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Editor's Corner

Forgive me for climbing on a soapbox again. (Isn't that part of an editor's job?) A few days ago, I was in a conversation with a caterer. It was interesting and eye-opening, especially because I have discussed the same topic with several Brothers in recent months. The issue? Failure to make reservations, but showing up for dinner.

The night before my conversation, 44 people came to dine at a catered Masonic function, but only 34 had decided it was appropriate to make reservations. I believe everyone attending was fed, if I understood the scenario correctly, but those who had made reservations wound up with slightly less food

Food for thought

It was "traditional" twenty or thirty years ago for Eastern Star Chapters to raise money for their activities and charitable work by feeding their Brother Masons on Lodge nights or special occasions. Degree work, Official Visits or Open Installations, the fare was always Roast Beef. You never really had to ask what the menu would be ... it was automatic! I'm convinced the reason was the same then as it is now. You can slice the beef a bit thinner if a dozen extra people appear; you can dish up three-quarters of a scoop of mashed potatoes and vegetables; ice cream or sherbet for dessert can be rationed, too. This will hardly be noticeable to the diner and, God knows, we all should eat less anyway.

The down side is that the reputation of the provider is damaged, not to mention the frustration experienced when their prepared feast doesn't fulfill the guests as intended. This is magnified when the chosen entree is prepared in individual

portions. Like our Lodges, Eastern Star Chapters are declining in numbers and members. They are also aging and no longer willing or able to put in the hours to purchase the food, prepare, cook, serve and clean up following the meal. As a result, more and more dinners are being catered. These hard-working food

preparers need to know how many people they will feed, a few days in ADVANCE! They cannot show up to the Lodge kitchen to be told how many are expected to be there, for some of the reasons mentioned in the second sentence of this paragraph...some things need to be done in ADVANCE.

If you meet in a restaurant, this whole discussion is probably of no concern to you. While the establishment could run out of a particular entree, you should be able to get some food without affecting the dinners of other members of your group.

In almost all cases I am in favor of the policy I learned has been adopted by Officers of Damascus Shriners.

The Shriners now issue red tickets to Nobles who come out for their meetings without making a reservation for dinner. When all those who called the reservation line, and are present, have been fed, remaining food is distributed to those holding the red tickets.

By choice, I don't go to the dinners which precede some functions. As an empty nester, if the women are not invited, I might choose to stay home and dine with my wife. Parts of the frustrations mentioned above are also a factor. I don't want to get there, expecting a wonderful experience, to suffer the hassles of an imbalance in the people to reservations ratio. It is more relaxing to show up just for the "main event."

You will read, hopefully, elsewhere of the upcoming Apron Presentation Dinner, sponsored by the Masonic Service Bureau. Two years ago when we honored our current Grand Lodge Officers, we set a deadline and cut off the reservations. We wound up taking a few more people past that deadline. We wanted everyone willing to attend to be present. There were several Brothers who went without supper, however, when they showed up assuming there would be plenty to eat. There wasn't!

I expect to follow the same procedure for the event to be held on June 19th. We have to notify the caterer of our count for Chicken French and Beef by June 12th. We are asking you to respond by June 9th. (We will accept your reservation TODAY!) We will not be able to guarantee dinners for anyone after I call in our tabulations.

For any function you'd like to attend, you can do yourself a favor; you can please the person(s) in charge of arrangements; you can help everyone enjoy a pleasant experience... MAKE A RESERVATION!

In some cases, you will be allowed to cancel due to illness or extenuating circumstances. In most, where advance reservations are required, you can expect to be dunned for the money...the caterer must be paid, and few organizations have the financial resources to cover this item.

None of this should be earthshattering information; I don't believe anyone has made the effort to expound on it before, as I just did.

THANK YOU TO THE NEW YORK STATE MASONS



The Masonic Student Assistance Training is well worth staff time. The Masonic Student Program is a research based program designed for New York State public schools, promoted and funded by the New York State Masons. The MSAT training in Utica has been in place since October of 2001. This program has been developed with New York State Education Guidelines for effective programs, including the requirements set forth in the No Child Left Behind Education Guidelines (NCLB) and the New York State SAVE legislation. The purpose of the program is to train core teams within a school or district in the identification, intervention and planning for students who are identified as

The training takes place over three consecutive days on the campus of the Masonic Care Community in Utica, New York.

The Masons are very generous. They offer their service four times each year and provide not only the training, but hotel accommodations and food at no cost to the schools that attend. The recommended core team includes regular and special education teachers, support staff, nurses, counselors and/or psychologists and administration. Having a strong team with administrative support, who is willing to bring information back to their buildings and share, is the key to the implementation and success of the program. Livonia has been taking advantage of this opportunity since its inception. To date, we have been able to send 50 staff members including teachers, counselors, psychologists, nurses and administrators.

Those who have participated in the training come back excited and focused. The information learned has been put into practice through our Instructional Support Teams (IST) in each building. The training encourages teams to focus their energies on issues such as attendance, behavior, health and academics. Staff is taught how to identify the early warning signs of students who are at risk and how to develop an action plan to assist individual students to work through their difficulties. Each team has returned to their building feeling empowered and ready to use their new skills to implement plans and promote positive re-

sults with their students. The Livonia staff who has attended this training are more aware than ever about the importance of working as a team in dealing with school related problems within our control, "thinking outside the box" and showing empathy and understanding to students and their families who may be experiencing a difficult

The Livingston County branch of Masons provides valuable services and support to both our school and community. Gerald Pease, a Mason since 1941, continues to be an active member of the Livingston County branch. He has been a Master of our local lodge as well as the District Deputy for the Livingston County branch. In 1994, with the support of our local Sheriff's Department, he started the Identification of Missing Children and Fingerprinting program which continues today at the Primary building. He commented that the Masons are invested in the welfare of children and work hard to provide and support programs that ensure children are healthy and safe. He was very happy to hear about Livonia's level of participation in the MSAT training.

We would like to thank the Masons throughout New York State for all they do and give special thanks to the New York State Masons Committee on Drug and Alcohol Abuse who sponsor the MSAT training. ×

APRON PRESENTATION Dinner Scheduled for June 19th



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Time to Change

Is this the time to make a change to the way we use our Ritual and conduct a Lodge communication? I have been your Assistant Grand Lecturer for nearly three years and I have found the presentation of the work to be proper. The one thing that I found to be most common among all my visits to the District Lodges is that each Lodge opens, conducts the necessary day to day operations and then closes for the evening.

Yes, using the Ritual to open and close is acceptable for the requirement of the Master to teach a Masonic lesson as he was obligated to do when he accepted the secrets of the chair. The question that comes to my mind is; have you, as Master of your Lodge, really satisfied this requirement and aided in the making of a better man and leader in Masonry and the community that surrounds your Lodge?

My answer is NO. Not a single Lodge I have visited ever tried to enter into a detailed discussion of any part of the Ritual explaining what its meaning is.

Would you trust any member of your Lodge with all of your financial assets, your wife or children?

Can anyone explain what is the "East?" when in actuality, by the compass, the Lodge room is situated North and South? Or can you tell me why each of the Master, Senior and Junior Wardens rap their gavels three times during the opening of the Lodge's communication? Why does the Junior Deacon purge the Lodge first during the opening?

These are just a sampling of the type of discussions and moral training that should occur during a Lodge communication, and for that manner, why do we call an assemblage of Masons in a Lodge room a communication as opposed to a meeting?

If the lodge was lowered to the level attained by your current candidate, this would be a great way for him to further his Masonic education and would give him more reasons to attend all future communications, particularly after becoming a Master Mason.

To obtain the time to have a discussion of this nature, is by conducting the paying of the bills, etc., prior to the communication using a committee and the budget, thereby eliminating the waste of time which can be used for education. A short report to the Brethren during the communication is sufficient.

Our Ritual is designed to be an educational tool today, as it was 300 years ago. This has not changed and never should be, but its usage has been forgotten and must be re-instituted for the future of Masonry.

My Brothers, we must change our ways NOW, making Ma-

sonry a better educated and moral Fraternity that young men will want to be a participating member in the future. I know, we have always done it that way before. Well, have the last 50 years of decline told you that the old way has failed? Let us reverse that decline by improving our standards for membership, education and morals. Start making our communications inspiring, educational and interesting. Bring the snowbirds back to the nest by changing the Summer darkness to light, and the cold Winter months of January and February to darkness, to aid in the education of the future Masonie leaders by using these older Masons. They have a lot to offer, even when they sit on the sidelines. Put them to good use, they will appreciate being asked to educate these upcoming Masters in their endeavor to lead Lodges towards the future.

We are a charitable Fraternity which gives away millions of dollars each year. I was taught many years ago that charity begins first at home, thereby better enabling myself so that I can best assist those who are truly in need. It is time to be charitable to our Fraternity and its future by spending some of those funds for our preservation in future generations.

Change is good, and let us make the changes that will keep Masonry and its moral and leadership teachings for better community and world leaders in and for the future. If we do not make changes now, there will be no moral standings or a society with knowledge of Masonry as we know it today.

Teach our Ritual and the lessons within it to all Brothers for the future of Masonry.

I express my sincere thanks to Barbara Goodrich for all the help and assistance she has given to me over the years. I also pray to the Great Architect of the Universe that all of her future endeavors, as she joins with the Senior (with loving respect) members of this great society, will honor her always. She will be missed.





Talent Show




will confer this Degree, so let's show our thanks and support with a good attendance.

The Two Paths

The two paths which Mark Tabbert outlined are the road to continued charity or the road to a more traditional Freemasonry. I agree these may be our possible courses for the future. However, I believe the real course is probably somewhere in between.

gotten the beneficent influence Masonry can shed on men and worldly overview of Masonry on communities. Today, many and seemed to recommend one men are unaware of Masonry and most are unaware of the benefits of belonging.

Charity is a way for us to expose our Craft to the community and to show people we do good work. It makes us feel like an important part of our communities. Most importantly, it is a channel through which we can promote Masonry to other men in our communities. This creates an image of the Masons being another group of "do

The problem is, no longer are our Lodges comprised of the leadership of our towns and villages. No longer are we heavily comprised of the captains of finance and industry. No longer do we largely influence the directives of our local governments and businesses. Therefore, we must find purpose. Our purpose of late is to be a charitable organization doing good work in our communities, rather than the traditional purpose of building leaders of men.

Traditional Freemasonry

As our speakers explained to us, traditionally, Freemasonry was an organization of men who were the pillars of their community. It was an elite organization that required a certain level of intellect, of stature, and of association to join. Masons were regarded as men who were important and influential and the Lodge was a focal point in the community. The Lodge was a place where men could go to aspire to be better men and mix with those who were influential in their community. It was a place where not all men were accepted. These qualities made for a certain lure to men who had high ideals and goals. Thus men flocked to Lodges and sought membership.

Today, in other parts of the world, traditional Freemasonry thrives. The societies where this is true are unlike most societies in North America. In these places, Freemasonry is an elite group and men are very carefully and thoroughly investigated and scrutinized before they are considered for membership. The process of joining can be much more rigorous, more time consuming and more expensive than it is here. Once raised, these Masons feel they have accomplished a monumental feat. Certainly, elitism exists in these Lodges the way it once did in North America. It is interesting to note that membership is very often growing in these Lodges, rather than declining.

My Choice





Our Lodge and Fraternity are really quite similar to a painting in its composition. Each of us represent a different brush stroke, it can be of any color, length, width or depth. A single brush stroke begins the master-

piece. No two marks will ever be the same, yet they come from the same painter's palette and the same artist chooses the canvas and paint.

I have read numerous philosophical accounts like the one that I have written above, or similar themed stories from others in our Fraternity. These thoughts usually show a comparative relationship to something that we might see as a tangible object in order to make it a more understandable and solid definition. Additionally, we often hear the familiar themes of our story as in, "Masonry makes good men better," but rarely hear the specifics of how that really happens. Just how do we put our finger on this; how do we grab on to this Fraternity?

Those of you who have been Masons for many years have a certain faith in the Fraternity, which leads you to believe in Freemasonry. In my conversations with members of Seneca and other Lodges, I find that we often express our own personal interpretation of why we are Masons and what purpose we serve in a variety of words. Most often I hear things like "It's a healthy place to spend an evening," "I like the people who come to the meetings" or "I feel like I'm giving a little back." These unassisted responses coincidentally match so nicely with our official motto, "Friendship, Morality and Brotherly love."

When speaking with non-Masons about Masonry, we might choose to discount the core principals of Freemasonry because we feel that they can't be explained well without sounding weird (think canvas and paintbrush). Or, we may be inclined to use uncommon terms like "cabletow," "subdue our passions," or "Masonry makes good men better." I suggest that we would need to think to ourselves and communicate to others in terms of the sizzle and not the steak, speaking more of the benefit not the feature. There really is a difference; here is an example. Feature: Meetings are always on the 2nd Tuesday of the month: Benefit: Just knowing that these meetings always occur at this time makes it so convenient for me and my family to make monthly schedules.

Masonic meaning is often understood through philosophy, expressed with faith and reflected in our words and actions. This means that we may not ever actually grab the Fraternity but we can grasp the Fraternity and its principles to share with others and make a masterpiece.


April



for this year's campaign. We didn't attain 100% membership participation, but that doesn't make me any less proud of what was accomplished through your cooperation and contributions.





It's April, and you're once again burning the midnight oil, poring over stacks of paperwork or small pieces of paper with little or no explanation on them, trying to file your income tax return on time. If you're rushing to complete your return, you may be making costly mathematical errors, overlooking important deductions or missing tax credits for which you might qualify. Yes, you might be one of those people in the TV ads who overpay their taxes each year. Why are we so stupid to subject ourselves to this torture year after year? Each year we tell our spouses and ourselves that next year will be different, but we do nothing to make our lives

The definitions of custodial parent and noncustodial parent for dependency exemptions, the child tax credits, and other provisions of the Code, were changed as a result of the Gulf Opportunity Zone Act of 2005. A custodial parent is newly defined as the parent having custody of a child for the greater part of the year. The new law also restored the requirement that a noncustodial parent who claims an exemption for a child must attach Form 8332, or a similar statement, signed by the custodial parent to his or her income tax return.

According to the IRS, the changes are not reflected in the 2005 instructions for Form

1040; Form 1040A; Form 2441; Form 8615; Form 8814; Publication 17; Publication 501; Publication 503; Publication 504; and Publication 929.

The Internal Revenue Service has certified the model year 2006 Toyota Prius Hybrid for the clean fuel vehicle deduction. This certification means that taxpayers who purchased a 2006 Toyota Prius new during calendar year 2005 may claim a tax deduction of up to \$2,000 on Line 36 of Form 1040. Starting in 2006, the deduction is replaced with a credit, which equire a different certification. The tax credit for hybrid vehicles applies to vehicles purchased on or after January 1, 2006, and may be as much as \$3,400 for those who purchase the most fuel-efficient vehicles.

Taxpayers residing in Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New York, Vermont and the District of Columbia, have until April 18th to file and pay their income tax. The Internal Revenue Service Center in Andover, which processes returns for those areas, will be closed April 17th in observance of Patriot's Day.

Think about it

This article was written by Ben Carson, a medical doctor who gained worldwide recognition in 1987 for his part in the first successful separation of Siamese twins, who were joined at the back of the head. Dr. Ben Carson tells us of his emotions as he faced the seemingly inevitable death of a patient, the father of three children. He

It's a miracle!

"Lord, I need a booster here," I remember praying. You could do wonders for my faith right now. Somehow, bring Rob (not his real name) out of this situation. I do not know if I believed that God would do it or not; I did not know that I had to ask ...

Within two days, Rob was off the respirator. He was soon talking and walking. His children came to see him, and I experienced a deep, peaceful joy as I watched him playing with his little ones...

A few days after Rob went home there was an interesting development. Since I first entered the field of medicine, I have met doctors who have difficulty with unanswerable situations. Often they'll finally admit, "Well, there's some explanation, we just don't understand it."

One of the neurosurgeons, an especially brilliant man, and one who does not acknowledge a belief in God, pondered this matter with Rob for several days. He asked question after question, determined to figure out an answer. None of us could offer an explanation for Rob's recovery. "Absolutely none," I said. "I know, but I think I finally figured it out," he said. "Really?"

"Sure. Simple. It's the mitochondria at the sub cellular level, and they can go into shock." (That is, some of the energy producing parts of the cells that constitute the central nervous system had simply started functioning again at a normal level. Basically it was like turning the lights down low, but not turning them completely off.)

I listened to his explanation before I asked him a question. "Tell me, did you ever see such a thing before?" He said "No, not really, but-"

This is a miracle," I said. "Why not accept it for what it is? They don't come any more blatantly than this. Rob was gone and now he's back. This is the only time I've ever seen an adult sink to such a low neurological level and then recover." As my final statement I said, "We don't have to explain miracles; all we have to do is accept them." Keep the faith!



Think about it

As Masons, the tenets of Faith, Hope and Charity are very important to us. I want to focus on Faith in this issue. I came across a short article that I want to share with you. It was written by James Schaap, who s a professor of English and was teaching at Dordt College in Sioux City, Iowa at the time of the writing of this short story.

Faith can move mountains!

A Doctor, who is not a believer in God, once told me that he had seen miracles with his own eyes. The bones of an old woman he treated were rotting with cancer, he said. Yet, she walked to his office for appointments. She shouldn't have been able to move, he said. Her pain should have been that bad. But what should have been wasn't. Why? Her faith, he told me. As she came closer to her death, she looked forward to life eternal. Her faith gave her the ability to take pain that no one should have been able to take.

Of course, that doesn't mean that those who feel pain have no faith. What the doctor remembered, he remembered as a miracle. But faith can do things that we think are impossible...

You really can't blame the ten spies for chickening out of going to Canaan...They've seen the forts of the Canaanites. Sure, there's milk and honey, and everything's really rosy in this new land. But there are also giants running around. The place is crawling with fighters. No way, they say. No way can we take all those Hittites and Jebusites and Amorites.

Caleb and Joshua pooh-pooh the other ten.... "God loves us," they claim. "He'll bring us in safely."

But ten-to-two odds don't win elections. The Israelites believe the ten and run scared. It's easy to understand why, because it is easier not to have faith.

God doesn't like it - not at all. "If you're so scared," He says, "then why don't you just back up and start over?" Then he tells Moses the bad news. Not one of those who complained, not one of those who are over twenty-one years old, will ever make it to the Promised Land. That's their punishment for faithlessness. A whole new generation of Israelites will have to be born into the kind of strong faith that their parents lack. Then, God's chosen people will make it.

Brother Johnson is a native of Lynchburg, Virginia. He is the oldest of three children born to Roberta Davis Johnson and the late William A. Johnson, Sr. Having earned both a Bachelor's and Master's Degree in Political Science from Howard University in Washington, DC, he has prior academic experience as a tenured political science professor at Mott Community College in Flint, Michigan.

While in Flint, Brother Johnson was the Deputy Executive Director of the Urban League of Flint. He subsequently became the President and CEO of the Urban League of Rochester where he served for 21 years, until his election as Mayor of Rochester in 1993. Brother Johnson was Rochester's 64th Mayor and the first African American Mayor of any major city in upstate New York.

Andrew Moore, Dean of the College of Liberal Arts, said: One of the great advantages of bringing the Mayor to RIT is that he will help strengthen several of our initiatives, not only in public policy, but also in criminal justice, political science and [the] planned new degree in urban and community studies." In this program it is said that undergraduates and graduate students will be working with faculty to solve problems in areas such as "environmental policy, energy policy, biotechnology policy, information and communications policy, and industrial policy."

Brother Johnson remarked that he was pleased to join the RIT faculty where he would be able to work with young people in an academic setting.

Brother Johnson is the recipient of many awards, including an Alumni Award from Howard

University, his alma mater, for Distinguished Post Graduate Achievement in Public Service, the Distinguished Minott Professor at RIT and the recipient of three honorary doctorates: Keuka College (1990); St. John Fisher College (1998); and RIT (1999). He has received over 200 awards and citations during his career and has served on the Boards of more than 30 organizations. He is a member of Eureka Lodge No. 36, PHA.

Brother Johnson is the husband of Sylvia M. Johnson, Esq., an assistant US Attorney, the father of three daughters and one stepdaughter; and the

grandfather of four. He has put his musical training to use as an organist and choir director at several churches in three States and the District of Columbia, over the past 53 years. He is currently improving his pipe organ skills under the tutelage of David Higgs, Chair of the Organ Department at the Eastman School of Music.

Brother Johnson has not only been a lifetime teacher, but a life-long learner as well.




