Walk... So They May Read!

Imagine what your life would be like if you couldn't read. You would be missing out on one of life's most fundamental gifts. If you couldn't read, your innate curiosity would turn to frustration and anger - a bad combination of feelings. Children born with a neurological disorder called dyslexia (sturggel wiht thees teeligns eveyr yad) struggle with these feelings every day. Through no fault of their own, they are faced with reading and writing roadblocks that have seemed insurmountable - until now.

Dyslexia can't be cured, but it can be overcome. On Saturday, October 14, 2006, we are walking to raise money to help dyslexic children in our community learn to read and write. The program offered at the 320 Masonic Learning Centers for Children provides the most effective treatment of its kind in battling this reading disorder. No one else in the nation has a program remotely like it, with one-on-one, professional tutoring offered to children at no charge to them or their families; this type of program is not available through any other school (public or private).

We need your help to keep up this good work. We are asking you to lace up your sneakers, raise some funds, and take part in the WALK to Help Children with Dyslexia, a 3-mile walk along the scenic Erie Canal. Check-in begins at 9:30 a.m. at Perinton Park in Fairport. The WALK begins at 10:30 a.m. Following the WALK, you and your family will be treated to a picnic lunch, great music and entertainment by the Shrine clowns and

Honeoye Falls Honors Union Star bodge

On August 21st, Members of the Temple Association of Union Star Lodge were presented a Proclamation of Thanks by the Village of Honeoye Falls Board of Trustees and Village Mayor, Richard B. Milne. It was noted by the Village Board that the Masonic Building at the main intersection of the Village has been a focal point of history for the Village of Honeoye Falls throughout the years.

Over the last two years, Union Star Lodge has been involved in a major reconstruction project on the outside of the building. Beginning with a complete outline, by an architect, of work to be done, it included a project bid package, review of submitted bids and the final awarding of the contract. The actual work on the building started in 2005 and resumed in the Spring of 2006.

This project included very special historical preservation work on the brick, repairs to the roof fascia and complete paint-

ing of the building. The detail foundation and there was com-of these bricks and fascia at the plete window replacement. top of the building was done with extreme care. New copper flashing was installed around various areas of the building, including tops of the chimneys.

In recent years, the building has undergone electrical system upgrades by Brothers Jerry Wiedemann and Bud Ripley. Also, repairs were made to the

The building was built in 1860 and was the home of the "Wilcox House," a local hotel. Union Star Lodge purchased the building on April 1, 1920, from the Estate of Sylvester and Marion Wilcox. On November 17, 1920, the first Communication of Union Star Lodge was held in this building.

As previously announced, the Masonic Development Course will be held on three consecutive Friday evenings in October: October 6th, 13th and 20th from 7-9 p.m. The class location will be Unity Lodge, 133 South Union Street, Spencerport.

Pages 4 through 18 of the course-required textbook should be read and Quiz No.1 completed (15 multiple choice questions) prior to the first class. This takes about one-half hour to complete and, if not done, may extend the first class time requirement. Everyone taking the course should also have a copy of The Standard Work and Lectures of Ancient Craft Masonry (Revised and Reprinted 2001). The newer Masons have been given a copy by Scottish Rite through their supportive Blue Lodge initiative.

The book is \$12.50 and can be ordered from Grand Lodge Services (David Fransen, 1-800-362-7664, Ext 647). Some Lodge Secretaries have a supply on hand for purchase by Members. Each Mason should have his own copy for studying the Ritual they must know as they advance in Masonry.

As M .: W .: Neal I. Bidnick said in his June 24th address to District Deputy Grand Masters, Grand Lodge Staff Officers and makes this great Craft of ours different from most other fraternal groups is the fact that in reality we are an educational institution dedicated to assisting our members to improve themselves by learning the meaning of the basis of a good life. It is one of the core reasons for the existence of our Fraternity and the catalyst to keep it growing in the future.




Eunice Lodge had a 225th Anniversary Celebration Service the same day and also did





DO YOU HAVE AN AGENT?

NYS Has a new Final Disposition Law

Many New Yorkers already have a Health Care Proxy but now there is a new Public Health Law, effective August 2006, which allows them to appoint a "Final Disposition Agent". This law allows an individual to appoint a person they trust - such as a family member or close friend - to act as their "agent" or legal representative - to control the disposition of their remains following death.

Your "agent" would have the legal authority and responsibility to ensure that the deceased's wishes concerning final disposition are carried out as intended. Funeral directors, cemeteries, crematories and other providers involved in the proces follow the deceased's directions, as well as any decision made by the agent if there are no specific written instructions.

By appointing an agent, an individual is making sure that his or her wishes are honored by significantly reducing any chance that family members or others who disagree with these plans can alter them. In addition, a person may also give the agent specific instructions concerning details for the funeral and /or burial.



New Grottoes were formed as the Knights of the F.D.C. moved on to form the M.O.V.P.E.R. The Members of the Supreme Council went to the various new Grottoes and installed the Officerselect.

They went to Ilion, NY, and installed the Officers of Khorassan Grotto on June 11, 1891, and Lalla Rookh on August 26, 1891. The Prophets from Mokanna Grotto came to Rochester quite often, staying overnight at the old Lexington Hotel. LeRoy Fairchild, who was Monarch of Mokanna Grotto, even conducted the Ceremonial while in Rochester.

From reading the minutes of the first 1891 meetings, they had two meetings a month, much as we do now. There were minutes of only the formal Grotto meetings. There was voting on Petitions, business and a Ceremonial at each meeting.

Most minutes read that the Grotto was opened without form. For several years I wondered about that. In August, I came across a paper in which was typed the short form opening. At the September 20th meeting, both were presented for information. To my knowledge, it was the first time in over 100 years.

In the historical presentation, it was brought out there was some humor in the installing of the new Officers. In the next ten years the Supreme Council addressed that situation and asked all Grottoes to refrain from humor during the Installation.

As Lalla Rookh is now the oldest working Grotto in the Realm, the old typed paper needed to be shared, and this meeting was a good time to do it. We can appreciate how we evolved even more, when we see how our Charter Members conducted their meetings.



Taxes! Taxes! Taxes! By Tom Michielsen Taxes!

The leaves are turning bright colors and soon will be falling faster than we can rake them. The sweet smells of apple and pumpkin pies are in the air. Autumn must be here again. That means Winter is coming soon!

For tax years beginning in 2006 and 2007, an individual can take a credit against his or her New York State personal income tax based on the costs incurred by him or her on or after July 1, 2006, and before July 1, 2007, that are directly associated with the replacement of an existing home heating system. The replacement system must be installed in a residence that is the taxpayer's principal residence at the time the costs are incurred. The residence must be located in New York State and the installation cember 31, 2007. The credit is not allowed for the installation of a home heating system in a newly constructed principal residence.

To qualify for this credit, the home heating system that replaces the old system must, after installation, qualify for and be labeled with an Energy Star label. An Energy Star label is placed on a home heating system by the manufacturer pursuant to an agreement by the manufacturer with the United States Environmental Protection Agency and the United States Department of Energy.

The amount of the credit is equal to 50 percent of the costs incurred on or after July 1, 2006, and before July 1, 2007, that are directly associated with the replacement of an existing home heating system. However, the credit cannot exceed \$500.

principal residence at the time the costs are incurred. The residence must be located in New York State and the installation must be completed before December 31, 2007. The credit is not allowed for the installation of a home heating system in a newly constructed principal residence.

One of the more unexpected changes of recent legislation is the new "kiddie" tax rules. Prior to 2006, minor children under the age of 14 were required to pay tax on their unearned income (investment income) at their parents' higher tax rate. Beginning in 2006, the age limit increases and applies to chil-

dren under the age of 18. The unearned income of children that exceeds \$1,700 will be taxed at the parents' highest marginal tax rate, if taxing the income at that rate results in a higher tax.

The following are some questions that you and your tax professional should answer now to avoid surprises in April when you file your tax return:



National Heritage Museum presents **David Hackett Fischer**

Noted Author and Historian Speaks on Liberty and Freedom

Sunday, October 15th, noted author and historian, David Hackett Fischer, will discuss the many meanings of "liberty" and "freedom," and how they have changed throughout history, in a lecture beginning at 2:00 p.m. at the National Heritage Museum. The talk is presented in conjunction with the exhibition, "American Vi-sions of Liberty and Freedom," currently on view at the Museum. Mr. Fischer's appearance is co-sponsored by the Massachusetts Foundation for the Humanities as part of their Massachusetts History Lecture series. Admission is free. Call (781) 861-6559 for more information.

David Hackett Fischer is the Earl Warren Professor of History at Brandeis University. His major works have tackled everything from large macroeconomic and cultural trends in Albion's Seed, and The Great Wave, to narrative histories of significant events in Paul Revere's Ride and Washington's Crossing, to Explorations of historiography in the book Historians' Fallacies.

He is best known for his maargued that core aspects of American culture stem from several different British folkways and regional cultures, and the Pulitzer Prize-winning Washington's Crossing, a narrative of George Washington's leadership of the Continental Army during the winter of 1776-1777 during the American Revolution.

American Visions of Liberty and Freedom

What do palmetto trees, rattlesnakes, and the Statue of Liberty have in common? The answer is revealed with a visit to "American Visions of Liberty & Freedom." The exhibition shows how generations of Americans, from Revolutionary times to the present, have drawn, carved, and quilted symbols to represent their sometimes conflicting defini-tions of liberty and freedom. Among the more than 200 objects in the exhibition are icons such as the Statue of Liberty, Uncle Sam, and the

concerns of succeeding gen-

For example, following the September 11, 2001, attacks, all U.S. Navy vessels were ordered to fly the navy's original red-and-white striped naval jack bearing a rattlesnake and the words "Don't Tread On Me." This was the jack used in the Revolutionary War, and its use was revived as a symbol of our nation's traditional resolve. The flag on view in the exhibition was flown aboard the USS Nashville during Operation Iraqi Freedom. Similarly, the palmetto tree, a Revolutionary War symbol of South Carolina's resistance to the British, reappeared during the secession movement of 1860-1861. The first exhibition section, "E Pluribus Unum," deals with the mounting protest against British policies such as the Stamp Act, Townsend Acts, and Tea Act. Regional symbols of resistance, like the backwoods rattlesnake symbol, spread throughout the nation. After the war, the new nation realized it needed unifying symbols for the nation's varying interpretations of liberty and freedom. Important objects in this section are a "Liberty Tree" powder horn, a 1790 cotton textile panel called "The Apotheosis of Franklin,"

American flag that have been and a rare silver badge from revived, revised, reviled, or the African American "Bucks reinterpreted to express the of America," a Massachusetts Revolutionary War unit composed of former slaves.

"A New Birth of Freedom" deals with the place of African Americans in American society, terminating in civil war. The abolitionist movement, secession movement, Confederacy, and Union each had its own symbols. The hammer of an 1863 rifle is cast in the shape of President Abraham Lincoln's head, and a whale's tooth is incised with a picture of a member of the United States Colored Troops. An African American in his country's uniform, bearing a weapon, was a powerful symbol of freedom, especially to black Americans.




