Gift of Love Help Endow the Camp

Let us assume you purchased 1000 shares of CISCO at \$30 per share, or a total cost of \$30,000. CISCO has had great growth and has recently split 2 for 1 and its current price is about \$75, after the split. This means your split adjusted cost is now \$15 per share and you own 2000 shares for the same total cost of \$30,000.

If you contribute those 2000 shares to the Masonic Service Bureau for Camp DeMolay, the value of that gift is \$150,000. The full value of the gift (\$150,000) is a tax deduction and, if you are in the 31% tax bracket, it would save you \$46,500 in taxes, or \$16,500 more than your original cost. You also save 20% capital gains tax on the gain of \$120,000 or an additional tax savings of \$24,000.

Are there limitations on deductions? Yes, deductions are limited to 50% of your adjusted gross income for cash and 30% for appreciated stock, but any amount not used can be carried forward to future years.

This is a tax efficient way of making the government a partner and paying 47% of your gift of love. Why not make a significant gift to help endow our Camp DeMolay? Lifetime Charitable Gifts of appreciated stock are usually better than gifts of retirement assets.

Turbulent times!

I am writing this column during one of the most turbulent periods in the stock market in recent memory. Now is an excellent time to review the fourth principle for building wealth presented by Harry S. Dent, Jr., in his book, "The Roaring 2000's": Use asset allocation for the biggest risk versus return.

As our stock portfolios climbed increasingly higher over the past few years with just a few short-lived downdrafts, some of us might have forgotten the inverse relationship between risk and return in the stock market. Some investors may have recently begun investing in stocks and ignored the concept of risk altogether. The past few weeks have been a wake up call to many stock market and stock mutual fund investors wondering what they could do to temper the ups and downs of their portfolios.

To reduce the volatile swings of an all-stock portfolio, financial advisers usually recommend a strategy of holding different types of assets (stocks, bonds, cash) and even different types of stocks, (international, small company, large company, growth, rising dividend). Spreading investments across these categories is known as asset allocation.

The biggest returns over time come primarily from having an appropriate asset allocation, and not from picking the best funds or from market timing. For example, overweighting stocks during this long running bull market has been a good strategy, but hav-

credits or more to qualify. A credit equals one quarter or 4 months. To obtain a credit, carned income has to exceed \$590 each quarter (SSA Handbook 212). The amount of the stipend depends on your contributions during your career. Mistakes in reporting your income by previous employers do occur. To safeguard your earning record, you must verify its accuracy. Social Security will not do it for you. Fortunately, Social Security makes this process of verification very easy. Call Social Security at 1-800-772-1213 (or visit their web site at www.ssa.gov) to request a Form SSA-7004SM (Request for Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement). It will show how much you have paid into the system, and what your retirement benefit would be. If the earnings information contained in this statement is inaccurate, then you must contact Social Security to correct the error. The time to correct your earnings record is limited, and may be as little as 3 years from the date the income was reported.

Retirement benefits can be obtained beginning at age 62, but full retirement benefits aren't paid until age 65 is reached. Beginning this year, and for those born after 1938, the full retirement age will be increasing gradually to 67 in 2022 (SSA Handbook 723).

As of January, 1998, Social Security estimates that a retiree, at 65, who steadily earned: \$12,000/year, would get a monthly stipend of \$568/month (\$852 if married); earnings of \$27,000/year, would get a monthly stipend of \$938/month (\$1407 if married); earnings of \$65,400/year, would get a monthly stipend of \$1342/month (\$2013 if married). (SSA Publication #05-10080).

Survivors Insurance

Survivors benefits are paid to a deceased worker's family, provided the deceased worker was fully insured at the time of his/her death. A widower with 2 children can expect a monthly stipend of about \$1500/month. This amount will increase annually as the cost of living increases. Social Security estimates that this survivors benefit is the equivalent of a life insurance policy worth \$313,000 (SSA Publication #05-10080). Children up to age 18 (age 19 if still in high school) can obtain survivors benefits. A child over 18, but disabled before age 22, can also obtain survivors benefits. A widow(er) who is either: caring for children under age 16; age 60 or older; age 50 or older who is disabled, can also obtain survivors benefits. A survivor who is divorced from the deceased worker, may also qualify for a survivor benefit if he/she is over age 60 (age 50 if disabled) and hadn't remarried prior to age 60 (age 50 if disabled) (SSA Handbook

Disability Insurance

A disabled worker and his family are entitled to disability benefits after meeting certain eligibility requirements. These re-


quirements are essentially: inability to work; earned at least 20 quarters into the Social Security System (a quarter is 4 months in which the worker has earned at least \$590 per quarter) at the time he is determined to be disabled; completed a 5 month waiting period (unless exempted from waiting); and is under age 65. The disabled worker's benefit rate is the same as his retirement benefit; both of which are based upon theworker's average lifetime, taxable earnings. A disabled widow(er) can also qualify for the deceased spouse's disability benefits if the survivor's disability came about within 7 years (SSA Handbook 513). The average monthly payment to a disabled worker is \$720/month; \$1200/ month if married with children. A person collecting disability for 2 or more years becomes eligible for medicare. (SSA Publication #05-10080).

Supplemental Security Income (SSI)

SSI is a disability program, too. It provides cash assistance to meet the necessities of life. It differs from Social Security Disability because its benefits are not paid from the Social Security Trust Fund, but from general tax revenues. Unlike Social Security Disability, SSI benefits are based on need, not amount of earnings that a recipient has contributed. To qualify for SSI, the applicant must be either: age 65 or older; blind; or age 18 and over and disabled as defined under Social Security disability rules.

Because SSI is based on need, an applicant must basically be poor in order to qualify. The qualification rules for SSI are similar to medicaid qualification. An applicant cannot have cash income exceeding \$587/month (\$855/month if married). Additionally, an applicant cannot own assets (resources) exceeding \$2000 (\$3000 if married). The applicant can exempt from these resource limits: a very used car (can't exceed \$4500 in value); \$1500 burial fund (or any amount set aside for burial if placed in an irrevocable burial trust), and household items not exceeding \$2000 in equity. An SSI recipient qualifies for Medicaid.

I'll cover Medicare in next month's article.

To a Very Old Soldier-Best Wishes

July 13, 1951

Dear James A. Hard:

This is the first time we have ever written to anyone 110 years old, and the fact that you will reach that extremely special state on Sunday leaves us a little embarrassed at our inadequacy of expression.

There doesn't seem to be much that any of us can tell a man of your age, your experience and your stature. All we can do is ask, knowing that somewhere in your miraculous memory you have most of the answers.

You have said several times that you have faith in the United States and all for which this nationstands, that you hate tyranny, that you love liberty and that you are convinced that oppression must be fought and freedom is worth dying for.

These are sentiments in which all good Americans concur. It is to be hoped that all will continue to hold them fast long after we and even you have gone.

What your faith in America does for us is something very good indeed.

For along the years of your tremendous life span you have gleaned the kind of knowledge that few men can acquire in their small lifetimes.

You have known men who could have known Washington and Jefferson and the Adamses. You have met Lincoln and seen Grant and been contemporary with Lee and Sherman and Sheridan.

You have seen what fool politicians and well-intentioned statesmen have done to the greatest land on earth and seen that land become involved in six major wars in your own time. You have seen it survive and grow stronger even while ineptness and stupidity and wastefulness have gnawed at its innards and corroded its outward beauty.

You have remained constant and your faith has remained firm and your judgement sound.

You have not preached, and this is refreshing to find in any man. You have not scolded and that, too, is a virtue. You have not prescribed-either for long life, or for morals or for human conduct. You have not filled us full of recipes or formulae.

You have exercised two of the American's greatest privileges-to fight for his country and to vote for his candidates, and in fighting and voting you have helped keep our America intact.

Masonic Plague

Do you know, and do you care, that a plague is upon the Masonic Fraternity? During the ten years from 1978 through 1987, 254 Lodges merged into 123 Lodges.

During the next ten years, from 1988 through 1997, 235 Lodges merged into 115 Lodges.


In a span of 20 years, 489 Lodges merged into 240 Lodges, and an additional 16 Lodges simply surrendered their Charters. A net loss of 264 Lodges in only 20 years is a disaster.

During the same 20 years individual membership dropped from nearly 180,000 in 1978 to a reported membership count of 60,000 in 1997. And this 60,000 figure includes double counting of many members who belong to more than one Lodge.

The membership has toppled to a pre Civil War low. Not since the 1850's has the membership in New York fallen to such depths.

Recognize every Brother, and whatever he has accomplished. Teach the work and history to all new Masons. Remember your Brothers who do not come to Lodge often, visit or call them on the phone. Remember the widows of your Brothers. They were once a part of all your "doings".

Help the Master with his programs. Offer to serve on his committees. Be a volunteer to help with the upkeep and beautification of your Masonic Temple. In short, do everything that can be done to instill pride in every member. Amember who is proud of his Lodge will not abandon it. He is more likely to take part in the activities of the Lodge.

From this day forth, only recommend men of solid and stellar character for membership in this Fraternity. The membership of your Lodge may not dwindle as fast as others, but a loss will happen as time passes and more competition for your time presents itself at every turn. When the downward trend of "membership" and the upward trend of "cost to operate" meet, there must be change. No matter how good your Lodge does the Ritual, it won't help offset the cost of doing business.

I hope the discussion of having a common building on the West side continues. This is a "must" for the future of Masonry West of Rochester. My recent suggestion to my Etolian Brothers was to go it alone if no other Lodge was willing to join in. Should this happen, and if the ground work is done well, the others will want a part in this undertaking. The

There is much to learn about this great Craft of ours. But where does one go to find more information?

 Start with your local public library. There are books about the Craft in the local library system, I know, I've looked.

Get together with knowledgeable Brethren, there are many available.

 Join a Masonic research society like the Philalethes or a research Lodge like the American Lodge of Research.

 Request a reading program from the Robert L. Livingston Library and Museum at Grand Lodge.

Start a study group. What a unique idea.

 Attend District sponsored educational events like the Leadership Development Course.

For more information on any of these points, contact a member of the Bureau of Masonic Education. The officers are listed in the District Directory. Don't have a Directory? They are available from the Masonic Service Bureau.


Like I said, I don't know and it has me wondering, what is going on out there?



Currently, Etolian Lodge itself is the largest single share owner, holding about 20% of the outstanding shares. The 80% ownership issue must be cleared up before any progress can be made toward fulfilling Etolian's future building

Toward that end I am asking all Brothers that hold any outstanding shares in the Temple Association to donate them back to the Blue Lodge in the name of all Brethren and fellows who have passed this way before them. In this way, together we can ensure that the Brothers who follow us will be able to take full advantage of any opportunities which enable Etolian to continue to flourish. "


Most recent deaths are Don Shoemaker and Paul Weller. We extend our sincerest sympathy to their family and friends.

Don't forget to check your dues cards. We still have 15 Brothers who have not paid dues for 1999. If your dues card says 1998, you are going delinquent.


Dates to remember


Lodge leadership


Before parting


THE Party 2000





room large enough to hold special events, perhaps a kitchen and dining area, all at ground level with a private exterior access as well as doors to the corridors of the mall. Ancillary organizations could join with the basic Lodge groups (Eastern Star, youth associations, Royal Arch Chapters, Council, and others).

Greece has a Continuing Education Center in the theater wing that looks like it might have the right amount of square footage.

The mall has lighted, flat surfaced parking lots, which are maintained and that includes snow removal. 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

many forms ranging from single extra beats sensed as occasional palpitations to totally uncoordinated contractions known as fibrillation. Fibrillation of the upper chambers of the heart (atria) usually leads to a fast somewhat irregular heart rate, accompanied by fatigue, chest discomfort and, in people with coronary disease, anginal pain. Fibrillation of the main pumping chambers (ventricles) is a bit more serious in that it leads to death unless reversed in a timely manner. Between these two extremes exist a wide variety of irregular rhythms that impact on the quality of our lives and in some cases are life-threatening.

Detection of an arrhythmia, the most important first step in dealing with the problem, is at times easier said than done. Physicians have a number of tools in their armamentarium to tackle this problem.

The most important is the electrocardiogram of ECG. This wonderful device records the electrical activity generated by the heart at the body surface. You may recall from our discussion in Part I of this series, that although the heart is a muscular pump, each of its beats is initiated and finely regulated by electrical activity generated by the flow of ions across the cardiac cell. The humps and bumps recorded by the ECG provide your doctor a wealth of information about the condition of your heart. It can tell him whether your heart is functioning normally or alternatively, whether you heart is beating too fast, too slow or unevenly. If it is beating too slow, the ECG will reveal whether this is due to a problem with your primary pacemaker, the sinus node, or the "gatekeeper" that controls the flow of impulses in the atria or ventricles and provide the physician some clue as to the mechanism of the tachycardia (fast rate), flutter (very fast rate) or fibrillation (ultrafast rate due to disorganization of the electrical impulse leading to uncoordinated contractions). The ECG will also reveal whether a patient may have suffered a heart attack recently or at some time in the past and whether a congenital heart defect should be suspected. Electrocardiograms can even predict whether a drug like erythromycin, a widely prescribed antibiotic, may be life threatening to individual people. Although medical science and ECG interpretation have advanced considerably in recent years, our understanding of the ECG remains incomplete and is one of the areas of study at the MMRL.

One of the principal difficulties in dealing with arrhythmias is the ability to catch up with them, for they are often elusive, appearing for short periods of time and then subsiding for hours, days, weeks or even months. Although infrequent, they may be troublesome causing occasional dizzy spells as in the case of paroxysmal tachycardia and may even be deadly as in the case of ventricular fibrillation (sudden death) or Torsade de Pointes. The physician has additional tools at his disposal to detect these isolated events and when necessary to provoke them. The first of these is non-invasive and involves the attachment of several stick-on electrodes to the chest wall which are then connected to a Holter moni-



tor. This device is a miniaturized portable ECG recorder generally worn for a period of 24 to 48 hours. Data are recorded on small cassette tapes which are analyzed at the doctor's office, or clinic. Holter monitors detect arrhythmias that are intermittent but frequent, but are unlikely to detect those that appear once a week or once a month. This limitation is circumvented by devices call event recorders which are miniaturized ECG recorders worn for much longer periods and activated by the patient when symptoms occur. These units not only record the ECG but are capable of transmitting it to the physician over the telephone.

When these methodologies fail to detect suspected arrhythmias, the physician may resort to an electrophysiological (EP) study. This procedure is usually recommended for patients who have previously experienced lifethreatening events. An EP study involves the insertion of a cathode electrode into the heart through either an artery or vein in the groin, arm or neck. Electrical impulses are introduced through the electrode to stimulate the heart and provoke the arrhythmia. Recordings of local activity within the heart may be obtained with the same or different electrode to localize the region of troublesome activity. Drugs may be tested during the EP study to assess their ability to prevent the induction of the arrhythmia. Alternatively, a special catheter may be introduced into the heart to destroy the tissue that is giving rise to the erratic electrical activity by using radiofrequency energy to heat the tip of the electrode. Known as catheter ablation, this procedure has gained considerable popularity as the procedure of choice in the treatment of a variety arrhythmias, including AV nodal tachcardia and the Wolf-Parkinson-White syndrome.

These diagnostic procedures and therapeutic modalities are available today because of many years of painstaking research conducted at medical research laboratories worldwide. Among the laboratories that have contributed fundamentally to our present day knowledge of cardia electrophysiology and arrhythmias is the Masonic Medical Research Laboratory. For nearly forty years, scientists at the MMRL have worked to define the function of the heart in both health and disease. On-going research continues to focus on the mechanisms of arrhythmias, how they can be prevented and controlled; how drugs like erythromycin can produce them and

what the various waves in the ECG are trying to tell us. In coming segments of this series, I hope to expand on specific arrythmias, their causes, treatments and, in some cases, cures.

Part IV

Ventricular Tachycardia and Fibrillation

Like the beating of distant drums, your heart modulates its pace, adjusting to environmental and physical demands by slowing down and speeding up. Occasionally, it goes into a frenzy, beating out of control, racing against time for no good reason. As discussed in Part III of this series, this type of cardiac arrhythmia is referred to as a ventricular tachycardia (VT). It is most frequently observed after a heart attack, in otherwise diseased or scarred hearts, and occasionally in apparently normal and healthy hearts. In most cases, VT is due to a shortcircuiting of electrical activity within the ventricles of the heart, thus giving rise to a circular movement of the electrical wave. This mechanism, known as reentry, continuously re-excites the heart, causing it to beat at rapid rates. In some indivuduals, VT is caused via a "focal" mechanism involving a rapid and repeated firing of a small group of abnormal "pacemaker" cells within the ventricles of the heart. In the latter case, the arrhythmias are often very sensitive to the sympathetic nervous sustem activity and to various stimulants.

Ventricular Tachcardia, when relatively slow and regular, may occur without symptoms. At more rapid and/or irregular rates, VT usually produces symptoms in the form of palpitations, presyncope (dizziness) and syncope (fainting spells). The dizziness and fainting spells occur because the pumping chambers do not have sufficient time to fill with blood and as a consequence are inefficient in pumping blood to the brain and other organs of the body. The ECG will alert your physician as to how dangerous the arrhythmia may be. If the ECG signals attending each beat of the tachycardia are similar in size or shape, the tachycardia is said to be monomorphic. In contrast, when the signals are of varying amplitude and shape, the arrhythmia is said to be polymorphic. Generally speaking, the latter is more likely to be life-threatening. The danger of a rapid polymorphic tachycardia is that it can degenerate into ventricular fibrillation (VF), which is the principal cause of sudden death. Although a heart in VF beats at an extemely rapid rate, it is useless as a pump because the contractions are uncoordinated.

Treatment of VT depends on the cause. When secondary to a focal or discrete reentry mechanism, ablation therapy may be able to prevent the arrhythmia, using radiofrequency energy to burn the abnormal pacemaker or the troublesome tissue that allows reentry to develop. In some cases, antiarrhythmic drugs, such as amiodarone, beta-adrenergic blockers (propranolol), potassium and sodium channel blockers, may be helpful. In the case of life-threatening arrhythmias, the first line treatment is an Implantable Cardioverter Defribillator (ICD). This is a device that senses when the heart goes into ventricular fibrillation and automatically delivers a shock to restore normal rhythm. These marvelous devicxes have dramatically changed the treatment of arrhythmias over the past decade and have extended the lives of hundreds of thousands of people.

In some cases, an ICD may be used in conjunction with anti-arrhythmic drugs to limit the number of times that the device is activated.

VT/VF occurring in apparently normal hearts has been the subject of intense study over the past 5 years. These studies have demonstrated the existence of primary electrical disease caused by defects in specific ion channels. The heart is otherwise normal in structure and function. One form of this type of disease is called the long QT syndrome (LQTS), because the QT interval in the ECG is prolonged in patients afflicted with this problem. It is hereditary and has now been linked to a genetic defect in one of four different ion channel genes that contain the genetic message for three different ion channels (potassium and sodium channels). The ion channel defects give rise to the development of a polymorphic tachycardia which can degenerate to ventricular fibrillation. The syndrome tragically takes the lives of teenagers and young adults. Children and young adults excperiencing one or more syncope events, are usually fully evaluated to rule out LQTS. The genetic definition of the disease has made possible the development of gene-specific therapy. While many patients are protected by use of beta-blockers, others require ICDs. Studies currently underway are examining the therapeutic value of sodium channel blockers like mexiletine in the three gentic forms of the diseases, based on recent reports from the MMRL.

Another type of primary electrical disease, recently discovered, is known as the Brugada Syndrome. Like LQTS, the Brugada Syndrome has been

linked to a defect in the sodium channel gene. A very rapid polymorphic tachycardia develops in these patients, causing them to pass out. In some cases sudden death is the first symptom. This too is an hereditary disease whose incidence is highest in individuals of Southeast Asian origin.

For reasons that physicians and scientists do not as yet understand, the disease often lies dormant for three to four decades before emerging to rear its ugle head. The average age of death of Brugada patients is 39. ICDs are indicated in patients who have previously experienced syncope or who have been resuscitated from sudden death. Recent work from the Masonic Medical Research Laboratory has suggested a new pharmacological approach to therapy using "transient out-ward current" blockers. This pharmacologic alternative may be critically important in many parts of the world where ICDs are not affordable.

The knowledge that has made these diagnostic procedures and therapeutic measurers available emanated from decades of painstaking research conducted at medical research laboratories thoughout the world. Among the laboratories contributing fundamentally to our present day knowledge of cardiac electrophysiology and cardiac arrhythmias is the Masonic Medical Research Laboratory. For forty years, scientists at the MMRL have contributed to our understanding of the function of the heart in both health and disease. On-going research continues to focus on cardiac arrhythmias, the single largest mechanism of death of Americans. In coming segments of this series, I will expand on other arrhythmias, their causes, treatments and cures.

Answer: The Blue Lodges of the District in which the Council functions do.



So, my Companions, let us support our Lodges and make every effort possible to increase membership in them, and promote a healthy York Rite.



EMESSAY NOTES

Who was Chancellor Livingston?

For those who might not know, Robert L. Livingston was named the first Chancellor of New York and in that position administered the oath of office to George Washington upon his inauguration as first President of the United States on April 30, 1789 in New York City.

He later became US Minister to France and negotiated the Louisiana Purchase for the United States. Later, teaming with Robert Fulton, they built a steamboat called the *Clermont*, which reached the then incredible speed of 5 m.p.h..

He also introduced merino sheep into communities West of the Hudson River and that is his connection to the Sheep Industry.

Chancellor Livingston was a member of Union Lodge, NYC, and was the first Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of New York, serving from 1784 until 1801.

Open Letter Regarding Proposed Changes in Shrine Law to Remove Masonic Membership Prerequisites

The proposal presented by Shrine Imperial Potentate Ralph W. Semb at the Conference of Grand Masters of North America on February 22, 2000, would allow non-Masons to become Shriners. If approved, such action would destroy the intent of the 13 Masons who founded the Mystic Shrine and break the Shrine's traditionally strong link with Freemasonry.

Over the years, the various Masonic-related organizations have worked together to promote the basic philosophy of the fraternity. There has been a common bond within all these groups. That bond is Freemasonry. Masons have been proud to be Shriners, and Shriners have been proud to be Masons.

For several decades, fraternal and civic organizations — Masonic and non-Masonic alike — have suffered from declining membership as individuals attempted to ignore the need for common values and close association with others. It is particularly important at this time that Masonic groups maintain strong ties and find ways to build a stronger fraternity. No link can survive on its own.

On behalf of our Supreme Councils, we, the Sovereign Grand Commanders of the Southern and Northern Masonic Jurisdictions, urge a continued unwavering adherence to Masonic unity. We cannot afford to divide Freemasonry.

We commend the Imperial Potentate for the courage to focus Masonic attention on the urgency of the need to remedy the membership issue. We believe the answer lies in strengthening the Craft, not diluting our solidarity.

We pledge our full support to a national, unified Masonic effort to reverse the current trends and rebuild our Craft and our society for the future. Should the Imperial Council leadership pick up that standard, we will do everything in our power to close ranks with the Shrine to promote Freemasonry for the benefit of all.




