A 1963-64 President of the Masonic Service Bureau and founder of the Monroe Masonic News in 1963, George passed away on January 24, 2004 at the age of 91 years. His Masonic career also included being Master of the then Genesee Falls Lodge (now ERAC Lodge), and the 1972 District Deputy Grand Master of the Second Monroe District. He was a member of Sagoyewatha Commandery and Damascus Shrine.

R:.W:. George had the vision to bring the Monroe Masonic community together with a monthly newsletter informing all of the upcoming events and trestleboards of their respective Lodges and organizations.

Most of us who were around in the sixty's and seventy's can remember Brother George visiting the Lodges and Concordant Bodies, soliciting the Bodies membership in an endeavor to keep this paper solvent, with the hopes it never would have to shut down. Brother George even went so far as to use his own resources to keep this idea afloat. We hope he is remembered for his efforts, as we all know they were successful. His family can be very proud of Brother George's tireless hours spent achieving his dream.

The original paper was named Monroe Masonic News, reporting events on the Lodges and Bodies in the Monroe Districts. Later, the surrounding Districts were recruited to join in the membership of this publication. We now report the news and upcoming events of the Masonic Bodies in the counties of Ontario, Seneca, Yates, Wayne, Livingston, Genesee, Wyoming, and Monroe. I'm not

sure Brother George's vision reached this far, but certainly his idea was one of this area's finest means of communication. The name has been changed to Masonic Times.

The price of the original subscription, back in 1962, was \$.30 per member per year. The cost today is certainly not the same. With inflation, the costs to produce the paper have risen. As the membership has declined, these increases are amortized over fewer subscribers. It is still a publication of which we all can be proud. We have taken the liberty to reproduce, in miniature, the front page of the very first issue of the Monroe Masonic News.

Captain Wetzel was a combat veteran of WW II, serving under General George Patton. He was awarded the Silver Star with Oak Leaf Cluster, and the Bronze Star with Oak Leaf Cluster for gallantry in action while serving from February, 1944 to April, 1945.

George is survived by his wife of 68 years, Marie, two sons, four grandchildren and several great-grandchildren.

Those of us who are involved in the Masonic Service Bureau and the Masonic Times, are indebted to George for leading the way.

Washington as a Mason

Masons Ease Secrecy

Masons are well known for the secretive nature of their traditions. The international Fraternity is as famous for its private ceremonies, oaths and symbols as for its philanthropy and other good words. So few people in Fredericksburg knew what was behind the doors of Lodge No. 4.

Inside the sprawling, 188 year-old red brick building, were key artifacts from the young adulthood of George Washington, who grew up across the Rappahannock River and is the source of such pride and identity here that his portrait hangs even in the local McDonald's.

Washington was a member of Lodge No. 4, where dozens of historical items, including the Bible used at his Initiation Ceremony in 1752, the minutes of his meetings at the Lodge and a portrait by the celebrated painter, Gilbert Stuart, dating to the late

1700s, were stored unprotected from must and dust.

For years, a volunteer gave tours, but the collection was barely advertised and was seen mostly by insiders - Masons from around the world who know Lodge No. 4's place in American history. More than a decade ago, officials with the city's museum began appealing to the Masons to move their collection to safer storage space and to allow the city to display it on a much grander stage.

But the Fredericksburg Masons, influenced by a combination of possessive pride in their unique connection to Washington and two centuries of sporadic anti-Mason sentiment, turned the city down.

"People who have experienced persecution are more hesitant about opening themselves up," said J. Travis Walker, a past Worshipful Master of the Lodge and its Historian.

Then on one day last year, the Masons came to city museum officials to say they had changed their minds. It had been 250 years since Washington swore on that Bible, the Masons told the city, and they didn't want the anniversary to pass unnoticed. They know that they didn't have the money to mark the occasion themselves.

There was more to it.

Like other civic groups, the Free and Accepted Masons are losing membership, and in a culture that reveres free information and free trade, the group's reticence hasn't helped. The Masons in Fredericksburg, a place that celebrates constancy, decided to try to buck the trend by bringing some of their 250 year-old traditions into the open, hoping to save them from extinction.

Along with the exhibit, which opened last month at the Fredericksburg Area Museum and Cultural Center, the Fredericksburg Masons this year published a book by Walker about their history and have just registered the Lodge as a nonprofit organization so they can begin raising funds to restore their building and house the permanent exhibit there

"There has been a concerted effort to reintegrate our Lodge into public life," Walker said.

The world's oldest fraternal organization, the Masons which is called by many other names, including the Freemasons and, in Virginia, the Ancient Free and Accepted Masons - evolved from the guilds of stone masons and cathedral builders of the Middle Ages. Eventually they opened their membership to others and became focused on morality, charity and the requirement that members believe in some high being - regardless of what it was.

With the number of Masons nationwide down about 300,000 since 1996, to fewer than 2 million, the Fraternity is trying to be more open to shake loose the stigma of secrecy and attract younger members, said George Seghers, executive secretary-

treasurer of the George Washington Masonic national Memorial in Alexandria. After the Alexandria Memorial, the Fredericksburg collection is the second most important from Washington's Masonic past.

Because of its link with George Washington, the Fredericksburg Lodge has been hit slightly less hard by the decline in numbers and has been able to maintain more interest - among both relatively younger men and Masons worldwide who pay to be "affiliated" with Lodge No. 4. Its average age is 45, compared with the national average of 65, Walker said.

The Local Lodge has still been hurting financially and was unable to pay someone to keep the George Washington collection open when its longtime volunteer guide fell ill in 1999. The Lodge also has been unable to afford to maintain its relics.

"One minute book page was open with sunlight on it, and it almost faded away," said Don Robey, a former Virginia Grand Master, or state president, who has been involved with the Fredericksburg Lodge. Also, a document mounted on an oily board was ruined, he said.

Scholars have long studied the significance of Washington's experiences as a Mason. When Washington joined the Lodge, it was a place where landed gentry would gather and one of the few places where the British and colonials could mingle. It was a more sophisticated, worldly group that Washington had generally been exposed to, Walker said.

The impact of Masonry pervaded Washington's writing and ideas, said John Kaminski, a history professor at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, who wrote A Great and Good Man about Washington and heads the University's Center for the Study of the American Constitution.

Washington's writings rarely include references to God, and never to Jesus, Kaminski said, but rather use the terminology and philosophy of the Masons, referring to The Great Archi-

tect and building in general. Washington became a promoter of an extensive canal system aimed at facilitating westward expansion, and Kaminski suggests that he was influenced even in that by his experience as a Mason.

After Washington's death, suspicion about this elite society grew into a political party - the first Third Party - based on anti-Mason sentiment. Masons in the United States split into many factions, including some who practiced Rituals criticized as satanic and anticlerical.

Suspicions and old rumors about Masonic practice have lingered, and officials with the Fredericksburg Area Museum said they believe that part of the reason they had difficulty raising money for the exhibit may have been some donors' reluctance to be connected with the Masons.

As the world sometimes looked askance at the Masons, so did the Brotherhood sometimes look skeptically out. Robey said he doesn't favor all the moves toward openness, including the simplification of Rituals, to make it easier for people to join. "It's everywhere, so what can you do? We don't like to see those things lost, but others say, 'Hey, we need to get members in, whatever the cost."


Franklin Powell, 71, a retired contractor who has been a member of Lodge No. 4 since 1956, said he was simply worried about turning over to the museum items that have such value to the Masons.

"When you think about it, that Washington was initiated 250 years ago and you have this Bible, it's not replaceable," he said. But for the sake of saving Lodge No. 4, Powell said he supported going through the elaborate rites involved with removing certain artifacts from the Lodge. For example, three Past Worshipful Masters had to be present to escort them to the city museum.

"What can you do," Powell said. "It's just a sign of the times."



Changes can be good




Consolidation







of Plainville headed down to Florida last year on vacation without a care in the world. Little did he know that by the end of his trip he would have had his heart jump-started twice and be diagnosed with a unfamiliar genetic heart dis-

"I was in perfect health," said the 52-year-old Britton, owner had never had any problems life. except occasional high blood pressure because of stress-related problems with work."

Britton remembers his Saturday morning that his life changed. He and his wife had gone out to an antique car auction when he began developing chest pains. "I had never had chest pains before," he added.

But Britton got medical attention anyway, and felt bet- and Pedro, has been researchter within about 10 minutes. ing this disease since 1995, On the way to the hospital in the ambulance, his heart stopped, and then it restarted on its own.

The doctor in Tampa told him that Britton did not have a heart attack and that his arteries were crystal clear. "It was strange," said Britton.

The Tampa doctor then spoke with a colleague across the country, suspecting that what the electrocardiogram was showing was a newly discovered disease called Brugada syndrome.

The doctor ordered an EP test, which checks the heart's electrical activity and whether there is any type of malfunction. This procedure is performed by going through a vein in the leg and into the lower chambers of the heart. With this procedure, doctors

The doctors informed him that he did in fact have Brugada syndrome, and that he would need to have a defibrillator installed in his chest, which he of an explosives company. "I . would need for the rest of his

> Brugada syndrome was discovered in 1992 by Pedro and Josep Brugada, who identified the disease, which prevents the sodium channels in the heart's electrical impulses to pass correctly.

> Dr. Ramon Brugada, director of the Molecular Genetics Program at the Masonic Medical Research Laboratory in Utica, and brother of Josep and believes it is possible that one in 5,000 Americans may have the syndrome, and that an estimated 20 percent of all sudden cardiac deaths in America may be caused by these genetic abnormalities in the heart.

> "Don't ever think it's normal to have an unexpected, sudden death, like that of a young child or a healthy 40-year-old. It's never normal, unless the condition may be related to a very elderly person," said Brugada, who is familiar with Britton's case.

"When we got into the history of his family, we found that he had a couple of cousins who had died of Sudden Infant Death Syndrome. It's just suddenly."

Brugada syndrome is be-

that in Southeast Asia, the adult disease is also known as SUDS, or Sudden Unexpected Death Syndrome. Researches at MMRL claim that Brugada syndrome is the second only to car accidents as the cause of death for young men - accounting for approximately one in every 2,000 deaths.

Dr. Henry Ward, Britton's regular cardiologist, said that although he has been informed that the disease is prevalent in Asia, he doesn't necessarily agree with the numbers, and he believes Brugada syndrome is one of the rarer diseases.

These numbers are estimations. I don't know if you can pinpoint it," he said.

A number of area health professionals contacted for this article had never even heard of the disease, which is why Brugada is trying to get as much information to the public as possible.

"It's important to have your blood screened for genetic abnormalities, especially when a healthy member of your family dies suddenly," he said. "We need to get awareness of this disease out there."

Although there is no medicinal cure for this disease, sufferers can live a healthy life with an implanted defibrillator to jump-start the heart every time it stops. The device is checked regularly with software every three months.

Britton said the defibrillator doesn't bother him, although he does always know it's there. He claims that his life hasn't changed much, except in a few different ways.

"I can't use remote-controlled airplanes or cars, and I can't go through metal detectors. Oh, and I can't jump-start a car." If he does any of these, he risks sending a false trigger that will give him a sudden not normal for an infant to die shock, which could then cause cardiac arrest.

Taxes! Taxes! Taxes! By Tom Michielsen

The wearing "O' the Green" is prevalent and I see Leprechauns everywhere. Even the streets are putting on the green. The aroma of corned beef and cabbage is in the air.

The Internal Revenue Service comprehensive tax guide for individuals has been updated for tax year 2003 and is now available at http:// www.irs.gov. IRS Publication 17. Your Federal Income Tax, has been published annually by the IRS for more than 60 years and has been available on the IRS Web site since 1996.

Global Crossing stockholders that owned shares prior to December 9, 2003, can write off this stock as being worthless on this year's tax return.

The revised 2003 Form 8332, Release of Claim to Exemption for Child of Divorced or Separated Parents, indicates that the IRS now agrees with the holding in Lopez v. King that allowed a never-married, noncustodial parent to claim a dependency exemption where the custodial parent has waived this exemption

by signing Form 8332. In King, the Tax Court applied the special support test and held that the noncustodial parent was entitled to a dependency exemption because the custodial parent signed Form 8332 waiving the exemption. Changes to the wording in the instructions to Form 8332 reflect this court ruling.

National Taxpayer Advocate, Nina Olson, released a report to Congress that identifies the Alternative Minimum Tax (AMT) and sole proprietor tax noncompliance as the top two problems faced by taxpayers. In her report to Congress as the National Taxpayer Advocate, Olson also sets forth strong arguments for protecting the confidentiality of tax return information and makes legislative recommendations for ways to enhance these protections.

"Although the AMT was originally enacted to prevent wealthy taxpayers from avoiding tax liability through the use of tax avoidance techniques, it now affects substantial numbers of middle-income taxpayers and will, absent a change of law, affect more than 30 million taxpayers by 2010," Olson reports.

By 2007, nearly 95 percent of AMT revenues will be attributable to personal and dependent exemptions, the standard deduction, State and local taxes, and miscellaneous itemized deductions. Olson recommends that Congress repeal the AMT or, alternatively, make changes to lessen the impact on middle-income tax-

The annual report is required by law and contains three main sections: a list of the Most Serious Problems Encountered by Taxpayers, Key Legislative Recommendations, and a list of the Most Litigated Tax Issues. This year's report focuses on the IRS's need to maintain an active presence in enforcing the tax laws while balancing these initiatives with an equally vigorous protection of taxpayer rights.

Toward this end, the report reaffirms the importance of confidentiality to the tax system. "The promise that we will hold taxpayers' highly personal information in confidence forms the basis of all tax administration. Every proposal to create an exception to that promise must be balanced against the potential

impact it will have on taxpayers' continued willingness to provide that information to the IRS." Olson writes.

Olson also proposes a legislative solution to the second most serious problem - the over \$132 billion tax gap attributable to income not reported by self-employed persons (\$81 billion is attributable to independent contractor sole proprietors).

Because payments made to these taxpayers are often not reported to the IRS by payers and have no tax withheld, Olson recommends that Congress enact a withholding requirement on payments to certain categories of non-wage

Taxpayer Advocate highlight a problem that requires a response involving enforcement initiatives?" Olson asks in the report. "The answer is simple - compliant taxpayers are impacted by the large tax gap attributable to sole proprietor taxpayers."

The report makes several other legislative recommendations, including the oversight of tax return preparers. The National Taxpayer Advocate recommends that the IRS reg-

ister, test and certify persons who prepare more than five tax returns for a fee. Olson also recommends enhanced penalties against preparers (including Electronic Return Originators) and stronger due diligence requirements for persons who prepare EITC returns for a fee.

The Taxpayer Advocate Service, an independent organization within the IRS, helps individuals solve ongoing tax problems with the IRS and recommends changes to mitigate taxpayer problems.

Tompkins were permitted to attend the Mock Trial of Fairchild, and to become members of the FDC. They were elected as Knights, then created as Knights of FDC of this Illustrious Order. A payment of a dollar fee was made.

Riddell went to work to retool the work of George Beal and Adon Smith, who wrote the first script out of necessity before Fairchild's Mock Trial.

October 15, 1889 - "On motion a vote of thanks was tendered to Brother R.R. Riddell for his able and efficient service in assisting to perfect the Ritual of our organization."

Riddell visited Lalla Rookh Grotto various times. From our minutes of May 29, 1895; "Monarch George Loder introduced esteemed Prophet Robert R. Riddell, Officer and member of the Supreme Council and author of the Ritual. Prophet Riddell gave the early history of the Grotto and made some very interesting remarks."




