Postage

As previously mentioned, the increase in postal service rates is one of the reasons our subscription prices increased. I am still waiting for the first issue to be mailed under the new figures (this one!) to see just what the difference is. We mail to many areas and each has its own postal service designation and price structure. Some of them went up; some went down; I'm anxious to learn the results of these changes.

Moving?

Most publications, if not all, are not forwarded to you when you change your address. They are returned to the publisher at a fairly steep price. For the past few years, that rate has been \$.70 per copy, which is billed annually on the invoice to your

organization. We have just received our first returns under the new rate, which is \$.75. This is an appeal to you, if you plan to move, to get your new address to us as quickly as possible. You will save your organization an additional charge and won't miss an issue of the Masonic Times. (Organization Financial Officers, please make a note of this new price so you won't be sur-

prised in the Fall.)

On the same topic, we make an effort to take care of snowbirds. If you let us know when you leave (giving us your Winter address), we will change the mailing list and send issues to you while you bask in the sunshine. Please, though, let us know when you return so we can put the local address back in the system. We haven't found



Elections




In May our Masonic year will conclude with the election







We will be glad to see you at Lodge. Take care until then. *





By now our newest Brother will have taken his Fellowcraft Degree. We really need new blood. Maybe you know a few good men. We need members, not just names in a roster book.






A 55-year Service Pin was presented to Brother Richard Wood and a 45-year Service Pin was presented to R:.W:. Richard D. Brown.





Amended Tax Law

The New York Corporation Tax Law has been amended to provide a new method for computing the business allocation percentage (BAP) for all Article 9-A taxpayers. When calculating the tax on the entire net income base, the minimum taxable income base, and the capital base, these affected Article 9-A taxpayers will allocate their business income, alternative business income and business capital to New York State as follows for tax years beginning on or after January 1, 2006, and before January 1, 2007; taxpayers will use a 60% weighted receipts factor, a 20% weighted property factor, and a 20% weighted payroll factor. Thus, in computing the business allocation percentage, the receipts factor will be multiplied by three and added to the property factor and the pay-roll factor and the sum will be divided by five.

On December 7, 2005, the Internal Revenue Service issued proposed guidance on the disclosure or use of tax return information by tax return preparers. A key principle underlying the proposed guidance is that tax return preparers may not disclose or use tax return information for purposes other than tax return preparation without the knowing, informed and voluntary consent of the taxpayer. A taxpayer's consent to each separate disclosure or use of tax return information must be contained on a separate written document, which can be furnished on paper or electronically. A taxpayer's consent to a tax return preparer's disclosure or use of tax return information must include the name of the tax return preparer, the name of the taxpayer, and the date on which the taxpayer signs the consent. If a taxpayer consents to a disclosure of tax return information, the consent must identify the recipient or recipients of the tax return information and the intended purpose of the disclosure. If the taxpayer consents to use of tax return information, the consent must describe the particular use authorized. If the

use tax return information to generate solicitations for products or services other than tax return preparation, the consent must identify each specific type of product or service for which the tax return preparer may solicit use of the tax return information. Examples of products or services that must be identified, if solicited using tax return infor-mation, include, but are not limited to, refund anticipation loans, balance due loans, mortgage loans, mutual funds, individual retirement accounts, and life insurance. A consent to use or to a consent to disclose tax return information must clearly state that the information may not be used for any purpose not specifically prescribed in the consent. The consent must specify the particular items of tax return information to be disclosed to each recipient or used by the return preparer. It must include the contact telephone number for the Treasury Inspector General Tax Administration (TIGTA), 1-800-366-4484. This telephone number allows taxpayers to report suspected unauthorized uses or disclosures of tax return information. All consents to use or disclose tax return information must be signed by the taxpayer.

Scams

It's that time of year when unscrupulous people come out of the woodwork. Watch for scams that ask for upfront preparation fees and personal information to obtain a fraudulent refund of Social Security taxes paid in. Also watch for identity theft Internet scams promising income tax refunds to taxpayers who enter their name and Social Security number on an official looking form. These forms are not legitimate.



We do not meet in January or February. Our March meeting will be the 23rd at the Nutcracker Restaurant. We will order off the menu.



in a service unit. One Saturday our CO, who was a Mason, and had learned of other Masons under his command, passed the word to us that transportation would be available the next morning to take us to Paris for the re-opening of the Grand Lodge of France.

Challenging your health insurance denial

It can happen. Your health insurer refuses to provide coverage for a procedure it deems to be medically unnecry. Even if your doctor and his staff "go to the mat" for you, it may not be enough. Insurance companies are large bureaucracies. Not everyone has the time, patience or inclination to "squeak" loud and often enough to get noticed.

Sometimes a "no" answer is nothing more than a tool to manage by frustration. Fortunately, State and Federal laws provide some measure of protection. Health insurers are mandated by law to provide an independent appeal procedure. This is a quick, relatively inexpensive procedure to challenge a denial of coverage.

This article will provide a brief oversight on how to request and use an external appeal procedure. For more inwebsites. The first is collaboration by the Kaiser Family Foundation and Consumers Union. This website can be found at:

To understand how appeals work and why they are necessary, let's first review how health insurance coverage can be denied.

Health care benefit coverage can be denied for two main reasons. First reason: the procedure isn't medically necessary. Second reason: you obtained medical care from a provider who isn't a member of the health care plan "network" of recognized providers.

Before challenging a denial, formation, I recommend two first determine why you were

denied. Many health care plans are managed in a way to save costs. Some managed care plans, to save costs, negotiate fees up front with physicians. Physicians who choose to accept these rates can become members of a provider network. This network is essentially a group of physicians who will accept rates as set by the health insurer.

medical care from a physician who does not participate in this network. Depending on your type of managed care health plan (POS-Point of Service or PPO-Preferred Provider Organization), your health insurer either denies coverage or only pays a percentage of the total medical bill because you used a non-networked physician. You will have a hard time prevailing on an appeal challenging a denial if you chose a provider "outside the network." A notable exception is if you needed emergency care.

Another source of denial is obtaining services from a specialist without first having obtained a referral from your primary care doctor. It's now an article of faith in managed health care that you cannot see a specialist unless referred

by your primary care physician. Your primary care physician is the gatekeeper. In order to obtain health insurance coverage for services provided by a specialist (i.e. surgeon), your primary doctor

ating at home.

1. Refer you to this specialist; Obtain prior authorization for this referral from your health insurer.

Let us say that you obtain As a side note, you may be required to obtain the prior authorization yourself.

> Just as in obtaining coverage outside the network, you will have a hard time prevailing on an appeal denying coverage unless you obtain a referral, and prior authorization for the procedure that forms the basis of the referral. A notable exception is if you needed emergency care.

Presuming you followed the rules and cut square corners and the health insurer still denies your claim for coverage, the first step is to review your health care plan booklet. Steps on how to immediately challenge a denial can be found inside this booklet. If you no longer have it, then a call to either your employer's human resources department or to the customer service telephone

number of your health plan, will get the process rolling.

If your dispute cannot be resolved directly with the health insurer, then the next step is to file an external appeal. An external appeal is a review of your claim by an independent third party.

To start this process, you must file an appeal form with the State Insurance Department. This form can be obtained online at:

www.ins.state.ny.us/ extappqa.htm#standes

The form itself must be filed within 45 days of being notified that your claim was denied. The 45-day rule is strict. If the State Insurance Department does not receive your appeal application within these 45 days, then you loose your right to an external ap-

Once the appeal is received by the State, the appeal must be determined within 30 days. This is known as a standard appeal. If there is a medical emergency involved, and if your physician certifies as such, then a 3-day expedited appeal is available. Depending upon which health plan you are enrolled in, you may have to pay a \$50 fee to have your appeal assigned to a reviewer. *




