





On November 30, 1989, at a historic meeting in Buffalo, N. Y., Most Worshipful Roswell T. Swits, Grand Master of Masons in the State of New York, met with Most Worshipful Solomon Wallace, Grand Master of the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of New York and Jurisdiction.

The two Grand Masters shook hands, entered into a dialogue, and then dined together in the company of 250 Masons and their ladies from both organizations.

Thus began a process which was continued by Grand Master Richard P. Thomas last year, along with Grand Master Wallace, and again on October 30, 1991, when in the unavoidable absence of Grand Master Thomas, Deputy Grand Master Sheldon K. Blank represented the Grand Lodge in the State of New York. Most Worshipful Solomon Wallace was able to be present for this third year, and as before, there were over 250 guests representing the two State bodies.

Seven Grand Lodges in the United States have entered into fraternal relations with Prince Hall Grand Lodges in the past few years, and in his remarks, Grand Master Wallace noted arrangements are well in hand for discussions between our two respective Grand Lodges.

Ample evidence of this relationship was clearly established on September 8, 1991, when Grand Master Thomas accepted the invitation of Grand Master

### **Financial Planning Solutions**

This is part of a continuing series of discussions of possible solutions to the problems encountered by financial planners. Every person or family should either do a financial planning program on themselves, or have a competent financial planner do it for them.

Each of the above has three estates. They are:

1. A living estate, which is to say that if one lives until retirement (this is called living too long), he should plan to have sufficient capital to support him in the style to which he wants to be accustomed to.

2. A disability estate which is to provide for his requirements in the event of a permanent disabil-

3. A death estate to provide his survivors with sufficient resources to maintain their way of life as though the principal were still alive.

It is a fact that over 90% of the citizens of this country have problems in their three estates because they failed to plan properly for each event. You the reader are urged to do something about it.

Financial planners

There are basically two types of financial planners; fee based, and non-fee based.

A fee based financial planner is supposed to be objective and charges a fee for his services. When his recommendations are made, theoretically, the client can buy the required products from anyone of his own choosing.

A non-fee based planner does the planning without charge and makes his living by what he sells.

From my point of view, a planner is supposed to obtain the best mileage out of your investments. If he charges a fee and then you pay another fee for the products that you purchase, that is not obtaining the maximum efficiency

Military Service

He served with the United States Army during the Korean Conflict and received several military decorations. Following his active military service, he was employed by the New York State Education Department in Albany and as the Deputy Director of the New York University Libraries in New York City before becoming the Director of the Chancellor Masonic" American Legion Post; Livingston Library of Grand Lodge.

### Soviets Get Masonic Assistance

The following story was sent in an envelope postmarked Anchorage, Alaska. Sorry we don't know who sent it, but thanks to our unknown friend. It's a great story! "Soviets Get To Catch Up With Their Ship"

Four Soviets, stranded here (Sitka) when a ship they had expected to join was forced to leave without them, got to leave last Friday thanks to an anonymous benefactor.

The four planned to board the Soviet ship Academic Korolov, but the company sponsoring the ship's U.S. tour had refused to pay the docking fees in Sitka, and the ship continued on to Seattle.

Nataly Vstovskaya, Diana Kachalova, Yuri Sushkin and Yuri Zaruba, who flew here expecting to board the Korolov, were stranded without a dime. They stayed with locals and wondered what they would do next. Last Thursday, a man telephoned Barbara Shaffer, Isabel Miller Museum director, offering cash for tickets and pocket change.

He showed up at Shaffer's office with a check for \$1,776, for the year America declared its independence. Shaffer said, "He told me: Tell them it was an anonymous gift from a Freemason, in honor of my fellow Americans as well as the newly liberated spirit of Russia"."" 





You may borrow Library books and other reference materials either in person or by mail. You may choose your own books, you may request information on a particular Masonic subject or for a particular Masonic purpose, or you may select a course of Masonic readings which touches on all subjects.

Reading Courses

You subscribe to a Reading Course as you would to a magazine or a book club, except that there is no charge. The first book is sent to you by U.S. mail (library rate), unless you pick it up at the Library, and as soon as you return it the next book in your chosen Course is mailed to you. This continues until the Course is completed or until for any reason you decide to stop. Your only obligation is to return or renew, promptly, those books which are sent to you.

Lending Service

You may borrow books and other reference materials for an initial period of three weeks, and you may request renewals for an additional three week period. Whatever you borrow from the Library and Museum is due to be returned to the Library and Museum within three weeks from the time you receive it, unless you request and are granted a renewal. There is a penalty charge of ten cents per day on books or other materials kept beyond your due date. Your only expense will be postage on books and materials you return by mail.


Grand Lecturer's Convention



Q: At a recent lodge meeting which I attended, I was surprised to see a former Grand Lodge Officer being introduced and received separately, invited to the East, and accorded Grand Honors. Is this the usual practice for Past Grand Officers?


A: Strictly speaking, the matter of Grand Honors now comes under the jurisdiction of the Grand Marshal's Guide to Masonic Protocol. However, since the Custodians of the Work were originally involved in drawing up these Guidelines, and recommending some changes, I feel an explanation is in order, in an effort to dispel any confusion.

In 1972, the Custodians of the Work published a series of Guidelines, in accordance with their report at the 190th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge. These guidelines contained one section devoted to the reception of Past Grand Masters, and another to "Other Past Grand Officers." This second section gives directions for the reception of Past Grand Lodge Officers, and continues: An escort may be provided for him, he salutes at the altar, and may be invited to the East, and may receive Grand Honors. (Note the word may three distinct times.)

In 1974 the Custodians of the Work, after consideration, recommended that "the custom of raising the lodge when a Past Master or Past Grand Lodge Officer enters should be discontinued". This does not apply to Past Grand Masters, who are obviously in a unique category. (Grand Lodge proceedings, 1974, Page 17, Section 7)

Since 1974, the whole subject of Masonic Protocol has been brought under the direction of the Grand Marshal, and in all guidelines published since that year, there is no mention of separate receptions for Past Grand Lodge Officers other than Past Grand Masters. Under these circumstances, the separate reception of Past Grand Lodge Officers, and the accordance of Grand Honors, becomes rather a moot point.

However, should a Worshipful Master decide to receive a Past Grand Lodge Officer separately and accord him Grand Honors, it is certainly not for me to question his prerogative. "



### The Masonic Apron

Meaning

Ask any Master Mason or even an entered apprentice about its meaning. Sure he knows all about it. He'll tell you that it is white in color, an emblem of purity and the badge of a Mason. It also is one of the symbols of speculative Masonry and probably no other is more important in its teachings and history than that lambskin or white leather apron. As an entered apprentice it is his first tangible evidence of his introduction into Masonry and as a memory is indelibly impressed on his mind.

Legend teaches that it was the protective apron of a workman in the temple of Solomon and that the manner in which it was worn indicated his stature as a workman. But what about all those other fancier aprons to which he would soon be introduced as he looks about the Lodge? As he looks about the Lodge he notices an entirely different set of aprons, and soon begins to ask many questions as to their meaning and origins.

Differences

Why are the aprons of officers of the Lodge different? What is their meaning? What do the symbols stand for? What is the meaning and symbolism of the Grand Lodge Officers Aprons? Could you answer these questions? If someone attempts to find out the meaning of various symbols in the library of his Lodge, or even perhaps the library of Grand Lodge, he will find it difficult to find the meaning of many of the symbols. Hidden away in the several Masonic Encyclopedia one may find the answers to some of these questions, but at the expense of considerable time and research. A brief summary of some of the findings are attempted in the paragraphs below.

Officers

The Officers Aprons are white with the emblem of the station embroidered on them in blue, the significance of which is quite well known to the well informed Mason. The Master's symbol is represented on the Apron by the compasses and square in Blue ("to square our actions and keep them in due bounds"), the rising sun ('the source of material light reminding the Mason of that intellectual light of which he is in constant search'), and on the flap the all-seeing eye ("symbol of the Supreme Being and His constant surveillance").

Past Master The masters Apronafter he has completed his term of Office to become a past master, has a white background, blue ribbon border, with a wide band of silver embroidery. On the white satin background are the compasses and quadrant representing the knowledge of the Four Paths of Learning; grammar, rhetoric, logic (the trivium) and arithmetic, geometry, music and astronomy (the quadirvium). On the flap is the all seeing eye of the Supreme Being.

Other officers The Senior Warden and other officers have a white apron on which are the symbols of their Offices - the Senior Warden (the level representing the equalness of all the Brothers) . the Junior Warden (The plumb

representing uprightness which Public Relations distinguishes the truthful, good and just man) - The Senior Coordinator Deacon (the square and compasses with the sun in the center) - The Junior Deacon (the square and compasses with the moon in the center). Their emblems distinguish their relative positions and their duties to the Master and Senior Warden respectively. Their responsibility is the security of the Lodge.

The Masters of Ceremonies crossed batons indicate their responsibility in preparing and conducting the candidates. The Stewards (the Cornucopia or horn of plenty, representing their responsibility to see that there is attention that the refreshment tables are properly set up and every Brother is provided adequately with refreshment) - the Tiler (the sword to protect the Lodge from intruders and admit no one unless duly qualified and also to warn Brothers upon which degree the Lodge is working.)

At the Grand Lodge level, appointed officers wear a white apron bordered with purple ribbon and a solid broad band of gold. In this group of aprons are Grand Representatives of other Lodges near the Grand Lodge in the state of New York, Staff Officers and District Deputies.

On the white background of Grand Representatives aprons is avery colorful "Coat of Arms" of the Lodge being represented. The flap is plain purple with a similar border as on the margins of the apron. An exception is made on those aprons which were wom during the bicentennial year of the Grand Lodge of the State of New York, when the seal of the Grand Lodge of the State of New York was embroidered on the flap.

The Staff Officer's apron and District Deputy Grand Master's aprons have the same type border as the Grand Representatives with the emblem of the Office embroidered on the white background. In addition there is present a laurel wreath - representing victory or accomplishment - tied together at the lowermost point by a knot or bow - symbolic of unity or brotherhood. The flap is purple with a solid gold border with the exception as noted above.

The Grand Steward's Apron has the Cornucopia embroid-

ered in gold. The Grand Director of Ceremonies has the crossed batons embroidered in gold. The Grand Sword Bearer has a shield and sword embroidered in gold.

Elected officers of Grand Lodge have a distinctive gold on purple border with acorns and oak leaves - denoting that from small things great strength evolves. At the lowermost point of the laurel wreath there is again noted the knot or bow as above. The elected officers of Grand Lodge are the Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Senior Grand Warden, Junior Grand Warden, Secretary, Treasurer, etc. The aprons of the officers have upon them the same insignia as the symbolic Lodge aprons excepting that they are in gold embroidery, surrounded by the laurel wreath described above.

Hope it helps!

I hope that this brief discussion may be helpful in answering some of the questions which may be raised, but there is still much to learn about the Masonic Apron. Much information may well be buried and lost in voluminous records which may well have given descriptions of the details and intent of the symbol-

### For the First Monroe District

The most important contributor to a successful life is self-discipline. Without discipline, we cannot improve ourselves, or solve problems, or be competent, or delay gratification or assume responsibility. Without discipline we cannot find reality and truth, we never evolve from children into productive adults.

#### Discipline

Yet discipline is a trait that's in short supply these days, especially among the young people.

Why is discipline so powerful? Most people think that the point of life is to be happy. But life is really about self-improvement. We're not born perfect. It's our job to make ourselves as good as we can be.

As Benjamin Franklin once said, those things that hurt, instruct. Yet the concept that life can be difficult is alien to most people.

### Self-improvement

The only way we can improve ourselves is through discipline. Without it, we can't solve any problems. With some discipline, we can solve some problems. But with total discipline, we can solve all of our problems. Discipline makes us competent.

#### Joy

The problem with competence is that there's a vacuum of it in the world. So as soon as people become more competent, either God or life gives them bigger problems to deal with.

There is, however, a certain



kind of joy that comes with knowing you're worrying about the big problems and that you're no longer getting bent out of shape about the little ones.

#### Priorities

How can you determine which problems are truly important? Think about them. Most people don't. You should spend time each day and think about your priorities. What should I be working on now? What can be put off until later? Important problems are the ones that affect all of us. It's impossible to think about big problems if you're spending your time worrying about what you're going to watch on TV or what you're going to say to someone. Spending time on that kind of problem is a waste of energy.

Little problems Some people think about the little problems to put off working on the important ones. This relates to delayed gratification. This means doing the things in life that are unpleasant before those that are enjoyable. If you do what you have to do first, you'll be free to enjoy yourself later.

Most people--and I'm not just talking about children-dash to what they want to do, and then feel terrible trying to get around to what they have to do.

### Growing up

Why do so many people, especially young people, have so much trouble delaying gratification? Gratification is something that must be learned. We rejoice in the spontaneity of small children. But, in truth, children are all born liars, cheats, thieves and manipulators who don't know how to delay gratification. It's hardly remarkable that many of them grow up to be adult liars, cheats, thieves and manipulators. What's even harder to explain--but what life is all about--is that some children grow up to be disciplined, Godfearing and honest.

There are many reasons why people grow up undisciplined. Most importantly, many children lack good parenting. Parents are role models. Kids with

Discipline also suffers from an image problem in our culture. We think of discipline as something that's imposed by someone else rather than as a form of self-

Learning discipline requires real effort. But this is what it takes for people to find the most joy and lead the most productive lives. Delaying gratification means, ultimately, enjoying things

#### Accepting discipline

In what ways do people fail to accept discipline? People often look to someone else to solve their problems. This is a natural tendency. Being disciplined requires assuming responsibility. That means saying, -- this is my problem. You can't solve a problem until you admit that you own it. For example--you can't apologize unless you accept responsibility for being at fault. To take responsibility, you have to value yourself. You have to have role models. Kids who won't assume responsibility undoubtedly have parents who won't either.

#### Dedication

How do we get discipline to accomplish what we set out to do? It requires dedication to reality--the truth. The more clearly we see the world, the better equipped we are to make wise decisions. Reality and truth are only things we can approach. We can't get them tied in a nice little package and put it in our pocket.

#### Deadlines

What else does it take for people to be disciplined? People need deadlines. It's amazing how a group of people who had been acting as if they had all the time in the world could get moving once they had a concrete deadline. Death is the ultimate deadline. None of us has forever to accomplish what we want to.

Our parents and our culture teach us that certain things must be done in certain ways. We can become so disciplined that we're not able to stop and smell the roses. n


Membership eligibility



That message is as true for Masonry today as it was for the infant United States 200 years ago. We enjoy the blessings of this country because those men did not refuse to play their part.

In England, during WWII, it was known as doing your bit." The ladies knew that, even if they could not join in the fight, they could roll bandages. They could make some contribution, no matter how small, to England's survival.

That message is as true for Masonry today as it was for England 50 years ago. So how about you? Will you prove to be the lost horseshoe nail which could have made the critical difference?

If few people show up, nothing For the want of the rider, the much happens, there's no excitement, no brotherhood. It takes people to make a fraternity. We can get by without a building, we can, if necessary, get by without the Lodge furniture. We cannot get by without Brethren.

The same thing is true at a Scottish Rite Reunion. Here, in this large auditorium, is a small knot of candidates, huddled in the front rows of the center section, with a vast echoing emptiness around them. They sit there and we tell them what Masonry teaches through the Degrees. That it is by watching the Degrees and thinking of their meanings that one advances in knowledge as a Mason.

They have to wonder where all the others are. Not only that, it's less fun for them. If they don't get a chance to meet you and form friendships, they miss much of what a Reunion has to offer.

To get to the ball park, the fans had to cross a busy five corner intersection by "dodging" the trolley cars, and that prompted Ebbets to rename the team the Brooklyn Dodgers. ("Ebbets" was Charlie Ebbets, the team's owner. The Dodgers ballpark, Ebbets Field, was named after him. Brother Ebbets was a member of Greenwood Lodge No. 569 in Brooklyn, N. Y.).



By Marion Siebert, Dave's friend DAVID E. CORDY - Musician - music, the art of creating melody and harmony was Dave's life.

When he watched his older sister Nell, at the piano, she began to teach him. At five years of age, his mother took him to a Scottish friend for formal instruction, and he played "Nearer My God to Thee" for them.

One Sunday at Church, he told his family that some day he was going to play that organ. His mother replied, "Laddie, you'll have to practice!", and practice he did. In his teen years he accompanied those in the Dunmore High School Music Department, Church choirs and area bands in Scranton, Pennsylvania.

His college career was interrupted by WWII. He served overseas in the Army Band for almost four years. While resuming college studies, he played in the pit orchestra in the Earl Theatre in Philadelphia, then toured with Les Brown and a Dixieland group. When the big bands became fewer in number, Dave moved to Rochester with his family.

He frequently substituted for weddings, funerals and atworship services for all denominations.

Dave accepted the title of Honorary Past Grand Commander of the Grand Commandery of the State of New York with pride. He accompanied the Shrine Chanters on Monday evenings, Craftsman or Valley-Simes Lodge on Tuesdays, Damascus Temple of the Shrine or Corinthian Chapter of the O.E.S. on Wednesdays, the Consistory on Thursdays and the Commandery on Fridays.
