If an article submitted for publication is poorly written or is partially or wholly illegible, it takes time to verify and edit con-

If copy submitted is too lengthy, it requires editing to sort the wheat from the chaff.

All these things require time, a commodity that is in short supply. The Masonic Times is short on staff, but long on service, there

If the deadline is the twelfth that leaves twelve work days to the end of the month. Allowing three days for printer turn around and three days for mailing, we are only left with six days for putting together an average 20 page publication. Not too much time.

Publishing names

Question: A number of Brothers have requested a clearer understanding of the restraints relative to publishing the names of candidates who have taken their degrees and when this restraint no longer applies. So much so that the Editor of this paper has requested we publish some form of guideline which would satisfy all concerned.

Answer: It has always been the policy of the Masonic Times, not to publish the names of candidates who have taken their de-

The question has arisen, however, as to when it is appropriate for new Brothers to be publicly welcomed as new members of a Lodge and accordingly have their names published.

This matter was taken up directly with the Grand Secretary. There is no particular ruling for publishing the names of new Master Masons. So, it is not a matter of whether they have been a member for three weeks or fourty-five minutes. They have now become Master Masons and under these circumstances, it would not be inappropriate for their names to be published as a new member of a Lodge.

The restriction will still apply, however, to candidates who have taken their First or Second Degree (Section 800, Handbook of Masonic Law). Hopefully, this will clarify the entire subject for all who have inquired.





Starting in December we will begin to put into action the change in the Lodge year. This will align Lodge Officer terms with Grand Lodge Officer terms. Lodges will elect officers and hold installations in December and January. Thereafter, all Lodges will hold elections at the first stated communication following the Annual Communication of Grand Lodge in May.

Different choices

Some lodges will be electing officers in December for six months and re-electing them in May or June for the ensuing year. Other Lodges may choose to elect officers in December for six months and then elect new officers for the ensuing year.

Beneficial to all

Whichever way a Lodge chooses to go, the change in the Lodge year may be difficult initially, but it will have many benefits. It will put Lodges and Grand Lodge on the same page in program development, the Brotherhood Fund, and in many other areas. It will also make the Masters and Wardens years coincide with the District Deputy and Staff Officer terms.

That in itself will save a lot of duplication of time and effort and make the goals we have set for ourselves more attainable. Try to imagine the confusion and chaos there would be if a football team changed coaches every year in the middle of the season. We urge you all to see the advantages of this change and support your Lodge through whatever difficulty that may initially arise.

Invitational school



Joint Investiture


Don't forget the Joint Investiture on December 28, 1992 at the downtown Temple. Even if the Master is a repeat, he is urged to come anyway.


"Molly", the traveling trophy



Drug Free School Zone



Worshipful Raymond J. Baker was born 76 years ago, October 20, 1915 in Johnsonburg, N.Y., a rural, unincorporated community near the heart of Wyoming County. He lives with his wife, Arlene, at 18 Livingston Street in Warsaw, New York. He was a trucker, at one time owner and operator of Baker Motor Express in Warsaw; he also owned and operated contract school buses for the Warsaw Central School District; and in later years operated a Real Estate business, employing several sales persons.

He is also a licensed private pilot, but with his present medical condition, has to be satisfied with "hangar flying". At one time, just following World War II, he owned his own airplane, a J-3, Piper Cub, and flew from a grass strip in the valley across from the present Wyoming County Community Hospital.

Masonic activities

Ray is a fifty year member of Warsaw Lodge, having been raised on December 1st, 1942. He worked up "through the chairs" and was elected Worshipful Master for 1975. He had the unhappy distinction of serving as Master for two years., due to the passing of his Senior Warden.


Officer elections

Masonry and Christmas

It is Christmas time. This season of the year brings to mind two in have often been asked of me. The first is: "Does Masonry celebrate Christmas?" My answer has been no, but Christian Masons do. I followed up with the explanation that Masonry is a universal non-sectarian fraternity, and as such it includes not only Christians but also men of other faiths, Mohammedans, Jews, etc. Since non-sectarianism is the nature of Masonry, it would not behoove the Craft to single out Christmas for a celebration, since Christmas is fundamentally a Christian obser-

To elucidate further, I went on to explain that it was not always thus, especially at the time of the Middle Ages, when the stone masons of Europe, who built the mighty cathedrals and churches, were practically all members of the Christian church. However, since the 18th century, as Ma-

sonry spread to lands other than Christian, it was deemed advisable, because of the non-sectarian nature of the Craft, to dechristianize it. Gradually, the process took effect and became final in 1814-1816 when the ritual was revised. All overt Christian references were eliminated except three patron saints.. These men of God were retained because in their lives they exemplified the basic teachings of Masonry. St. John, the Evangelist, taught what brotherly love meant. St. John, the Baptist, constantly railed against vice and encouraged repentance and the practice of virtue. St. John, the Almoner, by his generous relief to the needy, became the exemplar for Masonic practice.

Now, I said, Masonry could demonstrate that it is not a religion or attached to a religion, but merely a fraternity - a non-sectarian club, if you will, with high ideals, capable of embracing all faiths and cultures in order to make good men better.

The second question is, "How could you, a Christian clergyman, ever be a Mason, since Christ said: "No man cometh to the Father, but by me" (John 14:6). My answer has been that the values of Christ are in Masonry. If I follow these values, am I not going to the Father by Christ?

Masonic teachings

Like Christ, Freemasonry stresses the existence of an everpresent God. Christ taught: "God knoweth your hearts" (Luke 16:15). To keep this thought in mind, Masonry uses the symbol of the All-Seeing Eye of God. Consequently, Freemasonry calls upon its members never to mention God's name except with that reverence due Him from His creature. It further teaches ever to act upon the square and do unto your neighbor as you would wish him to do to you - another Christ value.

When the Pharisees asked Christ which is the greatest commandment of the law, He answered: "Thou shalt love the Lord, thy God, with all thy heart and with all thy soul and with all thy mind. This is the great and first commandment; and the second is like unto it, thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself" (Matt. 22:37-39). This teaching is the same in Freemasonry.

It is, therefore, the teaching of Masonry that God comes first always, for in Him, we live and move and have our being. It further teaches that our neighbor comes second, because God himself has so ordered it. Finally, Masonry encourages prayer and points to the Book of the Law, the Holy Bible, to serve as the rule and guide for faith and practice, all with the aim to reach a blessed immortality, so well symbolized by the Masonic symbol of the evergreen. To stabilize these teachings, Masonry encourages its members to be faithful to the church of their choice.

Another value of Christ which is embodied in Freemasonry is His teaching: "Be ye perfect as your heavenly Father is perfect" (Matt. 5:48). Masonry encourages the practice of the four cardinal virtues of Prudence, Justice, Fortitude and Temperance.

To bear this in mind, Masonry uses the symbol of Jacob's ladder. The bottom of the ladder touches the earth and the top touches heaven. The rungs are designated as the virtues, the stepping on each will assure a blessed eternity.

Christ taught: "You are the

light of the world..let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works and glorify your Father which is in heaven" (Matt. 5:16). Masonry incorporates this value of Christ in its teaching when it places each new member in the northeast corner of the Lodge and directs him ever to walk and act as an upright man and Mason before God and man.

Other symbols

Since Christ and Freemasonry teach that every person, at the end of life, will be rewarded according to his merits, we can understand why the value of Christ included in Masonic teachings encourages each person to keep himself in readiness for life's end. Freemasonry uses the symbol of the beehive to remind each Mason to keep as busy as bees in the practice of the virtues. It uses the hour glass to remind each member to keep constantly in readiness, for no one knows when the sands of life will run out. The same can be said of the scythe to remind all that no one knows when the reaper of death will cut the brittle threads of life. Finally, Masonry uses the symbol of the coffin to remind all of the inevitable in life. The empty grave is to teach each Mason that death is not the end but that there is a resurrection to a life eternal. Don't we find these values among Christ's teachings? To emphasize the value of readiness, Christ gave the parable of the five wise and five foolish virgins (Matt.

Another dimension added

The way Freemasonry has absorbed Christ's ideals in its teachings should remove all fear from every Christian, that he is not going to the Father if he joins Masonry. By following Masonic teachings, which incorporate Christ's ideals, his way to the Father is assured. In fact, his joining Masonry will add another dimension to his life to aid him in surely attaining the final goal of life-the enjoyment of a blessed immortality. If only Rock Hudson had such an assurance after he learned that he was suffering from the fatal illness called Aids. Time Magazine has him as saying: "I spent so much time in my life figuring out what life is all about, and still I don't know; but, now, I don't give a damn."

Freemasonry and Christ's ideals not only tell what life is all about, they also embody the fun and joy of living in fraternal interplay.

Brethren! May the joy of Christmas beyours in abundance.

King Solomon's Quarries

The August '92 issue of the Short Talk Bulletin was entitled "King Solomon's Quarries" and was written by Bro. Leon Zeldis, Editor of the Isreal Freemason. As a result of this STB the following story was sent to us by Dove Lodge No. 51 of Richmond, Vir-

ginia.

The years 1909 to 1912 seemed to have been the years in which Dove Lodge received much of its handsome furnishings. And there is a story behind our acquisition of the Ashlars. About the year 1872 an English traveler visiting Jerusalem was walking near the Damascus gate accompanied by his dog. Suddenly the dog disappeared in what seemed a solid wall covered by vines and bushes. The traveler's curiosity being excited, he made an examination and discovered an opening. With the help of others a thorough examination was made, and a large opening was found which proved to be the entrance to an old quarry containing huge blocks of stone in an unfinished state along with a number of workmen's tools, lamps, etc.

A number of scientists made a thorough examination and unanimously decided that this was the quarry from which King Solomon secured the stones of which the original Temple was built. Since that time this quarry has been visited by a great many Masons from all over the world, and a goodly number of Masonic communications have been held in it. It is from these quarries that the Ashlars were obtained for Dove Lodge. The silver plate on the smooth Ashlar reads as follows:

These Ashlars were secured for Dove Lodge No. 51 A.F.&A.M. by Worshipful Hay T. Thornton, Treasurer of the Lodge from King Solomon's Quarries in Palestine through the kind help of Bro. Thomas R. Wallace, American Consul. They were received by Dove Lodge April 8th, 1910. Thus coupling the Masonry of the 20th Century A.D. with that of the original Temple Builders.

Dove Lodge has the distinction of being the only Masonic Lodge in the world possessing such historic Ashlars."


