

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EDITORIAL

Compass points - to ponder:

Is it true, as has been written in the Philalethes magazine, that the primary responsibility of the Blue or Symbolic Lodge, is to make Masons, to Masonically educate them, and to foster the social, fraternal and charitable amenities that should adorn Craft life in the primary community of the Lodge?

The article further discusses the role of appendant bodies being more circumscribed. "They should be nothing but reliquary societies". They preserve and foster the ancient mythic and symbolic treasure represented by the complex of Freemasonry's appendant degrees. They enhance and elaborate upon the consciousness to which each brother is awakened in the Sublime degree of Master Mason.

Freemasons in this modern age, no longer have the luxury of treating each Masonic body as if it were a miniature Lodge, of insisting on monthly meetings of each York and Scottish Rite body, of giving each a full program of Masonic education. lectures, films, ladies nights, and social events. To perpetuate the notion that each appendant body in the Craft must be a "full-service institution" in the way that a Blue Lodge should be, is to do a grave injustice to the leaders of the Craft. They will inevitably diffuse their time, talent and energies, which should of right be concentrated in their lodges, and which will be spread over all the Masonic institutions in which they claim membership. . .

Are we Masons slow to recognize that it's "the organization as a whole" that is foremost in importance to survival of the Craft? Everyone speaks to this being a time of restoration, renewal and also, modernization in all bodies of Masonry. Notice that while we speak that way, we continue to focus on our own lodge, chapter, council, etc. when we attempt change.

For example, as Masters and Wardens of our respective lodges, our attendance at monthly M&W Association meetings sure doesn't show that we recognize the advantages of considering "the organization as a whole". We don't seem to see the potential for building on the successes and avoiding the failures of our peers by being in their presence and learning of their experiences first hand.

We seem to jealously guard our resources. After all, charity begins at home. A common pool for the common good does not appeal to us. Yet, our Masonic ancestors in the Monroe Districts established a Service Bureau through which we would share our largesse with the surrounding community of man. Today, we in our individual lodges say "let them fend for themselves, what we have is ours for our own locale".

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How often do we review each other's trestleboards to take advantage of programs that "the other" lodge or body has prepared? For example, when other lodges have candidates going through degrees, do we invite them to join with our candidates, combining our talents to give these newly arriving members the most positive feelings about the Craft as a whole, or do we get parochial again because we don't want to share with "the organization as a whole".

What might we achieve by reawakening to the value of using our common organizations as focal points, as resource centers, as providers for the common good? Let's renew our encouragement of new brothers attendances at Countywide functions, such as educational sessions; let's encourage centralization of funds that we come into possession of, for the greater good in our community charitable and philanthropic works. Our time and talent is equally of value in this respect - many hands make - - -

How about our use of the Committees in our Craft? It's difficult to create them out of a few brothers in our own "active "group these days, but we do have those members of District Committees, and even local representatives of Grand Lodge Committees, who would be willing to share their knowledge and experience with local bodies, and be a tool or resource for them.

How often do we use these members of the "organization as a whole" for the benefit of our lodge brethren in the Monroe and Genesee-Wyoming Districts? We create Lodge trestleboards which only show a business meeting when we could have a brief program which educates, entertains and otherwise makes it worthwhile for a brother to come to lodge on a weekday evening.

Are there still areas where the Craft of Masonry would be better served through the merging of two or more bodies into one? Would such change be better for the "organization as a whole"?

Finally, as compass points to ponder, are there areas in our community where we could better serve the "organization as a whole" by creating new lodges? There are pockets where the population is large but not well served by the Craft, don't you think? This has been noted in previous years in articles in this paper but we have not pooled our resources in such a way as to act on such change. W.:. Gordon Dodge notes that in some countries where he has visited lodges, Grand Lodges require that when the membership in a lodge reaches 60 brethren, they are at maximum strength and must assist in creating a new body with those who would cause the roll to exceed that number. Is that another direction for us to consider locally? Keeping lodges at a maximum number of members, rather than merging to increase those numbers? Is there strength in numbers, or numbers of active members? As said at the outset, points to ponder. . .

It has been noted in the local community that the Executive Secretary of the Masonic Service Association, Richard E. Fletcher, PGM was "very pleased" with the Friedman article "Masonry's Key Ingredient" a in the Northern Light (reprinted in this issue of the Times). He had been the one to recommend the article be sent there. He also made note that Hay Market Lodge in Virginia held a "Brother Bring A Friend Night" based on the Friedman Short Talk Bulletin, with positive results for the Craft as well as MSA.

Having been granted the opportunity to write on a topic of my choice, I decided not to editorialize but rather relate some personal feelings.

As I approached my thirties I was filled with a sense of unfulfilled potential. This feeling was not just for myself, but for my fellow man as well. 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MASONRY AND THE DOLLAR BILL

A Response to an Article in the New York Times

NOTE; On Sunday, August 4, 1991 the New York Times ran a story about possible Masonic significance of the design of the dollar bill.

The following are excerpts of a letter from our Grand Secretary, M.: W.: Robert C. Singer, to the Editor of the Times.

Responsible authorities would agree, I believe, that there is no proof of a Masonic connection, and concur in the point that the Masons and the Great Seal designers (one or two of whom were Masons) might very will have used parallel sources. Why not just say that they both had good taste and let it go at that?

My difference with Mr. (Jed) Stevenson (author of the article) is over his comment: "Who wants to think that a national symbol is linked with a secret organization?"

There is nothing secret about an organization that meets in well labeled buildings, whose members wear all sorts of Masonic insignia, and which performs all sorts of public and community service across the nation in its own name.

Why would anyone not want to be linked with an organization whose membership included George Washington, Benjamin Franklin, nine signers of the Declaration of Independence, 13 signers of the Constitution, etc.?

6. Give the Lodge its own individual charitable or philanthropic project, periodic visits to some hospital, home for the aged or handicapped, or raise funds regualrly for a specific need, etc.

7. Encourage youth, your own and others, to join DeMolay, which is a major source for future Masons.

8. See the older members are provided transportation to meetings.

Grand Lodge Level

The modern age will require adjustments on the Grand Lodge level, also. What these may be, we can only venture a guess.

1. Grand Lodge may foster and encourage the program of spreading knowledge of Masonry through wider distribution of informative pamphlets, such as the "Primer of Masonry."





Let's Go Visiting

By W.: Gordon T. Dodge

I have been asked to write about my Lodge visitations in other jurisdictions by the Editor, R. . W .. Jay McCullough, who would also like to hear of YOUR visitations outside of New York State.

In 1976, while serving as a Junior Officer in my Lodge, the company I worked for sent me to Holland for a few months. I took my tuxedo with me as I had heard that everyone wears one in Europe. The town I was to be in, Eindhoven, had three lodges listed in the master book listing the lodges throughout the world. Upon arriving I found that none were listed in the local phone book. What to do? I thought that if I attended a church service on Sunday I might meet a fellow Mason. On arriving at an Angelican Church I introduced myself to the Deacon as a visiting Mason and desirious of attending a Masonic Lodge. Not being a Mason himself he informed me he would try to find a member of the church who was. A short time later he told me that someone would meet me after the service. I was met later by the church Treasurer and invited to his home for dinner on Monday. No one knew he was a Mason, but he stepped forward to help a fellow Master Mason.

After dinner on Monday, his wife and children retired as two of his Masonic brothers had arrived to "prove" me. This was done in a friendly manner and I was invited to visit their lodges on bothThursday (for a second degree) and on Friday (for a third degree).

At the lodge all members were in tuxedos (morning tuxs with tails) and waited until the Tiler, who was carrying a SIX FOOT BROAD-SWORD, announced that the Lodge was opened (this being done by the Master and Wardens). We then proceeded up a flight of stairs, at the top of which stood the Tiler who used the broadsword as a barrier until each member (and visitor) had given him the proper password.

We sat on benches on the North and South sides of the lodge. The ritual was done in Flemish but was similar enough in nature that I could

Masonry is a way of life. If you take to heart the tenets of Freemasonry, if the Fraternity really is a CRAFT, and if you really consider yourself a CRAFTSMAN then you will spend a portion of each day building that spiritual temple that defines the true Mason.

In reality the word "ritual" is not the best word available for this invaluable teaching tool.

The word "Ritual" implies a static, boring repetitive body of work. The living, electric, incredible, message which is given in the degrees is vibrant, relevant, and ever changing to remain cogent to those who at any given time are lucky enough to receive its light.

The beauty and profound lessons contained within this living work are timeless. The words and methods involved in breathing life into this body of rich material are what change.

The message of the Third Degree: spirituality, fidelity to God and to your Brother, courage, rebirth, fortitude and love has always been considered so good that, it has been dubbed "THE SUBLIME DEGREEE OF MAS-

After the degree, we assembled for a sit-down dinner at tables arranged in a U-shape covered with white tableclothes and a blue silk ribbon in the middle upon which

wine glasses were placed. The Master, Secretary and Treasurer sat at the head while the Wardens sat at each end of the U-shape. My host from church informed me that the blue ribbon represented the "firing line" in a military artillery battery. As the cannons would move backwards upon firing, the men had to move the guns back to the "firing line". Here it meant that if you moved your wine glass off of the blue ribbon, you wished to speak (fire). WHAT AN OPPORTU-NITY!! I immediately moved my wine glass near my plate. My host spoke in Flemish to the Worshipful Master who then informed all of the brothers, in Flemish (then English for my benefit) that their visitor wished to speak.

After rising to speak, I thanked all for the privilege of attending their Lodge, gave them greetings from Flower City Lodge #910 in Rochester, and remarked on their Lodge's furnishings which were somewhat different than what we have in Monroe County.

The evening ended with the brother who had taken his second degree speaking briefly on what he had done since the previous Thursday relative to the lessons he had encounted in his first degree. These three lodges in Eindhoven meet 52 weeks a year and the brothers going through the degrees must rise and speak every week on their weekly endeavors.

I also learned that evening that when their lodge reaches 60 members it must split and form two lodges. An interesting policy. You will know all of your lodge brothers. Altogether an interesting and

Since 1960 the Masonic Medical Research Laboratory, located on the Masonic Home campus, has quietly gone about providing a Sammer Fellowship Program. The program provides a rare opportunity for gifted and talented students of the life sciences to gain an appreciation for how scientific problems pertaining to medical disease are approached and examined, and to experience first hand the scientific method with all its rigors and disci-

The program is designed to instill scientific curiosity by allowing students to participate in ongoing research projects under staff guidance in the areas of Heart Disease, Immunology, Cancer, Gerontology and Blood Substitutes.

Over 260 young men and women have participated in the Summer Fellowship Program since its inception. Many have gone on to earn their Ph.D. or M.D. degrees; approximately 40% pursuing scientific and/or teaching careers.

Masonry's Key Ingredient

The world may have a shortage of trust but the Masonic fraternity has built its foundation on it

From the very start of a man's journey in Masonry, until he goes to that undiscovered country from whose bourne no traveler returns, there is a basic bedrock which supports the entire foundation of his Masonic life. That little mentioned fundamental is trust.

The world we live in has an extreme shortage of trust. Children are often taught not to trust adults. Formerly held positions of esteem inour society are no longer trusted. We seem to have reversed the American creed to now believe that a person is guilty until proven innocent. Yet Masonry is based on trust and teaches this critical human truth to all of its adherents.

Imagine, if you will, a world totally devoid of trust. How long could mankind survive in a wholly cynical state where every person focuses on self-centered pursuits without offering any citizen the trust which comes with living in a caring society?

The Importance of Trust

Masonry begins to inculcate its belief in the importance of trust right from the moment that a man decides to join our gentle craft. That man has formed an opinion of our fraternity for the most part sight unseen. It leads him to seek admission. His Masonic sponsor trusts that this man will fulfil his obligations and become a good and true brother. The new candidate trusts his investigating team to tell him the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth in their answers to his questions about the craft. The new candidate who comes for his first degree is bombarded with issues of trust. In the preparation room he is divested of all his metallic substances, rings, watches, money clips, wallets and trusts that these items will be present when he returns. The candidate is asked a series of questions which he answers on his "honor" and the Craft trusts him to have honor. One of the ultimate trust tests of that first evening is the moment at which the candidate is hood-winked and allows himself to blindly follow in the ceremonies of a degree he is minimally informed about by men he may not know at

Building Trust

To build trust among people one side cannot betray the other. The candidate learns that we will not betray his trust in us by the dignified way in which he is treated and the beauty of our ritual.

Within the degree itself there is the famous question: "In whom do you put your trust?" The candidate is asked to deepen his feeling about trust by his public admission of his trust in God. He comes to realize that one of the great benefits of being a Mason lies in the craft's insistence that he think about his life in a way he may not have had the time to do before. He is then informed that he need fear no danger as we ask him to trust us again.

The degree system of Masonry can indeed be seen as a process of creating a trusting bond between our new brothers and the body of the lodge, be-tween God and man, between men and their neighbors, between men and women and perhaps most importantly between men and themselves.

The framers of our ritual had wonderful insights into human beings. They must have realized that a manwho is coerced into any form of behavior is not in a position to be fully invested with our trust. I wonder if this is why the phrase "Of my own free will and accord" is so often an inte-gral part of our ceremonies. A man who enters freely into an obligation with his moral eyes open, assumes an emotional state of commitment and trustworthiness.

Trust the Foundation of Masonry

Throughout the body of Masonic ritual the issue of trust is highlighted. To keep and conceal and never reveal, to recognize a brother Mason in the dark as in the light, the repository of the faithful breast, the equality of men who meet on the level, answering and obeying all due signs and summonses, never wronging, cheating nor defrauding, pledging ourselves to the relief of all mankind, caring for widows and orphans, subduing our passions and circumscribing our desires, keeping our Brothers' confidences secure and inviolate, bidding all men come up to us but refusing to descend a single step. These are all Masonic concepts which call forth the issue of our ability to trust and be trusted.

The Hiramic Legend

The concept of the immortality of the soul is entirely an exercise in trust. Nowhere in Masonry is this more clear than in the Hiramic legend. Looking at the drama itself, it becomes clear at the outset that Hiram places a great deal of importance on his own trust in God. Equally clear almost immediately is that Hiram is involved in a sacred trust with Solomon and Hiram, King of Tyre. The dilemma for Hiram Abiff touches on the greatest issues oftrust and integrity. He can betray the trust already reposed in him and save his life. If he chooses to remain trustworthy, he will die. The beautiful resolution to the drama is that Hiram's trust in God allows him to maintain his integrity and save his immortal soul.

The Brother who represents Hiram places an enormous amount of trust in us - trust that his lodge will not take his life, trust that the different way he is handled in the ceremony of the degree has a higher moral meaning, and trust in himself that he can endure the trials which are set in his path.

Trust and Grand Lodge

Masonic law at its roots rests on a foundation of trust. No organization could ascribe the dictatorial powers to a Grand Master the way Masonry does, without a tremendous trust that the individual will utilize his power for the good of the craft. The same trust is inherent at the lodge level, where the Master is presumed by the Grand Lodge to be doing his job appropriately and from whose decision no procedure exists to overturn, except by the Grand Master.

The Masonic funeral service also concentrates on the issue of trust -trust in the immortality of the soul and trust that the God who guided us in life will not abandon us in death

Masons can take the lead in letting children know that there are adults in the world whom they can trust. I remember as a child in New York City, my uncle, who was a Mason, telling me that if I was ever lost or scared to look for a police officer or a man wearing

the square and compasses. In his voice was an assurance that I would be safe with either man.

Trust and Brotherly Love

Masons have the pleasure of knowing the trust which comes with being a brother, particularly when traveling in different jurisdictions. I have known the safe, comforting feeling of being enveloped in brotherly love by men that only needed to know that I was their brother to take care of me.

The next time you are asked what Masons do, think about adding a thought about our way of life. Masonry is one of the last bastions of trust to be found in our country and indeed in the world.

Throughout a Mason's life, if he clearly understands his role as a Mason, he will act as a human symbol to all those around him of the concept of trust. He will be a man who can be trusted with the lodge's work, money, responsibilities and desire for self im-provement. He will place his trust in his God, his family, his fraternity and him-

Masons Trust and are Trusted

He will learn as a Mason that he can trust a set of principles and a group of men, despite the avalanche of cynicism which he will encounter in his daily life. Our modern philosophers would have us believe that to trust anyone or anything is a foolish enterprise. As Masons we base our lives on the opposite view. We can trust, we do trust, and we can be trusted. It is only in the effort of holding firm to these simple truths, that a man can fully learn to trust kinate.

Whence Came You; Whither Are You Traveling?

That phrase is given to each of us early in our Masonic Training. At that time it is used to help exemplify a particular portion of the drama then in progress. To those of us responsible for the future of the fraternity, and that should be all of us, it should hold a deeper challenge

In school we were told that the study of history is important. By it we developed pride in our heritage. Our history inspires patriotism. It teaches is how certain accomplishments were achieved. This should enable us to achieve similar goals. History is also studied to be a guide to prevent us from making the mistakes made in the past.

The Masonic Fraternity has a glorious history. It is well to ask "Whence Came You?". Legend ties us to the building of the Great Cathedrals of Europe. The builders belonged to guilds which held meetings in a room of the unfinished structure.

These Masons took great pride in their work. Each stone was cut to perfection. Their works exist for us to admire today. These structures bear testimony to the utmost exertions of human genius. Did they realize that they were building immorality? We must be challenged by them as we strive for greater and more noble efforts for Masonry and Humanity.

After 300 years on the continent, Masonry crossed the channel into England. In due time we see a change from operative to speculative building trades. Can you imagine the consternation of the veteran members. They probably shouted "This change will ruin us!" Not only did they survive the change; but, it led to a stronger organization and the establishment of the Grand Lodge of England along with one in Ireland and another in Scotland.

About 1730 we find newspaper articles about Masonic meetings in

Philadelphia and Boston. These meetings were held in Taverns and Coffee Houses. I am sure that once again there were cries of fear as to CHANGE. But we continued to change. During the Revolutionary War weare told some meetings were held in barns, in tents and in open fields. Masonry survived the change.

With the Temperance movement more changes were made. We now find Masonic temples being built. Lodges met in rooms over stores and mills. Almost every little town during the westward movement had first a church, then a school and then a Masonic Lodge. Again we survived the change.

The second part of our original questionwas, "Wither are you Traveling?" Freemasonry is not a complete structure. We can contribute to this quest for perfection. We must leave it better than we found it. We are beneficiaries of a sacred trust. We must transmit it umimpaired.

We are like stones in the cathedrals. Each one was skillfully fitted to the Master's plan. Each of us are an important part of the Fraternity. We are symbolically stones fit into a portion of the work. How do we measure up when tried by plumb, square and level?

As we prepare for the 21st Century, we too must be prepared to change. Society has changed. Life styles have changed. An eighteenth century institution, regardless of its glorious history and legendary leaders, must have something to offer todays sophisticated, well educated, mobile population. Are we ready for this challenge?

Stage one was operative Mason. This was followed by speculative Masonry. In my opinion stage three must be "Applied Masonry." To serve the human race must be our true destiny. We are NOT a secret society. We are not just a social club. We must put our Masonic Principles into practical and helpful use. How a Mason lives outside the Lodge is more important than what he does in the room

Freemasonry took a giant step toward Applied Masonry with adoption of an outgoing, aggressive program of support for the education of children in the dangers of alcohol and drug abuse. We must individually and collectively lead the way and demand higher standards for our schools.

We must encourage greater citizens participation in government at all levels. Work to see morality and honesty practiced in all agencies, government and business. We must cooperate with our own concordant bodies and other organizations for Community Service, improved ecology and education.

All this can be accomplished thout changes to Masonic I als, Landmarks or Principles. We must institute programs to guide our membership toward Applied Masonry. First we must make our members knowledgeable about the Fraternity. Many brothers are unable to explain our organization. Secondly we need programs for Public Awareness. Masonry does so many good things; but, we won't let our light shine. Third we must Practice our Principles in the home, the house of worship and our work place.

We must meet on the level. We must practice our teachings and not just give them lip service. Titles and Jewels do NOT make a Mason. It is the shadow you cast and the image you create. 



George Washington Tells Why

"My first desire to become a Mason was due to the fact that many of Virginia's noblest sons were members of the Fraternity. Therefore, it was not without forethought that on Saturday evening, November 4. 1772, in the village of Fredericksburg, I was made an Entered Apprentice Mason." "

The Masonic lessons I learned on my admission to Masonry and my contact and conversation with prominent Masons thereafter were of the greatest encouragement in after years when I encountered and underwent severe trials, especially those of commencement and during the Revolution." "

It was at this time that friendly counsel reached my ears to the effect that some of the men regarded me as a slave owner and as

aristocrat and that they abhored my Episcopacy. I decided at once to dispel such thoughts from my comrades' minds and on one occasion sat in a Masonic Lodge at Cambridge of which an Orderly-Sergeant was Master. I made it a point to 'meet upon the level' and part upon the square' with all my comrades, regardless of rank or position and my reward was the loyalty and friendship of all far beyond my expectation. "

There is no doubt in my mind that Masonry and its lessons were helpful throughout the Revolution both upon the battlefield and in the Legislative assembly."


