Distinguished Community Service Award to be Presented to Miss Theresa Capozzi

On Sunday, October 24th, Theresa Capozzi will receive the Distinguished Community Service Award, presented by the Masonic Service Bureau at the Brunch following the Interfaith Service. This annual event will be held at Logan's Party House on Scottsville Road, with the Service beginning at 10:00 a.m.

In selecting Theresa for this Award, the Committee investigated some of her activities as outlined in the April 19th issue of the Rochester Democrat and Chronicle. The headline for the Everyday Angels series referred to Miss Capozzi as the "Area's 'Mother Theresa," for the numerous programs which she serves as a tireless volunteer. Among these are: home hospice care; services for disabled and homeless veterans; Habitat for Humanity; and programs for single and disadvantaged young mothers. She provides transportation to doctor's offices or to hospital appoint-

ments for many elderly people.

As a volunteer at Webster Comfort Care Home, Theresa helps terminally ill patients and their families. She finds this very rewarding, and tries to encourage others to become similarly involved.

Her neighbors have benefited from her presence, also. She is constantly transporting children to sports practices or picking them up from school if parents are delayed.

Miss Capozzi worked with special education students at Monroe County BOCES No. 1 in Fairport, where she taught for 28 years. She became an advocate for these children.

Recipients of this Award are presented with a plaque and a check, which is customarily given to the charity of their choice. Theresa has divided hers between the Webster Comfort Care Home, Shepherd Home and Lollypop Farm, all organizations for which she has served over the years.

Leading the worship service will be R. W. Paul R. Gleason, Jr. Assisting him will be Father Otto Vogt, retired Catholic priest, and R .: W .: Maurice Solomon, who will represent the Brothers and Sisters of Jewish persuasion.


R.: W.: Frank Horton Passes


A long-time public servant and active Mason, R .: W .: and Honorable Frank Horton died August 31st. He was born December 12, 1919. His wife, Nancy, survives him.

Raised in Seneca Lodge on May 31, 1949, Frank served as Master of the Lodge in 1962. He was appointed Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of Ohio near the Grand Lodge of New York, in 1972, a position he held until he retired from the United States Congress in 1992.

Among many accolades he received were several from the Masonic Fraternity. He served as President and a Director of the Masonic Service Bureau and was given its Distinguished Community Service Award in 1981. The Grand Lodge of the State of New York awarded him the 1987 Grand Lodge Medal for Distinguished Achievement.

A member of the Valley of Rochester, AASR, Frank was coronetted a 33° Mason in 1965 and he was the sponsor of the Fall 2003 Class. He was also a member of the Commandery and the Shrine.





Regardless of your political feelings, the incident which recently occurred on the CBS Television Network is a disgrace to the journalistic efforts of honest, hard working professionals. I've mentioned before that we try to check every fact that is submitted for publication. There are four dedicated individuals proofreading the articles before they are pasted on our production boards. Hopefully, what one person might miss, another will pick up. I'd like to tell you we are 100 percent accurate; I'd like you to believe that we are! But, mistakes get through, and some of them are beauts!

On the other hand, I can relate stories where we have corrected information, so two people reporting the same item are not contradicting each other; where we corrected dates, so members would not miss an activity; etc.

I've also mentioned before that correspondents may call us at the last minute to change or correct information they submitted. We may not be happy, but we don't want to send out wrong information.

A short time ago, we were verbally chastised for publishing glowing reports on some events, which didn't happen. No one told us! In one case, the activity was cancelled in time to be deleted from the issue. In another, it was after the paper was in the mail.

I believe our readers know that much of this text is written prior to Lodge meetings or other programs taking place. I've always tried to gear the column I write for my Lodge as an announcement of the event coming up, with a follow up the next month on the success (or lack there of... or cancellation, if that be the case) of

and do not have to "sell" to our readers by sensationalizing or fabricating stories. I try not to editorialize in the paper, other than this column. If I do, I put my byline on it, so you know there may be a personal opinion expressed.

Feel free to call us to task on any mistakes you find while reading this or future issues. More importantly, supply us with correct information if you find something wrong...especially if it is repeating. We've published incorrect phone numbers for months, because no one let us know the person moved and changed their telephone number!

I hope we never have to stoop to "yellow journalism." Then again, I hope we never have to become the type of publication that would require this type of "reporting." It did give me the opportunity to request, once again, your continued support and assistance in keeping our facts correct.

nancial donation to a charity of their choice; and the Apron Presentation Dinner for Grand Lodge Officers.


This is only a small portion of what the Masonic Service Bureau does. All questions or suggestions are welcome. I will continue next month.

Monroe District Brotherhood Fund

One Million, one hundred sixty eight thousand, eight hundred fifty seven dollars and seventy seven cents! This is a large amount; an outstanding amount; one of which we can all be proud; but we can and will do better. The foregoing was the total amount raised by the 65,573 Masons in the State last year for our Brotherhood Fund, yet only 26.942% of the membership participated.

To be able to serve the Fraternity and to get out to socialize with you, my Brothers, in both the Lodge surroundings and in a relaxed atmosphere, is one of the unique opportunities in being a Brother Mason.

R .: W .: Lew Perna asked me if I would be interested in serving as District Brotherhood Fund Chairman and I readily agreed. I must admit though, I have much to learn from the Lodge Chairmen and others.

Our Grand Master, in his Address on St. John's Day, requested that "each Lodge develop a program to achieve 100% participation of the members of its District in this worthwhile effort." I, in turn, will be supporting each individual Lodge Chairman in this effort.

If you have read your current issue of the Empire State Mason magazine, on page 21 you saw that Monroe District distinguished itself last year in raising over \$30,300. and was within the Top Ten Districts in this effort. Though this amount was significant, it represented only 23.31% of our District members. We need to do better.

The Brotherhood Fund Campaign runs each year from October through May and the hard working Lodge Chairmen are the focal points of this endeavor. They will be making themselves known to you to answer questions, encourage you to contribute, provide you with information regarding the various programs of the Grand Lodge to which you can donate and to report to me their progress over the next eight months. I will be visiting Lodges to keep you informed of our progress and to pass along more information.

R .: W .: Robert Stack, the State Chairman, had some very important information to pass along regarding donations. Grand Lodge is a designated 501c10 non-profit organization and is, therefore, not tax exempt. That is why your Lodge dues are not tax deductible as a donation. That is also the reason your Grand Lodge Fund donations are not deductible.

The Masonic Brotherhood Fund, whose parent is the Masonic Brotherhood Foundation, is a designated 501C3, or nonprofit CHARITY organization. This means ALL contributions to the Fund are tax deductible.

The Masonic Brotherhood Fund is the only source of funds for our designated charities. If we do not reach our goal each year, the only people who come up short are the ones we want to help. It is YOUR dedication that keeps the support coming. The frustrating part is, that of all our membership, we cannot get more than 30% of the Brothers to help.

You can also designate the tax deductible MBF Foundation in your wills and legacies.

The point of all of this is that I want each of you to know where YOUR money goes, and how IMPORTANT it is to continue to remind everyone that it is part of our Masonic fabric to "HELP, AID and ASSIST." ×





Widows' Luncheon

On 9/11, following a very moving Memorial Service on the Monroe Community College Campus with my son and about one hundred others, I had the distinct pleasure of accompanying several widows associated with Oatka Lodge to Logan's Party House on the "Scottsville Road to Rochester" and enjoyed a wonderful program put together by Linda Zahn, Chairperson of the Lunch, with the other Masonic Service Bureau members. The food, atmosphere, fellowship, and entertainment were all wonderful.

In anticipation of the event, did some basic research and learned that the Grand Lodge of Kentucky was the first Masonic Body to undertake an event to honor the widows of our fallen Brothers (1837). Interestingly, the Brothers from Kentucky decided that by having such an event every year they would provide an opportunity to observe the widows over time and would provide an opportunity each year to talk with the widows to see if there needs were being met. The Grand Lodge of Kentucky was also the first Grand Lodge to open a Masonic Home for the relief of Widows and orphans in 1867. I must say I do not personally know any Kentuckians, "but a fellow Brother would sure be lucky to be in Bowling Green." Huh...

Murder Mystery

Chapter One -Who slew Hiram Abiff?

I know that all of you Master Masons know the story, but to properly explain the mystery we must first determine who Hiram Abiff was.

According to the author of messengers to Hiram, King of Tyre, to acquaint that friendly sovereign with the fact that he contemplated erecting a Temple, and inviting him to furnish men and materials for the prosecution of the work. Solomon's first demand was for a specially gifted crafts-

'Send me now," he says, "a man cunning to work in gold, and in silver, and in brass, and in iron, and in purple, and crimson, and blue, and that can skill to grave with the cunning men that are with me in Judah, and in Jerusalem." The King of Tyre received the embassy with cordiality, we are told, and returned a favorable answer to Solomon.

"I have sent a cunning man," he says, "endued with understanding... The son of a woman gold, silver and brass.

of the daughters of Dan, and his father was a man of Tyre."

The account given in the First Book of the Kings (Chapter VII.) differs somewhat so far as the parentage of the man is concerned. There it is stated that he was "a widow's son of the tribe of Naphtali." The author, or editor, of Kings agrees with the Chronicler that Hiram's father was a Tyrian, adding that he was "a worker in brass." Josephus describes him as of Naphtali on his mother's side, his father being Ur of the stock of Israel. It is not easy to reconcile these differences. One Biblical student Giesebrecht - suggests that the dislike felt by the editor of Kings to the idea of the Temple being built by a half-Phoenician caused him to insert the words "a widow of the tribe of Naphtali," the alteration of the phrase "of the daughters of Dan" into "of the tribe of Naphtali," being the more permissible, since Dan lay in the territory of Naphtali.

The clear points that emerge are that Hiram was of mixed race, the son of a brassworker, and a man so high in his profession as to have secured the patronage of his King, and to have been deemed worthy to uphold the reputation of his country. His exalted position is inferred from the description given by the author of the Chronicles who alludes to him as "Hiram Abi," and the word "Abi," meaning "my father," is usually taken in the sense of "master," a title of respect and distinction, I am told.

The name is undoubtedly Phoenician, but there is some confusion, as to its actual form. "Hiram" is the more common rendering, but the author of the Chronicles adheres to the spelling "Huram," and other writers adopt the variant "Hirom." Biblical scholars say that it is equivalent to "Ahiram," and means "the exalted one." According to others, Hiram, or Huram, is the name of a diety, and means "the coiled or twisted one," but other scholars regard this derivation as very improbable.

Whatever his real parentage, and whatever the exact meaning of his name, the widow's son of Freemasonry reached Jerusalem and was thereafter intimately identified with the building of the Temple. What exact share did he have in that great work?

The editors of "The Jewish the Second Book of Chronicles Encyclopaedia" point out that Road to the East program, and (Chapter ii.) Solomon sent there is an essential difference Masonic Development Course. as regards the nature of his technical specialty between the account preserved in the First Book of Kings and that in the Second Book of Chronicles. According to the former, Hiram was an artificer only in brass, and the pieces which he executed for the Temple were the two pillars, Jachin and Boaz, the molten sea with its twelve oxen, the ten layers with their bases, the shovels and basins, all of brass. But in the Second Book of the Chronicles, he is depicted as a man of many parts, and the impression is conveyed that he superintended all the work of the Temple. Josephus seeks to reconcile the two accounts by saying that Hiram was expert in all sorts of work, but that his chief skill lay in working in

There our exact knowledge of Hiram ends. History knows nothing of him. The volume of the Sacred Law is silent as to his fate. Scholars report, founding on the eleventh verse of the fourth chapter of the Second Book of the Chronicles, think he "was certainly alive at the completion of the Temple."

Out of this slender basis of fact, Freemasonry has created a wonderfully vivid character. The Order maintains that he was the chief architect at the construction of the Temple and associates him with Hiram, King of Tyre, and Solomon, King of Israel, on a footing of Masonic equality. It suggests that these three were the most exalted personages in the Masonic world and that the secrets of a Master Mason had either descended to them, or been invented by them, and could not be communicated to anyone else without the consent of all three. There were Master Masons in abundance at the Temple, but apparently none of them had been admitted to a knowledge of the secrets and mysteries of the High and Sublime Degree. Consequently, when certain curious Fellow Crafts sought to obtain the hidden knowledge, they were compelled to approach one or another of the three grand masters. You think you know what happened next? Stay tuned until next month and for the rest of the story come to the Schools of Ritual!!! I welcome you all.



Questions

A couple of questions did come up that I had promised I would clarify for the Brethren. I contacted R∴W∴ Edward G. Gilbert, Grand Lecturer for the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons in the State of New York, for clarification.

The first involves invitations to the East. This is optional. More importantly, it points out the important jobs that both the Senior Deacon and Tiler have in the Lodge. Both Officers should know (before of the opening of Lodge) of the presence of visitors to the Lodge. With this information, it is critical that they communicate the presence of visitors (along with their names and Masonic titles) to the Worshipful Master prior to opening. If both these Officers are doing their jobs well, then the Worshipful Master can conduct a personal invitation to the East versus the more impersonal general invitation.

The other question has to do with what can and cannot be read in the Ritual. The Balloting Ritual cannot be read in Lodge. Please note in the 2001 Cipher Book that prior to balloting this statement is made: "(The following is standard work)." This means this "work" is part of our Ritual and MUST be memorized. Just because some of the Ritual is not in code, does not mean that it can be read...it is a valuable part of our Ritual.

Grand Master's Edict Still in Effect!

IMPORTANT! The Grand Master's Edict is still in force! Specifically, I (or my partner, or another designate) must observe each and every Lodge in the District in its performance of one of our three beloved Degrees. Additionally, it CANNOT be the same Degree, which was observed by the AGL last year.

I have sent the Master and Secretary of each Lodge the "Annual Lodge Degree Schedule Form." I am asking that each Lodge complete this form and return it to me NO LAT-TER THAN OCTOBER 1, 2004! Upon receiving your form, we can schedule the review of the Degree. Please, Brethren, assist me by returning a completed form (with your Lodge Seal embossed), as soon as possible. Also, if your Lodge is conferring a Degree, but you are in need of someone to assume a part, please contact your Assistant Grand Lecturers and we will do our best to find a Brother who can do so. 
Please join us

I have been in contact with Bryant G. Parsons, Jr., 2003-2004 Monarch of Galae Grotto, North Fort Myers, Florida, for over a year. His father was Bryant, Sr., Lalla Rookh Grotto Monarch in 1936.

Bry, Jr., visited our Grotto when he was here in July. He donated his father's Fez and several buttons for our glass case, along with photos and news articles from 1936. I would be remiss if I didn't relate some of these events.

Bryant G. Parsons, Sr.

Born in Springfield, Massachusetts on October 17, 1894, he joined the Navy in WW I and was a cook aboard a troop transport. In 1920, he became a Mason in Hampden Lodge and a Prophet in 1921 in Bela Grotto No. 37 of Springfield.

Bry, Sr., followed in his father's footsteps and became an erecting engineer in the Skinner Organ Company of Boston. He married, and later, he and his wife, Ruth, moved to Rochester.

Bry, Jr., was born on his father's birthday, while his sister, Bina, was born on her mother's birthday, August 18th. Bry, Sr., joined Lalla Rookh Grotto in 1927 and got very involved. He was in line in 1930.

He was assistant editor of the Grand Alarm in 1933, when the name was changed to the Grotto News. He became its editor and business manager. He became manager of the Rodeo after he was Monarch, a post he held for some 25 years.

1936 Highlights

March 25th, 43 new Prophets were initiated.

April 11th, The Pipe Band had a party. Toronto Radio Singers entertained, along with vaudeville acts and three hours of dancing.

May 2nd Ceremonial, with 350 for dinner at 50 cents each. Thirty-nine candidates, with a Supreme Council Visit.

insisted he won, as he had the highest score (finished 15th out of 26th). A picnic was held at Corbett's

Glen on August 15th. A tagalong from the Masonic Temple at 1:30 p.m. to Brighton. Bring your own basket lunch. Free ice cream, suckers, peanuts, orangeade and coffee.

On October 2nd, a Clam Bake was held for 97 Prophets, provided by Prophet Louis Rund.

On October 28th, a Halloween Party with the ladies, was after the meeting.

During the year, Monarch Parsons read a letter from George Hatch, PGM, who resigned as Trustee citing the new By-Laws gave the Board of Directors all the power and left none for the Trustees.

Bryant, Sr., established his own pipe organ company in Rochester. Bryant, Jr., was discharged from the Navy after WW II, and joined his father in the business. It became Bryant G. Parsons, Inc.

Today, Bry, Sr., has passed on. Bry, Jr., has retired and now resides in Florida. His sons, Richard and Kevin, run the Parsons Pipe Organ Company in Canandaigua, employing 25 people.

While at the Grotto Office, Bryant, Jr., related many stories of the past Grotto activities and old time members. He and George Knierim both grew up around the activities of their very active Monarch Dads.

June 2, 2004

The Army is keeping me busier than ever before. I have completed lots of training since I have been here at Ft. Hood, Texas. The weather has been very, very hot. The other day it got up to 92 degrees, with a heat index of 103. I was training in this weather, too, which makes it very difficult to complete whatever it is that I am doing at that time.

I am now assigned as a Platoon leader in charge of 38 soldiers...some of them much older and more experienced than I, and from whom I am looking for guidance. The Battalion is composed primarily of people from New York City, Long Island, Buffalo and Newburgh. It comprises altogether, some 630 soldiers.

It has been a while since I have written, but I have been extremely busy. I am now a 1st Lieutenant, promoted as of two weeks ago. I have been asked by one of the senior non- commissioned Officers, who is a Mason, what steps are required to do this.
