Interfaith Service and Brunch Halloween - A Fun Time for Enjoyed by All!

We celebrated the 66th Annual Masonic Interfaith Service and Brunch at the Country Party House on October 28th.

The Service

Those who attended were treated to a thought-stimulating and inspirational message from retired Priest, Father F. James Lawlor, residing at St. Thomas More Church.

His message about the principles of good Stewardship covered not just the obvious - tithing and monetary contributions, but donation of talents (given to you by God) and time (prioritized by you). As a New Year approaches and we're all thinking about the principles of the Fraternal organizations to which we belong, the following may shed new light on our goals and inspire us to reconsider priorities.

Stewardship

The Bible is very clear...

- · God created the heavens and the earth (Genesis 1:1).
- · God created human beings, blessed them, and gave them dominion over the earth (Genesis 1:26-28).
- · God, the Creator, took humanity into partnership (stewardship) of creation.
- · God put mankind in the garden "to cultivate and sustain with loving care" (Genesis 2:15).

Clearly, we are called to be good stewards.

Principles of Good Stewardship

Everything we have (our time, talent, and treasure) has been

given to us by God, and we are called upon to be good stewards of these God-given gifts. If we take Genesis seriously, then we need to become good stewards of all three gifts. Not just a small portion of each, but all our time, all our talent, and all our treasure. And, as stewards, we need to learn to use them as God intends them to be used, and also to return these gifts to their rightful owner - God the Creator!

Time

God created Time. Time is a universal gift - everyone gets the same amount every day. We cannot add to, and we can't slow it down. But we can choose how we use it. Stewardship calls us to use our time wisely by taking time to talk with God in Prayer.

It also means giving your time to be present to others (spouse, children, parents and others close to us). It means investing time in working for the church and for the community. And it means taking time to refresh our minds and renew our souls.

How will you commit your time this year?

Talent

God gave everyone one or more talents. This list of talents (special gifts from God) is endless - and so is their use for carrying out God's plan.

Stewardship calls us to identify our special gifts, accept them gratefully, without pride or false humility, and use them well, as God prompts us. Good stewards also look for talents in others and encourage them to put these gifts to work. Being a good steward means looking for ways to make your community better than you found it.

How will you commit your talents this year?

Treasure

Stewardship calls us to have a proper attitude towards money and material things. Are we owned by our possessions, or do we see them as God sees them? It is easy to be trapped by possessions. Jesus warns us: "You cannot serve God and money...Where your treasure is, there will your heart be."

Stewards know that the money and material possessions they have are merely held in trust from God. The day will come when God asks: "What have you done with all I have given you?" How will you respond? A steward responds by recognizing the need to give. Sharing a portion of one's income, assets, and possessions is the best way to show gratitude to God. Jesus said: "Give not just from your surplus but from your need."

The steward gives what in prayer feels right with God.

How will you commit your treasure this year?

Beautiful music was provided by Beverly Murray, Supreme Rodeval of Daughters of Mokanna of North America. The President of the Masonic Service, R .: E .: James A. Ghent, Jr., welcomed everyone and gave an opening reflection for the Meditation of the day -Stewardship.

Stewardship is a way of life; a life style; a way of thanking God for all our blessings by returning a portion of the Time, Tal-

In fact, we have missed articles completely for this reason. We try to acknowledge within a couple of days that your article has been received and we are able to reformat it for the Masonic Times. If you don't receive confirmation of receipt, call us.

Second, we receive large files. These are slow to download and quickly clog up our Inbox. Gmail is a web-based mail service with enormous capacity.

Third, we should be able to access these messages from any computer. If we have a computer crash, we can access from another machine and are not hampered in publishing articles.

It should be easier for you to remember, too. Just start typing Masonic Times, and your address book memory should fill in the rest of the address for you. Once you send it, look for our reply of receipt. If that doesn't come, please re-send your material or send us another email message asking if we received it, or give us a phone call at 671-9730.

They not only do patrol duty, but front attack in battle zones, protection escort for Troop ships, chase subs, board illegal boats and ships (this could be very dangerous, for you never know what is waiting when you board), be on the lookout for mines and a host of other dangerous assignments. When I went to Attu Island in the Aleutian Islands in World War II, they were our invisible escort, never to be seen for fear of giving our Troop ship location.





I see this time in the life of Milnor Lodge as historic and exciting and I hope you find the work enjoyable and fulfilling!


you could let an Officer know if you will (or will not) be attending a scheduled event, especially one involving dinner.

Road to the East


The Road to the East course for incoming Masters will be offered on three Saturdays in February 2008: February 2nd, 9th and 23rd at 1 p.m. at the same location.





When one of the boys was called forward to receive his participation patch, he asked the leader where his patch was for the community service




Masonic education. R∴W∴ Thomas Paglia was also present and made a presentation regarding the Grand Lodge Veterans Service Committee.

Children - Chicago in 2006. This pilot program aimed to not only identify and improve communication between providers at the Chicago hospital and referring primary care providers, but also to identify promising strategies that might enhance coordinated care at other Shriners Hos-

pitals. Anticipated benefits to this project include: increased access to a medical home for children youth with special health care needs, potential costs savings, patient and primary care provider satisfaction, and enhanced quality of pa-

Essentially, a witch's familiar was, according to 12th century belief, the devil in animal form, usually a cat or goat. It was said that the devil would appear at the black masses of the witch's, which were held at midnight, and thus we gain some of the motivation behind accusation number eight - That the Templars held their meet-

Since this accusation of worshipping a cat, as a witch's familiar is a standard accusation of heresy during the time of the Templars trial, we can be certain that there is little value in suggesting that the cat was the Baphomet enigma.

This leaves us with that portion of the accusation, which claims that the Templars worshipped an idol that was a head. Theories on this "idol" are many. One theory is that it was the severed mummified head of John the Baptist. This seems plausible due to the fact that trading in religious relics was plentiful during the crusades. Another theory is that it was based on the Shroud of Turin. Given that the Templars were actively involved in the sac of Constantinople in 1204, this could seem plausible. When the shroud is folded, it will depict the head of bearded man, which fits the description of the bearded head to be the object of Templar devotions.

While both of the above theories have supporters and detractors, no trace of any such relic forbids all forms of idolatry.

was found when the Templars were arrested throughout France and beyond. In fact, the only item found was a gilded head. This gilded head was the image of a woman, and may well be a representation of the Virgin Mary, to whom the Templar preceptories and churches were dedicated.

The most plausible explanation, according to Stephen Dafoe, of the word Baphomet is that it is either Old French for a corruption of the name Mohammed or that it is a corruption of the Arabic, Abufihmat, which means Father of Understanding or Father of Wisdom. According to Webster's Revised Unabridged Dictionary: "A corruption of Mohamet or Mohammed, the Arabian prophet; an idol or symbolical figure which the Knights Templar were accused of using in their mysterious rites." It was true that the Templars fought along side (and against) Moslems during their time during the Crusades, and that some believed that they adopted some Islamic beliefs. However, the problem with this, according to some scholars, is that anyone familiar with Islam knows that as a religion Islam

the Arabic work Abufihmat meaning the Father of Understanding or Father of Wisdom, think about this. It cannot be argued that many Templars spoke Arabic, for this was necessary in order to deal with their enemies and to survive in the communities in which they had business dealings. Perhaps the Templars adapted this common Arabic word as a name for King Solomon, who's Temple was the basis of their (our) name. Additionally, Dr. Hugh Schonfield, whose work on the Dead Sea Scrolls developed one of the more interesting theories. He studied a Jewish cipher called the Atbash, which was used on some of the scrolls, claimed that when one applied the cipher to the word Baphomet, it transposed into the Greek word Sophia, which means knowledge.

I tend to lean towards the theories around Wisdom and/ or Knowledge. What a tie to Masonry. Anyway, something to think about.





The Holiday Season is fast approaching and everyone is scrambling to get their shopping and wrapping completed. We are attending parties and seeing family for the joyous occasion. May the Season bring happiness, joy and peace to you and your family.

Not reporting or under-reporting business income, including income from construction activities, contributes to the tax gap. The tax gap is the difference between the amount of taxes that should be paid in a given year and the amount actually paid voluntarily and in a timely way. Contractors, subcontractors, as well as individual workers need to be aware of everything that counts as income so they pay their fair share of taxes. They also need to be aware of all deductible expenses so they don't overpay their taxes.

and workers must pay taxes on income received for all work. including side jobs and work that is paid for with cash. This includes work in exchange for credit on a bill. It also includes work that is done in exchange for goods or services in a barter exchange. You are required to report your income even if a sued to you.

Expenses

Ordinary and necessary business expenses are deductible. An "ordinary" expense is one that is common and accepted in the construction business. A 'necessary" expense is one that is helpful and appropriate for the construction business. An expense does not have to be indispensable to be considered necessary.

Common business expenses deductible in the year incurred include: Utilities, car and truck expenses, advertising, employee salaries, trade association dues, rent expense, supplies, continuing education, small tools expected to last one year or less, steel toe work boots and business licenses; expenses for business assets that are expected to last more than a year must be capitalized and depreciated over their useful lives. Examples of assets include: cement mixer. compressor, ladder, other heavy machinery, buildings and real property.

Personal expenses including clothing that can be worn off the job site, fines and penalties, and the non-business use of vehicles or computers cannot be deducted.

Other expenses, including certain meal and entertainment expenses, may be deductible in part or only if certain conditions are met. Additional information

about other expenses is available in Publication 535, Business Expenses; Publication 463, Travel, Entertainment, Gift and Car Expenses; Publication 946, How to Depreciate Property; Publication 334, Tax Guide for Small Business, and Publication 587, Business Use of Your Home. And further industry information is available in the Construction Industry -Federal Taxation Curriculum.

The responsibility to prove entries, deductions, and statements made on your tax returns is known as the burden of proof. You must be able to prove (substantiate) certain elements of expenses to deduct them. Generally, taxpayers meet their burden of proof by having the information and receipts (where needed) for the expenses. You should keep adequate records to prove your expenses or have sufficient evidence that will support your own statement. You generally must have documentary evidence, such as receipts, canceled checks, or bills, to support your expenses. Additional evidence is required for travel, entertainment, gifts and auto expenses.
