Your Legal By Bro. Phillip Hurwitz, Esq.

In my last article, I covered what happens if an officer suspects you of drunk driving. In this month's article, I'll cover what happens if the officer places you under arrest.

If the officer suspects your ability to drive is impaired, he can do one of two things. He can take you into custody, or issue an appearance ticket.

If taken into custody, the officer will take you to a police station for processing, for later appearance before a judge, for arraignment. Alternatively, the police officer may decide not to take you into custody, and instead, can issue you an appearance ticket. The appearance ticket will note the date you are to appear in court for an arraignment itself.

There are a number of fac-

tors that influence officer's decision whether to take you into custody, or let you go with an appearance ticket. The most obvious factor is whether there is someone who can drive you home. Another factor is how intoxicated you are. Cooperation is another factor, but this is a tricky area.

It's understandable to believe that if you are cooperative with the police, they will "go easy on you." In some cases, that belief is valid. A cooperative attitude can change a suspicious attitude on the part of the officer. All too often, I have seen a cooperative attitude be used against a client. Why? Anything you say can be used against you in Court. It's easy to lose sight of the fact that it is not the police officer who will be prosecuting you, but an assistant district attorney. The assistant usually doesn't get the arraignment.

involved in your case until after the arrest. Therefore, any promises the officer made to you (or promises you think he made to you) do not bind the prosecutor, unless the prosecutor agreed beforehand.

The only other way to make any such promises "stick," is to convince the judge that you made these incriminating statements because of certain promises made to you by the officer. That is a difficult proposition to prove to a judge. The judge has to be convinced that these promises on the officer's part, "coerced" you into making statements that could hurt you. The point is simply this: be careful of what you say - in fact - other than your name, birthdate, and address, the best advice is to say nothing before speaking to an attorney.

Laxes! Laxes! Laxes! By Tom Michielsen

Well, Summer is about to begin. Most of us have turned our thoughts to golf, fishing, yard work and vacations. The governments have not stopped working and the tax laws continue to evolve. Therefore, I will continue to monitor them and publish, as much as space allows, those changes which might be of use to most of you.

The Internal Revenue Service recently provided tips to businesses, individuals and tax professionals to avoid errors on Schedules K-1. The Schedule K-1 is used to report income from partnerships, S corporations and some trusts. Accurate filing of the forms is important because the IRS continues to match income from Schedules K-1 to other tax returns.

Additional reminders to individuals and tax professionals include:

For recipients of Schedules K-1:

· Report income in the proper location on individual Form 8082, Notice of Incon-

returns as instructed on Schedule K-1, column C.

· Avoid netting or combining income against losses or should be reported separately from other related deductions, such as unreimbursed partnership expenses or Section 179 expenses. Refer to the Schedule E instructions for information on properly accounting for deductions related to Schedule K-1 income.

· Report deductible "At Risk" or Basis Limitation losses carried forward from prior years on a separate line from current year transactions. Do not combine (net) them with any current year amounts. Refer to Form 8582, Passive Activity Loss Limitation, for instructions on properly deducting passive activity losses. Beginning with tax year 2002, Form 8582 worksheets are required to be attached to the

· Identify "estimated" K-1 income. When the Schedule K-1 has not been received at the time the Form 1040 is filed, the income should be estimated.

sistent Treatment or Amended Return, should be used to identify estimated K-1 income or when the investor disagrees expenses. Gross income with the amounts reported on

> · Report elections authorized by Rev. Proc. 2003-79 properly. This revenue produre allows partners and shareholders impacted by a partnership or S corporation's election to change to an annual accounting period to apply a four-year ratable spread to the portion of the income attributable to the short tax year. Section 6 of the revenue procedure provides specific instructions that should be followed to ensure the ratable portion of the income is properly reported on the partner or shareholder's individual tax return.

> The IRS also implemented this year two initiatives that will have a positive impact on the transcription quality of paper forms K-1. While electronic filing is the preferred method of filing, two-dimensional (2-D) barcoding and Optical Character Recognition (OCR) scanning have both

been incorporated in the processing of paper forms K-1.

The IRS will scan the barcode and use a combination of barcode, OCR and manual transcription technology to process the K-1s. These improvements will reduce taxpayer burden by causing fewer transcription errors and will also increase the efficiency of IRS operations.

Secondly, our Master-elect has chosen Sunday, June 6th, at 1:00 p.m. for the Installation of Officers. This is an open installation, so bring your families.


Next, our last meeting before the Summer break is on June 14th. It is a sport shirt night, so wear that shirt your family won't let you wear out in public.

In conclusion, let me leave you with a final lesson, The Lambskin Apron.

In Masonic symbolism, the Lambskin Apron holds precedence. It is the initial gift of Freemasonry to a candidate, and at the end of life's pilgrimage it is reverently placed on his mortal remains and buried with his body in the grave. Above all other symbols, the Lambskin Apron is the distinguishing badge of a Mason. It is celebrated in poetry and prose and has been the subject of much fanciful speculation. Some Masonic writers have contended that initiation is analogous to birth, or our advent from prenatal darkness

into the light of human fellowship, moral truth and spiritual faith. Much ancient lore has been adduced in an effort to show that the Lambskin Apron typifies regeneration, or a new life, and this thought of resurrection may be the cause of its interment with the body of a deceased Brother. At least it will serve until a better reason is advanced for this peculiar custom in the Masonic burial service. The association of the lamb with redemption and being born again is expressed by John, the Apocalyptic Seer, who had a vision on the Isle of Patmos, and beheld the purified and redeemed "of all nations, and kindred, and people and tongues." Of them it was said, "These are they, which came out of great tribulation and have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb." By many it has been regarded as a great religious symbol.

In our present conception there are three parts of man: body, soul and spirit. What the body is to the soul, the soul is to the spirit, namely, a house or habitation, but in oriental thought there were seven parts of man, four earthly and three heavenly, four physical and three spiritual. The four sides of the square symbolized the four physical and the three sides of the flap, or triangle, symbolized the three spiritual parts of man. The apes of the triangle or point of the flap stood for the seventh part of man which was called Atma and which means the eternal spark, the divine flame, the indestructible spirit of the living God in every human being. In this aspect it means that... God is not a looker-on


At the life of anyone; God is under every man, God is part of every man.

Upon presentation of the Apron, a Master Mason is told that it is an emblem of innocence, and the Badge of a Mason; that it is his, to be worn upon all proper occasions throughout an honorable life. The Masonic Apron, when properly worn, shall be completely visible at all times. While wearing a coat as part of your dress, whether in a public meeting or within the tiled recesses of your Lodge, the Masonic Apron is correctly worn outside the coat. The apron has always been associated with work. "Except a man be working, he would have no need for an apron." When the Mason puts on his Apron, he is signifying to the world his willingness to work at his acand thanks for being there this cepted responsibility. Further, he is signifying the dedication of himself to a life of purity before God and man, because the material of the Masonic Apron is lambskin, it is associated with innocence.

It's time for me to put down the baton and pass the reins to the new Master, Bernie Russell. In doing so, I'd like to start his year out with my blessing and prayers for a fruitful year. Bernie, may fortune be on your side, may the angels of the Lord bless and watch over you, and may you have good luck in all your endeavors this coming year.







One of the many items this writer would like to present, will be to bring to "light" information regarding the Scottish Rite. Subsequent publications will continue the story, beginning with the Lodge of Perfection, 4° through the 14° and concluding with the Consistory 32°, Sublime Princes of the Royal Secret.

Excerpts from the writings of A. G. Mackey

While many believe the Scottish Rite, began in Scotland, it was actually formed in France, by those Scottish Masonic emigrants, who traveled to France to evade persecution from their motherland, and continue their Masonic interests. It was believed that this influence contributed to the use of the word Ecossais, translated means "Scottish." It was originally called the "Ancient and Accepted Rite," but the Latin Constitutions of the Order designated it as the "Antiquus Scoticus Ritus Acceptus," or the "Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite."

In 1732, the first Scottish Lodge (Ecossais) was orga-nized in Bordeaux, France, one of the most influential Masonic regions. In 1761 French Masonic authorities, granted a patent to Stephen Morin of Bordeaux, to carry these advanced Degrees to the French possessions in the West Indies. The initial Degrees consisted of a system of 25 "higher" Degrees, known as the "Rite of Perfection." A few years later, other Degrees were added, until the Rite had a Ritual structure of 33 Degrees, the first three being exemplified in a Symbolic Lodge, if a Grand Lodge with subordinate Lodges existed in the area.

In 1797, in Albany, New York, Henry Francken, orga-Continued on Page 14

nized a Lodge of Perfection. This Lodge was the forerunner of what has become the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite in the United States. During the Colonial Period, other deputies, appointed by Morin, organized Masonic groups which conferred the advanced Degrees along the Atlantic seaboard. These groups were independent and without centralized control. On May 31, 1801, the Supreme Council of the 33° for the United States of America, the first Scottish Rite Supreme Council in the world, was founded in Charleston, South Carolina, unifying these competing Masonic groups.

In 1813, Emauel De La Motta, 33°, a distinguished Jewish merchant and philanthropist, organized in New

York City, the Supreme Council of the Thirty-third Degree for the Northern District. The first Sovereign Grand Commander was Ill .: Daniel D. Thompkins, 33°. He filled the office from 1813-1825, at the same time he was Vice-President of the United States, under President Monroe.

Both the Northern and Southern Jurisdictions made slow progress in unifying the scattered Degree-conferring groups. Handicapped by the pride of local organizations, leadership jealousies, anti-Masonic disturbances, and by the War between the States, the unification process however, was completed in 1867. From this troubled period arose what is the present day Northern Masonic Jurisdiction (NMJ) of the United States of America. The NMJ covers the 15 states East of the Mississippi River, and North of the Mason-Dixon Line, and the Ohio River, including Delaware. The headquarters are located in Lexington, Massachusetts. The Southern Masonic Jurisdiction (SMJ), is headquartered in Washington DC., and covers the remaining 35 States. While there is disparity among the number of States between the two Jurisdictions, the membership of the two Jurisdictions are approximately equal.

This is my first message to you, Brethren, as Sovereign Prince. I express my gratitude and appreciation to each of you for the confidence you have demonstrated by electing me to this esteemed office. This is part three, listing the founders of the Grotto.

The Village was incorporated in 1812 and named after Alexander Hamilton. It was based on farming with commercial activity occurring as transportation routes were developed.

William C. Eaton

The son of the third president of Madison (now Colgate) University and Commodore in the United States Navy, was a distinguished son of Hamilton, who had roamed the seven seas and visited every important seaport in the world.

He always took a lively interest in the village and for many years was quite active in the Village Improvement Society. Some of the improvements of the group included care of the trees in the park, extension of Broad Street Park, the Lont Park on Pine Street and the Triangle Park on Lebanon Street.

The expenses were met by the Society, and some money came from the annual festival in the park, which was always well attended. It should be noted that most of the founders signatures can be seen on the membership list, which is on display in Mokanna Grotto.

In the forming of the Supreme Council, Eaton made many motions and was a voice to be heard. He was appointed District Deputy Grand Monarch in 1890. Commodore Eaton was a stately old gentleman, as he would walk toward the Post Office on his late afternoon stroll for the mail. His Madison Street home was a treasure chest of interesting bric-a-brac, accumulated from travels abroad during his Navy days.

General William M. West

William Mott West was born in Hamilton on November 13, 1858. He served for many years as President of the National Hamilton Bank and was one of the foremost citizens of Hamilton. He gave generously of his time and talents for the good of the village and on every public occasion, when called upon to speak, West had words of wisdom and good judgment.

He was one of the Commissioners to provide Hamilton with a water supply and light system. He served as Fire Chief for a few years and was appointed as Military Aide on the staff of New York Governor, Roswell P. Flower, thus the title General.

Brother West served as Grand Treasurer of the Supreme Council from 1890 until the time of his death in 1910. PGM Charles Colton of Lalla Rookh Grotto then took over, and was Grand Treasurer for many years.

He had been in Rochester to attend the Democratic State Convention when he suffered pains in his side and was taken to Rochester General Hospital to be operated on for appendicitis. The following week a change came over him and he died from complications of the operation on October 4, 1910 at the age of 52 years.

In his private life, Brother West married Alice Gray, born 7-17-1857 and died, 3-7-1917, at the age of 59 years. Both are buried in Woodlawn Cemetery in Hamilton. He was held in high regard with people in all walks of life.

George Beal

George was born in 1850; in adult life he became the most eloquent of Hamilton's public speakers and a man of versatile talents. He was an original member of the Fountain Fire Company, along with LeRoy Fairchild.

He was Village President (Mayor) and a member of the School Board. In September, 1894, he was appointed Village Postmaster under President Grover Cleveland. During the administration of the office, he proved remarkably confident. Hardly had he become familiar with the routine of the business and its many complications when the office was destroyed by the Great Fire. Very little was lost, and postal service resumed in Paterson's Shoe Store, then a building in

Shanty Town in the Broad Street park, and finally its present location in the Smith Building.

He was a member of the firm of Bartle and Beal, and after its dissolution, became associated with the late John W. Rowlands in the furniture and undertaking business, which they operated for many years.

George was District Deputy Grand Master of the 17th Masonic District. He was known far and wide in Masonic circles for his rare gift of public speaking and his splendid personality. He had written the original Ritual of the F.D.C., along with Adon Smith.

In the Supreme Council, he served as Grand Marshal in 1894-95, and again in 1897-99; Grand Captain of the Guard in 1903. In the Sessions of 1910, he was Chairman of the Ritual Committee, and spoke out against the constant changing of the work here and there in the Ritual.

He died in 1929 at the age of 79 years. His was one of the largest Masonic funerals ever held in Hamilton.

Dr. J.F. McGregory

All of these men, except Dr. McGregory, were born in Hamilton. It was his adopted home, having arrived in 1883 as Professor of Chemistry and Mineralogy at Madison University, where he served for 46 years. He was also a member of the Social Club of Hamilton, later to be renamed the Citizen's Club and was soon identified with the Grotto's forming group.

John Frank McGregory served in the Supreme Council as Grand Alchemist in 1890-01; 1894 and 1896-1899; District Deputy Grand Monarch, 1892-1893; Grand Marshal, 1900-1902; Grand Standard Bearer, 1903; Grand Keeper of Archives, 1904; Grand Master of Ceremonies, 1905; Grand Chief Justice, 1906; Grand Deputy Grand Master, 1907; and Grand Monarch, 1908.

All of the Founders stand out as men of exemplary character, who consecrated their lives for the good of the human family.


