A little background

The current Grand Master and Deputy Grand Master met with the past Grand Masters on March 18th this year. Apparently a vote was taken and R.W. Robert Stack, Past Grand Treasurer and Chairman of the Masonic Brotherhood Fund Committee for numerous years, received the "nod". R.: W.: Louis Juers, Past Grand Treasurer, was interested in the position, as well. Some of his colleagues announced they would place his name in nomination. Just a few weeks prior to Grand Lodge a "dark horse" was announced as a third contender-R.: W.: Carl J. Fitje, who had served as Junior and Senior Grand Deacon.

All three were nominated and seconded as candidates for the office of Deputy Grand Master. The Judge Advocate, R.: W .: Daniel Semel, described the process that would be used and ordered the ballots distributed to the District Deputies. The protracted process of balloting, we were told, has remained essentially unchanged since its inception in the late 1700's. Survival, an open letter!

Dear Reader,

"All endeavors require support." I'm sure most of you would agree with that statement. Although the Masonic Times was created for and desirous of supporting all Masonic endeavors, we have to consider the unrelenting pressure of financial viability. Just like every other Masonic organization in the area, the cost of operations has increased, but our subscription rate has not increased since January of 1991.

Although we have been able to keep costs down by internalizing some operations that were previously done outside and increasing our number of patrons, the increase in the cost of printing and mailing have more than offset the effects of these changes. The almost 30% decrease in Masonic membership over that same time period, with resulting loss of revenue, has not helped either. There are also many organizations who still do not choose to subscribe.

As I have pointed out in the past, the cost of the Times is still low for what you get. Ten issues, of what has been called the best Masonic Newspaper in the State, for only \$4.00 per member per year is a bargain. Compare this to \$.33 per piece for mailing one newsletter to your membership. As a matter of fact, it costs the Masonic Service Bureau more to publish the Times than the subscription fee alone brings in.

We will continue to support our subscriber organizations while giving support, where possible, to the entire Masonic Community. In all fairness to our regular subscribing groups, however, we cannot give space away.

Health-Yours and Mine

Since the age in the Masonic Community dramatically increased, so too did the health problems, both present and future.

How we handle those medical problems will greatly influence our recovery and rehabilitation. We should not and cannot ignore the medical diagnosis or the doctors suggested treatment.

However, we can materially assist and affect the recovery process and the degree of recovery, or, in come cases, the acceptance of the diagnosis. First let us look at how we can assist in the recovery process. Probably the most difficult period is when we recognize the need for testing, or after testing but prior to the results. An equally difficult time is after the prognosis, but before the treatment is determined and started. Once the results are in and a treatment course is suggested, that is when we can materially affect the results.

How? By taking charge of the disease or problem, rather than letting it take charge of you. Easier said than done? Not really.

First, using cancer as an example, accept the fact that you have cancer and do not refer to cancer as "it" or the "disease". Do not be afraid to talk about "it". Realize that attitude can have a significant affect on your treatment and recovery-perhaps as much as 60% to 70% of your recovery. Mind over matter is real. If you think you are sick, you are. If you think you won't recover, you won't. A positive attitude is the beginning of your recovery. Talk about it in depth with your doctor. Letyour doctor know that you want to know about your type of cancer, your treatment, and your intent to assist. "Take charge" of your disease, don't let it take charge of you!

Taking charge

Read only current articles, and even then don't let it scare you. Medicine has come a long way in the last five years.

Adopt a holistic attitude-I do not mean ignore your doctor or your medication. I do mean use every method at your disposal to help the medication work.

Stress kills. Excess stress is dangerous by itself, however, it also interferes with your recovery.

Tension works against you. Use relaxation tapes, bio-feedback, imaging, a psychologist, or any other method that will help you relax. I used all these-they work!

Be positive about all things, it's contagious. A positive attitude and relaxation will work wonders.

Faith and prayer help. I did not pray to be cured. I prayed for help to cope with whatever comes. Your faith is also part and parcel of handling the cancer or other diseases.





Children's Hospital Telethon

cial Security Disability Benefits for a 2 year (24 month period), or are classified as working disabled.

Medicare consists of two parts, Part A and Part B.

Medicare Part A pays for hospital care, care in a skilled nursing facility, home care or hospice care during a defined benefit period. There are no asset or income limits to qualify. Part A covers all inpatient hospital care during a defined benefit period. Part A will pay for up to 90 days of care in either a inpatient hospital care (plus 60 additional reserve days) and 100 days of care within a skilled nursing facility following discharge from the hospital.

While an inpatient in a hospital, medicare will cover: bed and board (excluding private rooms); nursing and related services (excluding private nurses); blood transfusions; hospital services; social services; medical supplies, appliances and drugs; diagnostic and therapeutic care.

If extended care in a skilled nursing facility is required, then Medicare will cover: bed and board; nursing care (no private nurses); physical, occupational or speech therapy; social services; medical supplies, drugs and appliances; and all other necessary treatments that are generally provided by the skilled nursing home to patients.

If qualified, a patient can obtain Medicare covered home care. Services covered include: part time or intermittent nursing home care; physical and speech therapy; social services; medical supplies (excluding drugs); durable medical equipment and part time or intermittent care by a home health aide.

Medicare Part A will pay for the full cost of medically necessary home health care and 80% of the cost of approved durable medical equipment.

While in hospice, Medicare will cover treatment if your doctor certifies you as terminally ill; you elect to receive hospice care instead of medicare benefits for terminal illnesses and the hospice is medicare-certified. If hospice care is elected, then Medicare will cover: nursing care; therapy; physician ordered social services; home health aide; medical supplies; medical appliances; short term inpatient or respite care; counseling.

These three areas: hospital inpatient care, subsequent skilled nursing home care, and hospice care are paid for by Medicare Part A during a defined benefit period. Home care currently has no limits as to duration of coverage, so long as the patient qualifies.

A defined period is a period of time that begins the 1st day you receive inpatient care in a hospital, and occurs in a month in which you are entitled to medicare coverage. Medicare will pay for services once the medical charges exceed a deductible. The benefit period lasts for 60 consecutive days during which: the person was neither an inpatient of any hospital; or inpatient of any skilled nursing facility; or was a patient in a skilled nursing facility but didn't receive skilled nursing care for 60 consecutive days.

For example: you enter a hospital and remain for 200 days, and are then discharged. This is what Medicare will cover: day 1 through 60, you pay the initial Medicare deductible of \$776. For days 61-90, you pay a deductible of\$194/day. Provided you haven't used medicare in any prior hospital stays, then days 91-150 are covered by your lifetime reserve days (60 days maximum). You

would have to pay a deductible of \$388/day for a hospital stay extending from days 91-150. After day 150, Medicare will no longer provide coverage for this particular hospital stay. You would be fully responsible for days 151-200 in the hospital.

A shorthand way to remember this is that Medicare will only pay for 150 days in the hospital per spell of illness. In order to obtain medicare coverage for future hospital visits, you have to be discharged from the hospital and go for 60 days without needing hospital or skilled nursing home care. If you can get past the 60 days post release from the hospital, then a new benefit period will begin. The only difference is Medicare will only pay for 90 days of inpatient hospital care. Why not 150 days of coverage? Because in the prior example, you used up your 60 day lifetime reserve. Once it's used, it's gone for good; even if you do qualify for a

new benefit period. Medicare Part A will pay up to 100 days of skilled nursing care for patients discharged from a hospital who had been receiving inpatient care. To qualify, the patient must: have been a hospital inpatient for 3 consecutive days; certified by a physician in need of skilled nursing care; and suffering from the same condition that was treated in the hospital. The first 20 days are fully covered by Medicare; days 21-100 require the patient pay up to \$97/ day deductible.

Payment-hospitalization

There is a \$776 deductible. In addition, co-payments are required as follows: days 1-60 (\$0/ day); days 61-90 (\$194/day); 91-150 (\$388/day). This last co-pay range applies if the 60 day lifetime reserve needs to be used.

Payment-skilled nursing home

If you are subsequently transferred to a skilled nursing home, Part A will pay up to 100 days following hospitalization. A copayment of \$97/day is required for days 21-100. Home care and hospice services are also covered. In the next article, I'll discuss Medigap Insurance.



Fear and greed

In this final installment of my review of "The Roaring 2000's" by Harry S. Dent, Jr., I will cover two extremely important principles near and dear to my heart: 1) take the emotions out by investing systematically and 2) find an objective Financial Advisor.

Fear and greed often drive our investment actions and cause us to sell at market bottoms or buy at market tops. (The last six months could serve as a textbook lesson for many investors!) Dent states that the best way to overcome these emotions is to follow a simple model that instills a diversification discipline in your investment portfolio. For the sake of simplicity, let's suppose there are four different investment classes: large company, small company, international and fixed income (bonds). Depending on your tolerance for risk and your investment objective, you will allocate a percentage of your portfolio to each sector in such a way so that you achieve the highest possible returns with the least

amount of risk. For example, your appropriate model may be to allocate 25% to each of these four

Over the course of a year, each sector will perform a bit differently. On a regular basis, therefore, you should rebalance the weightings to the original 25% which means you will take money from the higher performing sectors and put it into the lower performing sectors. Essentially, you will be selling high and buying low-just the recipe for long term investment success! If you will be adding new money to your portfolio, you should also follow this strategy by investing more in the out-of-favor sectors and less in the better performing sectors.

An objective advisor can help you establish this type of systematic program for your "serious" money. In addition, before you invest a dime, he or she can help you evaluate your financial goals, tolerance for risk and keep you on track with an appropriate investment program. Dent claims that the fee paid to a professional advisor to keep the investor from caving into the temptation to buy near the tops of strong surges or sell near the bottoms of strong corrections is a bargain. Using an objective advisor can improve your investment results over time and allow you to spend your valuable time on what you love most: your career, your family and friends, and leisure activities. If you are not willing to pay for a professional advisor, at least get an experienced friend to be your mentor who can help you with your decision making. Meet with a number of financial advisors through word-of-mouth references, and take the time to choose the one that you trust and best

understands investors like you. The terrific bull market we've been experiencing (up until the end of March, anyway) has given many investors a great deal of confidence about managing their investments, and many have tried to educate themselves and invest on their own with little or no professional guidance. During the past few weeks, I've been reminded of the adage "it's easy to swim in waist deep water, but it's much more difficult when the water is over your head". Good luck and good investing...more to come in September when we'll discuss the impact of Presidential elections on the stock market. "


Meeting




Family Picnic

Case Number 1

I have been in the electrical field almost 50 years and I have seen all kinds of things, so very little surprises me when I go into the field. This incident concerns a man who is highly respected in his profession, but when it comes to construction-well!!

I received a call asking if I had some time, would I look at some wiring? I asked the caller what was wrong, his reply, "No power to his outlets." Upon arriving at the house, guess what? There was construction going on, sort of a do-it-yourself project. I looked at the wall and saw cut marks made by a saber saw, which was used to cut some dry wall and you guessed it, there were wires right where he cut. The Code states "No buried junction boxes in a wall".

I had to rewire that section. The thermostat wire had been removed and someone had rewired it back again on the wall. Yep, try for heat, the air conditioning unit would come on, try for air conditioning and only the fan would start. Anyway, it was all corrected.

Professional people in the field don't cut blindly. If you try to get someone to install a telephone or TV cable in your basement with a finished ceiling, most will refuse to do it because it never fails, there will be wires where they are not supposed to

Case Number 2

This one is about a roof fan. The problem occurred when the fan started it would make a loud noise which could be heard throughout the house. On opening the door that led to the attic, I found no steps, but a small step ladder lying on the stairwell ceiling. This was used for steps.

Very gingerly feeling my way up, not knowing if I was going to go through the ceiling (done that before, being in business for a long time, your foot does slip) I managed to get to the attic.

First I looked for a switch to isolate the fan so that I could work on it, but, found none. There was a direct wire, which is a Code violation. To make the fan work to see what was wrong with it, I had to install a jumper wire

everyone's support. W.: Henry invested in their office for the on the fan. Don't do this if you do not know what you are doing.

The motor started with no noise. I was looking for something else, but could see nothing. I told the home owner that the fan was losing the bushings because of age and probably would need to be replaced. Taking the fan unit out of the housing, I found that the housing was cracked and there were two holes in the hood. I did not see these before because the blades hid them from view. I asked if any work had been done on the roof and was told that a new roof was put on over the old shingles. What had happened was that when putting on the new roof, the roofers, while hammering the nails had cracked the housing (made of plastic) and probably missed a couple of times to put the holes into the housing. They used a 20 oz. hammer and anyone who has been hit on the thumb with this tool knows it kind of stings. The housing could not take it and apparently did not withstand the abuse. What was happening was that when the wind blew in a certain direction, the housing only being held by one strap, it would jump like a rabbit. Putting in a new fan was not difficult, but climbing up the steep roof was a sight to behold. While up there, I had to put one foot on the exhaust stack (one foot over and one foot down from me spread eagle). You can imagine what I looked like.

I installed the fan, but here is the good part. When looking for a switch to shut off the power to the fan, I traced the wire that was strung along the roof rafters like a clothes line and found it dropped down at least 6 feet with no support under loose plywood.

Lifting up the drywall, I found what looked like a bunch of snakes looking at me! Someone had cut the armored cable, and not installing a junction box had made open connections, a Code violation. When taking the connections apart, I found the wires black from heat, because of the poor connections. All ended well. The proper connections were made, a junction box installed, a switch added to shut off power to the fan and a pull chain fixture installed.

The original wiring for the light in the attic had two lamp cords hooked together, plugged into an outlet in the second floor bedroom with a ceiling gooseneck fixture at the other end just hanging on a nail in the attic on a roof rafter. When you jury rig electrical devises, it is like putting a penny behind a fuse. You all know what that reads: "In God we trust", and God must have been looking out for them because the fan was a warning sign.

May all of your neutrons flow



A lesson to be learned

What is so special about being a Mason? The question was posed to me recently. The context was adversarial in nature. The person asking the question was reacting to something one of our Brothers had done. What he had done was not very flattering or exemplary. I don't need to go into the details.

As a leader he had acted in a public setting in a manner that did not reflect very favorably on himself or on anyone with whom he might be associated. His ring and lapel pin identified him as a member of the Craft to those outsiders who recognize the Square and Compass. The question was posed with a sense of disappointment. The question was posed as if the asker was surprised and yet disappointed that his expectations had fallen short. The question was posed as if the asker had witnessed a failure of someone not measuring up to an expected standard of performance.

Our Brother had reacted in frustration to a situation he apparently felt he could not control. He had lashed out verbally and physically in a manner that might be understandable had he been a child on a playground. He allowed his emotions to rule his better judgement. He paid a ter-

rible price in the loss of respect he earned from those around him at the time. His words and actions were indefensible. For the asker of the question he had just demonstrated, in his case, there was nothing very special about his being a Mason.

I've been thinking long and hard about this incident. For those of you who have been reading my monthly messages, you know that I have been encouraging you to "Lead by Example". But, what does that mean? Obviously, I don't want anyone to think that the negative impression of the example above is any indication of what I meant.

When I use the term "Lead by Example" I mean for you to act in a manner that is worthy of emulation. I mean for you to lead your life in such a way that others will want to follow your lead willingly. Your example should be a good one.

In other Masonic Jurisdictions it is still required that a potential candidate ask to be considered for membership. In order to be motivated to ask to join any organization, one who would ask must think that there is something of value to be obtained by joining. If the Brother in the illustration were to be our representative, we as a group don't have much to offer. I have to ask each of you if you are a good example. If you can see your actions as not being in the best interest of the Craft, perhaps you need to go back and reconsider your obligation. Ask yourself if you are living your life in such a way as to be a good and positive role model that nonmembers would want to emulate.

But more importantly, are you satisfied with the wayyou are living your life? The lessons we learn from the Craft and from those Brethren in leadership positions about how to live as upright citizens should be the rule and guide for our lives. If we can learn those lessons and use them to change

our way of life, we can avoid becoming like the Brother in this example. We can, by our actions in every day life, provide the positive role model that will attract the interest and the respect of our fellowmen. Maybe this is a wake-up call for all of us to reassess how we individually are seen by others.

As Scottish Rite Masons we are taught through a system of 29 Degrees how to live our lives. WE need to continually reassess our understanding of those lessons and how they should be interpreted. The Millennium Passport system is one way of encouraging us to do so. When in a position of leadership we must always act as a leader should. The leader must always put the interest of those following in the forefront. If the leader doesn't think first of his followers, soon there will be

When we lead, in whatever capacity, we must consider that those working with us must be treated with dignity and respect. Otherwise, there is no reason for them to follow.



The Supreme Council of the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Ritewill hold a Cornerstone Laying Ceremony on July 29th for its newly renovated Headquarters in Lexington, Massachusetts. Supreme Council September 24-27

Pittsburgh will be the site of this year's annual meeting of the Scottish Rite Supreme Council for the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction. More than 2,500 Thirty-third Degree Masons and their ladies from 15 Northeastern States are expected at the meeting on September 24th-27th. The Supreme Council last met in Pittsburgh in 1989.

The 2000 Session will be highlighted by the conferral of the organization's Thirty-third Degree upon 318 Scottish Rite Masons who were elected for this high honor at last year's meeting in Atlantic City, NJ. This year's millennium class will be the largest in recent years.

Introductory luncheons honoring the Thirty-third Degree candidates and their ladies will be on the schedule for Sunday noon.

Earlier business conferences attended by the Active Members and Officers of the Supreme Council will be held on Friday and Saturday, September 22-23.

The larger-scale events will begin on Sunday afternoon, September 24th, when the Pittsburgh Convention Center will be the scene of the traditional Supreme Council Vesper Service. The Rev. Dale R. Smith, 32°, will deliver the Vesper message. He is Senior Minister, Level Green Community; Past District Superintendent of the Western Pennsylvania Conference of the United Methodist Church; and Past Grand Chaplain of the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania.

Assisting will be Sovereign Grand Commander, Robert O. Ralston, 33°; Grand Prior Kenneth V. Kettlewell, 33°, Interim Pastor, Second Presbyterian Church in Cambridge, Ohio; and Rev. Richard G. Morledge, 32°, Pastor Emeritus, First Presbyterian Church in Bakerstown, PA, Past Dean of the Chapel at Grove City College, and Past Grand Chaplain of the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania.



Triple Tau Shield

By Barnes A. Sharitt, Jr.

With respect to the shield of the Royal Arch Masons, and the use of the Triple Tau, I am unfamiliar of the shield and am unable to find a reference for it. With respect to the Triple Tau, the reader is referred to Section (Chapter) 22 of the "Freemasons Book of the Royal Arch", by Bernard E. Jones (London: Harrap,


Jones states that the "T" (tau) symbol is an early form of the cross. In England a Royal Arch lecture explains that the tau was used as a sign on a warrior who had survived a battle without being injured. Ezekial 9: 3-4 reads where the the Lord commands "the man clothed with linen, which had the writer's inkhorn by his side" to "go through the midst of the city, through the midst of Jerusalem, and set a tau upon the foreheads of the men that sign and that cry for (because of) all the abominations that be done in midst thereof."

The Triple Tau was originally "T" over "H" and meant the Temple in Jerusalem. It was not seen in the Triple Tau form until

There would be no physical connection between the Templars and the Royal Arch Masons due to the 500 years between the Templars and the development of the Royal Arch Mason Degrees. The evolution of the American York Rite (Chapter, Council, Commandery) is an early nineteenth century phenomenon. This would account for the cross pollination of the emphasis of the two degree systems, only if one was unaware of how the Royal Arch developed in the British Isles and in the Northern United States. The Royal Arch and Cryptic (Council) Degrees do not depend upon the Templar Orders for the respective teachings or symbology, as they are self contained philosophically within themselves. (So is Templary contained also with itself.)

Though Royal Arch membership is a prerequisite to Templar membership, there is no direct linkage between the Capitular Degrees and the Templar Orders. The membership requirement is changing as some Grand Commanderies (or Grand Priories) now require both Capitular and Cryptic membership as a prerequisite to Templar membership.

In summary, one would be advised not to take the Templar model too far from its field of emphasis, as scholarship does not support those conclusions. Additionally, in many areas of the globe, Royal Arch Masonry is all that is known of what in the US is called York Rite Masonry.





The Mystic Order of Veiled Prophets of the Enchanted Realm, more commonly known as "The Grotto", is a great Fraternal Order. It was organized in Hamilton, New York, on June 13, 1890, as a fun Order for Master Masons to meet, have fun and cultivate the lighter side of life.

The Grotto has grown over the years to include members throughout the United States and Canada. There are over 200 Grottoes in as many different cities. These Grottoes have dinners, picnics and other family oriented functions for all to enjoy.

As all good Masons, just having fun was not enough. It was felt that there was a need to help the less fortunate, so in June 1949, our Humanitarian Foundation was born. The "Dentistry For The Handicapped" was pioneered with the dental clinic at the Illinois Medical Center in Chicago and the Children's Hospital in Cincinnati. Later on, Centers were started in Pittsburgh and Toledo. In addition, local Grottoes are involved in their own dentistry programs as well. More than 30,000 children have been treated.






