



Financial Planning Solutions

During the Summer break, conversations about IRA plans came up, and I was astounded to learn about some erroneous ideas that people have about this great investment.

Can it be moved?

On item picked up was that a great number of people who have IRA's believe that once an investment is made, say in a bank or insurance annuity, it cannot be moved to some other type of investment.

This is completely wrong!

The dollars that you invest are yours, and you have the right to place those funds into practically any investment vehicle of your choice.

Many choices

Supposing that you have \$10,000 deposited in a bank at 3.5 to 4 percent, and you are eating your heart out at that low rate of return. Depending upon how aggressive you are, you can invest it in stocks, bonds, options, real estate, mutual funds, or almost any-

Of course, I would suggest a fine family of mutual funds, but it is your choice.

Withdrawing money

One other item that was learned, was that many people believe that you cannot begin to withdraw money from your plan before you are 59 1/2.

This is also a misconception! You can set your plan up to withdraw funds at almost any age

without penalty. You just have to be aware of how to do it. It is real easy. Give me a call and I'll tell you how.

By the way, both of these can be done without any taxable penalties whatsoever.





What is the Lewis?

it is an instrument used by operative masons. It an iron cramp which is inserted into the cavity prepared for it in the stone. Through its use large stones may be raised to any height by rope or pulley, and set into position.

This implement was known to the Romans and several were taken from old ruins and are now in the Vatican.

In England in the ruins of Whitby Abbey, founded ca 658 by Oswy King of Northumberland, large stones were found with the necessary cavity for the insertion

Where did the word come from?

Probably an old French word "Lewis" meaning "any contivance used for lifting".

In the English system of Masonry, The Lewis is found on the tracing board of the Entered Apprentice where it is used as the symbol of strength, because with its assistance the heaviest of stones can be lifted with little ex-

The son of a Mason is called a Lewis, because it is his duty to suppliment the failing strength of the father, or as Dr. Oliver has put it, "to bear the burden and the heat of the day, that his parents may rest in their old age, thus rendering the evening of their lives peaceful and happy".

In Brown's "Master Key", which is supposed to represent the Prestorian Lecture we find the following:

Q: What do we call the son of a Mason?

A: A Lewis.

Cars

Q: What does that denote? A: Strength.

Q: How is a Lewis depicted in a Masonic Lodge?

ponderous weights are raised to a certain height, fixed on their proper boxes, without which operative Masons could not so conveniently do.

Q: What is the duty of a Lewis to his aged parents?

A: To bear the heavy burden in the heat of the Day, and help in the time of need, which by reason of their great age, they ought to be exempted from, so as to render the close of their days happy and comfortable.

Q: His privilege for doing so? A: To be made a Mason before any other person, however dignified by birth, rank of riches, unless he by compliance waives this privilege. The term occurs in this sense in the constitutions of 1735 at the end of the Deputy Grand Master's song in allusion to the expected birth of George III, son of Fredrick, prince of Wales:

"May Lewis be born whom the whole world may admire. Serene as his mother, august as his father."

It is sometimes said that a Lewis may be initiated before he is 20; the Scottish. Constitution will allow initiation at age 18. This is not allowed under the English Constitution.

I have mentioned George III in the Deputy Grand Master's Song is allusion of his expected birth in 1760-1820. It was during his reign that the American Colonies were lost. He became insane in 1811, and his son acted as Regent for the rest of his reign.

American War of Independence

Hostilities broke out in 1775, at this time Rev. Bishop Charles Inglis (Trinity Church New York), showed great devotion to the King and he was presented with a Bible by George III. The war ended with the surrender of the British at Yorktown in 1781. Peace was signed at Paris in September 1783. Bishop Inglis came to Nova Scotia and was awarded land in the Annapolis Valley.

Almost 100 years later a new Masonic Hall was built on Barrington Street in Hallifax, Nova Scotia, Built under the direction of M.·.W.·. Bro. John W. Laurie, It was completed early in 1877 and dedicated on June 6.

The principle address was given by Grand Master Laurie who pointed out that the Bible which had been used for the ser vice had been presented by King George III to the late Bishop Charles Inglis for showing fearless devotion to the Crown. This Bible is held in the Grand lodge of Nova Scotia and is a treasured exhibit in the Grand Lodge Archives. To all of this I must add, you who are entitled to wear this jewel do so with pride and honor.

R.·W.· Brother Robert Francis Sanford was born September 30, 1924 in Rochester. He and his wife Eileen (Kennedy) reside at 30 Landing Street, Rochester 14623 (phone 292-6383). Eileen is from Crow Lake, Ontario, Canada which is about 50 miles north of Kingston. They visit her cousins there a couple of times a year.

They have 3 children: Gary, an electrical engineer at Kodak; Douglas, an architect in Plymouth, MA, and Nancy (Williams), vice-president of production at Magnetic Systems in East Rochester. Collectively, they have provided the proud grand-parents with 9 grandchildren.

District, allied and concordant


R.·.W.·. Brother Sanford served the Monroe Districts Masters and Wardens Association as President in 1956.


Shedding a little light




Picnic

Grand Chaplain's

Grand Lodge, DEAM, State of New York

Have you ever wondered what the Grand Chaplain's duties are? Since I have been asked this question on numerous occasions, let me begin this regular feature of the Genesee-Wyoming District's contribution to the Masonic Times. with the history and purpose of this Grand Office.

Revived in London

First of all, according to the New and Revised Edition of the Encyclopedia of Freemasonry on page 142, the Office of Grand Chaplain, when viewed within the framework of Ancient Freemasonry, is a so-called modern Office of all Grand Jurisdictions. It was first instituted on May 1, 1775, on the occasion of the laying of the foundation of the Freemasons' Hall in London. The English Constitutions of 1784 mention that the Office of Grand Chaplain, which had been discontinued for several years, was, on this day, revived. There is, however, no record of any appointment to the office before the date given.

Modern times

Today, the Office is now universally recognized by the Grand Lodges of America, with the duties of the incumbent confined to the offering of prayer at the Communications of Grand Lodge and conducting devotional exercises on public occasions where Masons are involved.

Duties

Within this parameter, I call your attention to the Constitutions of the Grand Lodge of New York, sec. 111, which direct the Grand Master to appoint Grand Chaplains. These same Constitutions, sec. 122, state that it shall be the duty of the Grand Chaplain to attend Grand Lodge and to conduct its religious services, to attend upon the Grand Master and to officiate at public and private functions when designated to do so. How the Grand Chaplain ministers to his Masonic brethren is left to his own devices, discretion and style.

Personal practices

Ever since I received my commission as Grand Chaplain at the hands of the Most Worshipful Albert W. Schneider on May 20, 1976 at the St. John's Day observances in Utica, N.Y., I have offered daily prayers for the sick and shut-ins within the Grand Jurisdiction, especially for those within the Genesee-Wyoming District. If I learned of a such Brother's confinement to the hospital or to his home or suffering from grief over the loss of a loved

one, I sent a message of concern, and, if possible, paid the Brother a personal visit.

Grand Chaplain Emeritus

When I received my commission as Grand Chaplain Emeritus at the hands of the Most Worshipful Robert C. Singer on May 22, 1987, the office of Grand Chaplain took on a permanent nature and my name was listed in the yearly Official Roster of Grand Lodge, among the twentyseven other clergymen, who are also Grand Chaplains Emeriti. As a result, I have continued my previous practices to this day, since it is my understanding that prayers and services are of the nature of the Grand Chaplaincy

It has been my special privilege and honor, as well as a highlight, in my fifty-nine years as clergyman, to serve my Masonic Brethren as a Grand Chaplain.

Parade






Another Olive Branch Lodge?

The Grand Lodge Proceedings for March 1, 1809 shows that the petition for Olive Branch Lodge of Massena was received but does not actually indicate that letters of dispensation were granted.

Whether Olive Branch Lodge ever received its charter, may never be brought to light. However, it can be assumed that Olive Branch Lodge was active, despite the lack of records.







What is Schizophrenia?

In its chronic form, it is a disease which strikes in adolescence or young adulthood, and from which patients never fully recover. Abnormalities appear in every aspect of behavior; thinking, emotion and interpersonal relations. Usually, the patient is so seriously affected that he cannot work productively, and lives an isolated, friendless existence with very few interests or goals. His thinking is illogical; much of his time being spent in fantasy with delusional ideas about him-Continued on page 18

self and the world. He is not capable of more refined emotions, such as sympathy or love, but he is subject to uncontrolled primitive emotional outbursts and his mood is often depressed.

Because their emotional feelings for other people are blunted and because sometimes they have a false belief that other people are intent on doing them harm, patients may occationally commit senseless crimes of violence without provocation.

Sometimes patients will grimace, stand in peculiar postures or remain mute for long periods of time. Some have hallucinations, frequently hearing voices or imagining something wrong with their bodies.

Until recently patients with this disease were confined to mental hospitals for their lifetime, but thanks to research, it is now possible for many to live in half-way houses or with families returning to the hospital only for medication and psychotherapy.

There is approximately a one percent chance of contracting schizophrenia. One in one hundred or over two million in the United States can expect to fall ill to this disease. Schizophrenia accounts for 40% of all long-term hospital care days. You can now understand why the Scottish Rite adopted this area of concern for their philanthropy.

something worthwhile-something of lasting value.


Roman arches

MASONIC LAB RESEARCHER CAPTURES FIRST PLACE IN INTERNATIONAL SCIENTIFIC COMPETITION

Da-Wei Liu, M.S., Research Associate at the Masonic Medical Research Laboratory, was selected as the First Place Winner of the Young Investigator Award Competition of the North American Society of "Pacing" and Electrophysiology. Liu competed with scientists and physicians from the United States, Canada and Mexico for the coveted award

Co-authors

His study, co-authored by Dr. Charles Antzelevitch, Executive Director and Director of Research of the Institute, and Dr. Gary Gintant, deals with differences in the electrical activity of individual cells isolated from different parts of the heart. Liu and five other finalists made their final presentations before an international panel of judges at the Annual Meeting of the North American Society for Pacing and Electrophysiology held in Chicago on May 15, 1992.

Cell types

Recent work by the Experimental Cardiology group at the Masonic Research Lab has shown major distinctions between the inside and outside muscle of the heart and a unique population of cells in the middle of the wall of the heart (M cells). The different cell types have been shown to display major distinctions in their electrical activity and in the way that they respond to a wide variety of drugs. Liu's project involved isolation of cardiac myocytes (single heart cells) from discrete layers within the wall of the heart and measurement of electrical currents carried by potassium ions across the cellular membranes of these cells. He showed that cells isolated from the outside muscle of the heart contained much more of a current known as the transient outward current. His study also demonstrated that M cells isolated from the mid-wall show a unique behavior similar to that described in tissues isolated from this region of the heart.

Advanced understanding

"Knowledge of the existence of prominent heterogeneities in the electrical activity of cells spanning the walls of the main pumping chambers of the heart stemming from this and similar studies has greatly advanced our understanding of the ionic bases for certain deflections (J and U waves) in the electrocardiogram (ECG) and should improve our understanding of the complex rhythms of the heart), a leading cause of death in this country and most industrialized nations of the world", explained Antzelevitch. He added that "these findings should also help us understand why different parts of the muscle of the heart respond differently to a variety of drugs".

Background

Liu joined the Experimental Cardiology program at the Masonic Medical Research Laboratory only 1 1/2 years ago after receiving his Masters of Science Degree in Biophysics at the Shanghai Medical University in the People's Republic of China. "Da-Wei knew little English and was a novice in the area in which he won the award when he first joined us. He has come a long way since and we are very proud of him" said Antzelevitch.

Future plans

Liu hopes to complete his work at the Masonic Laboratory in Utica and attend the SUNY Health Science Center at Syracuse to pursue courses towards his Ph.D. degree in the Fall.

Masonic Lab Receives Award From The NIH

Dr. Charles Antzelevitch, Executive Director and Director of the Research of the Masonic Medical Research Laboratory, has been selected by the National Institutes of Health (NIH) to receive the Shannon Award. The Award, named in honor of Dr. James A. Shannon, a former director of the National Institutes of Health, was recently established to provide support for research projects that have been approved by scientific peer review and designated as high priority but which cannot be funded in full because of the current severe shortage of federal funds for biomedical research. The award is in the amount of \$100,000 to cover a period of 24 months.

International recognition

This award will permit Dr. Antzelevitch and his Experimental Cardiology research team to continue their research into distinctions between the electrical properties of different parts of the heart and the response of these different regions to drugs. This work is revolutionizing our understanding of the function of the heart in health and disease and has won the group wide international recognition in recent months.

Rochester Forest No. 133 Donates 29 Trees

On Saturday May 23, 1992 a Tree Dedication Ceremony took place at the Penfield, New York, Town Hall Park. This Ceremony was presided over by Rochester Forest No. 133, Tall Cedars of Lebanon of North America and was the culmination of a year of planning, research and cooperation between the Forest and the Town of Penfield. This community involvement project was initiated by the Forest to improve the local environment which had suffered extensive damage due to a severe ice storm in the Spring of 1991.

Disaster area

The ice storm that started in the late evening hours of March 3, 1991, lasted for 12 hours and left a two inch thick coating of ice on utility lines and tree branches in the City of Rochester and surrounding three county area. Electrical and telephone services to many of the area's homes and businesses were out due to downed lines. The Federal Emergency Management Administration declared this a disaster area, qualifying the area towns and villages for Federal Disaster Relief Funds.

Survey results

The Gordon S. Black Corporation of Penfield, in a survey published in the Henrietta, New York, Post on April 24, 1991 stated that: "In Monroe County alone, the storm caused an estimated 216,000 households (78%) to lose power. If cost families in the County an estimated mini-mum of \$322,000,000.00 in damages, lost wages and other expenses". Most importantly, "damage to trees was extensive across

the County, with 69% of the households reporting damage".

Storm remembrance

The donation of trees as a remembrance of this ice storm was the suggestion of Rochester Forest No. 133's immediate Past Grand Tall Cedar, John E. Zabel and his wife, Sheryl. After a period of time and effort, Donald Bell, Senior Deputy Grand Tall Cedar, Maggie Hession of the Penfield Town Board, and Robert Ainsworth of the Penfield Parks and Recreation Department agreed that the donated trees would be part of a newly planned pond area in the Penfield Town Hall Park. The purchase of 29 trees was coordinated by Don Bell and Robert Nichols, Junior Deputy Grand Tall Cedar.

Tree Dedication Ceremony

The Penfield, New York Town Board was present at the Tree Dedication Ceremony, which was presided over by Thomas Hueston, Grand Tall Cedar of Rochester Forest No. 133. Members, Officers, Donald J. Brugger, District Deputy Supreme Tall Cedar and Paul Kober, District Trustee for the Supreme Forest Foundation attended the ceremony.

Symbols of Life

The Ceremony, an adaptation of the Supreme Forest outline, explained Tall Cedarism and it also defined the trees and earth as symbols of life. Maggie Hession, in accepting the 29 trees and commemorative plaque stated on behalf of the Town of Penfield: "We thank the Rochester Forest, Tall Cedars of Lebanon, for their generous donation of trees to the Town of Penfield for our new Town Hall Park. We hope to see our friendship and cooperation bloom as the trees and the town continue to grow. We welcome you to our town."

Kind gift appreciated

Mr. John Nolan, Supervisor of the Town of Penfield, who was also greatly impressed by the donation and by the presentation, said: "We in the Town of Penfield

wish to thank the men of Rochester Forest, Tall Cedars of Lebanon, for their kind gift of trees to be planted in the new extension of our Town Hall Park. We will watch these trees grow as our town grows. This gift is another example of the fine activities which this organization provides to our Community. It is greatly appreciated."
