Masons Augment D.A.R.E. Program

Late last year an article that appeared in the Rochester "Democrat and Chronicle" struck a nerve in one of our Brothers. It was a story about a young girl in the city, who had found a used, abandoned needle along the side of the road. Not knowing what it was, she accidentally stuck herself with the needle. This initiated a barrage of testing and medication for this little girl,

since it was uncertain what possible diseases were present in the needle (to prevent her from the possible diseases a dirty needle could possible carry with it).

Brother Andy Alvarez was so touched by this incident that he contact the Ogden Police Department early this year to inquire if they had need for a needle awareness section included into their DARE Program. Officer Steve Brown, who is the Director of the Ogden Police DARE Program, told Andy that they had thought about including this in their program, but lacked any creative ideas.

The two men put their heads together and developed a plan. Officer Brown suggested a display case for different types of needles. This would visually demonstrate to the kids what they looked like, and therefore, what to avoid. A display case was designed and built, with the help of some skilled workers from Eastman Kodak Co. The display was presented to Officer Brown and the Ogden Police Department in September, for use in their DARE Program.

This is only the first stage of their project. A poster contest is being planned that will warn kids of the dangers of needles. Awards will be presented for the best

In early 1945, I was assigned to a service unit outside Fount-ainbleau, France. Not long afterward, the Commanding Officer made an effort to let those of us who were Masons know that on a particular Sunday there would be transportation to Paris for us to attend ceremonies of the reopening of the Grand Lodge of France.

Masonry throughout Europe was under great stress while Hitler was in power. He hated the Order and its members. Knowing this, members hid their records and properties, and Lodges simply disappeared. After the country was cleared of Germans, activities in the Craft began to happen, and soon plans were afoot to re-open the Grand Lodge with a special ceremony.

We were some distance from Paris, so it was necessary to leave by truck before 6:00 a.m., well before breakfast time. I was fortunate to have a small chocolate bar, which slowly became my breakfast.

We arrived at a building somewhat like a church, with high ceilings and many stone pillars. I found myself in a crowd of men and officers wearing the uniforms of France, Belgium, England, Canada, the United States and even Brazil! I recall there were many Generals in the crowd. It was emotionally overwhelming!

Ceremonies began promptly at 9:00 a.m., and in French, but

Camping anyone?

You can do so in a somewhat rustic setting at Camp DeMolay. Contact Service Bureau Executive Director, Vern Goodrich, at 473-4351, to see if your group qualifies. Lodge and Chapter groups, church groups, and Scout groups are among those that use or could use the Camp for a retreat, for example, or a family reunion. There is a glade in the lower level of the campgrounds where the DeMolay has conferred Degrees, and where Lodges could do the same in a private, outdoor setting. Put a guard at the driveway entrance and you have a sufficient level of security.

As a reminder, the Camp is on the shore of Lake Ontario and there's a sign at the entrance from the highway, seen within a mile or two West of Sodus Point. On the 18 acres of grounds, you'll find a main lodge building, which can be heated from the large fireplace in the center of the main room. An equipped kitchen provides all that's needed to cook up some group meals. A porch is expected to be completed by the start of the Summer season in 2001 and it faces the lake. Picture big rockers (we don't have those yet), or even some lawn chairs for casual relaxation as the evening wears on.

You then have the choice of retiring to one of the buildings equipped with frames on which to place mattresses or sleeping bags, up to a dozen in each, or setting up your tent or camper on the grounds. There's plenty of open grassy area to accommodate such amenities.

A couple of other buildings feature sinks, toilets and shower stalls and there is hot and cold running water. You don't have to trek down the slope to the lake or heat water in pails, or look for the half-moon door to a small building.

Several of your staunch Masonic Brothers have taken on the Camp as their volunteer project and among the most frequent workers in the quarries of Camp DeMolay are Bill Hook, Tom Paglia, Richard Snyder, and Rene VanDeVeire. Others join them from time to time and all are welcome to contact Vern or Bill to set up time to join with them for project work. Vern checks the site frequently to review work progress on behalf of the members of the Service Bureau and to provide general oversight for steady improvements, or as much as funds will permit.

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

There were more officers than enlisted men, but I do not recall anyone saluting! We were all on the level. The program went on until almost noon, when it was announced refreshments would be served on the lower level, to which we repaired hoping to find food. We should have known better! What we found was champagne! Now I can tell you that having had no solid food for 18 hours, save for the little chocolate bar, champagne is something you do not need much of!

Many years later I obtained the address of the Grand Lodge of France, and wrote them to determine if there might be the possibility of obtaining a copy of the record of this celebration, and perhaps a picture of the building. By reply, I learned there had been no printed program at the event, so no copy was available. Also, I was told they had occupied several buildings since that event and could give me no help with my

Not long after that I was assigned to a small group in special services. Our job was to provide movies every evening, schedule and advertise special events and services for the troops in the area. We also published a weekly news letter, with news of interest to the

Shortly we obtained a "library", prepared by the military and sent to us in wooden boxes that became the library shelves. Boxes of paperback books, both fiction and nonfiction, arrived regularly, and were soon snapped up by GI's hungry to read. The basic library had many hard cover books which served as references. I always wondered about one which was an English/Chinese-Chinese/English Dictionary. Having no pictures it was the least opened! Now why was that included in a library in France? There were biographies, books on nature, art, and many other topics. There were dictionaries and other reference books. We took over a small shop near the center of town which became the library, with regular hours and lots of "customers". Nobody in our group wanted the job of li-

the detail. Lucky me! I soon learned this meant I had to go to school in Paris to learn how to handle this assignment. So off I went, and found myself registered in the Cite' Universitaire. As it turned out, this was the week the Germans surrendered!

Well! There we were, and shortly rumors were floating about that the Germans were seeking to surrender. The CO called us together and promised us he would keep us informed as to the situation. Meanwhile we were to continue with classes as scheduled, and no one was to leave. We kept to our assignment, and true to his word, the next day he announced that yes, surrender had taken place, and passes were issued to each of us, good for 48

In less than an hour the place was deserted, and we all moved into the city to find people everywhere, crowded into streets seemingly unable to hold even one more person. The only movement was lines within the crowds, moving slowly, helter skelter in crooked ways to other crowded streets with other lines.

The Place de l' Opera was jammed tight. (It was nearby that the French underground had a headquarters during the occupation.) The Place de la Concorde was an opportunity for some to try swimming in the fountains, and the square in front of Notre Dame Cathedral, built by operative masons, had suffered some damage from rifle fire and was a special attraction. The area of the Arc de Triomphe was drawing hundreds of people from all twelve streets radiating from that "Place of the Star", the Champs Elysees, all the way to the Place de la Concorde, was solid with people rejoicing the surrender.

As it grew dark, even more people crowded the streets until it seemed there wasn't room for even one more person. People moved only as the crowd moved, for there was no alternative. Then the lights came on, with two scarchlights forming a huge V for victory. Unforgettable! The shouts of the crowd were deafening! How fortunate I was to be a part of this celebration!

Each member of our small group was allowed one day off each week, and since transportation to Paris was always available from the motor pool, I went to see the sights, to walk the streets, visit places of interest and even attend an occasional concert. I soon discovered the Grand Lodge of New York had established a retreat in a store opposite the famous Moulin Rouge. Here was provided coffee, writing paper and envelopes, maps of the city and information on what to see and do, and how to get from here to there. Since there it all was, and there I was, I determined to see as much as possible while I could. Meals were not a problem, for the American Red Cross established centers to serve GI's for a few cents a meal.

So I went sightseeing. Of course their churches were not to be missed as well as Napoleon's Tomb. (It needed dusting!) I visited the famous Paris School of Music, where I was escorted through their museum by an elderly French gentleman who, although he could not speak English, helped me to understand the wonderful things I was seeing. This school is where for centuries, many of our most famous composers and instrumentalists have studied, and their collection of historical instruments is truly amazing.

One must visit the Louvre, especially to see the paintings of the masters in their collection. When the Germans wanted to steal this art, much was loaded on a train which was moved from one switch yard to another, never to leave the area! Much of the art simply disappeared, secretly sent by the French to salt mines where it remained hidden throughout the occupation. Only a few knew where it went, and it never left France!

I do have one regret about these visits. I had forgotten LaFayette, and wish I had remembered so I could have visited his grave. In the early 1800's, following a triumphful tour of the States, he returned to France with baggage which included a trunk, its contents a mystery. When he died, the trunk was opened and found to contain earth from the United States. (The earth came from Bunker Hill-World Book Encyclopedia). Earth of a free nation! This was spread in his tomb, and according to his wishes, he rests on that soil. RIP, Brother LaFayette. So mote

Report to Grand Lodge

Over many years, this Grand Lodge Committee has shown concern for the veterans who have served our country. Accordingly, our primary commitment has been to serve the veterans who are hospitalized in VA Medical Centers in New York State. We participate in the voluntary

service programs in each of thirteen facilities: Batavia, Bronx. Brooklyn, Buffalo, Canandaigua, Castle Point, Montrose, Manhattan, Northport, Syracuse and St. Albans. We also service four New York State veterans nursing homes in Batavia, Oxford, St. Albans and Stony Brook.

Your dedicated Representatives, Deputies and their volunteers devote many hours to bedside visits and bring comforts and gifts to the hospitalized veterans. These representatives are also actively involved at these sites in all activities planned by the Veteran's Affairs Voluntary Service (VAVS), which include: Chapel services, baseball games, special events, Bingo parties, birthday parties, tours, dinner parties, and outdoor bar-b-ques. These are just some of the activities planned for our veterans.

Through your contributions to the Brotherhood Fund, monies are made available to purchase and distribute to hospitalized veterans a variety of necessities and comforts. In most instances, the recipients are aware that the items were given, compliments of the Masons of the State of New York.

The Veterans Service Committee manned a booth together with the Masonic War Veterans on St. John's Day at Utica, and distributed Masonic materials from the MSA.

In September, 1999, we brought our team of Representatives and Deputies together for a seminar in Tarrytown, and discussed our goals and shared ideas for the ensuing year. All were agreed that our main objective was to increase the number of volunteers for visits to hospitals. Participants also agreed that a marked down-sizing of veterans hospitals was taking place. New outpatient clinics were opening throughout the State. Clinics are staffed by various VA Centers.

With the approval of the Grand Master, we observed Veterans Hospital Visitation Day on November 7, 1999. Through a joint effort of the Committee, the Masonic War Veterans, under the leadership of Commander General, Ray Alvarez, and the ladies of the Eastern Star, this day proved to be a huge success at many of the VA facilities.

The support from the Commander General was quite evident by the presence of Grand Post and Masonic Posts at many VA facilities. It should be noted that Sunday, November 5th, is designated as the next Veterans Hospital Visitation Day.

The Committee considered servicing the family members of New York State Masons in the US Armed Forces. This information was provided to the Empire State Mason magazine.

One third of the Masonic year has past. The programs of the Worshipful Masters should be running smoothly. The Master is becoming more and more comfortable with his new authority. The Lodge Officers know their parts of the Ritual, and they know what the Worshipful Master expects of them: to assist him in governing the Lodge. Sounds simple, doesn't it? Well, it is not as easy as it appears. Actually, the Worshipful Master is responsible for more than just the harmony of his own Lodge. He represents his Lodge on both the District and State level for various committees and programs. It is also his job to choose the representatives from his Lodge to work with the District and State Chairmen of those programs.

If you are an officer in your Lodge, working your way to the East, ask your Worshipful Master when he started preparing for his year as Master. Then ask him when he thinks you should start preparing for your year. We're sure that he will tell you that if you wait until you are elected, or installed, your rm in office may become filled with frustration and to make matters worse, there may be confusion within the Craft. You will spend your entire year trying to play "catch up" and determine what wentwrong. To avoid this unfortunate situation, you should start planningyouryearas Mastersomewhere between Senior Deacon and Junior Warden. This is the period of time when you should start studying your Worshipful Master, drawing knowledge from his experiences and focus on his successes. The job of Master is far from an easy one, but when planned correctly, it can be one of the most rewarding times of your life.

Grand Lodge has developed a program to help Lodge officers prepare for their time as Masters of their Lodges. The program is called the "Road to the East". It is designed to educate Brethren on the different aspects of becoming the Masters of their Lodges.

Think of it as a prospective Master's seminar. Some of the subjects the attendees will learn are:

The structures of Grand Lodge, it's committees and programs.

How to choose the right chairman to represent your Lodge on these committees.

What you should expect from your own elected and appointed officers, and their roles in supporting you, as Master.

How to effectively communicate with your Lodge Brethren, and your District.

How to plan and execute a Lodge meeting effectively. This includes normal Lodge protocol as well as those difficult situations, i.e., how to handle a heated discussion among the Brethren.

Lodge communications and officer's meetings.

How and when to wield the gavel of authority.

By attending the "Road to the East" seminars, you will learn all of these and more. The only requirements are a \$10 registration fee, a copy of the "24 Inch Gauge", and a time commitment of three Saturday morning seminars, each lasting 4 hours. The dates of this year's seminars are December 2nd, January 6th, and February 3rd. Each session will start promptly at 8:00 a.m., and end by 12 noon. The location of the seminars will be Phoenix Lodge, Dansville, NY. The program this year will include Brethren from the five District surrounding the Monroe District. This gives the coordinators the advantage of drawing on a wider range of experiences and ideas.

Each Lodge should already own a copy of the current "24 Inch Gauge" for your use during the Course, and as a reference for all of your Lodge officers. If they do not have a current copy, one can be obtained by having your Lodge secretary contact Grand Lodge Sales.

If you hold an officer's position in your Lodge, you would be wise to attend these sessions. If you are a Brother who would like to learn what it takes to coordinate a full year being the Master of a Lodge, you, too, should attend these sessions. There are Lodges that believe that this Course is so essential in preparing their officers to govern their Lodge, that their By-Laws have been amended to make it a requirement for their officers to take before becoming Master of that Lodge.

We assure you that not only will you enjoy the Brotherhood of many other officers who attend these seminars, but the bottom line is you will be ready to become a well prepared, well organized Master of your Lodge. Your Lodge Brethren will enjoy the benefits of your knowledge and efforts, and you will look back on your term of office with the pride of knowing that you did the best job possible as the Master of your Lodge.

order to correct this situation the first session in October was cancelled. The new 1st Degree instruction for LSOME will take



The Schools of Ritual for the rest of this Masonic year will be: November 30th-2st Degree-



The Masonic Times Editor recently wrote that a Lodge currently receiving this publication will cease having it sent to the Lodge's Brothers. The Lodge did a survey and found that 12 Brothers, out of 65, wanted the Masonic Times. This disturbs me very much because one of the primary ways we retain members in this Fraternity is by communicating with them. The Masonic Times is the best tool we have for communicating to the membership in the Monroe District

the Monroe District.

Over the years, I have listened to discussions about how much money can be saved. We can publish our own newsletter, we can use the phone, e-mail or word-of-mouth to communicate with our Brothers. I have heard all the ideas on how to replace this publication. Instead of alternatives to the Masonic Times, all of the above ideas should be used in addition to the Masonic Times and not to replace this news paper.

this newspaper.

How much money will be saved by our members? Usually the cost of the Times is part of a Lodge's dues. The Masonic Times costs a Lodge \$4.00 a year per subscription for 10 issues. Let me see, my math isn't that great, but I am pretty sure that works out to 40 cents per month, or a little over one penny per day. Yeah, a Lodge and its members will save a ton of money there.

Instead, most of us spend 50 cents a day, even more on a Sunday, for a local newspaper that will not publish any news about any fraternal organization, especially about Masons. When did you read anything in the local newspaper about \$14,000 in scholarships for area students, \$14,000 for area charities, thousands of dollars raised for the Ronald McDonald House, and Masonic participation in raising funds for Channel 21, just to mention a few. We don't even think

about dropping a few bucks on the lottery every week, but don't worry, we will be saving 40 cents a month because we don't receive the Masonic Times anymore.

Then there is my favorite solution. A Lodge can drop the Masonic Times and produce its own newsletter. Who needs to read about what is going on in other Lodges, other Masonic organizations, from our District leaders, R.-W.-. Bill Lindsay and his Staff Officers, R.-W.-. Cliff Short and R.-W.-. Jim De Lorenzo, from R.-W.-. Maurice Solomon writing about the correct way to do the Ritual, from writers on advice concerning investments and legal matters?

Let's see, 33 cents to mail it, cost of paper and copying, not to mention someone's time. Whoops, there goes the profit. We produce a few newsletters, a light goes on, and the newsletter stops. Then communicating stops. Results? Another reason for a Brother to drop membership. But, not to worry about a Brother dropping out, we saved \$4.00 per year, 40 cents a month, and a little more than a penny a day.

A paraphrase from the 2nd Degree Charge: No Lodge can become a place of prosperous growth whose leaders care little and do less for its advancement.¹²


crimsons, russets, and yellows of October. Our sports change from something "played on a field" to one "contested on a gridiron".

Brotherhood Fund




Poll results

Sadness







Q. While at my Lodge the other night, a number of Grand Lodge Officers were received individually. The Lodge was raised on their entrance, and each received Grand Honors. Isn't this a time consuming practice, considering there might be a large number of visiting Grand Lodge Officers?

A. Grand Lodge provides each Lodge with copies of the "Officers Training Guide", and the question you raised is covered fairly adequately. First of all, Grand Lodge Officers, with the exception of the Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, and DDGM, may be, and it is suggested they should be, received collectively in a group, made up of:

a. Elected Grand Line Officers. b. Appointed Grand Line Officers

c. Appointed Grand Lodge Staff Officers.


Past Grand Masters may also be received collectively as a group.

Each group should, of course, be received separately. The Lodge is raised only on the entrance of Past Grand Masters and Elected Grand Line Officers. On the entrance of appointed Grand Line Officers, or appointed Grand Lodge Staff Officers, the Lodge is not raised until these Officers are received in the East, when the Master should raise the Lodge and accord Grand Honors.

Q. I was somewhat surprised to hear the DDGM addressed as "Brother Bill". Is this correct?

A. No, it certainly is not. Masonry, like other organizations, has an etiquette all of its own. An individual Mason should always be addressed as Brother, unless he has a title, such as Worshipful, Right Worshipful, etc. There is no such title as Worshipful Sir. To address the DDGM as Brother Bill, or for that matter, any Grand Lodge Officer, is considered Masonically improper. (I should, of course, acknowledge that "Brother" is also a title.)

A very urgent call came from a lady at around 7:00 p.m. saying, "Part of the house lighting is out and my husband received a shock while trying to change a light bulb on the porch, and there are two young children living here." So I hopped into the truck and as I was pulling out of the driveway, the thunder and lightening started with a downpour of rain, and the visibility was only about 20 feet.

Arriving there, the rain had not stopped. You can imagine how wet I got while trying to get to the house. I asked her to explain what the the problem was. After her explanation, I went to the basement to check the panel box. No breakers were tripped. I removed the cover to check all the breakers because sometimes breakers get lazy and stop functioning correctly. All were in good shape. Going upstairs, I started to remove wall outlets and switches. Everything looked all right. I went to where she said her husband received a shock and removed the fixture. You can bet I had safety gloves on. The floor was wet, but there was no prob-

One hour had gone by, but I still hadn't located the problem. I then noticed the TV was playing, so I went over to that outlet and started to remove it from the outlet box when all of the lights went on. Sometimes the living room is split up into two separate circuits and this can fool you when trouble shooting.

The outlet contained three white wires, which indicated they were neutral, to complete the circuit. Whomever did the job did not use a pigtail, as required, to connect the three wires and then put just one wire under the connection screw. Instead, two wires were inserted into the stab-in holes in the back of the outlet and the third wire in the place where you push to release the wires. This last wire had become loose and was causing overheating because of the poor connection. It had burned back at least three inches.

The power was going through the light fixtures and coming back through the ground wire, not through the neutral wire like it should. I rewired all the outlets with pigtails and installed new grounding outlets, then everything worked the way it should.

For many years professionals have argued against using stabins connections because the part that holds the wire becomes weakened from overloading and good contact is interrupted and overheating results causing a possible fire. Always secure the wire, mind you I did not say wires, under a screw when available. When you have more than one wire going to the same screw, always use a pigtail with the proper size wire nut to insure proper connection.

Remember what it says on a penny? "In God We Trust". This is what you are doing when you do not make proper connections. All other utilities in the house can cause damage which is repairable, but improper wiring, however, destroys.

cally or mentally able to respond to any type of request or question. Boy, were we wrong! Hunter lets us know when he wants to reply "yes" by intentionally blinking his eyes. We have learned was exposed to many new adventures, like checking out books at the Attica Library with his first library card, shopping at Wal-Mart, swinging on swings at the playground, the aquarium, the zoo, and petting horses at the farm; just to name a few. He was on the go!



through practice with patience, that Hunter can tell us what he wants, if we just ask him. He wants to make his own decisions and tell us what he wants or doesn't want and what he likes or dislikes. When he comes down to watch his morning movies, we ask him what he wants to watch. Usually it's "Stuart Little", "Little Bear" or "Franklin". When he has some free time we ask him what he wants to do-go for a walk, read books, go swimming (at Grandma's house, of course) draw and color, school time or snuggle-and he tells us.

Instead of giving him a choice, we made the choice for him. Now we leave it up to him. He lets us know. How awesome!

We have started investigating communication devices and computer options, so that we can further help Hunter Communicate. Eventually we hope he will actually talk in full sentences through computerized voice response. Just as God promised, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." We know where Hunter gets his strength.

Hunter's weight has stayed about the same ranging anywhere between 20 and 22 pounds. However, he is growing so tall. He was measured on his 3rd birthday and is 33 inches long.

Physical and occupational therapy have been increased to six hourly sessions a week. We are planning to increase physical therapy to two-hour sessions, because he has been responding so wonderfully to his therapy. Hunter is now able to enjoy belly lying and his Tri-stander. The Tristander has actually been a treat for all of us. Hunter tends to show off while standing in his stander by pulling his head forward and holding his head up all by himself. It's amazing how determined he is.

Another one of Hunter's favorite activities is playing the small portable piano. We place both of his hands on the keys and when he's ready to play he pulls his arms back and plays a tune. You can tell that he is really concentrating on each movement. Every time he plays a key we clap and praise him. He loves it!

When it comes to story time and school, Hunter is so smart. In addition to teaching him the alphabet and numbers, we try to quiz him to see what he has learned.

Winter '99/Spring 2000 was an eventful season for Hunter. When Grandma and Aunt Dodi planned Hunter's schedule, he Hunter's favorite place (besides home and Grandma's house) is the horse farm. Hunter made a very special friend this year-a beautiful dark chestnut brown horse named Bambie. Their friendship is so incredible and real. Whenever you mention Bambie's name or show Hunter pictures of her, he gets so excited. Bambie is generally a pretty bold and sometimes frisky horse. However, when Hunter is in her presence she is gentle, calm and obedient. It is so beautiful to see them

Another big change for Hunter in 2000 was his feeding system. We decided for a number of reasons to go from the G-tube (a tube where both medicine and food go into his stomach) to the JG-tube (a tube where medicine goes directly into his stomach and food directly into his small intestine). This change has made a world of difference in Hunter's life. Reflux aspiration was one of Hunter's biggest problems, that caused him to suffer from pneumonia many times. However, with his new JG-tube the risk of aspiration has greatly decreased. In fact, Hunter has only had pneumonia once this year and he very seldom refluxes. Another benefit to the JG-tube is Hunter's increased playtime. With the Gtube, Hunter spent half of his waking hours waiting to play because of this feeding schedule. Now he can be moved anytime and fed anytime and anywhere. This frees him up to do more exercise and lots of fun activities.

Hunter is an amazing teacher. We have learned more about kindness, gentleness, patience, God's grace, and love from him, than any other person we know. God is not finished with our Hunter Boy. We believe he still as a lot more to teach us, and many more lives to touch.

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
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

I would like to share with all the members of the Valley of Rochester the following information regarding our rich Scottish Rite Programs. This information is taken from Supreme Council literature and is condensed for your convenience. Having personally visited The Museum of Our National Heritage on numerous occasions, I highly recommend each of you, if you have the opportunity, to do the same. I'm sure you'll find it interesting.

The Museum of Our National Heritage is an American history museum founded and supported by 32° Scottish Rite Freemasons in the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction of the United States of America as one of four charitable endeavors. The Museum is located on the grounds of the Supreme Council Headquarters at 33 Marrett Road (Rte. 2A), Lexington, MA 02421. Within the Museum is The Heritage Shop where you can buy reproductions, souvenirs, gifts, and books.

Founded in 1975, as part of the Museum, the VanGorden-Williams Library is a research library specializing in American Freemasonry. The original collection consisted of the holdings of the Supreme Council's collection has been augmented over the years by pur-

chases and donations, including the acquisition of several notable private libraries. The Van Gorden-Williams Library now boasts one of the most comprehensive collections on American Masonry in the world, comprising nearly 60,000 books and 360 serial titles, as well as a sizable collection of documents maintained in the Library's archives.

The Library is open to the public Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday, 10:00 a.m. - 4:45 p.m. Materials may not be checked out, but limited photocopying service is available.

Because the Museum exhibitions change regularly, you always experience something new. The Museum is open seven days a week with free admission and parking.

For example: "Initiating America: Three Centuries of Lodge Life" is an ongoing exhibit that examines the fascinating and sometimes bewildering secret societies that were formed to offer fellowship, aid and self-improvement to their members. The exhibition also traces the evolution of these organizations from their beginnings to the present day. Freemasonry, in particular, is examined in depth in "Initiating America".

Since its opening in 1975, the Museum has become the premier American repository of Masonic and Fraternal items. Highlights of the exhibition include Masonic jewels, fine decorative arts, fraternal regalia, and ceremonial implements. Formally established in the early 18th Century, Freemasonry is the earliest Fraternal Organization in America and it provided the model by which most other fraternal organizations patterned themselves. "Initiating America" reveals how the rituals, exotic titles, and dramatic scenarios used by various societies were inspired by ancient legends, historical incidents, or mythology.

Regalia used by fraternities and sororities provides fantasy and drama for Lodge members. The Lodge itself is designed to foster a sense of fellowship and camaraderie. Many visitors will be surprised to learn that in the 19th and early 20th Centuries, fraternal organizations were essential to the well-being of many of their members. Long before the advent of Social Security, corporate pension plans, and medical insurance these societies provided death, sick, accident, disability and funeral benefits.

"Initiating America" also brings attention to many interesting facts about fraternal organizations that may be unknown to Museum visitors. At the beginning of the 20th Century, more than 300 secret societies, fraternities, and sisterhoods were active in the United States, with their ranks totaling more than 10,000,000 members.

"Lexington Alarm'd" is another ongoing exhibit. It introduces visitors to the residents of Colonial Lexington and explores how and why this community functioned. It presents an in-depth look at the personal culture and intellectual history of Lexingtonians in the 18th Century. By examining their attitudes toward work and home, church and community, the exhibition sets the stage upon which our Revolutionary War started. The events that took place on that fateful day on the Green thrust Lexington into the worldwide political arena. "Lexington Alarm'd" focuses extensively on the events of April 19, 1775, including first hand accounts of eyewitnesses recorded within a week of the confronta-

"Return to Route 66" is a new exhibit that will run from March 3 - September 3, 2001. John Steinbeck called it "the Mother road". Route 66 - the ultimate main street, the American road. Chock full of kitsch and nostalgia, but also a hard-working road that carried countless young families West, fueling the growth of the country. Featuring historical artifacts and contemporary photographs, the exhibition reveals the impact of this celebrated highway on American history, popular culture, and art.

Coming attractions

November has four significant occasions in store for us. We have a presidential election, Veterans Day, Thanksgiving Day and our Scottish Rite Reunion. All of these we look forward to with eager anticipation. I encourage each of you to set time aside to reflect on what these four events mean to you. For all of us, as Scottish Rite Masons they have particular significance. Putting them all in context together is difficult, but not impossible.

For your consideration I suggest that William Tyler Page said it best when he wrote the American's Creed: "I believe in the United States of America as a Government of the people, by the people, for the people; whose just powers are derived from the consent of the governed; a democracy in a republic, a sovereign Nation of many sovereign States; a perfect union, one and inseparable; established upon those principles of freedom, equality, justice, and humanity for which

American patriots sacrificed their lives and fortunes. I therefore believe it is my duty to my country to love it; to support its Constitution; to obey its Laws; to respect its Flag; and to defend it against all enemies."

Let us especially give thanks throughout the month of November for all of the blessings we enjoy as citizens of the greatest country in the world. May we practice in our daily lives the lessons that have been passed down to us in our Masonic Heritage that we now in our Reunion, so earnestly seek to convey to candidates.






Canada


Companions







Remember, Nobles, we have to sell the Calendars to help the Shrine and ourselves.





A Profile

Not too long ago I was sitting in the doctor's office when the inner door opened and out walks a Brother. With the usual greetings, he sat down next to me and started to relate to me about certain experiences which he called miracles. According to him, there were three that very much affected his life. Many Masons don't know too much about this Mason, but in his lifetime he has done some remarkable things. Many happy faces of children were lit up by his magical tricks. I know for I was present at many of his performances. He did this for a great many years.

He has always been very active in his Lodge, being in Degrees, helping with many activities and always there with a helping hand when called upon. He is well known throughout the Al Sigl Center for his many hours devoted to their fundraising programs. For many years he has devoted himself to the Veterans Service at Canandaigua Veterans Center and has many hours to his credit. He has always been there to help people at any time.

The first such called miracle was when he was a young man. For a while he had a very serious health problem, one he thought he would never recover from. It took a long time to recover, but he did not let it get the best of him. Slowly, but surely, his health

The second one was when he went to the doctor for a physical and was told you need to be in the hospital NOW. At the hospital he was told he needed surgery immediately because his veins were blocked. It looked like a regular and normal operation, but everyone was in for a surprise. Five bypasses were needed, if I remember correctly.

Then complications set in. Cora and I were there at the time of the operation and throughout his healing process. I had never seen anyone with so many tubes and needles. His condition had turned critical, almost to the point of losing him. He was on 24 hour care, but after many prayers and many vigilant days and nights, he recovered.

The third miracle was when he went for eye surgery. What was supposed to be a normal cataract removal turned out to be an eye sight impairment. They thought his eyes were going to go bad on him. Then they tried one more procedure and that was a laser treatment. Lo and behold, his sight was returned to his left eye. What a joy for now he could see everything clearly.

The last I talked with him, he was to have the other eye done in the same way. After he completed his story, I told him he was like a cat with nine lives. He still has six to go and knowing him, I am sure he will use all nine.

Well, most of you have figured out who this Mason is by now. He's R.: W.: Harold Bollotin. A simple man, one who does not look for glory. A quiet man, very serious about what he does and he shows it in everything he does.

I thought this profile should be in our Masonic Times as many more should be because we never hear about how some people go through life. Although Masonic news is important, so should the personal challenges of every day living be recognized. I hope this type of reporting continues, for there are many more out there. "

Your Legal Rights By Bro. Phillip Hurwitz, Esq.

Landowners

Do you own property that other people like to play or hunt on? You might be thinking: what if someone gets hurt? Can they successfully sue me and collect money?

NO.

The law grants a special immunity to landowners whose land is used by others for recreation, regardless if permission is granted or not. (General Obligations Law §9-103; Farnham v. Kittinger, 83 N.Y. 2d 520 [1994]). This law was written to encourage or allow people to use accessible land for recreational enjoyment. Ordinarily a landowner owes a reasonable duty to others to warn of known hazards and keep the premises safe. This special immunity protects landowners or tenants from liability to others for injuries sustained on the property they own or rent. The landowner or tenant owes no duty to warn others of a hazardous condition on the premises.

This immunity applies to the following activities: hunting, fishing, organized gleaning, canoeing, boating, trapping, hiking, cross-country skiing, toboganning, sledding, speleological activities (exploring caves), horseback riding, bicycle riding, hang gliding, motorized vehicle operation for recreational purposes, snowmobile operation,

cutting or gathering of wood for non-commercial purposes or training of dogs.

This immunity won't apply if the landowner or tenant charges a fee to play or hunt on his land. This immunity also won't apply if the landowner, out of spite or malice, creates a specific hazard; or out of malice fails to warn against a dangerous trap. Nor will the immunity apply if the person is injured while trespassing for some other purpose not related to recreation. For example, if a person is taking a shortcut through your property and is injured, he could still sue.
