Disaster Issue For April 1991

-- Caused By The Ice Storm -

Worse Ice Storm In History Hits Rochester, N.Y. on A.M. Of Monday March 4, 1991 One of the lucky few



The Home of R. W. Robert C. Pettit, Executive Director of the Masonic Service Bureau who lives in the town of Irondequoit, a suburb of Rochester, lost trees, gutters on his house, some roofing and was without electric power for approximately 5 days. Outside of that, Belva and I "did pretty good", said Dr. Pettit.

As this monthly issue goes to press, the Western New York area is still coming out from under the effects of the worst ice storm in memory. The number of Rochester Gas and Electric customers without power because of the late Sunday March 3rd icing exceeded 150,000 who lost electricity immediately after the storm. Another 110,000 Niagara Mohawk customers were without power and more New York State Electric and Gas customers, Fairport village, Spencerport village and Churchville village customers lost all electrical service. The statewide Municipal Electric Utilities Association responded to the villages with their own municipal services. In any case, candles, batteries of all sizes, wood for wood burning stoves and fireplaces, generators and chain saws were the "products of the hour" throughout the region. In food stuffs, bread, water, milk and canned goods went first.

Telephone lines were down with tens of thousands of customers without service. By the weekend of the 9th/10th, utilities were restored to about 90 percent of the public, however it has been concluded that the remaining 10 percent may not be back in service before the 14th or 15th of the month. A thousand in Parma-Ogden, 3,000 in Gates, 2,200 in Chili, 2,800 in Irondequoit, 1,000 in Brighton, 3,500 in Rochester and about 7,500 in Webster, Penfield, East Rochester, Pittsford and Mendon were without power up to the 12th.

Newspapers, televisions and primarily radio, have carried countless official status reports, messages and state of emergency data throughout the critical period. Officials are saying it may take as long as 40 weeks to clear away the

debris in towns like Irondequoit.

A local weekly paper reported there has never been so much cooperation among people in so many different ways - neighbor helping neighbor, private citizens volunteering to help their town and village crews, customers offering to help businesses they patronize.

We will all pay a very high price in the loss of our trees and shrubbery, the pride of the region, but thankfully to date, no loss of life is known, thanks to the extraordinary cooperation of everyone involved in the region and those who quickly volunteered to come in and assist the cities, towns and villages.



The following comments have been taken from a letter written by Doris Kent, Deputy to Saudi Arabia: (written before the war

"As you are aware we have many thousands of troops here looking after us. We are all in turn trying to look after them also.

Every one invites the boys w dinner at night. They are allowed to use the telephone to call their families, have a nice dinner and just sit and visit with family for 4 to 5 hours. They seem to enjoy it very much and believe me so do

If we don't invite them to the house at night we fix extra platters of food and take it to the camp, or try what I did. One night I fixed a huge pot of chicken and dumplings, another night fried chicken, black eyed peas, corn bread, boiled corn on the cob, jalipeno peppers and onions, another night fried shrimp with french fries. When you send this stuff you send enough for 25 to 30 boys and can they eat. It is not too unusual to have a boy who grew up in Saudi call you and stop by (he will be here now in the service). The troops can go through 12,000 cookies baked by the ladies of a

compound in less than 2 hours and I really couldn't tell you who enjoys it the most, the troops or the people in our compounds. Groups of people will take several BBQ grills and go to a camp area and grill hamburgers (hundreds) on a weekend, you should see them munch into a hamburger after 3 months. Another group will make pizzas by the dozens and deliver, free of charge."

Temples of Freemasonry

Recently the Smithsonian Institute in Washington, DC sponsored a tour of Masonic interest. We are reprinting the description used by the Smithsonian from their brochure "Resident Associates Program".

Freemasonry, a fraternal order known for its elaborate rituals and its tradition of mutual assistance among its members, was closely associated with the founding heroes of this country, most notably George Washington.

This tour of historic temples

and lodges, led by Gary Scott, Regional Historian, National Park Service, first stops at the Potomac Lodge No. 5, Georgetown, where the gavel that George Washington used to set the cornerstone of the U.S. Capitol is seen. Next visited is the fancifully decorated Naval Lodge, CA 1895, a flamboyant Victorian building richly designed with ancient Egyptian motifs, and the site for a catered lunch by the Fidelity Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star. The District of Columbia's Scottish Rite Temple, headquarters of the Supreme Council of the Southern Jurisdiction of the Scottish Rite. Next visited is the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge, founded in 1848, after which Alexandria's historic landmark, the George Washington National Masonic Memorial, is toured with curator Stephen Patrick. The day concludes with a historic re-enactment ceremony celebrating the 200th anniversary of the Masons' setting of the original boundary stone of the District of Columbia by members of the Alexandria Washington Lodge, accompanied by Masons of Virginia, the District of Columbia, and Maryland.

Scottish Rite A Brief History Of the Bodies in the Valley of Rochester, N.Y. By III. Lewis G. Ames, 33° 1957

Part (2) of (3) parts

In 1763 the Rite of Perfection was brought to the West Indies by Stephen Morin, who had been Master of Parfaite Harmonie Lodge in Bordeaux in 1744, and who had been granted a Patent by the Masonic authorities in France. While in Jamaica, Morin appointed Henry Andrew Francken and others, who brought the "Advanced Degrees" to the Colonies on the American mainland.

The Rite of Perfection was built up in continental America from 1767 to 1797 in Albany, NY, Philadelphia, PA; Charleston, SC; Martha's Vineyard, MA; and Baltimore, MD. By the end of the eighteenth century, however, none of these Bodies was active, except the Grand Council of Princes of Jerusalem and the Sublime Grand Council of Princes of the Royal Secret, both located at Charleston,

With the Union of the thirteen

colonies, the birth of the United States of America, the years of labor in establishing a stable government, and the peddling activities of some initiates of the Rite of Perfection, it became apparent that difficulties and evils existing in former organizations must be overcome. And so, "on the 31st of May in 1801, the Supreme Council of the Thirty-Third Degree for the United States of America was opened with the high honors of Masonry by Brothers John Mitchell and Frederick Dalcho, Sovereign Grand Inspectors General, and in the course of the present year the whole number of Grand Inspectors General was completed, agreeably to the Grand Constitutions." Such is the wording of the "Circular of 1802" by which the Supreme Council announced its advent to the Masonic powers of the world. This circular letter, dated December 4, 1802, set forth the origin and history of Supreme Council, its recognition of the Grand Constitutions in 1762 and the revision of 1786, and its system of thirty-three Degrees. Upon it rests all that we know from contemporary writings of the founding of the Supreme Council at Charleston. A few years later, about 1807, the name was changed to "The Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite."

From its beginning in Charleston, in 1801, with the formation of the first Supreme Council, the Rite as we know it today has encompassed the globe, and has supplanted, in the countries of origin, all of the Rites which were its predecessors, which have long since disappeared. With such alterations and amendments as have been necessary to fit changing times and conditions, the Grand Constitutions adopted by John Mitchell and his associates, as the fundamental law of the organization they founded, have been adopted by each and every Supreme Council since that date, and every individual member of the Rite has bound himself, through the "Oath of Fealty" to obey them.

The Supreme Council founded at Charleston was the first, the Mother Supreme Council, of the world. It is now known as the Supreme Council for the Southern Masonic Jurisdiction of the United States of America and has jurisdiction over all of the United States not in the jurisdiction of the Northern Supreme Council, as well as Puerto Rico, Panama Canal Zone, Hawaii, Alaska, China and Japan. The Supreme Council for the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction of the United States of America has jurisdiction over fifteen states-Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan and Wisconsin. In addition to these two, there are recognized Supreme Councils in the following countries: Argentine Republic, Austria, Belgium, Bolivia, Brazil, Canada, Central America, Chili, Columbia, Cuba, Denmark (National Grand Lodge), Dominican Republic, Ecuador, England, France, Germany, Greece, Iceland (The Freemasonry Order of Iceland), Ireland, Italy, Mexico, Netherlands, Norway, (Grand Lodge), Panama, Paraguay, Peru, Philippines, Scotland, Spain, (in exile), Sweden, (Grand Lodge), Switzerland, Uruguay, and Venezuela.

The Supreme Council for the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction of the United States of America - our Supreme Council- was established in New York in 1813, after an inspection of five bodies reportedly conferring Scottish Rite Degrees to and including the 33rd Degree, none of which had been sponsored by the Charleston Supreme Council. The organization was effected by Emanuel de La Motta, 33rd Degree, Treasurer General of the Charleston Supreme Council, under the direction and with the support of its Sovereign Grand Commander, John Mitchell, and its Lieutenant Grand Commander, Frederick Dalcho.

Due to conflicting patents, the withdrawal of office and power from certain persons, and the elimination of some charterd bodies which were later revived illegally, there came a long period of strife within the Rite and for a time there were three conflicting Supreme Councils in the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction. These conflicts were healed and in 1867 a Union was established, thereby creating the present Supreme Council which is recognized by every legitimate Masonic body in the world. It has its Grand East in Boston, Mass., and meets annually in the city of its choice in the Jurisdiction, except that every third year it meets in Boston, the Grand East. It is today the largest Supreme Council in the world, in membership; and is undoubtedly the most powerful Masonic body in existence. It does not however, attempt to dictate to or interfere with affairs of the Grand Lodges in its jurisdiction, recognizing the sovereignty of the Grand Lodge in all Masonic affairs- admitting none to its membership except Master Masons in good standing, and keeping only those who maintain good standing in their respective Symbolic Lodges.

Government of the Scottish Rite is lodged in the Supreme Councils, each of which is sovereign in its jurisdiction, and to which each and every Scottish Rité body (Lodge of Perfection; Princes of Jerusalem; Chapter of Rose Croix; Consistory) in the Jurisdiction yields allegiance and fealy.

The Supreme Council for the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction is made up of Active, Past Active, Emerti and Honorary Members; all Sovereign Grand Inspectors General, 33rd Degree. The Active

Members of the Supreme Council are the actual governing group of the Rite. Honorary members are entitled to attend meetings of the Supreme Council, and to a voice in its deliberations, but have no vote. Vacancies in the ranks of the Active Membership, due to death, or retirement to Past Active or Emeritus standing, are filled by election of Honorary Members to Active Membership by the Active Members. Honorary members also are elected to receive the Thirty-third and last Degree by the Active Members of the Supreme Council. They are selected from the ranks of 32nd Degree members of the Rite who have rendered distinguished service to the Rite, to Masonry or to their country.

The Northern Masonic Jurisdiction is divided into fifteen Districts, each of the fifteen states in the Jurisdiction comprising a District. In each District there is a Deputy for the District, elected by the Supreme Council from the Active Members for that District. He is the Commander-in-Chief of the District and presides over the Council of Deliberation of the District, which is composed of certain of the Officers and all Past Presiding Officers of the bodies in the District, together with all Active and Honorary Members of the Supreme Council in the District, and which usually meeting annual-

Within the District are Valleys, bearing the name of the locality where there are one or more subordinate bodies of the Rite Lodges of Perfection, Councils of Princes of Jerusalem, Chapters of Rose Croix, or Consistories. Each of the bodies, whether in the same or in separate Valleys, is separate and coordinate, with its own corps of officers, responsible directly to the Supreme Council. Where there are two or more bodies in the same Valley, however, they usually work from a common treasury (designating some particular body as the fiscal agent for all), have the same Trustees, Treasurer and Secretary, and coordinate their efforts through an executive committee composed of members of each of those bodies.

In the Valley of Rochester, NY
there are five subordinate bodies of
the Rite. Four of these-Rochester
Lodge of Perfection; Rochester
Council Princes of Jerusalem;
Rochester Chapter of Rose Croix;
Rochester Consistory- work
together as an entity. The fifth,
Germania Lodge of Perfection- is
a completely separate organization, although most of its members
are also members of Rochester
Council, Chapter, and Consistory.

The Rochester Bodies of the

"On the twenty-fourth of February, 1866, there was held the first meeting of petitioners for a Lodge of Perfection in Rochester." So say the early records. But there is ample reason to suppose that an attempt was made much earlier to establish the Rite in Rochester, and that the Degrees from the fourth to the thirty- second were conferred by communication.



Especially so, since everyone has put forth every effort to accomplish good work.

In addition to the busy schedule of her own visits, R.W. Donna is traveling in the state as well. On Friday evening March 7th she attended a social visit of the Grand Matron, M.W. Another was the Bennington flag,







Masonic Brother James Crockford Gave His Life Died in Operation Desert Storm, as AMS-3, U. S. Navy

On February 22, 1991, a Brother Mason gave his life during "Operation Desert Storm", while on an aviation mission. Brother James Crockford Jr. had taken his entered apprentice degree in the Masonic fraternity at Valley Lodge No. 109 in the mid-1980's, but was not able to continue his progression due to his Navy commitment.

Brother Crockford's father is a former member of the fraternity, having taken a dimit from Seneca Lodge No. 797 several years ago.

A contingent of Brothers was present at the Memorial Service conducted in Brother Crockford's behalf. He is survived by his mother Adelaide Fahey and sister, Gwendolyn Dainard, both of Conoga Park, CA., his father James Crockford Sr., of 389 Meigs Street, Rochester, N. Y. 14607, grandmothers, uncles and an aunt. The service was held at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Rochester. Veterans Program

"Operation Welcome Home" is an organization of volunteers created to greet and support military personnel returning from Operation Desert Storm.

The mission of the organization

- n To communicate the support of the public to the military person returning from Operation Desert Storm through initial greetings and on-going communications.
- To convey to the community the need for positive support for people who are making the very difficult transition from wartime service to peace.

Volunteers Needed to Greet

Volunteers are needed to literally "welcome home" returning veterans with banners, handshakes and cheers. These assemblies may take place at the airport, bus or train stations, the armory, reserve unit headquarters or even the veteran's own neighborhood.

The organization will seek permission from family members before organizing such a greeting. They want to openly demonstrate support for the veterans, but also want to respect family and personal wishes as well.

Pin and Certificate

A Service Commendation will be presented to every returning veteran in the greater Rochester area. The presentation of this commendation is intended to be the centerpiece of the welcoming home activities. It will be a small portfolio case containing a pin, signifying that they are a Desert Storm veteran, and a high-quality certificate entitled:

Welcome Home, And Thank You ====

The service pin will identify the Desert Storm veteran within the community. This will foster ongoing supportive interaction between

the general public and the veterans. On Going Support Activities

Working in cooperation with local veterans and community organizations, plus TV and radio stations, the organization hopes to serve as a focal point of information about services and opportunities available to Desert Storm veterans and their

Sign-Up Campaign

Kits will be issued which will contain lapel buttons, posters, decals and bumper stickers, all with the Operation Welcome Home logo. They will be distributed from tables set up in malls, shopping centers, college campuses and public buildings throughout the area. The objective is to insure that Desert Storm veterans and their families see these visual symbols of support wherever they go.

To obtain these materials, each person will sign his or her name to the Service Commendation, described above, in essence a "thank you" card for the veterans. The signature indicates a symbolic commitment on the part of the signer to continue to support the veterans.

The collected signatures also will serve as a measure of the broad base of community support. We'd like to tell returning veterans that "two hundred thousand people in the Rochester area have signed up to welcome you home". A public display of the collected signatures is being considered for an area such as the War Memorial.

Media

TV, radio, and newspaper coverage is being organized for many activities. This is not an attempt at self-congratulation, as the only purpose of "Operation Welcome Home"" is to get the proper messages across to the veterans and the general public.It is necessary to publicize in order to raise community awareness of the difficult adjustment that returning veterans must make, and to publicize the operation so that families wishing a welcome home greeting know who to contact.

Attend the rally when you see or hear it advertised by local media. Get your kit, with buttons, banners and background information. To volunteer for all or different aspects of this operation, call 654-2121 and leave your name and number. Someone will get back to you promptly to arrange your participation at an area mall or shopping center, on a campus, and in the greeter groups as veterans arrive in Rochester. Bill Thomas of Computor Consoles, Inc., and Public Relations Chairman of the Organization says he hopes to see us all there, knowing local Masons are among the most prominent community service volunteers!

Hopefully, this writing will find all of you in good health and happy, and hopefully in warmer weather. And now, the VA Medical Center News. The Medical Center at Canandaigua hosted a clinical symposium on "Diabetes in the Elderly". The program was open to all health care professionals involved in the management of the elderly diabetic. The aim of the symposium was to provide the clinician with a practical plan for treating diabetes in the elderly. The symposium was sponsored by the University of Rochester School of Medicine and Dentistry, and the Canandaigua VA Medical Center.

The commanding officer of the Reserve Naval Mobil Construction Battalion 13 of the Navy

"Seabees", along with 70 of Rochester's Navy "Scabces" attended the dedication of the new patient pavilion at the Canandaigua Medical Center on February 23rd. The commander was in Canandaigua to brief his troops on the events in the Persian Gulf and to go through a number of reserve activities, including a dress blue inspection of his troops. The patient pavilion was built, free of charge, by the greater Rochester area "Seabees". Construction materials for the project were bought with \$48,000 donated by the Veteran volunteer organizations, which included Masonic veterans volunteers. The patient pavilion project was started this past Fall with the "Seabees" working one weekend a month, to provide the Medical Center's growing population of long-term care patients a better quality of life. It enables those who for medical reasons, cannot leave the hospital grounds, the opportunity to participate in outdoor type activities such as picnics, concerts, family visits and recreational games. The Rochester Navy "Scabees" are considered an elite and unique group of military men. Their motto is, "We build and we fight". Their mascot is a bumblebee, which is depicted as a bee with its legs holding weapons and construction tools. Representatives of the Masons were on hand at the dedication. The pavilion is wheelchair accessible, complete with kitchen and lavatories.

Grand Lodge Veterans Service Committee Chairman, R:W: Brother Max Rauch, announced that as of the middle of February, Grand Lodge had shipped over 5,000 personal kits to our brave men and women operation of Desert Storm. The committee stated that it was prepared to send a personal kit to every family member, relative or friend, who was serving with our troops in the Persian Gulf. Since we will still have service men and women there for a while and if you would like a kit sent to someone, write or call me with his or her name and address. The committee will send out the kit.

The VA Medical Center's Community Affairs Committee has been restructured to include representatives from key medical groups that impact the community affairs involvement of the Center. We, as free and accepted Masons, are the only volunteer service organization with an official representative on the staff of the Medical Center.

Statistics are in: the recent salute to hospitalized veterans celebration in February was well attended and received, with over 100 volunteers and fifty service organization members gathering to participate in the ward activities. The Mayor of Canandaigua, the representative from the New York State Division of Veteran Affairs, clowns and a troop of brownie girl scouts were present. Valentines were distributed to patients. Two television stations covered the activities. The oldest and youngest veterans were presented with certificates. The Medical Center's Eastview Mall Health Fair had at least 2,000 people in attendance. The Center performed 45 hearing tests, 50 pulmonary function tests, 125 skyndex testings, and 90 blood pressures. The next Health Fair will be in 1992.

A reminder: consider giving a small portion of your time to those service men and women who have given so much for the protection and preservation of our freedom. These military friends who have gone to war have not come back healthy to their families. Many times, a permanent resident in our VA Medical Center needs the care and presence we provide once per month at ward parties. Many of these men and women never see visitors. Or have anyone to bring them treats, except through the volunteers. Meet us for monthly breakfast at the Canandaigua Masonic Temple. Join in our pilgrimage of love to the VA Medical Center. All it takes is a phone call to (716) 232-7165 or (716) 454-1598.

Lastly, be sure to mark your calendars for the annual gala VA volunteer service awards ceremony dinner. It will be held on April 24th, at 6 pm, at the Burgundy Basin Inn, Bushnell's Basin, New York. The theme is "Let's Be A Kid Again". It is requested that if at all possible, attending volunteers dress according to the theme.


