lobby. We are also recognized on their wall of contributors as a major benefactor.

The purpose of the Ronald McDonald House is to provide a home away from home for families who have a child being treated at a local hospital. Doctors refer families as the need and availability arises. Families who use the facility have a child being treated for cardiac care, neonatal care, cancer, MS, etc. Families from

every County in New York State have used our local facility, as well as families from 42 other States. Unfortunately, even with growth renovations, they many times have a waiting list.

The cost is a nominal fee of \$10/night/room. If the family is unable to pay there is no charge. Services provided at the Ronald McDonald House are laundry, kitchen, shuttle transportation, etc. If needed,

they also provide residents with food and staples for their return home

Little Known Facts and Hand-Me-Down Nonsense

These comments are not meant to be exhaustive on the subject of the Entered Apprentice Degree. They are, therefore, subjects for your consideration and contemplation as is. We certainly hope that the newly made Mason will avail himself of the broad spectrum of Masonic writings that will explain the history, symbolism and meaning of Freemasonry, as well as, the wealth of knowledge of the many Brothers who surround him.

First, it must be understood that there is no uniform Ritual among the various jurisdictions of Grand Lodges in the United States of America. You will find that the Ritual differs materially from jurisdiction to jurisdiction, but the tenets and principles will be the same.

Here will be presented a few "Little Known Facts," and some of our inherited "Hand-Me-Down Nonsense." In the later category is found information that has been handed down but has little or no foundation on facts. They are made by well meaning Brothers, but still convey information that is either faulty or incorrect.

Little Known Facts

There is a reference in the very first question asked of an Entered Apprentice to the "Holy Saint John." This is in the singular and does not refer to either St. John the Baptist or St. John the Evangelist. We here make reference to St. John the Almoner. A 7th century patriarch of Alexandria, Egypt, he was known for his charity and understanding of the poor. After the sack of Jerusalem by the Persians in 614 A.D., John sent resources and money to help rebuild churches, hospitals and shelters for visiting pilgrims and gave sustenance to refugees.

These comments are not Hence he is known as St. John eant to be exhaustive on the the Almoner or Almsgiver.

In the Apron Presentation we are told that the "white apron" is more ancient than the Golden Fleece or Roman Eagle and, when worthily worn, more honorable than the Star and Garter. You will find several references in Masonic writings that will relate the Golden Fleece to that of Greek mythology in Jason and the Golden Fleece. However, there is an order of knighthood, the Order of the Golden Fleece, dating from the 15th century, that was created by the House of Burgundy. There is inconclusive evidence as to which one is the correct reference. The ensign of the Roman Eagle was held in high regard by many cultures.

The Order of the Garter is the most senior of the orders of knighthood in Britain, instituted in 1348 by Edward III. The bearer wears a blue garter beneath his left knee and a star on his left breast.

The symbolism, then, of the white apron, is ancient since time immemorial and is a badge that is more honorable than the greatest of orders of chivalry.

We mention that a Lodge has three symbolic lights and refer to the North as a place of darkness, yet give no reason why. You will find in older Ritual ciphers the explanation that "every Lodge is, or ought to be, a correct representation of King Solomon's Temple, which was situated so far North of the ecliptic that the sun, even at meridian, did not dart its rays into the Northern most parts thereof..."

While on the subject of King Solomon's Temple, we are given the explanation of how this mighty edifice was erected without the sound of ax, hammer, or other metal tool.

"The stones were hewn, squared and numbered in the quarries where raised, and the timber was felled and prepared in the forests of Lebanon. They were conveyed by sea, in floats, to Joppa, thence by land to Jerusalem, where they were set up by the aid of wooden instruments."

It would then seem that KST was the first recorded prefab in history!

Hand-Me-Down Nonsense

Some Brothers were taught that there is a special Masonic pronunciation of many common English words. This is incorrect.

In this jurisdiction, the proper pronunciation of the word "hele" is as if it were spelled "heel." This is supported not only by R∴W∴ Henry G. Meacham in his Our Stations and Places, but as well in the Oxford English Dictionary. Yet that pronunciation can differ in other Grand Lodges.

Occasionally, Brothers insist that the word "Halve" has the letter "L" vocalized. This is also an error. It is the verb form of the word "half" and means to split into two equal parts. It also just happens to be a term in golfing. Two players who shoot the same score on a particular hole are said to "halve the hole." These same Brothers who insist on enunciating the letter "L" in the word "halve," will pronounce "half," "calf," "calves" and "psalm" with the "L" silent, as it should be.

At one time or another, Brothers get into near fistfights over which foot wears the slipper. Our Ritual requires that a candidate be "neither barefoot nor shod." There are no directions in the Ritual as to which foot is involved. Arguments are made to place it on the advancing foot or the other. In this jurisdiction, we are not specific. If your Lodge has a tradition of choosing one over the other, fine. Just don't criticize another Lodge if they do it differently. So it could be on the same foot for all three Degrees or alternated.

Probably the most damaging effects of a misunderstanding surround the notion of solicitation of a candidate for the Degrees of Masonry. It was truly believed by many in the past that you could not, under any circumstances, ask a person if he would be interested in joining Masonry. There is not, and never has been, any rule stating that. Read the first question that the Secretary asks the candidate in the preparation room. "Do you declare, upon your honor, that, unbiased by the improper solicitation of friends . .. " If all solicitation were prohibited, there would not be the word improper in the sentence. Logic tells us that if there is improper solicitation, then there can be proper solicitation. How many families have suffered from this misunderstanding?

My maternal grandfather was a Mason. Neither of his two sons ever showed any interest in the Fraternity. My father, the son-in-law of my grandfather, was also a Mason. During my grandfather's lifetime he gave his Masonic ring to my Dad, since neither of my uncles ever showed any interest in the Craft. At my grandfather's funeral, my uncles asked my father why their father had never asked if they would be interested in joining Masonry. Weren't they good enough men to qualify? My dad erroneously told them that asking was prohibited. Both my uncles later applied and were raised Masons. How proud my grandfather would have been to see both his sons in the Fraternity.

Exerting pressure on family

members or friends to join Masonry is improper solicitation. Asking those relatives and acquaintances if they would be interested in learning about or joining Masonry is not improper solicitation. If they are informed about the Fraternity and then choose not to join then you should respect their wishes.

Always remember that there is only one stupid question about anything; the one that does not get asked. So please avail yourselves of the experience of your Brothers. This includes the ones whom you know are willing to discuss Masonry with you and your Brothers (whom you don't know) who, over the centuries, have taken the time to write about this marvelous Craft.

Keep in mind the admonition of the Charge of the 1st Degree: "During your leisure hours, that you may improve in Masonic knowledge, you are to converse with well-informed Brethren, who will be always as ready to give you, as you will be to receive instruction."

Your Legal Rights FYI

It's good to be back, Brothers. I needed to replenish my inkwell. This month's article will cover some important highlights about our DWI law, which was recently amended.

As we all know by now, driving while intoxicated, or ability impaired, is illegal. Driving while ability is impaired (DWAI) is a traffic infraction in most cases, while driving while intoxicated (DWI) is a crime. In New York State, intoxication is defined as a blood alcohol level of .08. If you drive a truck for a living, and need a commercial (CDL) license, then impaired is defined as a blood alcohol level of between .04, but less than .08.

What is blood alcohol level and how is it measured? Blood alcohol level, or BAC, is a measure of how much alcohol is concentrated in a person's blood. Alcohol gets into the blood stream through your digestive tract (stomach and small intestine). A person's level of intoxication can be determined by a breath or blood sample.

A person's weight and gender can affect how quickly they become intoxicated. The fact that a person drinks on a full or an empty stomach can also affect a person's BAC. Scientific studies have shown that drinking on a full stomach will delay alcohol absorption in the blood stream, thereby delaying the effects of intoxication. Due to their physiology, women achieve intoxication more quickly than men.

The best advice is to refrain from drinking alcohol if you are driving; but that doesn't always happen. So here is a rough guide. That means it's a rule of thumb to be followed at your own risk. A 1 oz. shot of 86 proof alcohol, a 5 oz. glass of wine, or a 12 oz. beer, contain roughly the same amount of alcohol. Each drink raises your BAC level .02 per hour per drink.

An example

A 180 lb. male who drinks two 12 oz. cans of beer within an hour, will have a BAC between .03 - .04. He would have to wait two hours before the alcohol is completely eliminated from his blood stream. If he is a commercial truck driver, then he may be considered legally impaired if his BAC is .04.

If he were to drink three 12 oz. cans of beer within an hour, then he will have a BAC between .05 - .06. He is legally impaired. He would need to wait nearly three hours before the alcohol is completely eliminated from his blood stream.

If he were to drink four 12 oz. cans of beer within an hour, then he will have a BAC between .07 - .08. Depending upon the accuracy and skill of the police officer, and his use of test equipment, our friend is definitely impaired, and may be intoxicated. It would take nearly five hours wait time before the alcohol is completely eliminated from his blood stream.

Taxes! Taxes! Taxes! By Tom Michielsen

It's Have-a-Heart time and time to think about your own sweetheart. Does she want candy, roses or a romantic dinner or getaway? You had better do something or, believe me, you will spend the rest of the year paying for your thoughtless oversight. Have a heart, be kind to your sweetheart now and, throughout the year.

The maximum earnings subject to FICA withholding increases to \$87,900 for 2004. Beginning in 2004, individuals who are under full retirement age can earn up to \$11,640 per year (\$970 per month) before losing benefits. One dollar in benefits will be withheld for every \$2 in earnings above this limit.

The year the individual reaches full retirement age (age 65 and two months for retirees born in 1938; age 65 and four months for retirees born in 1939) the earnings limit is \$31,080 (\$2,590 per month). One dollar in benefits will be withheld for every \$3 in earnings above this limit. This applies only to earnings for months prior to attaining full retirement age. There is no limit on earnings beginning the month the individual attains full retirement age.

It seems just yesterday when you got that check in the mail for the Advance Child Tax Credit. How much was it? \$400? \$800? \$1233? Who can remember? Now, it's time to get your stuff together to prepare your 2003 tax return and you're going to need to know how much that check was. How much did you receive?

Legislation enacted in 2003 has changed the amount of the filing fees payable by limited liability companies (LLC) and limited liability partnerships (LLP) that are treated as partnerships for federal income tax purposes. The new legislation also established a new filing fee applicable to a single member LLC that are disregarded entities for federal income tax purposes. The new fees, explained below, apply only to tax years beginning in 2003 and 2004. In addition, the new law has changed the payment date for LLC and LLP filing fees. The new payment date, described below, applies to tax years beginning after 2002. The amount of the filing fee for limited liability companies and limited liability partnerships which have income from New York sources has been increased to \$100 multiplied by the total number of members or partners in the LLC or LLP. In addition, the minimum filing fee has been increased to \$500 and the maximum filing fee has been increased to \$25,000.

Furthermore, every singlemember limited liability company which is a disregarded entity for federal income tax purposes and which has income from New York State sources must now file Form IT-204-LL and will be subject to a filing fee of \$100.

Form IT-204-LL must be filed within 30 days after the last day of the tax year of the LLC, LLP, or single-member LLC disregarded entity, with full remittance of any filing fee due attached to the form. There is no extension for filing Form IT-204-LL or for paying the fee. A limited liability company or limited liability partnership treated as a partnership for federal income tax

The girls were overjoyed to receive the gifts, and every girl immediately started using her toothbrush and toothpaste. They all took the other items to school and were the envy of all the other students! Even the baggies were put to good use. The cook used them to pack the girls' lunch bags the next day!

Corinthian Fellowship has also given St. Paul's Church, in downtown Balboa, our old Bible, after the signatures of Past Matrons and Patrons were removed and added to the new Bible. St. Paul's Church's old Bible had been worn so thin from usage that they were unable to read it any longer.



difficulty-remembering names.

The more I become involved in this Fraternity, the more people I meet. I enjoy making new acquaintances and expanding my circle of friends, both within as well as outside, of Masonry. With an ever-increasing sphere of acquaintances, one of the major tasks I face is committing names to memory and facilitating the link between the name and face. When I was teaching college, I was assigned classes which ran the gamut from small seminars, to lecture halls containing 300+ students. In the larger classes, I made it a point during the first few meetings to delineate my dilemma regarding names. I would explain that while I was one name to remember to each student in the class, in the case of the larger classes, each student was but one among the 300+ of his or her classmates, each of whose names I could never learn in one semester. There was nothing I lamented more than to be greeted in the hallway with a cherry "Hi, Dr. Aus-tin!" and to have to return the greeting with a smile, but with no name to attach to it-how impersonal! Invariably, when names did come to mind, they were of those at opposite ends of the spectrum, those who stood out because of stellar academic performance, or those whose academic performance brought their names to mind on a more abysmal note. The majority, who placed in the middle academically, were "lost souls," whose names unfortunately, in many cases, were never connected with their faces.

I had heard of, and employed whenever possible, a memory technique known as mnemonics, a form of association used as a memory enhancer. Once I joined Masonry, I encountered this method again. Indeed, R .: W .: Bil Vassily has formulated a wonderful program utilizing mnemonics as a memory enhancing method which I have again encountered as part of Masonic training sessions. I have to say, it works-it really

Recently, I came across an article written by Lucius Beebe, an author and newspaperman. During his career, he met many people, and I was surprised to learn we shared a common pet peeve of trying to commit the names of newly met acquaintances to memory. I share the same with you herein; perhaps many of you will empathize:

The politest man I know-and Our thoughts are with I don't encounter him every day-is the one who, on shaking my hand in a restaurant or encountering me on the street, says, "I'm John Doe, of XYZ Lodge." He doesn't say, "I'll bet you don't know who I am," or otherwise act coy. He announces plainly whom he is, knowing that the chances are I don't know him from Adam and am very embarrassed

The rudest man I know-and I encounter him almost dailyis the one whom I should know but don't and who makes capital out of it as though somehow I had deliberately insulted him. I know, I suppose several hundred people, but my memory is as defective as the next man's. Give me a clue and I can usually, in time, reconstruct a person's case history and recall whom he roomed with at Yale, but sometimes I can't do it on the spot.

Women, of course, are far worse than men. They expect everyone to remember them immediately, as though a poor memory for names were a sort of lapse from chivalry. The fact that no woman ever appears twice in the same hat, hairdo or makeup, just doesn't occur to them.

When I encounter somebody who obviously doesn't remember my name, I don't try to be coy and mystify him with veiled references to the last, presumably shady, circumstances under which we met. I make a point of stating my name and my business or Lodge association. When anybody does as much for me, I set him down as having irreproachable manners and meriting my golden opinion.

The same obtains in all forms of communication, greeting or salutation. There is the character who simpers on the telephone: "I'll bet you don't know who this is." I don't and I don't want to. The individual who signs a postcard with just his initials or a nickname can also be retired, for my money. There are several people of my acquaintance who are "J.H." or "Hank" or 'Ratsy," and any one of them might be roaming around in Rome, old Mexico or Anto-

It doesn't make any difference if you are George Bush or Queen Elizabeth. Not everyone remembers you and it's a good thing to identify yourself before you get your acquaintances into a frenzy trying to think who you are. Not only do they know you then, they know you for a human being.

I liked this article, and found it to provide a basis for reflection. Hopefully, you did also, John, or is it Mike, er, ah, um, I mean Joe, oh no, pardon me, of course, your name is Bill, ISN'T it?


