\$14,200 net for

Thanks to the generosity of the greater Rochester community and the efforts of Masonic Organizations from around the area, the Masters and Wardens Association of the Monroe District presented a check to the Ronald McDonald House for \$14,201.53. This is the highest donation from the Fraternity since 1990, according to information obtained from Ronald McDonald House personnel, and exceeded last year's total by more than \$1,500.

With the new House going up inside the Golisano Children's Hospital at Strong, only the fourth facility of its kind in the country, the extra money will come in very handy.

The Masons are one of the charter fundraising organizations for the Ronald McDonald House in Rochester. The first campaign was held in 1988, a year before construction took place. By the time M:W: Roswell T. Swits, Grand Master of Masons in the State of New York, officiated at the laying of the cornerstone on October 29. 1989, the Masons had helped raise nearly \$50,000 toward the building of and operating ex-penses for this facility. The amount added this year brings the total donations to over \$170,000 in the seventeen years of Masonic participation.



Your Legal Rights By Bro. Phillip Hurwitz, Esq.

Traffic stop

In my last article, I gave an overview of the legal consequences of driving while impaired. In this month's article, I'll cover how the police can tell if you are intoxicated, and what happens during the traffic stop.

Driving while intoxicated begins with you driving your car while impaired. So let's say you are driving along 490, or along Ridge Road. An officer can legally pull you over if he has probable cause to believe you are impaired. How can a police officer tell if you are impaired? Some of the classic tell-tale signs are: weaving your car; drifting; straddling the lane; failing to obey traffic controls; ariving unusually slow; driving without your headlights on (if nighttime); abrupt or aggressive traffic maneuvers.

The fact of being pulled over by the police does not require the officer to advise you of your right to remain silent or to the assistance of an attorney. Anything you voluntarily say or voluntarily admit to at this time will be used against you. After pulling you over, the officer will be making a mental note of your appearance and demeanor. Are you slurring your words? Are your eyes glassy in appearance? Does the officer detect alcohol on your breath? Do you ramble? Are you defensive? Do you fumble while retrieving your license and registration? If the officer's suspicions about your impairment war-

will ask you to step out of the your car. Are you steady as you exit from the car? Do you stumble? Are you leaning on the car for support? Can you stand still? The officer will then conduct a field sobriety check. Essentially the officer wants to check both your hand/eye coordination, your abilities to remain balanced on your feet, concentrate and follow direc-

This test serves to confirm the officer's suspicions if you are impaired. By cooperating, you are essentially providing evidence that will be used against you. You do have the right to refuse the officer's request to participate in this field sobriety test, but as a practical matter, your refusal may result in a night in jail. Your refusal will be used against you at trial. If convicted, the judge will probably take note of your refusal to cooperate. The decision to cooperate is a judgement call on the driver's part. There may be very good reasons to cooperate or not to cooperate. For instance, the driver may be reacting to medication, thereby giving the appearance on intoxication. Divulging this information to the officer at the earliest opportunity can rebut any argument later on that you are raising a sham defense. On the other hand, someone may have been seriously hurt or killed as a result of your involvement in an accident. Your cooperation may supply evidence that will be used against you, which may be a reason not to cooperate.

If the officer reasonably believes that you are intoxicated or impaired, you will be formally arrested at this point, and charged with either driving while impaired or driving while intoxicated. This decirant further confirmation, he sion is based solely on the

officer's judgment, which itself can be attacked if found to be unreasonable. For example, how many of you have accidently weaved in your lane, or accidently drifted over a yellow line, without having anything to drink? The officer may want you to give a breath sample in order to obtain a blood alcohol reading. This blood alcohol reading, if high enough, will sustain an impaired or intoxicated conviction, even if the officer's own belief as to intoxication, is subject to reasonable doubt. You have the right to refuse to take this test. The reasons for doing so are to prevent the police from gathering evidence to be used against you. The officer is required to advise you that: (a) your license to operate a car will be immediately suspended, and later revoked, regardless whether or not you are convicted, and (b) the fact of your refusal may be used against you at a trial.

Whether or not you should refuse to take the test is dependent on the circumstances that led to your arrest. The law requires the police to take a breath sample within two hours of your arrest. You have the right to confer with an attorney before deciding whether or not to take this test. The police are not required to honor this request if more than two hours have passed since your arrest. Failure to reach an attorney cannot be used as a reason to avoid taking this test. In other words, if you refuse to take the test because you cannot reach an attorney, then the law will treat this as a refusal. Under certain circumstances, the police, despite a lack of consent, can obtain a court order allowing them to draw blood in order to test it to determine levels of intoxication. An example is where you are found unconscious at an accident scene - obviously you are in no position to consent or not to consent.

If you do consent to give a breath sample, then the officer will have you blow into a machine, which measures blood alcohol level (BAC). As with any machine, operator error or poor maintenance of the machine can undermine the accuracy of any BAC reading. The consequence of this should result in suppression of any test results. That means these results from the breath testing machine cannot be used as evidence against you.

Being pulled over by the police tests everybody's nerves, no matter how calm one may appear. Whatever information you volunteer, even if seemingly innocent, can appear incriminating when read in isolation in a police report. You still retain some control over the situation, even though you judge.

must submit to the authority of the badge, when pulled over. Your control is what you choose to say or not say; what you choose to do or choose not to do. What you decide has both short-term and longterm consequences. The easy answer is to say, "don't drink," but that ignores what really goes on. Drinking alcohol isn't illegal. Operating a vehicle after having consumed alcohol isn't illegal. It's the operation of a vehicle while impaired or intoxicated, that is illegal.

The best advice if you are going to drink is to pace yourself. If you feel the slightest "buzz," then chances are, your ability to operate a vehicle is becoming impaired. Is the chance you will make it back home worth the risk of conviction; or worse yet, the maiming or taking of human life?

Well, my Brothers, here I find myself writing my nextto-last article as District Deputy. My successor will have attended his initial training session in Utica preparing for his term by the time you read this. I share with you some reflections of my two terms as District Deputy.

In the area of membership growth and development, there has been improvement. In my initial term (2000-2002), information was shared regarding the longterm impact of our aging membership and anticipated losses due to death. We had lost 40-45 Brothers per year since 2000, plus NPDs, without significant growth in membership. As Lodges, we must work diligently at no less than maintaining our current numbers. Much has been said, both from Grand Lodge and within the District, about the economic impact of decreasing numbers of members. In this regard, 2003 was one of our better years in recent memory. With the One-Day Class and diligent efforts by some of our Lodges, our losses were reduced. Still, for 2003, we had a net loss of 24 Brothers in the OSY District. It behooves us, as Brothers and Lodges, to continually work at "bringing in our replacements" if we are to stem the losses we can realistically expect. We can do better!

Our efforts with the Brotherhood Fund are improving. As a District, we rank 23rd of the 65 in number of members. Our contributions rank us 29th and our percentage of giving rank is 15th, as of December 31, 2003. In my travels, I hear of the success some of our Lodges are having with contributions. I commend you. Again, we need to continue to work on improving in this area. We can do better!

The District efforts in the Child ID (CHIP) Program are improving. About one third of our Lodges have regularly scheduled sessions on an annual basis. I have been contacted by a couple of others wishing to get involved. This is truly one of the more important areas where we need to do more. We can do better!

Brothers should look to being more involved in District activities. The attendance at our bi-monthly meetings of the OSY Association varies significantly. It is important for each Lodge to be represented at these meetings to be aware of what is happening throughout the District and have a part in the planning of future activities. Our monthly meetings of the OSY Charities organization need better representation from our Lodges. Knowledge is a valuable tool and knowing what your District is doing and what you can do for your District is vital. We can do better!

approaches, I am pleased to report that at least eleven of our Lodges will be represented. With spouses and significant others, over 30 will be traveling to NYC on May 1st. Not only do we look forward to the business of Grand Lodge, but also to the opportunities for camaraderie and genuine fellowship among members of our District, along with Wayne and Chemung/Schuyler/Tioga Districts.

With this Masonic year drawing to a close, the District calendar decreases in size. I do encourage Lodges to keep us abreast of any special program (awards, etc.) that are in the works. R .: W .: William Colin, Staff Officer, and I will continue to visit Lodges in the District and are ready and willing to offer whatever support and assistance we can.





As you read this, it's now April and the month of Easter and that little bunny with candy (mmmmm, chocolate) and those little colored eggs. It doesn't matter whether you're a Christian or not, or even if you believe in Christ, April is a month dedicated to the Great Architect of the Universe because of Spring, resurrection, rebirth, and new beginnings. Everyone of the ancient cultures, whether they be the Sumerians, Egyptians, Akkadians, Minoans, Babylonians, Assyrians, Chinese or Hindus, Myceneans, Hittites,

Greeks, or the Romans, as well as the Incas, Mayans, and the Aztecs, all believed in the rebirth of Springtime and that's why all the ancient calendars began in April. So let April be a month of rebirth and new beginnings for you and may the Great Architect shine down His providence and guiding light upon you. Easter is a time of rebirth, resurrection, and new beginnings and we as Christians symbolize this with the butterfly. The American Indian religions symbolize Springtime and rebirth with the butterfly, as well.

Before I go, let me take a moment to pass along some brief insight as to what the Knights Templar means to, and has done for, Masonry. As well as Christians, Jews, and all the other Supreme Beings-based religions celebrate April as the month of rebirth, resurrection, and new beginnings, because of the Templars. We, as Christians wouldn't be celebrating Easter without them.

Knights Templar origins

There are many historical accounts of the poor fellowsoldiers of Jesus Christ, or Knights of the Temple, more commonly referred to as Knights Templar. They were formed as a result of the Crusades, doing battle with the Moslems and capturing Jerusalem around 1099. Jerusalem fell and the Holy City belonged to the Crusaders and all Christendom rejoiced. Men, women and children pressed forward on their pilgrimage to the sacred city, only to find that although Jerusalem was in Christian hands, the Moslems still controlled Palestine. The highways and byways leading to Jerusalem were unmutilated bodies and the bleached bones of pilgrims soon became a common sight along the roadways. To add to the vulnerability of the pilgrims, thousands of the Crusaders with their primary objective accomplished, returned to their own lands leaving the countryside to the Moslems uncontested.

This was the circumstance that set the stage for Templary. A small band of Crusaders, remaining after the conquest, recognized the plight of the pilgrims and bound themselves in a holy Brotherhood in arms. They entered into a solemn agreement to aid one another in clearing the highways, and in protecting the pilgrims through the passes and defiles of the mountains to the Holy City. In short, the Knights Templars were laymen who protected and defended Christians traveling to Jerusalem. These men took vows of poverty, chastity and obedience, and were renowned for their fierceness and courage in battle.

In 1118 AD, nineteen years after the successful Crusade. these poor fellow soldiers of Jesus Christ, as they termed themselves, were officially recognized and sanctioned and were given for their headquarters, a building on Mount Moriah, the site of the former Temple of King Solomon. Consequently, they became known as the Knights of the Temple, or Knights Templar. This was the era of chivalric ascendancy. Much as outstanding athletes receive the hero worship and admiration of the public today, so did those Knights of old capture the hearts and the wealth of the public of their period.

Their fame spread like wildfire. Rulers hastened to be identified with Knights Templar and to present gold and property to the Order. It is a matter of history that the warriors who fought for Christianity as Knights Templar had their vicissitudes with more downs than ups on the battlefield through the centuries. However, their wealth and their prestige remained undiminished. On the contrary, their treasury became too large to escape the notice of some financially embarrassed rulers, especially Philip the Fair, King of France.

Philip the Fair, with Pope Clement, who Philip pretty well influenced, arranged for Convocation of the Grand Master of the Knights Templar, Jacques DeMolay, and his Officers at Paris. The Convocation was held, but Grand Master DeMolay and his Officers never left, at least not with their lives. In 1314 Jacques DeMolay was burned at the stake for alleged heresy and dozens of other accusations; all Knights Templar wealth was seized and Templary "moved underground."

Some have written that after the death of Grand Master DeMolay there was an unbroken succession of the Grand Masters and a constant Templar organization without a lapse. To simplify the story without attempting to elaborate or quote various researchers, all we know is that when Templary emerged in the early 1700's it was a part of Freemasonry and The Order of Knights Templar today exists as the top ranking Masonic organization in the York Rite of Freemasonry. It is to these Knights Templar and their Crusade against religious persecution that we celebrate the religious freedoms we enjoy today, whatever your denomination or belief system is. It doesn't matter whether you're Christian and celebrate Easter, you're Jewish and celebrate Passover, you're Islamic, you're Oriental, or your Meso-American, we all start the rebirth and resurrection of our Calendar and the beginning of our Astrological phases





Taxes! Taxes! Taxes! By Tom Michielsen

It's April, and you're once again burning the midnight oil, poring over stacks of paperwork or small pieces of paper with little or no explanation on them, trying to file your Income Tax Return on time. If you're rushing to complete your Return, you may be making costly mathematical errors, overlooking important deductions or missing tax credits for which you might qualify. Yes, you might be one of those people in the TV ads who overpay their taxes each year. Why are we so stupid to subject ourselves to this torture year after year? Each year we tell ourselves next year will be different, but we do nothing to make our lives easier.

The Internal Revenue Service reminds taxpayers claiming the Child Tax Credit that they cannot get the full \$1,000 per child if they received an advance payment check last year. When figuring the credit, they must subtract the amount they received in advance. Failure to do so will reduce and could delay their tax refunds.

NYS Commissioner of Taxation and Finance, Andrew S. Eristoff, and NYS Consumer Protection Board Chairperson, Teresa A. Santiago, cautioned taxpayers to think carefully before opting for one of the "refund anticipation loans" offered by some tax preparers.

"Most refund anticipation loans are nothing more than massive rip-off schemes designed to whittle away taxpayers' refunds," said Commissioner Eristoff. "Before accepting one of these loans, taxpayers should calculate the effective interest rate and any associated fees. These costs often eat away refunds at rates that would normally be considered criminal usury if from a traditional lending institution. New York State offers ways to expedite your refund which will not cost you your hard earned money."

"Don't make an instant decision about an instant refund. Paying hundreds of dollars out of your tax refund doesn't make sense," said Chairperson Santiago. "Some people need money right away, and offers for a fast tax refund can be very attractive. What people don't think about are the costs, which can be substantial after you pay a processing fee and interest on this short-term loan. You could wind up paying a lot more just to get a refund a few days earlier."

Rather than accepting a refund anticipation loan, taxpayers should strongly consider filing their tax return electronically and authorizing direct deposit of their refund into their bank accounts. By combining the power of electronic filing and direct deposit, taxpayers may see their refund in a matter of days rather than weeks or months. The cost of e-filing is minimal, and free for many. The option to have a taxpayer's refund directly deposited into their bank account costs the taxpayer nothing. These two options provide a comparable benefit to refund anticipation loans without sky-high fees and interest.

Knights Templar origins

There are many historical accounts of the poor fellowsoldiers of Jesus Christ, or Knights of the Temple, more commonly referred to as Knights Templar. They were formed as a result of the Crusades, doing battle with the Moslems and the capture of Jerusalem around 1099. Jerusalem fell and the Holy City belonged to the Crusaders and all Christendom rejoiced. Men, women and children pressed forward on their pilgrimage to the sacred city, only to find that although Jerusalem was in Christian hands, the Moslems still controlled Palestine. The highways and byways leading to Jerusalem were unprotected. The ferocity of the Moslems seemed to increase with the fall of the city, and mutilated bodies and the bleached bones of pilgrims soon became a common sight along the roadways. To add to the vulnerability of the pilgrims, thousands of the Crusaders with their primary objective accomplished, returned to their own lands leaving the countryside to the Moslems uncontested.

This was the circumstance. which set the stage for Templary. A small band of Crusaders, remaining after the conquest, recognized the plight of the pilgrims and bound themselves in a holy Brotherhood in arms. They entered into a solemn agreement to aid one another in clearing the highways, and in protecting the pilgrims through the passes and defiles of the mountains to the Holy City. In short, the Knights Templars were laymen who protected and defended Christians traveling to Jerusalem. These men took vows of poverty, chastity and obedience, and were renowned for their fierceness and courage in battle.

In 1118, nineteen years af-ter the successful Crusade, these poor fellow soldiers of Jesus Christ, as they termed themselves, were officially recognized and sanctioned and were given for their headquarters, a building on Mount Moriah, the site of the former Temple of King Solomon. Consequently, they became known as the Knights of the Temple, or Knights Templar. This was the era of chivalric ascendancy. Much as outstanding athletes receive the hero worship and admiration of the public today, so did those Knights of old capture the hearts and the wealth of the public of their period.

Their fame spread like wildfire. Rulers hastened to be identified with Knights Templar and to present gold and property to the Order. It is a matter of history that the warriors who fought for Christianity as Knights Templar had their vicissitudes with more downs than ups on the battlefield through the centuries. However, their wealth and their prestige remained undiminished. On the contrary, their treasury became too large to escape the notice of some financially embarrassed rulers, especially Philip the Fair, King of France.


ficers at Paris. The Convocation was held, but Grand Master DeMolay and his Officers never left, at least not with their lives. In 1314 Jacques DeMolay was burned at the stake for alleged heresy and dozens of other accusations; all Knights Templar wealth was seized and Templary "moved underground."

Some have written that, after the death of Grand Master DeMolay, there was an unbroken succession of the Grand Masters and a constant Templar organization without a lapse. To simplify the story without attempting to elaborate or quote various researchers, all we know is that when Templary emerged in the early 1700's it was a part of Freemasonry and The Order of Knights Templar today exists as the top ranking Masonic organization in the York Rite of Freemasonry. It is to these Knights Templar and their Crusade against religious persecution that we celebrate the religious freedoms we enjoy today, whatever your denomination or belief system is. It doesn't matter whether you're Christian and celebrate Easter, you're Jewish and celebrate Passover, you're Islamic, you're Oriental, or your Meso-American, we all start the rebirth and resurrection of our Calendar and the beginning of our Astrological phases with the Month of April. Going back 11,000 plus years, including every one of the ancient kingdoms of history, they all started their calendar and their rebirth with the month of April.


We will always remember LeRoy Fairchild and the other founders of the Grotto in a very special way. It's that awareness that contines to define who they were.

LeRoy was born on January 2, 1847. For his entire life he lived opposite the Hamilton Masonic Temple, on Broad Street, in the center of town. When he married Adon and Sidney Smith's sister, they moved in next door. That house is a landmark; the house that was his birthplace is gone.

"Roy" was perhaps the originator of the concept which evolved into the Grotto, though he was certainly surrounded by competent and enthusiastic assistants. In physical appearance, he was somewhat below medium height, weighing not over 140 pounds. He was packed full of zest for life and bubbling over with cordial good fellowship and friendly impulses.

His business letterhead read, "Dealer in Clothing, Furniture Goods, Boots, Shoes, Hats, Caps, Traveling Bags, etc."

The first recorded visit to Lalla Rookh was written in the minute book on January 26, 1894. "The Grotto was open without form." The bills for the evening included \$4.00 for cigars and \$20.00 for refreshments. "After the reading of petitions, it was announced that Deputy Imperial Monarch, LeRoy Fairchild, was in waiting. He was duly received and introduced by our Potent Monarch, George F. Loder. After a few well-chosen remarks, Prophet Fairchild took over as Acting Potent Monarch and initiated six candidates. After the meeting there was a banquet at which the Deputy Imperial Monarch and several
