Buffalo Area Mason Elected Grand Commander



At the 184th Annual Conclave of the Grand Commandery, Knights Templar, State of New York, Sir Knight Ronald S. Januszkiewiczwas elected and installed to the highest post in New York, Right Eminent Grand Commander.

A Reception and Banquet will be held in his honor on November 1st at the Buffalo Niagara Marriott Hotel.

SK Januszkiewicz was raised a Master Mason in Charles W. Cushman Lodge No. 879 in 1966 and affiliated with Buffalo Lodge No. 846 in 1970. He served as Worshipful Master of Buffalo Lodge in 1981 and Charles W. Cushman Lodge in 1985, 1990 and 1994. He is a Life Member of the Past Masters Association of Erie Countyserving on the Board of Directors from 1990 to present.

He was High Priest of Buffalo Keystone Chapter No. 71 RAM in 1982 and served as Treasurer in 1983-'85; AGL 31st Capitular District in 1983; DDGHP in 1985 and '86; appointed a Custodian of the Work Grand Chapter, 1992 to present. SK Januszkiewicz was Illustrious Master of Hamburg Council No. 91 in 1993, appointed Chairman of the Leadership Training Program, 9th Cryptic District, 1995-'96.

SK Januszkiewicz was Commander of Lake Erie Commandery No. 20 in 1984-'85, General Trustee 1987 - present. He is an Honorary Member of Hugh dePayens Commandery No. 30, Past Grand Representative of MA and RI and was elected Grand Warder of the Grand Commandery of New York in 1987.

He is also a member of Sylvanus F. Nye Council No. 37, Allied Masonic Degrees Past Sovereign Master; Past Governor, Niagara Frontier York Rite College No. 77; Order of the Purple Cross; Sentinel, St. Mark's Conclave Red Cross of Constantine; Empire State Priory No. 48 KYCH and is the Past Sovereign Prince, Palamoni Council of Princes of Jerusalem in the Valley of Buffalo, A.A.S.R.

SK Ronald S. Januszkiewicz was born in Buffalo, NY where he received his formal education. He served in the U.S. Naval Reserve and active duty during the Korean Conflict. After his honorable discharge from active duty, he gained employment in the power engineering field, was employed as the Power House Supervisor for Buffalo Color Corp. He retired on September 30, 1997.

SK Januszkiewicz and his wife, Rose Marie, have made their home in Cheektowaga for the past 32 years, have been married for 43 years and have four sons and two daughters and are the proud grandparents of seven grandchildren.

So, play it smart, pay off one year and then work out a payment plan that will bring your obligation up to current status. Even dues of \$75 per year is only \$.20 a day! Let's get with it!

VA Centers outlook

The Grand Lodge Veteran's Seminar in Tarrytown, NY, on September 5th-7th, saw Grand Lodge Veteran's Representatives from all over New York State attending a Seminar concerning the veterans who are in the VA Medical Centers in New York State. In attendance were: R...W.. Moses Hyman, Chairman Veterans Services; R.:. W .:. Gus Strutz, Vice Chairman: R.·. W.: Thomas Paglia, Upstate Veterans Coordinator; R..W.. Charles Mendell, Past Commander General, Masonic War Veterans; R.·.W.. Ray Alvarez, State Director, Masonic War Veterans; Curtis Horne, VA Chief Volunteer Services, Bronx, NY; Judge Raymond LaScala, 1st Lt. Commander, Masonic War Veterans, and 23 other Representatives and Deputies from 15 different VA Medical Centers in NY State.

Each Representative gave a summary of what is happening in their locations. The outlook for the VA Medical Centers is not very healthy. As I explained in the September issue of the Masonic Times, the VAMC's are becoming out patient clinics only. The downsizing is happening at a very fast pace. Each Representative forecasted a gloomy outlook for the care of veterans. The main theme was, "A promise made is a promise not kept". The veterans are getting the short end of the

Care

In the future, if any veteran will need care on an in and out basis, it will be on a Means Basis. This means that he will be paying according to what he can afford. A large group of veterans will feel this pinch, especially those who are on a fixed income and it will create financial hardships. The government is shifting the medical care burden to the veterans and their families.



If you get hurt on a job where you work, you can collect compensation depending on your dis- the VA Medical Centers ability, even 100%. Go off to war to "protect your country", and you get the run-around. Something is really wrong, when people from other countries living here, who are not citizens, can get free medical and social care, but the veterans who have earned the right to medical care are left behind.

In the 1995 application form for medical benefits it states, "if your household income exceeds the established threshold, you will be considered "discretionary".

Such veterans must pay a copayment if they are determined to be a "discretionary" veteran. I looked up the word "discretionary" in the dictionary, and it reads, "the freedom to make decisions". Is this a freedom to make a choice when you have to pay for something you earned and have a right

Shriners

Children of Vietnam veterans who suffer from spina bifida will benefit from a new partnership between the V.A. and the Shriners Hospital for Children. Recent law authorizes the VA to care for children whose spina bifida may have been caused by a parent's exposure to Agent Orange during the Vietnam War. Under agreement, signed March 28th, the Shriners, at no charge to the children or the VA, will care for children under 18 identified by the agency.

There have been recent tax law changes which will benefit many of us.

Sale of home

For sales of a principal home prior to May 7, 1997, the old rules apply. Basically, a homeowner is entitled to a one time capital gains exclusion of up to \$125,000. This exemption could only be claimed once in a lifetime, and only if the homeowner was 55 years old at the time of the sale. If these conditions cannot be met upon the sale of a home, then the proceeds have to be rolled over into another home within two years.

For sales of a principal home after August 5, 1997, home-owners will now be entitled to exclude up to \$500,000 from taxation on the sale of their principal home. This \$500,000 is allowable if the homeowner claims joint filing status on their tax return. For any other tax filing status, a gain of up to \$250,000 may be excluded. This exclusion cannot be used more often than every two years. The age limitation has been discontinued.

Estate taxes

Under current Federal Tax Law, upon your death you can leave up to \$600,000 tree of federal estate and gift tax to another person other than your spouse. Property passing to a spouse is not subject to this tax.

For the estates of those dying after 1997, this exemption amount will be modified upward as follows: 1998-\$625,000; 1999-\$650,000; 2000-\$675,000; 2002-\$700,000; 2004-\$850,000; 2005-\$950,000 and 2006-\$1,000,000.

Beginning in 1998, the annual exclusion from gift tax will be indexed for inflation. This will permit individuals to give ever increasing amounts to others, without having to reduce their lifetime estate tax exemption.

Deductibility of student loan interest

Beginning in tax year 1998, student loan interest will be deductible from income tax. This deduction; will only be allowed for interest accruing on a loan in its first 60 months (5 years) of payments. For example, if you started paying your student loan back in February, 1994, then the last payment that would qualify for a deduction would be Janu-

The deduction for 1998 is limited to \$1,000, increasing \$500 per year until it reaches its maximum of \$2,500 in 2001 and be-

Financial Planning Solutions

Probably almost every investor thinks he or she is an expert on Stock Market timing.

Investing is a mind game, and every Market investor plays the game in accordance with his or her own emotional state.

According to Mark Dern, of Dern Capital Management Corporation, for some people, money represents security. For others, it is a means of keeping score. There are investors who like the excitement of taking risks, while others dread the smallest dip in the value of their account.

He believes that the secret to successful investing is to look for meaningful trend changes, and doing this requires knowledge of the Market, time and effort. It is very easy to tell that the Stock Market has returned an average ten percent annually, but when the Market declines by larger amounts, many investors want out, fearing that they will lose their money.

Research has shown that most stocks follow the Market's direction, so timing, properly applied, can give the investor some reasonable parameters to make buy or sell decisions.

Mr. Dern offers four tips to successful investing using a Market timing approach.

1. Do not let greed keep you in the Market or fear keep you out.

2. Do not let your emotions rule the decision making.

3. Do not make your moves based solely upon stories in the media.

Avoid timing the Market without first reading published information on technical and fundamental analysis and Market timing and thoroughly testing your system.






We talk about stopping drug and alcohol abuse, but what is really being done? We put one dealer out of business and another immediately takes his place. What have we gained? Nothing!

Let's get together and see what we can come up with. I'm available for programs and open to suggestions.




Election of Officers


Brotherhood Fund

So attend the meetings regularly And help with hand and heart. Don't be just a member But take an active part.



Shepherding Program

The Shepherding Program is aimed at educating a new Brother by assigning a knowledgeable Brother to act as his mentor, educator, and companion for one year. This will help in creating an active, educated and working Brother.

The main focus is to teach the new Brother the basics of Masonry, and allow him to be comfortable with open Lodge procedures. It also helps by providing him with someone whom he can relate to and turn to for the answers to any questions he may

There are four phases to the Shepherding Program:

Phase I is formal training with the candidate, the shepherd and the Educating Team.

Phase II is a meeting to be held as a part of a Lodge program or as a Shepherd and Brother Pro-

Phase III provides for continuing Masonic education as part of a Lodge communication.

Phase IV may be used as a brief educational segment for every Lodge communication.

In the Monroes, many of us know the Shepherding Program is already in use in some form. We, as Staff Officers, will be in

touch to ascertain the degree of success we are having. For any Lodge not using the Program, we are available to provide assistance in its implementation.

Education

In general education, and Masonic education in particular, is not to be feared, but to be revered. The principles of our Craft must be understood in order to be fully appreciated and it is through the education process that the Brethren will thrive and grow in spirit and in numbers.

Membership Retention

The primary objective of the Membership Retention Umbrella is to provide your Lodge with tools which will assist you in retaining members as active Masons. We feel that by increasing each Brother's Masonic education, bringing brotherly love to all Brothers, and by providing interesting programs, we will be able to keep our members from becoming inactive.

The committees contained within this Umbrella are:

- Masonic Education
- 2. Leadership Services
- 3. NPD and Demit Reduction
 - 4. Sick and Shut-in Visitation
 - 5. Widows Program

We would like to see all the Lodges give out Recognition Awards or Awards for Years of Service. These could take the form of "Mason of the Year", "Most Improved Ritualist", or some similar Award.

The Empire State Mason prints a column by the Grand Lecturer where questions are asked by the Brethren on Ritualistic matters and answers given. I hope that you read this column.

I have noticed during Degree conferrals and at other times that


the Standard Work and Lectures of Ancient Craft Masonry (the code book) is open in some Lodges. This book is strictly an aid to the memory and should never be present in Open Lodge or used as a prompting aid at any time. I realize that some Brethren feel the need to have the book close at hand. If you feel the need for a prompter, callon a knowledgeable member of your Lodge to prompt. If a prompter cannot be found in yourLodge, call either Scott or me. We will be more than happy to prompt, given some notice.

Our Ritual is rich in symbolism and meaning. The Ritual should be presented such that the candidate, and all the Brethren present, can begin to understand the teachings of the Symbols and Allegory. How do you do this? First, learn the words. Second, study the words to discover their meaning for you. Then take the words, your understanding of them, and use your voice to convey both words and meaning to the listener. Sound familiar, "The attentive ear receives the sound of the instructive tongue." Lastly, you will only become proficient in Ritual work through practice.

I have placed much emphasis on Ritual This is not to say that Ritual is the most important part of the Craft. There are many other equally important parts, but the Ritual is the foundation. Our Ritual is unique and is one of the reasons I find Freemasonry so interesting and exciting.

Suspensions

As the end of the year approaches, Lodges in the Monroe Districts will be faced with Brothers being dropped for nonpayment of dues. First of all, I sincerely believe that NPDs can be avoided in most situations by using the tools of membership retention such as the "24 Inch Gauge", the "LSOME" book and tape and the "Shepherding Manual" beginning when the Brother turns his petition in to the Lodge and through the Brother's Masonic life. The relationship of a Brother with his Lodge should be ongoing from the start and the key to that relationship is communication.

Be compassionate

Unfortunately, we sometimes fail in this relationship. We find ourselves dropping Brothers from our membership without trying to get them back or finding out why they are dropping so we can avoid repeating our errors. We send what I call "nasty grams" to our possible NPDs which are nothing but a short and nasty paragraph saying that a member will be dropped from membership if dues are not paid by a certain date. An excellent example of poor and negative communication.

What we should be doing is sending a concerned letter to these members asking why they have not paid their dues, is there a financial problem, are they ill, are they dissatisfied with something, do they have any suggestions for improvement. A week or so after this letter is mailed, personal contact should be made. Make a phone call, regardless of where the Brother lives, and personally talk to him.

We may not get them all back, but it will astound you as to what you may learn about our communication methods. A Brother, in most cases, will not call and tellyou he has a financial problem and is not aware that dues can be remitted. He may not call and say that he or someone in his family have been ill. You must make the contact to find out why he is dropping.

Support needed

It is the Master's job to prevent membership loss. However, he needs your support to accomplish this task. Every Lodge should have a Membership Retention Team. Part of this Team's responsibility is to help the Master and the Lodge halt membership loss by communicating (there is that word again) to possible NPDs to find out why they are dropping and if it can be avoided.

Samples available

I have a sample letter that can be sent to your possible NPDs, I have been passing out this sample to your Masters and Wardens at every opportunity. If your Lodge wants this letter or needs any other assistance, all you have to do is call. You will find my number and others who will help in the Hot Line section on page 2 of this paper.



One of the future events planned is our Annual Christmas Party. We will have Paul Stillman returning this time to do a different person, possibly Teddy Roosevelt.



Sickness and distress


We have two Brothers in this category. W... James Hart has been quite ill. I hear that he is on the mend, which is very good news indeed. Best wishes for a speedy recovery.
