

LET'S JOIN THE REST OF THE MASONIC WORLD!

Over the years, the Grand Lodge of New York has earned a deserved reputation as a trendsetter in Freemasonry, usually with very good results. Our efforts in communicating with the non-Masonic public, using modern media, are just one example.

True, compared with many other Grand Lodges, we have been thought of as being in the "liberal" tradition, that is, we have relatively few prohibitions and restrictions. But, in fact, many foreign and domestic Grand Jurisdictions have looked, and still look, to the Empire State for leadership and guidance.



Business on the First Degree?

This may well be proved again, perhaps as soon as the next Annual Communication of Grand Lodge, in May, 1992. At that time, the Grand Master, Most Worshipful Richard P. Thomas, may propose, through the Constitutions Committee, that henceforth all business, including the opening and closing of Lodge, shall be conducted on the First Degree, rather than the Third Degree.

Shocking? Unheard of? An "innovation"? These and many other descriptive terms may be the first reaction of some, because any change, whether good or bad, frequently engenders such responses. But, Brethren, the writer asks you to consider some telling reasons why such a change would be advantageous.

We're in the minority

While it is true that virtually all United States Grand Jurisdictions open, close and conduct business on the Third Degree, it is a fact that we are in the minority worldwide. Of the 221 Grand Jurisdictions, only the 51 in the U.S. plus a handful more elsewhere follow this practice! Actually, most of the Masonic world, including England, Scotland, Ireland, and the other old-line Grand Lodges have long used the First Degree as the basic one for all Lodge activities.

Can't vote

What does this mean, in real terms? It means that once a man completes his Entered Apprentice Degree, he becomes a member of the Lodge, pays dues (!) and is entitled to attend all Lodge meetings except those at which the Fellowcraft and Master Mason Degrees are conferred. The one privilege he does not have is the right to vote, which he receives when he takes the Third Degree.

Immediate participation

Think, my Brothers, what this change could do for our renewed efforts to stimulate Lodge membership and retention programs. No longer would the newly-initiated Mason have to wait months to take part in his Lodge's activities. He would be accepted for what he is -- an Entered Apprentice or a Fellowcraft, but a member nevertheless of the Lodge immediately. He would wear his apron according to his rank, and he would be encouraged to take all three degrees to complete his basic Masonic education.

No longer would Lodges have to "change over" to accommodate the presence of one or two Brothers; they would be there to start, and welcomed as a part of the Lodge. They could even serve on committees and perform other services commensurate with their station (as they did in operative Lodges in olden days).

In the writer's view, the best part of this proposed change is the perceived positive impact on bringing the new Brothers closer to their Blue Lodge before they go off to explore the pleasures and opportunities of the Masonic-related bodies, such as the Scottish Rite, the York Rite, etc. Certainly, there is nothing wrong with these organizations, but we must work harder to develop the basic bond to a mother Lodge first so that, no matter what other body he joins and no matter what rank he attains there, the fundamental tie to the Lodge is maintained as the bedrock of a Brother's Masonic membership.

Can we do it?

Will this idea work in New York? Sure, it will. It's worked all over the world, hasn't it? And, many of these non-U.S. Grand Jurisdictions are growing apace, not declining in membership, as we have been in America!

Brethren, we have to be ready to try new-old ideas as we move forward into the next century. Sometimes the best "new" idea is an "old" one, tried and true.

Let's do what we think is right now, and perhaps other U. S. Grand Jurisdictions will benefit from our leadership and experience once again.

(Note that after writing this article, we learned that several U.S.Grand Lodges are seriously considering making this change at upcoming Annual Communications. It's interesting to see how good ideas have a habit of coming to the fore at the same time in different places!) "

Financial Planning Solutions

The following is a repeat of the last two paragraphs from last month. A phrase was missing and clarification was needed:

"From my point of view, a planner is supposed to obtain the best mileage out of your investments. If he charges a fee and then you pay another fee for the products that you purchase, that is not obtaining the maximum efficiency out of your dollars, hence, I for one am a non-fee based financial planner.

Whatever your point of view is, you are once again urged to do, or have done, a financial planning profile on your family and

This month, the topic will cover safe types of investments.

Once again, in my judgment, the three safest and best forms of investments are:

Universal Life Insurance Tax Sheltered Annuities Mutual Funds

Most financial planners sell all kinds of investments, because there are some people who are willing to assume more risks than others. But, if you check around, I believe that you will find that my recommendations are at or very near the top of the list of safe investments.

Since life insurance companies and mutual fund companies have been doing business in New York State, not one insurance contract or mutual fund has ever defaulted to the shenanigans of the issuer. It is true that some contracts have not made profits, but, strange as it may seem, the above statement is true.

There are some "flaky" companies out there that should be avoided, so examine the companies that you choose to do business with very carefully.

It is also my judgment that an investor should do business with companies that manage a lot of funds rather than with a select number of funds. The advantages to the investor are much greater, and in a future column, they will be discussed.

Finally, a word of advice. Never annuitize an annuity type of plan! The moment you do, you lose control of your money. For example, if you retire from your company (i.e., E. K. Co.), and elect to annuitize your pension, your income remains the same and you can never change it. You cannot increase it, you cannot decrease it, and you cannot take out a special payment to cover an emergency. "



You and I know that hope alone will not insure success. It is imperative that you exercise the six "P"s, which are phrased as: "Proper planning and preparation prevent poor performance."

Reflection

I also want to thank the retiring Masters and Lodge Officers who labored hard in the Masonic fields last year. I hope you reached your goals and objectives, and if you didn't, I hope you can reflect on what you did wrong and try to offer some words of advice and encouragement to those coming after you. Only in this way can we hope to learn and improve on what it is we are trying to do.

I thank everyone in all the Lodges where we had Official Visits. Your kindness and attention to detail made it all worthwhile while we delivered the Grand Master's message.

Theme

For the 1992 Masters and War dens, I offer this suggestion: "Lead With Impact". This just happens to be the theme of our Grand Master, M.:W.: Richard P. Thomas.

In order to "Lead With Impact" you must first become a good leader. Good leadership is largely a matter of Love and Caring. Proper leadership involves caring for people, not manipulating them.

Two kinds of leaders

 Those who practice leadership as a trainable skill with all sorts of technical and administrative aspects.

Those who approach leadership as a calling, a life engagement that, if done properly, combines technical and administrative skills with vision, compassion, honesty and trust to create an environment in which people can grow personally, feel fulfilled and contribute to the common good.

Sacred trust

This country was founded on respect for individual rights and freedom of choice. Are we practicing what we preach?

You don't become a leader because someone appointed you to be one. Hanging a title after your name and putting you at the top of an organization doesn't make you a leader.

Leadership is in fact a sacred trust in which the well-being of other people is put in your care. It is a trust placed upon you by those who put you in the job, but more important than that, it is a trust placed upon you by those whom you are to lead.

Important points

Try to keep these important points in mind as you go about leading the members of your lodge and our Fraternity this year.

 Care about yourself: The good leader begins by managing and caring about himself. You don't go through life "motivating people"; you jump start them. And you can't jump start anyone unless your own battery is fully charge.

 Be honest: Honesty is the single most important attribute in a good leaders relationship with his organization. If your members know that you are honest and upstanding, they will follow your advice and counsel.

 Trust your members: If you ask someone to do a task, trust that they will do it, or at least, trust that they will ask for help and assistance if they can't do it.

 Recognize accomplishments: Everyone wants to hear those words; "Thank you." If you ask someone to do a task, then you owe it to them to thank them for a job well done.

Summary

1. Set goals and objectives.

Assign jobs and tasks to lodge members and officers, with clearcut instructions on what you expect them to do.

3. Evaluate the progress of the assigned jobs and tasks periodically

 Recognize jobs that were well done with proper forms of thanks.

5. Provide help and assistance all along the way.

Have a great and enjoyable year, and always remember, your Grand Lodge Officers are here to give you any help or assistance you may require. We look forward to serving you and our Grand Lodge in any way we can.

As a member of Grand Lodge Leadership Services Committee, (LSC), I was asked to come up with "The Principles of Total Quality Management (TQM) in the Development of Masonic Leadership". I would like to share these with you, but first our LSC mission is: To Develop, Empower and Motivate Grand Lodge Officers, Lodge Officers and All Brothers in Becoming More Effective Masonic Leaders.

With the above as a preamble, the principles of TQM in the development of Masonic Leadership can also be adopted in our everyday life plus being used regardless of what profession we are in, e.g.:

 Senior leaders of the Craft, or any function from top to bottom, require total Quality Management commitment and action.

 TGM requires that quality concepts become a necessary part of the way you manage any organization.

 Total quality is the baseline for survival and should be a way of life.

4) We need to provide and promote Education and Training. To quote R.: W.: George Peter "to lead is to serve, is to educate is to serve, is to serve., etc."

5) Attitude - it is essential that Grand Lodge, Committee Chairmen and Lodge Masters always set a good example by being totally committed to quality. This also includes Quality of Relationships, Quality of our Communications and Quality of our Promises to Each Other.

6) Strive for continuous improvement and prevention of errors versus detection and correction. Learn from errors rather than prevent.

7) TQM requires a comprehensive cuture change. It is not a "Quick Fix". It takes three to five years to achieve a culture change.

8) Top leaders should allow empowerment/teamwork/improvement teams to use their own local knowledge to identify problems and solutions and implement corrective action. This instills pride of ownership and it not only unleashes the talent and energy in our Brothers, but also flattens out the organization and reduces bureaucracy.

What Is A Leader?

The dictionary defines it as a person who leads others along the way; who is charge or in command of others; one who attempts to influence the behavior or an individual or group. I personally like the following definition of Leadership:

To know why to do something is Wisdom; To know how to do it

is Skill; To know when to do it is Judgement; To know strive to do it best is Dedication; To do it for the benefit of others is Service; To want to help others is Compassion; To do this quietly is Humility; To get the job done is Achievement; To get others to do all these things is LEADER-SHIP!



Fairport Lodge No. 476 Fairport, N. Y.

On Saturday evening, April 16, 1859, sixteen Master Masons assembled in the building later occupied by DeLand & Co. as an office. Under dispensation granted by Grand Lodge of the State of New York, they held the first communication of Fairport Lodge No. 476. The charter was presented July 1859 by W. E. Drew, Grand Lecturer, who installed the charter officers.

For many years the Lodge met in the Henry Block on South Main Street. In 1916, the Temple on West Avenue was purchased, with funds raised by the sale of bonds to members. The Temple was dedicated in June, 1916.

A fire in 1924 almost totally destroyed the building, and after careful deliberation, the decision was to rebuild the Temple. While work was in progress, the Lodge met in Baker Hall on North Main Street. The Temple was again occupied in October, 1924. It increasingly became inadequate and outdated because of the growth of membership. As a result, it was voted in July 1958 to purchase the Temple Theatre building on South Main Street from the Schine Theatre interests.

The building pictured here is the current Lodge and former village theater. The dedication of the Temple was combined with the 100th Anniversary Celebration October 3, 1959, a notable event in the history of the Lodge.

Along with the Lodge, Fairport Chapter No. 444, O.E.S. meets in the Fairport Temple. Business tenants occupy space in the front of the building, helping to defray the expense of upkeep to some extent.

Lodge officers welcome all Masons who may have occasion to visit, on either the 2nd or 4th Monday of the month. "

with his anecdotes and delightful humor. In a more serious vein he addressed the future of our Fraternity. The former Grand Master was very optimistic as he reported that the downward trend in membership is leveling off.

Letters

Grand Lodge sent out 2,500 letters to brothers who were subject to unaffiliation, asking why they were leaving and that they please reconsider before dropping out. A positive response was received from about 700 men. It was a pleasant surprise, saving so many brothers.

However, an ominous message came thru loud and clear from the other correspondents: "Nobody cares whether I go to lodge or not. The only time I am ever contacted is when they want money."

But Masonry does care, otherwise it would just be another service type of organization, according to M.·W.· Singer. He further recounted meeting a Mason from Turkey, neither could speak the other's language. However, the unspoken bonds between fellow Masons are universal. They are at ease with one another; they have both traveled the same road. They care.

Reactivate interest

Each lodge member, especially the officers, need to care about the brothers who have not been to a meeting for some time. Find out why they are not attending and what can be done to reactivate their interest. This may be a tall job, but everyone needs to be motivated to attend lodge. Our future depends on it.

If the secretary does not comply with this requirement, the District Deputy will be instructed to pick up the Lodge Charter and hold it until the secretary performs his constitutional duties. The last report that is due is the Invoice for the 1991 annual per capita dues. This bill must be paid by the constitutional date of March 15, 1992. You will note that this bill is for 1991, so the monies should be escrowed in each lodge since the lodge has collected most of these monies.

On Tuesday, November 26, 1991, Henrietta Lodge No. 526 presented the highest Masonic Award for Community Service which can be bestowed on a non-Mason. Ceremonies took place during a public ceremony.

The District Deputy Grand Master for the 2nd Monroe District, R.·W. Paul Spillane, assisted Lodge Master W. Paul Josephson in presentation ceremonies. In accepting the award, Kris Tortellotte specially acknowledged all the volunteers who participated in events during the several months of activities for "Operation Welcome Home".

Kris originated the Welcome Home committee for greeting returning veterans of the Persian Gulf War. During the middle of January 1991, he contacted a morning talk show on radio station WHAM to make it known that he wished to have a real welcome home for returning war vets. He had been a Vietnam War vet, who had not received such treatment when he returned and he didn't want to see that repeated. After giving his phone number over the air, he received a hundred calls in a single day, and over 300 in a two week time. As of the time of this award presentation, there were over 800 people who could be called at any time to rally and support vets returning home. Volunteers got other volunteers. Computer Consoles, Inc., became a prime corporate backer, contributing organization and financing. Certificates and pins were designed. A unique logo was created. Signatures were sought for the certificates and over 30,000 were obtained. Pins and bumper stickers were distributed to supporters. Yellow ribbon decorations, and in some instances, bands would group with volunteers to welcome returning vets. A man driving from Buffalo heard a radio announcement about the program and he stopped by the Monroe County airport to join other volunteers and welcome troops home.

Henrietta Lodge is very proud to have presented this community service award to a truly dedicated member of the community!

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



REVOLUTIONARY MASONS

By W.: Roy Goold, 1986 Master of Monroe No. 173

As Masons we are well aware of George Washington's affiliation with our benevolent fraternity, of the shadow he cast as a living perpendicular. That his trestleboard of life was built upon brotherly love, relief and truth. There is one other fraternal organization of which he was a member, that still flourishes today and was based upon the same immutable ideals.

First American Masons The history of our nation and Masonry are inseparable. It is believed that the first Mason arrived in Rhode Island in 1690. He had probably been raised in England. Many years later the first lodge was formed in Connecticut (by 1775) and the start of American Revolution Masonry was flourishing. Many of the more prominent founding fathers are identified as Masons: 9 were signers of the Articles of Confederation; 10 signed the Articles of Association; 9 signers of the Declaration of Independence; 13 were signers of the Constitution of the United States; 33 General Officers of the Continental Army were Masons; and 8 of Washington's aides and military secretaries were Masons. During the Revolutionary War many battalions and regiments formed military lodges. Unfortunately, few records now exist

about them. We are unable to determine with certainty how many soldiers of the Revolution also wore the Lambskin. We do know that in the post-war period as the former soldiers began to move to the new lands of New York, they formed lodges. We find that the first members of these new lodges had been raised in their home states before, during or shortly after the War of Independence.

Society of the Cincinnati

As the War ended, the general officers of the Continental Army instituted The Society of the Cincinnati at New Windsor Contone ment on May 13, 1783, A society of friends, who dedicated themselves "to perpetuate the vast event they had just concluded, the mutual friendships which they had formed during the heat of battle, to endure as long as they shall endure, or any of their male posterity, and to render permanent and cordial affection subsisting among them. This spirit will dictate brotherly kindness in all things, and particularly extend to the most substantial acts of benficence, according to the ability of the society, towards those officers and their families who unfortunately may be under the necessity of receiving it." Does this sound familiar?

First officers

The first meeting of the General Society was held at Philadelphia on May 4, 1784 when the first general officers were elected: George Washington of Virginia, President General which he held until his death in 1799; Major Gen. Horatio Gates, of Virginia, Vice-President General; Major Gen. Henry Knox, of Massachusetts, Secretary Gen.; Brig. Gen. Otho Holland Williams, of Maryland, Assistant Secretary Gen; General Alexander McDougall, of New York as Treasurer General. Each of these men were Masons as were the vast majority of the first qualifying members. Today, the Society of the Cincinnati is composed of direct descendants and collateral descendants of the officers of the Continental Army.

Patriotic societies

In the last century two additional hereditary patriotic societies were formed. First the Sons of the Revolution, whose membership is comprised of the descendants of the officers and sol-

Monroe Lodge No. 173 **Brockport**, New York

A group of ten Master Masons met March 19, 1850 to organize Monroe Lodge. The charter was granted June 21, 1850. Details of early meetings were lost in a fire in 1915 which destroyed the Temple, and all minutes and records. Later, the Lodge met in rooms over the stores at the corner of Main and Clinton Streets. The Lodge immediately proceeded to rebuild, in the meantime holding its meetings in the Odd Fellows Hall down the block. Raising funds by selling building bonds, with other fund-raising projects such as Masonic Balls in 1916 and 1917, minstrel shows in 1922 and 1923, resulted in enough money to dedicate a new Temple in November 1917.

The Lodge owns the building at 67 Main Street in Brockport. The stainless steel square and compasses above second floor windows was created and installed by W.: George Sage in the 1960's. The main floor book store and a second floor dance studio are current tenants in a long line of various business enterprises that occupied space in the building over the years.

Mary Jane Holmes Chapter No. 440, O.E.S., and Francis Hitchcock Shay Constellation of Jr. Stars are allied bodies that meet in the Temple. There had been a Royal Arch Chapter and a DeMolay Chapter in earlier history of the Masonic associations in the village.

Current membership is about 130. The Master, officers and brothers would be very pleased to greet Masons who choose to visit on the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays of the month. "

In 1875, the Sons of the American Revolution was formed and is composed of the descendants of soldiers, patriots, and individuals who supported the cause of American Independence in any fashion. Both are dedicated to the same immutable ideals set forth by the Cincinnati.

Should you be among those ho enjoy climbing their family tree, you may well find a Revolutionary War soldier in your ancestry. If you look closer you may also discover he was a Mason. If any of your forebears were members of a Lodge in New York, the dates that they were initiated, passed and raised will appear in the annual returns which are available at Grand Lodge. In 1991, we accomplished our goals and objectives in accordance with our bylaws. Three courses were presented.

Basic

Our Entry Level Course was conducted on January 28th. Fiftyfive brothers were in attendance, mostly raised in 1990. The LSOME* text was provided, as well as the "Walking Charge", information on concordant Masonic bodies, and information about use of Masonic libraries and research units, along with what's available in Masonic pub-

Advanced

On March 1st, our Continuing Education Course was presented, even though poor weather deterred attendance. There were 32 brothers who received this outstanding program. Subjects included Origins of Masonic Philosophy, Masonic History of American Presidents, Masonic Law (Q and A), "The Charges of a Free Mason", and King Solomon's Temple.

Leadership

Finally, on September 21st, there were 57 attendees at the Leadership Course. The "George Peter* Correspondence Course was the focal point this year. Instead of being a "couch potato" student of Masonry, the attendee participated with his peers in taking all ten lessons of this correspondence course in one Saturday setting! This was an innovation for Masonic education in New York State.

The approach was a huge success, causing several other Districts to schedule it in their areas in the Spring of 1992. Representatives from several audited the Rochester method.

In retrospect, the only disappointment was the feeling that we had mediocre attendance. We were prepared to handle much larger numbers at each of the three courses than did attend.

Our most ardent desire is for more members of the Craft to take advantage of this opportunity to improve themselves, further their light, and become better prepared spokesmen for the Fraternity and more confident men and Masons.





Heart Cure Originates at Laboratory

Patients who have an abnormal heart rhythm due to AV nodal tachycardia or Wolff-Parkinson-White (WPW) syndrome can now be cured according to Dr. Douglas P. Zipes. Zipes, a former Postdoctoral fellow at the Laboratory, is widely regarded as one of the finest clinical cardiologists and experimental cardiac electrophysiologists in the world.

The new treatment is based on research conducted 25 years ago by Dr. Gordon K. Moe, then Director of Research at the Laboratory. Dr. Moe and his colleagues had suggested that in such arrhythmias, electrical impulse travels down one of two pathways in the atrioventricular node of the heart, turns around and travels back the other pathway to its original point of creating an "echo beat". Although clinical data supported Moe's hypothesis, until recently there was no unequivocal proof showing that two pathways existed in this region of tissue which separates the upper (atria) and lower (ventricles) chambers of the heart.

Only in the last 18 months, using catheters in the heart, can we identify where these pathways are," said Zipes. And by using state-of-the-art equipment, he added, "we can burn it with radiofrequency energy and thus eliminate it."

Left untreated, this echo beat can go around and around," producing a rapid heart rate, said Zipes. In a young and healthy person, it could cause anxiety. In an older person, it could lead to blackouts, heart attack or stroke, he said.

Treating the problem with drugs can produce side effects, he continued. Eliminating the pathway is far more effective. "There are very few things we can cure when it comes to heart disease. This is not a treatment. It's a cure. We can send people home from the hospital in a day or two. It's one of the most exciting breakthroughs in the field in the last decade."

The catheter ablation therapy destroys myocardial (muscle) tissue by delivering electrical energy in the form of a high energy direct current (DC) shock or radiofrequency energy through electrodes on a catheter placed next to the area or pathway contributing to the arrhythmia.

Previous to this technological advance, both pathways responsible for AV nodal reentry were purposely destroyed during surgery, thus rendering the patient pacemaker dependent. The advent of this new technology allows for careful positioning of the catheter and the fine tuning of the dose of electrical energy which results in selective ablation of conduction over the slow or fast pathway involved in the AV nodal reentry (echo beat). The ability to pin point the ablation in just one pathway means preservation of the other thus eliminating the

echo beat and restoring normal AV nodal conduction and sinus rhythm.

This advance is the proof positive needed to verify Moe's hypothesis and the MMRL's work, said Zipes. "Gordon Moe did many of the early studies on the causes of (heart) fibrillation." He calls Moe "the father of electrophysiology" and said the Masonic Medical Research Laboratory had become "a Mecca of sorts" for attracting physiologists from all over the world.

Sudden Cardiac Death and M Cells Linked?

A recent discovery made at the Masonic Medical Research Laboratoy in Utica could help explain why an enlarged heart muscle is predisposed to beat too fast, Dr. Douglas Zipes, a nationally known cardiologist, said.

Earlier this year, scientists at the lab announced they had discovered a unique group of cells in the ventricular (lower, main pumping chambers) of the heart that could play a significant role in sudden cardiac death. This sudden death takes the lives of more than 350,000 Americans each

Dr. Charles Antzelevitch, executive director and coauthor of the study with Dr. Serge Sicouri, research scientist, said these socalled M cells may provide some missing links in our understanding of the electrocardiogram, "as well as important clues for understanding the mechanisms responsible for life-threatening abnormal heart rhythms."

Zipes, who was at the lab for a symposium of the Upstate New York Cardiac Electrophysiology Society, said that with Left Ventricular Hypertrophy (LVH), the ventricle wall muscle becomes enlarged and the heart beats at times when it should be resting. The recovery period also takes longer. It's one of the leading important risk factors in sudden cardiac death, he said.

While admitting it was only culation on his part. Zipes said "it's possible that LVH is associated with an increase in the number of M cells."

Scientists still don't know the function of these M cells, but they have been able to show that their electrical activity lasts longer than those of other cells, especially when the heart slows, and this can create an obstacle to the regular flow of electrical impulses in the heart. Scientists at the MMRL have also shown that this unique population of cells responds very differently to a variety of drugs. Antzelevitch indicated that studies are currently underway to assess whether M cells are the site for commonly seen forms of druginduced abnormal rhythms. II

TIME WAS

For all those born before

We are survivors. Consider the changes we have witnessed:

We were born before television, before penicillin, before polio shots, frozen foods, Xerox, plastic, contact lenses, frisbees and the pill.

We were before radar, credit cards, split atoms, laser beams and ballpoint pens, before pantyhose, dishwashers, clothes dryers, electric blankets, air conditioners, drip-dry clothes, and before man walked on the moon.

We got married first and then lived together. How quaint can you be? In our time, closets were for clothes, not for coming out of. Bunnies were small rabbits and rabbits were not Volkswagens. Designer jeans were scheming girls named Jean, and having a meaningful relationship meant getting along with our cousins.

We thought fast food was what you ate during Lent, and outer space was the back of the Riviera

We were before house husbands, gay rights, computer dating, dual careers and commuter marriages. We were before daycare centers, group therapy and nursing homes. We never heard of FM radio, tape decks, electric typewriters, artificial hearts, word processors, yogurt, and guys wearing earrings. For us, time sharing meant togetherness-not computers or condominiums. A chip meant a piece of wood, hardward was hardware, and software wasn't even a word.

In 1940 "Made in Japan" meant junk, and the term "making out" referred to how you did on your exam. Pizzas, McDonalds and instant coffee were unheard of.

We hit the scene when there were 5 and 10 cent stores, where you bought things for a nickel or a dime. For one nickel, you could ride a street car, make a phone call, buy a Pepsi or enough stamps to mail one letter and two postcards. You could buy a new Chevy coupe for \$600, but who could afford one? A pity, too, because gas was 11 cents a gallon.





Mlasonic Artists

by Dr. Allan Boudreau

Individuals who memorialize our great events and famous people with oils, canvas, stone and metal are frequently overlooked. Those skilled in the fine arts who dedicate their time and talents to creative works are often forgotten. The craftsmen who strive to provide us with the great buildings and structures that exemplify the progress of our civilization are often not remembered.

From its dimmest beginnings our Fraternity has honored builders - those who planned and created structures for their their fellow men. Also honored have been the men who designed and completed works of art through which the highest achievements of mankind might be symbolized in lasting memorials.

The Second Book of Chronicles describes the distinguished artist sent by Hiram of Tyre to King Solomon to supervise the workmen and carry out the plan to build a temple, "skilful to work in gold and in silver, in brass, in iron, in stone and in purple, in blue, and in fine linen and in crimson; also to grave any manner of graving, and to find out every device which shall be put to him ...

This brief treatise is intended as an introduction to some of the many gifted Masonic artists; the architects, engravers, painters, sculptors, and other creative masterworkmen who recorded American and Masonic History in their

As the American Revolution drew to a close, it was deemed important that a statue of George Washington be produced. The most famous sculptor of the day, Jean Antoine Houdon (1740-1828), a member of the Lodge of the Nine Sisters in Paris, was invited to complete the task. Benjamin Franklin delivered a letter from the State of Virginia to Houdon in Paris. Houdon arrived in the United States in 1785 and created the marble statue of George Washington that stands in the State House in Richmond, Virginia. Houdon's likeness of Washington is considered the most accurate. Copies are on several U. S. Postage Stamps (Scott # 554

The only painting of George Washington in Masonic Regalia (Scott #714) is the work of William J. Williams (1739-1823). The portrait is now the property of Alexandria-Washington Lodge No. 22 and hangs in the George Washington Masonic National Memorial in Washington, D. C. Williams was a member of St. John's Lodge No 3, New Bern, North

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
