and to treat an offender better than he deserves.

27th Degree Commander of the Temple. This Degree teaches that Scottish Rite Freemasonry believes in the concept of a free church in a free state, each supreme in its own sphere, neither seeking to dominate the other, but cooperating for the common good.

28th Degree Knight of the Sun. This Degree using the symbolism of the tools and implements of architecture teaches that by building high moral character among its adherents, Freemasonry may advance man's determined quest for the achievement of unity and good will throughout the world.

29th Degree Knight of St. Andrew. This Degree emphasizes the Masonic teachings of equality and toleration. We are reminded that no one man, no one Church, no one religion, has a monopoly of truth; that while we must be true and faithful to our own convictions, we must respect the opinions of others.

30th Degree Grand Elect Knight Kadosh. This Degree sets forth the tests and ceremonies that symbolize the experiences we must undergo in the building of excellence in character.

31st Degree Grand Inspector Inquistor Commander. This Degree teaches that we should give every man the benefit of innocence and purity of intentions. He who would judge others must first judge himself.

32nd Degree Sublime Prince of the Royal Secret. This Degree describes the victory of the spiritual over the human in man and the conquest of appetites and passions by moral sense and reason. The exemplar represents every Freemason eager to serve humanity but caught between selfinterest and the call of duty. Duty often requires sacrifice, sometimes the supreme sacrifice.

Thirty-Third Degree

The 33rd Degree is conferred upon those members of the 32nd Degree who have been outstanding in their contributions to Freemasonry, the Scottish Rite, or who have shown in their communities the leadership which marks them as men who exemplify in their daily lives the true meaning of the Brotherhood of God. It

cannot be sought by application, but must be such a man as described above who has been selected by the Deputy of his state. He must be not less than 33 years of age, and may be elected at an Annual Meeting of the Supreme Council a Sovereign Grand Inspector General of the Thirty-third and last Degree, Honorary Member of the Supreme Council. Such election shall be by unanimous vote of the Active Members present taken by secret ballot. The Degree is conferred at the Annual Meeting of the Supreme Council next succeeding the election of a

Meritorious Service Award

There is an award known as the "Meritorious Service Award" which may be conferred upon members of the Rite in this Jurisdiction who have attained the Thirty-second Degree and who by reason of meritorious service of a Masonic character, are deemed worthy of such recognition.

Oath of Fealty

Before receiving the Degrees of the Scottish Rite, every candidate must sign the Oath of Fealty.


