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Dorothy Steele, of "Cephas", to Receive the Masonic Service Bureau's Distinguished Community Service Award

The Interfaith Service and Breakfast on November 7th will be the occasion for the presentation of the Masonic Service Bureau's Distinguished Service Award to Dorothy Steele. Dorothy, and her late husband Harold, are the cofounders of "Cephas", a reorientation program for soon to be released inmates. Cephas is a not-for-profit,

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tax-exempt organization focused on meeting the needs of men and women in prison and on parole. When her husband left his job to start Cephas, Dorothy, although a homemaker and mother of four children, joined him in this en-

Cephas

This program was born in 1972 after the Attica Prison riots, the bloodiest prison riots in the history of the United States, which took 43 lives. It conducts inprison meetings for groups of about 20 men or women at the Albion and Attica prisons. Sessions are conducted with inmates serving life sentences as well as those who will eventually be released. "Cephas people help inmates discover the attitudes, beliefs and behaviors that are responsible for their situation. Often these critical factors are denied for years, or lie undiscovered, until they are brought to light in a Cephas group session. Once these factors are acknowleged the Cephas group helps inmates grasp the problem and lovingly, but firmly, holds them accountable for change."

Program

When ex-offenders are released they are eligible for a 90day residential program where they receive room, board and job training at a Cephas facility. Here they are taught to develop good interpersonal skills and work habits and effective ways to analyze problems and make good decisions. They learn to care for others and live as a family. At Cephas, 70% who complete the program, remain out of prison and lead successful lives, whereas nationally only 40% remain out of jail.

Facilities

Cephas operates a construction company where former inmates can learn a variety of trade skills associated with all types of construction. The construction company has been involved in such projects as the 3,000 sq. ft. addition to the Hilton Health Center.

A growing activity is the rehabilitation for home and business

use. They also run a 70 acre farm where Christmas trees are raised for sale to support the many programs. The farm additionally produces a large vegetable crop which is used to feed staff and residents. Extensive flower gardens are also located there.

Cephas maintains headquarters at 262 Arnett Blvd. (Cephas Attica, Inc., run by Dorothy Steele and Ken Siegel) in Rochester, NY and in St. Patrick's Friary (Cephas Buffalo, run by Brother Michael Oberst) at 102 Seymour Street in Buffalo, NY.

R. W. Robert C. Pettit was born on January 14, 1921 in Hallstead, Pennsylvania, and grew up on Staten Island, NY. He attended Wagner College in Staten Island, receiving his B.A. in 1942. R. W. Bro. Pettit served 3.5 years in the U.S. Army and was married to the former Belva Petersen on October 11, 1944. He received his Doctor of Dental Surgery Degree from the

University of Pennsylvania and opened his practice in Rochester in 1950. He retired from this profession in 1986 and was elected Executive Director of the Service Bureau in 1988 after having served briefly as a Director and



Dr. Pettit and his wife Belva have 3 children who reside at present in Nevada, California and Texas. They also have 2 grandchildren.

R.·W.· Bro. Pettit and Belva are long term members of Redeemer Lutheran Church on Dewey Ave in Rochester. Bob is quite active in his Church, and still sings in the choir. He has been a Deacon and has served on the Church Council, having held almost every office in that body at one time or another.

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Editor's Corner

What's in a name

In a Lodge meeting one night a Brother rose and stated his concern about the words "Masonic Temple" on the Lodge Building. In his opinion, he said, these words were a deterrent to young men becoming Masons. He thought it gave the impression that the building was some kind of religious edifice. He is not alone in this opinion.

I remembered this occurrence while reading an article in the September issue of the Knights Templar magazine. The article was written by Bro. Vernon B. Ingram, Master of Rob Morris Lodge No. 92, Denver, CO.

In his article Bro. Ingram explains that the word "temple" is derived from the Latin, templum, Meaning "sanctuary" and "consecrated place". The religious meaning of "sanctuary" is "a holy sacred place". The secular, "a place of refuge or protection" or "to set apart". The religious meaning of "consecrate" is "to set apart as sacred" the secular "to dedicate or devote, as to a particular purpose". He goes on to say that, "templum" was probably derived from the Latin verb "templari", meaning "to contemplate". "The use of the word "temple" is also associated with the word "speculative". The contemporary definition being "given to serious thinking or in-

"Freemasonry", to quote the author, "is a symbolically based science of ethics. Its beauty and meaning are reflected in artistic terms and symbols. Whereas a religious temple refers to a place of worship in a certain religiously prescribed manner-to the house of God-a Masonic Temple refers to a place for serious reflection and contemplation on charitable and moral conduct, a place where men of all faiths and religions agree to certain moral and social precepts and values."

The most compelling statement in the article is: "Those who criticize us for calling our buildings temples would probably criticize us for other reasons if we didn't call them temples...I am glad that we have something that stands out as unique in society, that ignites curiosity, and even inspires some controversy with us...there is a rational and well founded basis for using the word 'temple'. Greetings fellow readers! During the period 1927 to 1946 our Bureau increased its purposes and scope of service many fold. In 1916 we were known as the Masonic Employment Bureau. The year 1919 saw a change in name to the Masonic Service Bureau with a certificate of incorporation filed July 7, 1927 with the New York Secretary of State. A new certificate was filed in 1936 for the benefit of all Masonic and Eastern Star families in Monroe County.

Late 20s

During this period of our history, the period known as the "Great Depression", the problem confronting Masons and the Community in general were staggering. Problems in our Society began to appear after the gay and lively 20's where prosperity for many was common place. During the early years of the 20th Century industry in Rochester moved forward at a normal rate. The World War brought a tremendous boom, as commerce and trade reacted to the stimulation. From other cities, from smaller towns, from rural districts, workers flocked to the city and taxed its housing facilities to the utmost. Real estate skyrocketed. An era of building, of industry, commercial and financial expansions began and continued without let-up. With it came all the problems of crowded neighborhoods. Then came that dark day on Thursday, October 24th, 1929, when from one end of the United States to the other, financial uncertainty and fear fed on rumor caused the stock market to "crash" and plunge the Nation into economic depression. Suddenly businesses failed, banks closed and thousands of people were without jobs. Thousands experienced financial ruin.

Recovery

Our Bureau was called upon to increase its services to the Community and rally it did. The organizations along with the city of Rochester, met the onset of the depression with a remarkable displayof community effort. With unemployment beginning to mount in 1929 the Bureau was prompted to initiate several activities to serve needy Masons, their families and the Community. The Bureau offered valuable assistance to the Men's Service Center by collecting and distributing clothes to families. Valuable assistance was also given to failing businesses when requested by the Industrial Management Council. The Bureau acted as a clearing house in directing the unfortunate to such service agencies such as the New York State Employment Agency, Monroe County Home and Infirmary, Rochester Machine Industries' Placement Service, Rotary Student Loans Program, Salvation Army and many senior citizen agencies.

With help from the Masonic Service Bureau and many other service organizations Rochester's confidence remained strong during the depression years. In 1933 the National Industrial Recovery Act was signed into law by President Franklin Roosevelt. Slowly the city began to recover and believe in the President's words when he said, "This recovery act will put people back to work, let them buy more of the products of our farms and factories and start business at more of a living rate again"! The era of the "New Deal" had begun.

Back on track

Suddenly with prosperity and social conditions continuing to improve the dark storm clouds of war gathered over Europe again. Once again the Bureau will be called upon to offer its service to the community. In our next article, we continue the story as we climb the path into World War II and observe the role of the Bureau during this period in history. See you next month! Our story nears its successful completion.



The Masonic Community in Rochester has learned with profound sadness of the death in Toronto, on July 24th, of Most Worshipful A. Lou Copeland, Grand Treasurer and Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

Visits

Grand Master Copeland was not a frequent visitor in Rochester, but, did make a deep impression on those who were privileged to be present on those occasions.

In February, 1985, in the company of M.·W.· Robert C. Singer, then Deputy Grand Master, and a close friend for many years, he attended the presentation of the D.S.A. Award to W.: Frank Denton in Wakan - Hubbard Lodge. Later in that year, and now the Grand Master of Canada, Bro. Copeland was the guest speaker at our Interfaith Service and Breakfast, in the company of Grand Master Calvin G. Bond. The report in the Monroe Masonic News at that time indicated that he enthralled the large audience with his dynamic speech.

His last visit to Rochester was in September, 1989, when he was the Guest of Honor at the 75th Anniversary Celebration of Flower City Lodge No. 910.

History

Lou Copeland was born in Toronto in 1920, and became a Mason in Palestine Lodge No. 559 G.R.C. in 1949. He was elected Master in 1962, and was appointed District Deputy Grand Master in 1969. In July of 1983, he was elected Deputy Grand Master, and then in July, 1985, Grand Master of Canada in the Province of Ontario, an office he held with great distinction.

Morality and Responsibility

Whence came you and whither travelling? We come from a tradition of stalwarts, representatives of a strong society of morality and responsibility. We live now, I believe, in a time that is weakening, and are travelling into a period where Masonry will

not represent the strengths in our society, but will be leading society back toward those strengths. How many times have you heard about situational ehtics, or have heard of sociologists and candid camera buffs testing strangers to see if they will return lost money, or cheat on a test? Masonry teaches us to withstand the pressure, to act other than on the square.

Words of Bro. Macoy

Bro. Robert Macoy, in his "True Masonic Guide", (published in 1864) argued that, in times of civilization and peace, Freemasonry reigned, and that in times of barbarity, chivalry was better adapted to the rude manners of the age. (I noted that Bro. Macoy did not assume that intellectualism and civilization did not exclude war). He was writing after Masonry had recovered from the "anti's" of the 1840's, but before the war between the North and South. I believe that we now have both behaviors side by side. It is possible for individuals to be isolated from other elements of society that there are actually two societies (or more) and no central guiding philosophy or unifying spirit.

Masonry must lead

In all eras of no statesmanship, no guidance from those in positions of leadership, and when scandal no longer unseats those in power, it is up to Masonry to "lead from behind". We ourselves need to encourage those we can affect.

Follow the guides

On the personal level, follow the guides you were given at the 1st Degree: SINCERITY-by praising truth wherever found, and confronting dishonesty whenever found: CHARITY-by giving relief, not only by giving alms, but by helping others to succeed: BROTHERLY LOVE-by looking for the good in each person and belief him recognize it helperson.

The U.S. flag may be displayed at night when it is desired to produce a patriotic effect.

The U.S. flag should be displayed on or near the main building of every public institution, during school days in or near every polling place on election days.

Always hoist the U.S. flag briskly. Lower it ceremoniously.


There have been volumes written about the decline of membership in the Masonic Fraternity. A newstudy done by the Davis Consulting Group at the request of the Masonic Renewal Committee seems to be quite comprehen-

The way we were

The results of the study point out several interesting statistics. For example; membership in the Masonic Fraternity in 1940 was approximately 2.5 million. The Fraternity grew in the next 20 years to over 4.5 million. Now in 1990 the membership is again at 2.5 million (Fig. 1.). What hap-

Masonic Membership in North America -1940-1991



In the 1960's membership growth stalled and dropped through the 1970's. It appears that no one got excited about this until about 1988, which is when the Masonic Renewal Task Force was formed.

Average age


Another interesting statistic is the average age of the members. Most of us, of course, have noticed this. The median age, a term that I have always had trouble with is 61-65. This means that one half of the membership is older than 65 years of age.

Trendy indeed

Applying a strait line projection, what engineers at a certain local Company used to call; extrapolation, a trend can be established. This trend, if continued, would reduce the number of Masons in North America to 700,000 by the year 2010 (Fig. 2.).

Consequences

This would mean not only a reduction in programs, buildings and charities, but fewer potential leaders, and also fewer Masonic leaders in the community, business, religious groups and education.

Cyclic?

Some say that this phenomena is a cyclical apparition. Unfortunately, even in jurisdictions where there has been an increase of 10% in new members, it will take decades to stem this downward trend.

There is a glimmer of hope, however. According to the study, there is a potential pool of 16,000,000 men who are inter- worldwill, in this manner, be ever

ested in joining some kind of organization. "Our important task is to make that organization Ma-

It is not hard to see what that kind of reduction in membership would do to the financial well being of the Fraternity. To quote the study, "try to imagine living on 25% of your income". What would this do to our programs, our philanthropies; all Masonic Charities would be at risk.

The only choice is to stop the loss of existing members and make the membership grow at an aggressive rate. We still must make the choice of inviting only quality men to be members, however.

We have seen in our own Lodges how this kind of agressive program can work, if we work.

According to the survey, those desirous of joining an organization would prefer one that enjoined fellowship, Community involvement, charitable work and leadership opportunities; sound familiar? Freemasonry still is capable of offering these characteristics. "The objective is to do so with excellence and quality."

Help available

The Masonic Renewal Committee has available a Development and Management Kit and a Training Kit for Masonic Lodges. Nearly 1,500, representing 10% of the Lodges in North America, are now in use. There is also a video called "Getting the Most From Your Fraternity", which encourages a man to stay active in his Lodge. These tools can help the individual Lodge address the membership problem. The Charles H. **Johnson** Medal

At the 212th meeting of the Grand Lodge of the State of New York the Charles H. Johnson Medal was given to our own Past Junior Grand Warden, R.: W .: Ronald Mertens. The Johnson Medal is given by the Grand Master "to such members in good standing in this or any other jurisdiction or recognized Masonic Body, irrespective of rank or title, who have rendered unusual or distinguished service in furthering the good name of the Craft, its principles and purposes".



The Medal is given in honor of M.·. W.·. Charles Henry Johnson, "who gave his all in the furtherance of the ideals of Freemasonry, and whose contribution to Freemasonry throughout the remembered by those who seek the light of truth".

Charles H. Johnson was born in Brooklyn, New York on October 18, 1870. His family emigrated to the United States and he attended public school in Brooklyn, NY. He attended Trinity Church School in New York City, and graduated from both Boston University and Harvard in 1902. He also attended Northwestern University at Evanston, Ill. and Columbia University in New York City. He obtained degrees from Boston, Harvard and Alfred Universities with Social Work as his primary subject.

Charles Johnson's only son Orville Parker Johnson, by his first wife, Elvina Peterson, was killed in the first World War at Torcy, France, July 18, 1918. Johnson had remarried in 1908, to the former May B. Wallis of Albany, New York.

Public life

Charles Johnson held offices in many public agencies and organizations. Among these were: Charity Organizations of New York - Deputy Warden, Sing Sing Prison-American Relief Society under Herbert Hoover-American Prison Assn. - NY State Commission to examine laws relating to child Welfare - appointed by Calvin Coolidge and Gov. Alfred Smith to International Prison Conference in London - White House conference on Child Welfare - Board of Directors of the Potts Memorial Hospital, Livingston, NY - First Secretary, Committee on Tuberculosis Prevention in New York City - New York State Commissioner for Mental Defectives - New York Committee on Child Labor - National Probation Association -Past President of the Social Welfare Agency, Albany - National Conference of Welfare Officials -National Conference of Juvenile Agencies - New York State Conference of Charities and Correction - founded the Legal Aid Society of Albany - Commissioner of New York State Social Welfare - and a member of the State Board of Social Welfare.

He was the former Superintendent of St. Christopher's Childrens Home - State Reformatory Cheshire, Conn - Albany Orphan Asylum-Leak's and Watts Orphan House, Yonkers, NY, and was appointed by Herbert Hoover to the International Prison Congress held in Budapest, in 1930.

He was the former Director of the American Prison Association, and the United Service Organization - Commissioner of the Boy Scouts, Albany, NY - memper of the National Council of Boy Scouts of America, received the Silver Beaver Award - Past President of the Y.M.C.A., Albany - Board of Directors of the Y.M.C.A., McBuren Branch, New York City and a member of the Albany Society, and an associate member of the American Scandinavian Foundation.

Masonic life

Brother Johnson became a member of Ancient City Lodge No. 452 in 1911 and served as Chaplain that year. He proceeded up the line, becoming Master in 1915. He was appointed DDGM of the 17th Masonic District in 1917, and was a Trustee of the Masonic Hall and Asylum, 1918-

After being elected Grand Junior Warden in 1920-24, he proceeded up the line being elected Grand Master of Masons

in the State of New York in 1930. He was elected Grand Secretary in 1932, a post in which he served until being elected Grand Secretary Emeritus in 1947. He was Grand Representative to the State of Massachusetts and served on no less than 10 Grand Lodge Committees.

In the Concordant Bodies he served as Grand Master of the Council in 1929, High Priest of his Chapter in 1913 and Grand Representative to Tennessee. He was Commander of Temple Commandery No. 2 in 1925.

He joined the Scottish Rite, Valley of Albany in 1913 and served as Thrice Potent Master of the Lodge of Perfection in 1924- He was coroneted a 33° Mason in Boston in 1921 and became an Active in 1942.

He became a member of Cyrus Temple A.A.O.N.M.S. in 1924 and served as Potentate in 1926. He was a member of Kaa-Rheu-Vahm Grotto in Albany.

Brother Johnson was a member of Knights Red Cross of Constantine and was Sovereign of St. Paul's Conclave, New York City, in 1927. He was also a member of the York Cross of Honor, was Eminent Prior of Knickerbocker Priory No. 3, New York City, and was Most Emminent Grand Master General of the Convent General in 1935-36.

account CD? The bank will normally charge you high annual fees and put you into a long term situation where there are penalties for early withdrawal, and you can be stuck with a low return for the total term of the CD. It is the bank that tries to imply that you are in it forever.

The banks now are selling mutual funds and other investments because they are losing so much in deposits that in defense of making money, they now imply that these items which for years were no-no items, are now good things to be involved in.

2. You must be at least 59 1/2 years old to start taking money out of an IRA without penalites. Again, this is not really so. You can start to withdraw your funds out of an IRA at practically any age you desire, say 40 years old, without penalties. Of course, you must pay the taxes on the withdrawals, but penalties? NO, NO,

The early withdrawl program must be properly set up to do this. Now ask your handy dandy financial planner, "Can I take money out of an IRA prior to age 59 1/2?", and see what he says. When he says it can't be done, call me for the details.


Programs and goals



Operational structure




We extend our condolences to the families of Brothers Harry Kennedy and Robert McAndrew. Both of these great men were active in Pittsford politics, as well as







There are many symbols in Freemasonry with varying interpretations. To mention a few: The all-seeing eye is known as the all-seeing Eye of God; the anchor and the ark refer to a well grounded hope and well spent life; the beehive recalls the need for industriousness; the hour glass reminds all of the swiftness of life; the coffin recalls the state of life from which no one escapes; Jacob's ladder calls to mind that the rungs of virtue lead to heaven.

be safe to state, that Freemasonry leaves it to the human mind, in most cases, to see in each symbol, what the human mind is prepared to see. Bro. Ronald L. Brown, in an article published in the Summer 1993 issue of the Royal Arch Mason Magazine, Vol. 17, No. 10, states that the Masonic symbols are something like the Rorschach test given in psychoanalysis. It presents an unstructured object to the viewer and then leaves it to his mind to give it some sort of a structured meaning, drawn from past experiences.

Beehive

Take for example the beehive. One Mason might see in it just a place where bees store their honey. Another Mason might see in it the industriousness of the bees, which is to be copied by all Masons in fulfilling their task of character building. We can say then that Freemasonry does not attach an official interpretation to each symbol, but leaves it to the mind of each Mason to choose that interpretation which will motivate him to make himself a better man.

We can see how true this is when Masons of different theological backgrounds interpret the capital "G" enclosed between the square and compasses. After all, the capital "G" is only a letter. But, it can be interpreted as "Geometry" or only "God". When interpreted as "God", the Hebrew Mason can see in the capital "G", the God of Islam, who stressed the unity of God and the brotherhood of man. The Christian Mason, on the other hand, could interpret the "G" as one God in three divine Persons: God the Father, who created the world, God the Son, Jesus Christ who

Interpretation


It would seem that Freemasonry, by its many symbols, in no way intends to shackle the human mind with only one interpretation. It leaves it to each Mason to arrive at an interpretation which will serve him best in his efforts to build a true Masonic character.

The Temple

Yet, Freemasonry seems to stress but one interpretation when it calls attention to King Solomon's Temple. It wants this temple to be that spiritual temple formed by the fraternity of Freemasons, in which each Mason is to consider himself as one of the stones, to be smoothed, leveled, squared and polished to fit properly into the structure of character, that will win the admiration of God, even as the beauty of King Solomon's Temple won the admiration of human eyes.

The Masonic Charge

With this as a background, one can understand why each obligated Mason is given this charge: "You are now bound by duty, honor and gratitude to be faithful to your trust, to support the dignity of your character on every occasion, and to enforce by precept and example, obedience to the tenets of the Fraternity".

90 Years of Hesperus Lodge, No. 837 - 1902-1992



By R. . W. . Holden P. Miller Early History

Ninetyyears ago, a few zealous "Brethren of the Mystic Tie" combined their efforts Masonically and petitioned the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of the State of New York for permission to conduct a Masonic Lodge under dispensation and confer the three Degrees until such time as adjacent Lodges could vouch for the proficiency done by the Brethren and the Grand Lodge should either accept or reject their request for a Charter.

Practice meetings were held over Fisher's Drug Store using packing boxes for the stations and altar. Other necessary paraphernalia was just as crude. With the granting of the dispensation, the hall over the American Legion was rented and properly furnished. On January 17, 1902, the first meeting of the then Bergen Lodge UD was called to order by R.·.W.. J.R. Steward, DDGM assisted by W.. J.S. Hough of Batavia. The following Officers were installed: Master- W ... George M. Gillette; SW - J. Henry Engel; JW - Frank D. Wood; Treas - D.J. McPherson; Sec. - E.L. Fisher; SD - E.A. Ladd; JD-F.W. Fanson; Chaplain-S.E. Bower; SMC - E.H. McConnell; JMC - W.W. Gillette and Tiler -Aaron Arnold.

Securing the Charter

This was only the beginning of what was to be a long and tedious effort toward securing the Charter. Olive Branch of LeRoy, Batavia, Monroe, Murray and Churchville were petitioned for permission to demonstrate their proficiency in conferring the Degrees. The Brethren returned from each Lodge with a certificate of proficiency and the compliments of the Lodge on the excellent manner in which they had exemplified the Degrees.

Early months

As all of this work came between the months of January and May, when the weather was at its worst and the only means of transportation was by teams of bobsleds, there were times when lack of enthusiasm for the Lodge would have lost the cause. These Brethren were not to be deterred by any obstacle and in May, when Grand Lodge met in Annual Session, the small group who had worked so earnestly, came home victoriously with the Charter in their possession.

New members and name

Six members were raised while the Lodge was working under special dispensation. On April 10th, 1902 the name of the Lodge was changed to Hesperus.

The next step

An important event in the history of the Lodge occurred on June 5, 1902 when Hesperus Lodge No. 837 F & AM was regularly constituted and dedicated with M.:. W.: S. Nelson Sawyer PGM acting as Grand Master.

Losses by fire

The Lodge has sustained three losses by fire in 1904,1906 and the memorable fire in 1952, on our 50th Anniversary. The 1906 fire was so serious as to require the Lodge removal. Arrangements were made with the Odd Fellows

Lodge to share rooms over Claude's North Store.

At its present location, a beautiful Temple was built in 1906 with ample facilities for Lodge and Club purposes.

Unusual Ceremony

An unusual and interesting ceremony was conducted in 1950 when the original Holy Bible, Square and Compasses were retired from service and placed in a display case in the Lodge Room. A new Bible was placed on the Altar with due ceremony. The Square and Compasses for use on the new Bible were presented in memory of W... George M. Gillette, our first Master.

These items, unfortunately were short lived, as a devastating fire swept through the Lodge structure on the evening of November 21, 1952. Reading from the minutes, "MASONIC **BUILDING AND CONTENTS** DESTROYED BY FIRE OF UNDETERMINED ORIGIN". The 1st alarm was sounded at 4:30 a.m. Repairs started December 22, 1952. Again we accepted the Odd Fellows invitation to use their facilities until June 4, 1953 when repairs were significant enough for us to go back to our own Temple. This Temple serves the Craft today.

Scholarship Award

In 1967 our Lodge presented a Scholarship Award to a deserving Senior of Byron-Bergen High School. This cash award has been continued in conjunction with Hesperus Chapter, OES.

Contributions

Throughout the life of the Lodge there are recorded many generous contributions, both financial and in service, which have substantially benefitted the Lodge. One such instance occurred when Bro. Grant Gillam's estate presented a substantial gift. There was a stipulation that the proceeds from investments were to be used annually for charitable and benevolent purposes as determined by a committee appointed yearly by the Master and approved by the Brethren. A chairlift at the stairway entrance to enable many members of both the Lodge, Eastern Star and IOOF from climbing the 27 steps for meetings has been installed, thanks to this grant.

Perhaps the most charitable endeavor has been a yearly distribution of Christmas Food Baskets. This is in conjunction with the Sunshine Club, Fireman's Ladies Auxiliary, and the IOOF. Over 100 families in the Byron-Bergen area have been helped. W... Burton Sands and Hesperus Lodge received the Community Service Award from Grand Lodge for this function.

Through the Gillam Fund we are able to make yearly contributions to area Boy and Girl Scouts, Ambulance Fund Drives and other non-profit groups and individuals.

Returning the favor

In 1975 we accepted the membership of the IOOF to use our facilities for their Lodge meetings on a yearly basis.

Providing scholarships

In the Fall of 1977 the estate of W.. George T. Walker was endowed to the Temple Assoc. for the sole purpose of providing Scholarships to Hesperus Lodge members and their immediate families consisting of members wives and children. W.. John

Bater, chairman, advised me that from 1979 to date they have given out over \$120,000 in Scholar-

W.. Robert L. Whalen and R...W.. Holden Miller built the "Traveling Trophy" which is currently in use in the GW District. It began at Hesperus on September 21, 1985.

Van for handicaped

During the tenure of W.:. Van A. Hulburt a campaign to purchase a handicap accessible van for Bobby Whalen, son of W .: Robert L. Whalen, was instigated. On April 1, 1990, with the assistance of New York State Masons, R.:. W.: Leonard Mason, DDGM, presented Bobby the keys to a 1990 fully equipped Ford Van.

No repeaters

Hesperus Lodge No. 837 has the distinction of being one of the few Lodges that has never had a repeat Master. Our Line is filled with new Brothers and the prospect of this continuing is favor-

Total figures



During the Summer, some of the Brethren finished the wiring of our stairlift. I am not exactly sure who was involved, but I will find out and thank everyone personally.


The North front window in the restaurant was replaced with two smaller thermopane windows. Carl and Mel Parmeter coordinated this effort.
