

It is a sad occurence which is taking place at the VA Medical Center in Canandaigua. Slowly but surely, the Center is closing; all in the name of austerity. Three years ago the Medical Center had over 700 Veterans in their care. On May 7th I was at a VAVS Executive Board meeting and heard that there are a little over 400 veterans remaining. It seems that the VA will be dismissing more veterans to their homes and into the care of their families, to a middle care house, or to nursing homes. A statement was made at a large gathering of veterans just recently that in about 11 years all VA Medical Centers will be closed. Our veterans were promised medical care for their unselfish sacrifice in the wars. What is happening is that the government is turning their backs on the them. What will take place is that the veterans whose families cannot take care of them will be put into nursing homes, like Building 9 (which was one of our visiting wards and is now empty) at the VA Medical Center and taken over by a private, not for profit organization.

The cost of operating this building will be put onto the veterans, because their social security, retirement checks and other income will pay for this care.

What a way to treat veterans, by making them pay for disabilities or illness that they received in the service of their country. So basically, the VA will be out of the business of taking care of the

Speaking for myself, who served in two wars, missing going to Viet Nam by sheer numbers, and wore the uniform for 40 years, it really hurts. When we visit the veterans, all I can see is that but for the grace of God, there go I.

Visitations

Our visitations start on October 12th and we will meet in Building 7 at 12:45 p.m. to be up in the ward by 1:30 p.m. There are about 40 or 45 veterans there, but some of them cannot partake of the refreshments for various reasons. Your presence to talk to them will do much to bolster their spirits.

Veteran's Service

On September 5, 6, and 7th, Grand Lodge Veterans Representatives, Grand Lodge Veterans Deputies and I will be meeting in Tarrytown, NY for a seminar on Veterans Affairs. Here I hope to find out more about what may happen to the VA and in the care of the veterans. Any information I receive I will pass onto you. In the mean time, write to your Congressmen or Congresswomen and let them know you are against the closing of the Medical Centers. Veterans-you never know, you may need their help sometime.

Financial Planning Solutions

There is a topic that most stock brokers do not like to talk about to their clients. What I am about to divulge could drastically affect their commissions in a negative

The reason that I do this is that my modus operandi is to get the best possible profit out of my clients investments, which may not be too popular with a lot of brokers. The reason that I offer this approach is that although I may not make as much in commissions, my clients benefit, and in the long run, I do, because my clients know that I am looking out for their best interests, so I still get the rest of their investment dollars.

This idea is called a Dividend Reinvestment Plan or DRP.

Dividend Reinvestment Plans are programs set up by public companies so that their dividends may be automatically invested in additional shares of stock, free of brokerage commissions, instead of being paid to the shareholder


Most companies that offer DRPs also offer "optional cash purchase plans" (OCP) that permit the shareholder to purchase additional shares of stock directly from the company at zero commission, and sometimes, may even offer the shares at a modest discount.

This is sort of like a Mutual Fund, but this program gives the investor the control over the decisions that have to be made.

Mutual Funds are excellent investment choices for most investors, but DRPs offer optional alternatives that are not available in the Mutual Funds.

There are many comparisons that can be made, but not here. If more information is desired, there are several books on the subject. I have some copies that are available for borrowing, and an association that sends out monthlydata and information for the persons who are interested in this subject.

Health Insurance and job changes

An important new law went into effect on July 1, 1997. The Health Insurance Portability Act now requires insurers to provide you with health insurance when you change jobs. To be eligible, your last employer must also have provided you with health insurance. What it means is that, subject to qualifying conditions, you immediately qualify for health care coverage on your new job, without the necessity of a waiting period.

This new law also limits the length of time insurers can refuse insurance for pre-existing condi-

tions. Sometimes 12 months will be the maximum waiting period. The law also prohibits employers, including health insurers themselves, from dropping people from coverage because they are sick.

Portability


Health insurance portability does not mean you can transfer your current health care coverage from one job to the other. Portability means that if you change jobs, your new employer will have to give you credit for prior health care coverage.

To receive this credit, your previous employer is required to give you documentation stating how long you were covered while working at that job. You then must give this documentation to your new employer. If you were covered for 12 months or more byyour prior employer's health insurance plan without a gap in coverage of more than 63 days, then you are eligible for immediate health insurance coverage from your new employer (assuming it's made available). This holds true regardless if you had a pre-existing health condition.

If offered, you're eligible

Even if you were covered for less than 12 months under your previous employer's health insurance plan, you can still receive credit. For example, if you were covered for only 6 months by a previous employer, then your subsequent health plan could only impose a 6 month pre-existing condition exclusion. If you were previously covered for only 4 months by a previous employer, then your subsequent health plan could only impose an 8 month pre-existing condition exclusion.

While the law does not require that employers offer health care coverage to its employees and their families, if your employer chooses to do so, then it must offer it to all of its employees, regardless of that particular employee's health status. Nor can the employer who offers health insurance coverage, charge higher individual premiums than other, healthier employees. Once insured, and as long as premiums are paid, your coverage cannot be subsequently cancelled if you later get sick (e.g. stroke, aids, cancer).

thinking. At some point Hearned the important notion that without a sufficient thinking model, information wouldn't sink in or be integrated into my understanding. I'd like to share with you two books which met this criteria for me this Summer.

"Iron John" by Robert Bly (1992).

This best seller focuses on men and their psychological needs. It describes how a changing societal context has been responsible for denying men access to important interactions which are necessary for healthy growth and develop-

Example: most men no longer have access to their father's vocation (or in many cases, their father, for that matter). Within the vocational context, sons were initiated into adult expectations and became full-fledged male adults. This rite of passage, or initiation, is important for males, if they are to become healthy and functioning adults in society. My brief summary of one of the key points in this book hardly does justice to Bly's thorough presentation. It is just a teaser to encourage you to get a book from the library and have a go at it yourself. I came away from this book with a richer understanding of the positive impact that Masonry can have in the lives of its members. I also better understand the comment of a Masonic colleague (therapist) who said that joining the Craft was a good way to become a mentally healthier individual. Reading this book can serve the same purpose.

room learning would have us believe that the North and South American Continents were populated by Asiatics who crossed the Bering land bridge before the last Ice Age some 10,000 years ago, and that was it until Columbus put ashore in 1492. If that is the "thinking model" you bring to the book, as I did, you will have a great deal of trouble comprehending certain anomalies which anthropologists have discovered over the years. Consider the following evidence:

Bananas were buried in pre-Columbian Inca graves (they are an Old World plant).

"Step" pyramids are built in Egypt and meso America.

Cotton (an Old World plant) was widely cultivated in the Americas.

Looms for weaving cotton in the Americas during the pre-

Columbian period are identical to those used in Egypt (experts cannot tell them apart).

Calendars used by the Egyptians and the Aztecs contained 12 month of 30 days and five "festival days"; both began on February 26, 797 BC.

VanSertima reports how difficult it has been for historians to deal with these data because their "thinking" model does not admit the possibility of African civilizations capable of developing exportable technology or trans-oceanic navigation. Because the operant concept is racist (the "black people are inferior" model), and Eurocentric, the explanatory theories offered to account for these "anomalies" range from the ludicrous to the preposterous (some may remember VonDaniken's

First Place Winner!

Masonic Lab Investigator Captures First Place in International Scientific Competition

Wataru Shimizu, M.D., Ph. D., Research Associate at the Masonic Medical Research Laboratory (MMRL), was selected as the First Place Winner of the Young Investigator Award Competition of the North American Society of Pacing and Electrophysiology at its annual scientific sessions held in New Orleans this past May. Shimizu competed with scientists and physicians from throughout the world for the coveted Award. The study, co-authored by Dr. Charles Antzelevitch, proposed a new approach to therapy for hereditary diseases of the heart, known as the long QT syndrome.

The MMRL investigators presented data suggesting that sodium channel blockers may be effective in the treatment of the disease whether the genetic detect is on chromosome 3 or chro mosome 7. It was previously thought that this class of drugs would be protective only in patients with the chromosome 3linked congenital heart problem. If left untreated, patients with these genetic defects often suffer fainting spells which can end in sudden death, due to an abnormal heart rhythm known as Torsade de Pointes. The study

also showed that sodium channel blockers may be helpful in preventing sudden death due to drug-induced long QT syndrome. Anzelevitch and co-workers recently described the mechanism by which commonly prescribed drugs such as the antibiotic crythromycin produce an acquired form of the long QT syndrome. At the heart of the problem and this new approach to treatment is a unique population of cells, called M cells, discovered and characterized by Anzelevitch's Experimental Cardiology team at the MMRL.

Shimizu, a highly respected clinical cardiologist from Japan, joined the MMRL one year ago for a two year training period in basic cardiac electrophysiology. According to Anzelevitch, MMRL Executive Director and Director of Research, "Dr. Shimizu can take great pride in his accomplishment. The proposed therapy may help to save the lives of many individuals afflicted with both congenital and acquired (drug-induced) forms of this disease".





Reminder





Spencerport Village Mayor Robert Kincaid recently made a special invitation to local service organizations and Etolian Lodge No. 479 to share in an historical moment. A prominent flagpole was to be placed adjacent to the Clyde W. Carter Memorial Gazebo, a 1997 edifice built on the SW Eric Canal bank in the heart of Spencerport. Kiwanians, Rotarians, Lions and Masons would be memorialized on a plaque placed at the flagpole, if they so desired and wanted to share in its cost.

Lodge Master W.: Brian P. Keery gained the approval of his Brethren to include the Lodge. They also devised ways in which funds could be raised to meet this obligation.

Gazebo dedicated

The Gazebo was dedicated on Sunday, July 20, 1997. It was named for Mayor Clyde Carter, who died while still in office in 1994. Funds to fulfill his dream of this structure came from family,

and money as they paid for the entire project! That is community service!



this one is different. It's not addicts/users who are taking it, but, mostly kids into sports or people on diets. It's legal. The drug is herb ephridome, street name is "white cross". It's a dietary supplement and there have been several deaths among those using it. It is sold in health stores.

Harsh statistics

New figures in national studies from Washington, DC, now show that it no longer is one in five that use drugs, but one in three. The average starting age for drug use, including alcohol, is now 10 years of age.

Drunk drivers

In the past most of my articles have been on drugs. Let's not forget about alcohol. It is still rated right up there with AIDS for its killing power. Our government and law enforcement, or at least our courts, do not take alcohol abuse too seriously. The following is some information on how seriously other countries take it. I think some of the countries listed here may be taking it too seriously, but I do not live there and do not know what prompted these laws.

How do other countries handle drunk drivers? These statistics were reported previously in Ann Landers' column.

In Australia-Names are published in newspapers with the headline, "Drunk in Jail".

In South Africa-Ten years prison term or \$10,000 fine, or both.

In Turkey-Drunk drivers are taken 20 miles outside of town and forced to walk back under police escort.

In Malaya-Jail for the offender and if married, his wife, too.

In Norway-Three weeks in jail at hard labor, one year suspension; second offense in five years, permanent revocation.

In Finland/Sweden-Automaticjail--one year at hard labor.

In England-One year in jail, one year suspension and \$250 fine.

In Bulgaria-A second conviction is last, punishment is execution.

In El Salvador-First offenseexecution by firing squad.



Update on Grant Gillam Memorial



Excerpts from the Masonic Home Q&A Brochure

Questions are often asked about the Masonic Home and the services that are provided. These are some of the questions (with answers) that are frequently asked. These questions were selected from the "Important Answers to Important Questions About the Masonic Home Brochure".

What are the levels of care? The Masonic Home offers two levels of care: Residential Adult Care for persons who are essentially self sufficient and Nursing Care for persons who require assistance with activities of daily living.

What is included in the cost of care? All meals, linen, snacks, social activities, laundry services, housekeeping, cable TV, medical care, podiatry and dental services, speech occupational and physical therapy, X-ray, hearing/audiology services, and transportation for outside appointments and activities. These items and others are included in the admissions agreement section of the application.

Are there additional services available? Retirement Living is offered at Acacia Village, the Masonic Retirement Community. The Respite Care Program is designed to provide the opportunity to the care giver to "take a break" from that duty for a maximum of 30 days at one time. The total days in any 365 day period is 42. The Short Term Rehabilitation Program offers care to those individuals who have suffered a stroke, hip or joint replacement or other debilitating injury requiring rehabilitation. The goal of the program is to return the individual to the setting they were in within 90 days.

Are Master Masons required to pay for services? Yes, all individuals receiving service are required to make payments from any income or assets they may have until they become eligible for Supplemental Security Income or Medicaid.

Am I required to turn over my assets? Absolutely not! You may handle your own finances or you may have a friend handle them for you or you may have the Home handle them for you. If the Home handles them for you, they will be placed in an interest bearing account administered by the Home. You will receive a statement quarterly showing your balance.


Need information?


theory of visitors from outer space). VanSertima is at his articulate best when he skewers the short sighted thinking of otherwise respected historians.

And what might this book have to do with the Craft? One section deals with megalithic Masonry practiced only in Egypt and Peru. The author very elaborately lays out the process, and one's understanding of how "at the building of King Solomon's Temple, there was not heard the sound of ax, hammer, or other metallic tool" is complete.

One comes away from this book with the larger understanding that black people are not the only victims of "racism". Nonblacks, whose thinking has been crippled, are damaged, too. Powerful books are empowering!


This is not part of the speech, but I would like to make a few comments regarding the interaction between the youth groups and the adult organizations. Where were you first prepared to be made a Mason?

As a candidate, you were asked this question to which you replied, "In my heart." You had a conductor who whispered that response in your ear so that the appropriate answer was given. Had it not been for that conductor, you might have given any of several responses like, while talking with my neighbor," or "when I completed the application for Degrees," or "when my father-in-law talked with me about it," or "as I noticed several prominent civic leaders, who are Masons, advance politically," or "when I was a young man, I was in DeMolay." All these answers are right for the person who becomes a Mason as Masonry asks that a man has made the request to be a Mason of his own free will and accord, belief in a Supreme Being, immortality of the soul, that he is at least twenty-one years of age, free born, worthy and well qualified.

No matter why you sought out Masonry, the only correct answer in the Grand Jurisdiction of New York is, "In my heart." Today, talking with a man who is worthy and well qualified to be a Mason is accepted, thus enabling this man to knock at the door of Freemasonry who, otherwise, may never have done so of his own free will and accord. Thus, Freemasonry is enriched by adding to its roles, a man whom another who is already a Mason holds in high esteem. We have come a long way from the days when we said, "To be one, ask one," meaning that it was the non-Mason's responsibility to ask a Mason for entrance into this timehonored Fraternity.

When was the last time you foundaman, someone you respect, and asked him to be your Brother in Freemasonry? For many of us, the answer is that we have not done it. You may know such a person, but to approach him about Freemasonry is not easy. For those who have spoken with a man about becoming a Mason, it is not an easy task and, for this reason, the Brother-Bring-A-Friend Night was developed. Whether the man is spoken with directly by a Masonic Brother or introduced to Freemasonry through a Masonic membership program such as the Brother-Bring-A-Friend Night, the result may be that we never lead this man to knock thrice on the inner door as many a worthy friend and fellow has done before.

If talking about Freemasonry does not result in a man asking to become a Mason, then it seems that early training and active exposure to Freemasonry holds a promising key. As a Mason in the Grand Jurisdiction of New York, you know that we are enriched with four Masonic Youth Organizations: Rainbow for Girls, Constellation of Junior Stars, Triangle and the Order of DeMolay. The first three are designed for young ladies while the Order of DeMolay is for young men between the ages of thirteen and twenty-one. For purposes of this discourse, let's look to the Order of DeMolay.

The Order of DeMolay holds these as its tenets, the Seven Cardinal Virtues: Filial Love, Reverence for Sacred Things, Courtesy, Comradeship, Fidelity, Cleanness and Patriotism. As a Mason, we hold three basic tenets: Relief, Truth and Brotherly Love. When looking at those tenets held by DeMolays and those by Masons, is there any doubt that a DeMolay is being prepared, not only to deal with life overall, but with an eye toward becoming a Mason? The very Ritual the Order of DeMolay uses is modeled after Freemasonry, offering the DeMolay a portal to Freema-

sonry. Provided with these necessary tools, we indoctrinate a DeMolay in Freemasonry as early as thirteen years of age thus giving as many as eight years of healthy exposure to Masons and Masonry so that this young man, while maturing, will naturally and willingly knock at the door of Freemasonry.

You have the tools to make a difference in a young man's life today. As a Freemason in this Grand Jurisdiction, you can help to support the Order of DeMolay as an Advisor, Chapter Chairman, Adult Worker or by offering support when called on. As a Senior DeMolay, I knocked at the door of Freemasonry as a natural progression. Many others, who were DeMolays as young men, became a Mason because of what they experienced in the Order of DeMolay. In all of history, the future of any great society and nation was left to the youth who would become its leaders. The close ties of DeMolay and Masonry are no different.

Since 1919, when Brother Frank S. Land founded the Order of DeMolay, he knew that Masonry would find its members and leaders from those in DeMolay. The dream is as real today as it was then. The candle of the Order of DeMolay will burn bright with your support for the Order, and Freemasonry will reap the rewards of a job well done.

Never has the support for the Order of DeMolay and the future of Freemasonry been so closely tied. ¤
