
I am confident of a good year due to the fact our Lodge has both an elected and appointed line made up of some of the best men and Masons that I have ever met.






W .: Russ thanked the Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master,



Brother to bring their Bible because each will be stamped and signed by the Master and Sec-







Ugly Run attendance and financial success Fourth Annual expected to be bigger and better yet!



Like former one-handed major-league baseball players Jim Abbott and Pete Gray, Sakina Smith mastered the rapid transfer of ball from glove to hand at an early age. The Webster Thomas High School softball player does it so naturally and so quickly that if you blink your eye, you won't even notice that her catching hand and her throwing hand are one and the same. "She gets the ball in faster than most players with two hands," marvels Kelly Burns, one of Sakina's teammates on the Titans Junior Varsity softball team.

She does many things better than her two-handed peers.

And that's not by accident.

Her parents raised her to believe that anything's possible, despite being born without a left hand and forearm sixteen years ago.

"We've learned how powerful the mind and spirit can be," says her father, Tim Smith. "We've made sure we never used words like disability or handicap around her. We always told her she could do anything anyone else could."

Including play softball.

"I've been involved in either softball or baseball since I was about 4 or 5," says Sakina, who was the starting rightfielder for the Thomas JV's this spring. "My big brothers (23-year-old Turiq and 20-year-old Idris) got me interested. It was a family tradition that was passed on to me."

Sakina's performance for the 10-1 Titans earned her a promotion to varsity, which begins sectional play at 4:30 this afternoon against Iron-dequoit at home. "She is so deserving," says Thomas JV coach Emily Miller. I had 16 kids on my team and none of them worked harder than Sakina. Her teammates love her. She is shy and doesn't say a lot, but she knows how to lead by example."

Zestean Smith was about five months pregnant with Sakina when she watched a television show about kids dealing with a variety of challenges, including con-

genital amputation.

"It was amazing to see what they were able to do," she recalls. "That show would wind up inspiring me once Sakina was born. It kind of was God's way of reminding us that we should focus on making the best of what we have rather than worrying about what we don't have."

While the absence of a left hand and forearm obviously was a shocking revelation to her parents, they have since

I find that life can be very interesting when discovering history and your part in it. Since we started this column, various Nobles from time to time will bring forth material worthy of developing a story from which we all can benefit.

In the past we have talked about the Imperial Session that was held in Rochester in 1911, and I believe we had a post card from that time period.

Just recently I came across some notes that my Grandfather had kept pertaining to that episode and I will share them with you. I knew he was a Shriner, but did not know when he became one or anything about the Shrine at that time.

In one of his early diaries he writes: "1911- (a side note) my father was born at 11:45 a.m., July 23rd of 1911. Later in life he became a member of Warren C. Hubbard Lodge. Now back to the orginal story. On April 20th 1911, my grandfather was made a 32nd Degree Mason and, on May 3rd, a Shriner in Damascus Temple. July 11th, 12th, and 13th the Imperial Council, Ancient Arabic Order of the Nobles of the Mystic Shrine met in Rochester and were entertained by Damascus Temple. At least 70,000 Nobles and their friends were in the City. There was a big parade on the night of the 11th. It was the grandest parade Rochester ever had. The Uniformed Patrols wore gorgeous costumes. Most of those not uniformed wore dress suits and fezzes. It took 1 hour and 25 minutes to pass a

This was all he wrote, but I hope that you get a flavor of the times in 1911.

discovered what Sakina was born with has been more than enough to compensate for her missing limb.

During a recent victory against Hilton, she managed two bunt singles and a walk in four plate appearances. Each time Sakina reached first base, she removed the artificial limb and handed it to her first base coach as if it were nothing more than a protective shin guard. Sakina's younger brother, 12-year-old Amean, retrieved the prosthesis and returned it to her equipment bag.

Like her favorite player, New York Yankees shortstop Derek Jeter, Sakina is an astute and aggressive base runner.

She has great instincts," Miller says. "She knows when to steal and when to take an extra base on a hit. She rarely makes mental errors.

Softball is one of many passions. Sakina played guard for the Thomas JV basketball team last winter and plays trombone and tuba in the school band.

Sakina also excels in the classroom. She is a straight-A student and has been named an Urban League Scholar and earned national honors in chemistry.

She has thought about going to college to become a forensic scientist, but she may choose a different path.

"I'm thinking about maybe becoming a prosthetic maker," says Sakina, who has used different prosthetics from the Shriners Hospital in Erie, Pa., since she was about 8 months old.

"I had a chance to design one that helped me with the slide (on the trombone). I think it would be cool to be able to help other people with the same challenges

Such talk is music to her Mom's ears.

"Long ago, I told Sakina that regardless what she chooses to do in life, she will always be a teacher," Zestean says. "Not a teacher in the traditional classroom sense, but rather a teacher in life. By living her life to the fullest, without any limitations, she is educating all of us about how powerful the mind and spirit can be."

Summer is about over, the children are thinking of school days and renewing friendships, and it is time to again resume our labors. Our Representatives in Congress and the various State assemblies have again changed the tax laws, some for the better; some for the worse.

Organizations that provide seller-funded, down-payment assistance to home buyers do not qualify as tax-exempt charities, the Internal Revenue Service said in a ruling released May 4th.

Down-payment-assistance programs provide cash assistance to homebuyers who cannot afford to make the minimum down payment or pay the closing costs involved in obtaining a mortgage. Such programs can qualify as tax-exempt charitable and educational or-

Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3) when properly structured and operated.

The ruling makes it clear that seller-funded programs are not charities because they do not meet the requirements of Section 501(c)(3). Increasingly, the IRS has found that organizations claiming to be charities are being used to funnel down-payment assistance from sellers to buyers through self-serving, circular-financing arrangements.

In a typical scheme, there is a direct correlation between the amount of the down-payment assistance provided to the buyer and the payment received from the seller. Moreover, the seller pays the organization only if the sale closes, and the organization usually charges an additional fee for its services.

The IRS is increasingly concerned with organizations that are taking advantage of homebuyers who need assistance for a down payment to realize the American dream of home-ownganizations under Internal ership," said IRS Commissioner

Mark W. Everson. "So-called charities that manipulate the system do more than mislead honest homebuyers and ultimately jack up the cost of the home. They also damage the image of honest, legitimate charities."

Two tax law changes became effective in 2006 for estate and gift taxes. The annual exclusion for gifts made is now \$12,000, an increase of \$1,000 from last year's \$11,000 exclusion. The unified credit, which can be used to reduce or eliminate estate tax, rose to \$780,800, up from \$555,800.

Hoping to encourage higher savings and more banking, the IRS will create a new program to allow taxpayers who use direct deposit to divide their refunds in up to three financial accounts.

A new form, Form 8888, will give taxpayers a choice of selecting up to three accounts such as checking, savings and retirement accounts. Taxpayers who want all their refund deposited directly into one account can still use the appropriate line on the Form 1040 series. The program will take effect in January 2007.

Businesses, particularly when they hire additional workers to help them meet increased demand for their goods or services, must make sure they treat their workers properly to make sure everyone can meet their tax obligations.

Most workers fall into two categories: independent contractors and common-law employees. The main factor a business must use in determining how to classify its workers is the degree of control the business has over its worker. The more control the business has over a worker; the more likelythey are an employee rather than an independent contractor.

After increased complaints, the Internal Revenue Service reminds taxpayers to be on the lookout for bogus emails claiming to be from the tax agency. These emails are designed to trick the recipients into disclosing personal and financial information that could be used to steal identities and financial assets. The Internal Revenue Service does not send out unsolicited emails asking for personal information.





DO YOU HAVE AN AGENT? NYS Has a new Final Disposition Law

Many New Yorkers already have a Health Care Proxy but now there is a new Public Health Law, effective August 2006, which allows them to appoint a "Final Disposition Agent". This law allows an individual to appoint a person they trust - such as a family member or close friend - to act as their "agent" or legal representative - to control the disposition of their remains following death.

Your "agent" would have the legal authority and responsibility to ensure that the deceased's wishes concerning final disposition are carried out as intended. Funeral directors, cemeteries, crematories and other providers involved in the process of final disposition must follow the deceased's directions, as well as any decision made by the agent if there are no specific written instructions.

By appointing an agent, an individual is making sure that his or her wishes are honored by significantly reducing any chance that family members or others who disagree with these plans can alter them. In addition, a person may also give the agent specific instructions concerning details for the funeral and /or burial.



A Prophet recently inquired about the fez case outside our office. One is the "First Aid Fez" and has an interesting story all its own.

Prophet William H. Craw's wife was in the hospital for a serious operation and the doctor said she would need a blood donor in a hurry. The year was 1933, before the days of blood banks and large donor lists.

He had to make 24 calls before he found the right blood match. He vowed, if his wife got well, he would do what he could to see no one else faced what he did. She did recover, but it was six years before he could make good on his vow.

In 1939, Monarch Stuart Bowie appointed Prophet Craw, Chairman of the Sick Committee. While calling on a sick Brother in the hospital who needed a blood transfusion, he conceived the idea of a Blood Donor's League among the Grotto members.

The Grotto Masonic Blood Donors League operated in a very efficient manner. They were not only interested in aiding the Red Cross in obtaining blood for their blood bank in Rochester, but also through the Order of the Eastern Star and the Masonic Fraternity.

The service of the League was open to all Masons and members of their families. The donors agreed they would not accept any remuneration for any blood donations, and those receiving blood were informed that they could not make payment for the same.

Within the first few years, 275 transfusions had been given. Prophet Craw personally gave 60 pints, and 25 out of several hundred gave 12 pints each. One Brother whom the doctor held little hope for, received sixteen transfusions and in a short time was back to work.

Not long after the League was formed here, Craw received pleas from other Masons to help form other Leagues. He was credited in helping to form Masonic blood donor leagues in Batavia, Syracuse, Erie, PA, Akron and Cleveland, OH, and Memphis, TN.

The Masonic Service Bureau assisted Brother Craw and completed an inclusive list of donors. When an emergency call is received and Brother Craw cannot be reached, the Bureau would notify a donor.

Today, two Lodges still have blood drives, and the Damascus Shrine Center permits use of its facilities by the Rochester Chapter of the American Red Cross. Next time you pass the glass display case and see Prophet Craw's fez, remember the Prophet that made a difference.







new meeting place sometime during this Masonic year. There is a cooperative York Rite New Home Team working hard to find a place for us.


