



These requirements will be amplified in a letter sent to each Master in January. In this letter, will be a set of guidelines for better copy submission. We will also be sending this guide out again in June after the mid-year changes take place.

Fixing the problem

We are hoping to enlarge the circulation of the Times to serve more of the Craft in the outlying counties. This anticipated growth in readership will not only be good for the Craft in that it will pull together the Fraternity in this region, but it is a necessity.

The only ways that the Times can become self supporting (we still operate at a deficit and count on a subsidy from the Masonic Service Bureau) is to either increase advertising, increase circulation or increase the subscrip-

I am sure that the Brothers would not accept another increase in the subscription rate, in fact, that would probably do more harm than good. So, we must look

One important factor to concider is the continual reduction in the number of subscribers

The Presidents Message

A happy and prosperous New Year to you all! Any head of a service organization must find it necessary to put forth a plan of action in order to be considered successful by his constituency. In reflecting back over the past 365 days, most certainly the purpose for the Bureau's existence has been accomplished. This fact has been established by our record. How successful we were is a matter for only you to decide. The following progress report will hopefully assist you in this determination.

Goals

As the year began, your President set a number of goals that he hoped could be achieved during the year. The first was to continue the direction and spirit of the Bureau as begun under the direction of my predecessor, R..W.: Paul Gleason. In this, I believe we have achieved success. The Interfaith Service and Breakfast, as well as a new format for dispensing Charity monies, were huge successes.

Scholarships were given to County youth and a new program for awarding scholarships to Masonic youths was put in place.

A new program for inventory control and loaning home care equipment was developed and is now being implemented. The storage facility was moved and in its place an auxiliary kitchen was built to service Dining Room B.

Second goal

The second goal of establishing a sound program for a balanced budget while still seeking new revenues and cost cutting measures, continues to be developed. Through careful management of our revenues, coupled with a reduction of expenses and an advertising increase for the Masonic Times and the Directory of Officers, we will continue to reduce our deficit. Above all, the Bureau's portfolio was carefully monitored by the Finance Committee and Executive Director, while our assets continued to work at appropriate levels under the watchful eyes of our Trustees and Attorney. The Widow's Luncheon and the Interfaith Service and Breakfast were conducted with a sound management policy and actually produced a small profit which was added to the operating fund. Our Executive Director introcuced cost cutting measures that noticably reduced office expenses. Although there was progress in this direction, much more must be done to allow us to continue to deliver the current level of service.

Goal three

The third goal of establishing new and exciting directions for the Bureau to pursue in the 90's never really got started for a variety of reasons, none of which can be used as an excuse. With the new leadership of R..W.. Vern Goodrich and W.:. Gary Burke, I again pledge to see this goal advance toward maturity.

Goal four

The fourth goal, to excite new Brothers and ladies to become involved in the work of the Bureau, was a terrible failure. For this I must take most of the responsibility. Attendance at meetings was, to say the least, disappointing. At many meetings we struggled to find a quorum to conduct business. Various meeting times were tried, but no accommodation could be reached. Hopefully, with our meetings again scheduled at the Maplewood, attendance will improve.

Working together

This presidency plans to improve interaction with the Blue Lodges and their Masters to improve the attendance of their representatives at Service Bureau meetings. If we are to survive as a viable service organization, we must have the active support of the Lodges. The presence of the Grand Lodge Convention in Rochester this Spring, may provide the springboard for closer cooperation with the Lodges.

The new year brings with it a new challenge. We, as an organization, must strive to develop and put in place new and exciting community involvement programs. Our Community Service Committee continuously struggles to find volunteers to carry the Masonic pledge of service in the community around us. Veterans' Outreach programs are at our fingertips. Community group organizers are pleading for help in these times of economic weakness. Health agencies as well as agencies for the relief of the unfortunate, scream for continued support. What better time do we have than now to spread our message. Join the challenge and pledge yourself to join the Bureau's drive to do more in our community service work.

With the Director's approval, Dear Editor: I am adding to my list of goals for 1993, more involvement of women in our work. Women's organizations have proven in the past to be the key to new methods for raising revenues to support a variety of projects. We have overlooked this valuable resource. By adding women to our Director's Staff and Council, our support base will grow and enhance suc-

Much remains to be done. This Bureau cannot stand still while the Fraternity and the community around us are in need of assistance. With the support of the total work force of the Bureau we can and must continue to make an impact on the people who need our support. We need a commitment from each of you to be a member of this winning team

(don't rely on the person next to you to do it!). Together we will meet the challenge and through

it all the community and the Fraternity will win!

God bless you all in your work this year!

Andrew D. Wolfe Northfield No. 426

Saturday, November 14, 1992, was a busy day for Northfield Lodge No. 426. We gathered not only to celebrate 135 years of Northfield Lodge and the fact that our building was erected 150 years ago, but also to present the DeWitt Clinton Award to Mr. Andrew D. Wolfe, editor and publisher of Wolfe Publications.

Grand Master present

We were honored by the presence of M..W.. Sheldon K. Blank, Grand Master of Masons in the State of New York, who was escorted by the Grand Marshal, R..W.. Roderick Burris. Grand Standard Bearer R. .. W .. Charles E. Bateman was also present.

Speakers

A welcome to those present and opening remarks were given by W.. D. Scott Seltzer, who was followed by Bro. John Berggren, Pittsford Town Councilman. Bro. Berggren gave a brief history of the building which was built in 1842 as the District No. 6 Schoolhouse. The building is now an historical landmark in the town of Pittsford.

R.:.W.: Raymond Beardsley then spoke on the history of Northfield Lodge No. 426, which was chartered in 1857, and the origin of the DeWitt Clinton Award.

Bro. Berggren then gave a short biography of Mr. Wolfe who in 1952 became Director of Development for the University of Rochester. In 1956 he began his publishing career with three small weekly newspapers, The East Rochester Herald, The Penfield Republican and The Brighton-Pittsford Post. He is also the founder of Historical Pittsford, an organization dedicated to preserving Pittsford's early architecture, and has helped restore several buildings in the community, including the 1815 Phoenix Building (headquarters of the The Brighton-Pittsford Post), Richardson's Canal House Inn and some related buildings.

Mr. Wolfe, a member of the Rayson-Miller American Legion Post No. 899, holds many community offices, including Trustee and Chairman of International Museum of Photography at the George Eastman House, Trustee and Vice-Chairman of the Margaret Woodbury Strong Museum and member of the New York State Council on the Arts. In



(The Premier Lodge of Masonic Research)

Quatuor Coronati Lodge No. 2076

By R. W. Jay McCullough

This Lodge was founded in 1884 by a group of nine Brethren. Allwere scholars and some highly distinguished in the field of Masonic study.

Objectives were to develop for Brethren everywhere an interest in research, encouragement to study the many facets of Freemasonry, have papers read in the Lodge that were open to discussion and criticism, and to attract the attention and enlist the cooperation of Masonic scholars in all parts of the world.

The school

The Lodge has come to be regarded as the 'authentic school' of Masonic students. The founders inaugurated a comprehensive library (now amalgamated with that of the United Grand Lodge of England). They also resolved to publish facsimiles of and to reprint rare and valuable books, manuscripts and papers.

Why the name?

The name was chosen because of its connection with the craft of the operative stonemasons. "The Four Crowned Ones" were martyred on 8 November 302 and thereafter were regarded as the patron saints of stonemasons throughout Europe from about 400 to 1600. Lodge installations there take place the second Thursday in November, the nearest practicable date to the anniversary of their martyrdom.

Who are the members?

Members of the Lodge itself are there by invitation, the basis of which is important contributions they made to the field of Masonic study, or being distinquished in art, literature or the sciences. Professor Wallace McLeod of Victoria College in Toronto numbers among them. He is the current President of the Philalethes Society and was in Rochester for that Body's semi-annual international meeting in September of this past year.

The Quatuor Coronati Correspondence Circle Limited, was formed as an adjunct to the basic Lodge. It provides ways and means to communicate with serious Masonic students, particularly those abroad in the world.

Master Masons of all regular Constitutions can become members. Several dozen in the upstate NY area belong to the QCCC. This writer is the upstate NY secretary of the QCCC Limited. Correspondence Circle members are not eligible to hold QC Lodge office or exercise a Lodge vote. They do, however, on joining receive:

 Get the opportunity to purchase books published by the lodge, and obtain other masonic books and regalia from catalogues regularly issued to members.

On the road




Thanks





All information is for the exclusive use of the Square Club, and will be used on a published membership list for internal distribution only. Membership in the Square Club is open to any Free and Accepted Mason who is recognized by the Grand Lodge of the State of New York, and is/was an employee of a police, fire or public safety agency.

Additions have also been made in complimentary areas such as reference works, biographies of Masons, related fiction, anti-Masonic literature, works of Masons and audiovisuals.

Acquisiton philosophy has been to form a collection that will provide the majority of specifically Masonic literature, but which will also include selected non-Masonic works of Masonic interest. In this latter category we have major scholarly works relating to Masonry by non-Masons, and non-Masonic works by Masons. The intent is to create a library that will answer basic Masonic needs and also go beyond to stimulate users to explore the activity of Masons and Masonry in the world.

Equipment

A substantial gift has enabled the library to purchase a video player/monitor and camcorder. This is available to lodges at a small fee for Masonic related needs.

In addition, the library possesses two overhead projectors, a microfiche reader, slide projector and screen.

Collection Control

The major difficulty regarding collection control is to find dedicated and committed staff to keep the Library open. So far we have three volunteer workers: Ralph Biggar, Maurie Solomon and Wallace Grey. The Bureau of Masonic Education is assisting us in finding volunteers. In any event, when the hours of opera-

tion are finalized; they will have to be rigorously kept.

Donor Levels

To honor those making major contributions to the library a plaque has been affixed at the entrance of the Library. This will be updated with the names of those making contributions. The donor levels are:

Patron \$100 Benefactor \$250 Bibliophile \$500 Sarachan Scholar \$1000.

Local Color

With major assistance from the curator, Brother Grant Romer, we plan to create some modest displays in the library relating to local Masonic history. The intention is to create an interesting and stimulating environment.

The Library has honored Herman Sarachan by placing a commemorative plaque dedicating it to the memory of this local Masonic scholar. The plaque was placed over the desk just inside the door.

Needs

We could use a four-drawer file cabinet and a lockable storage cabinet for supplies and equipment. We also need to consider converting the backfiles of the Masonic Times to microfilm for the sake of more reliable preservation. When this has been accomplished, we will distribute service copies to the Rochester Public Library/Local History Division and the Rochester Historical Society.




Thank you



Brotherhood Fund


Brotherhood Fund money is being accepted by W.. Robin Bowles. We owe Robin a vote of thanks for accepting this responsibility.

Awards





Anno Lucis

We are now in the year 1993, so, Happy New Year! That brings to mind that, not only is there a new calendar, but also that there is a difference between the Masonic Calendar and the 1582 calendar of Pope Gregory XIII. First of all, the Masonic calendar is called "the year of Light", and is marked AL (Anno Lucis). The Gregorian Calendar is referred to as "the year of the Lord" or AD (Anno Domini). This Masonic reckoning does not stem from any prejudice against Christ, to which "Anno Domini" refers, but rather from the date on which it was believed the world was created.

We are not saying that Freemasonry believes that the Craft began with the creation of the world. We are saying, however, that on the day of creation God created Light. As we read in the Holy Bible, "God said: let there be light and there was light" (Gen. 1:3). It is upon this fact that the Masonic Calendar begins its reckoning.

Doubting James

Until 1624, scholars and Masons reckoned the span of time between the creation of light and the birth of Christ as being 4000 years. This figure was cast in doubt, when James Ussher, a learned British scholar and theologian and archbishop of Armagh, announced that, according to his calculations the world was created in 4004BC. Some Masons followed his reckoning, while the majority of Masons remained firm in the 4000 year figure. Our own Grand Lodge of New York still retains 4000 years as its official reckoning of the time and stamps all official documents accordingly. Thus, the year 1993 AD (Anno Domini) becomes Masonically 5993 AL (Anno Lucis).

Sons of light

Masonry makes so much of light, that its members are sometimes referred to as the "sons of light", because each member is entitled to be in possession of that intellectual light, of which physical light is but a symbol. Intellectual light is so needed in order to understand Masonic symbols and be able to apply them for the betterment of every day life. It is always the aim of Masonry to make good men better. So important is this intellectual light, that the candidate is made cognizant of it as he takes his degrees. The Master asks the candidate: "Why did you leave the west and travel East (the source of physical light and a symbol of intellectual light)? The candidate answers: "In search of more light

In speaking of the New Year, we are led to the idea of newness. Thus in referring to Masonry, Masonry begins with a new intellectual light and ends with a new man. It starts with a new man and finishes with a new code of values, like brotherhood, truth, relief, principles, ethics and morality. It opens with a new kind of man, dedicated ever to walk before God and man, as an upright man and Mason, and closes with a new kind of Brotherhood.

Renewal

The legitimate boast of Masonry is "I make all things new". Among these things is a new heart, in which a man is first pre-

pared to become a Mason. Then there is the open heart to embrace men of all races and creeds. If Masonry did not touch a man at this vital center of his being, if it did not make good men better, then Masonry would be only a club and not a Fraternity to those who love Masonry. What Masonry promises is what God promised to Ezekiel when he said: "A new heart will I also give you and a new spirit will I put within you and I will take away any stony heart out of your flesh" (Ezekiel 36:26).

The sword pointing to the naked heart is one of Masonry's symbols. It addresses itself not simply to the outward conduct of a Mason, but also to his inner conscience and motivations, because God's justice will sooner or later overtake those who make little of their Masonic vocation.

The real secret

What is it in the Fraternal bond of Masonry that enables the heart to maintain its moral steadfastness? What holds the heart firm and fast amid the ebb and flow of life within the Fraternal bond of Masonry? It is a totally new perspective towards Brotherly love, that causes a Mason's heart to be taken up with Masonry. Its affections are the Mason's. Its allegiance is the Mason's. Its adoration is Masonry's high principles. It starts out new within the candidate and never loses its newness, because its Fraternal Brotherhood under God is ever kept fresh and ever a challenge to do better in "Anno Lucis".
