Another Have-a-Heart Campaign is completed and my congratulations to all the Brothers and Sisters who braved bad weather and a terrible economy to raise \$18,000 for the local Ronald McDonald Houses.

The outcome to raise as much as we did last year was in doubt until the last day of the Campaign. But on the last day at Marketplace Mall, the Brothers of Union Star Lodge gathered to raise \$900 in six hours to push the Campaign over the top. Contributions during the week were down from last year, but a good job on the weekends made up the difference.

Another reason for the success is what I call the sticky heart approach; which means getting out from behind the tables and mingling with the crowds to pass out hearts (30,000) and explain to passing patrons just what was going on and the main reason for being there - donations for the Ronald McDonald House.

We will be presenting the check from our 2010 Campaign to a representative of the Ronald McDonald House charities on April 10th at the College of Freemasonry. Hopefully the new Di-

All those receiving a Charity or Education Assistance Grant need to be represented and provide a short talk on where used and how this will help them.

Camp DeMolay

Special to the Masonic Service Bureau, was his generous support to Camp DeMolay at Sodus Point, on the shore of Lake Ontario. Not too long ago, when we were dedicating a new recreation building at the Camp, Robert reminisced from his memories of the property and jotted them down for all to know. He had a love for the Order of DeMolay, an organization for boys to form the principles of Masonry as they became young men. Some interesting points Bob shared follow ...

Camp DeMolay was originally Camp Beechwood, due to the abundance of Beech trees and was purchased in the early 1930s.

The Order of DeMolay in Rochester ran dances called "Collegiate Club" at the Masonic Temple on Friday nights. They

used local bands, except for once a month when they would hire a traveling "Big Band" to play.

This was a money-maker for DeMolay, which at one time had over 250 members in Rochester Chapter. With profits from these dances, Dr. Elmer G. Seel, who was District Deputy for Western New York DeMolay, and his good friend Lennarth C. Anderson, who was Dad for Rochester Chapter, purchased the Camp for Rochester Chapter.

Prior to World War II, many DeMolay members spent Summers at the Camp and worked on the grounds and buildings. There was a lodge at the East end of the Camp called "The Old Folks Home" where the men cooked their meals, mostly on a grill, and rested afterward, playing nickel

2010 Circus Report



Pennsylvania DEP Secretary Plans Visit to Erie Hospital

John Hanger, Secretary of the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection, visited the Erie Shriners Hospital to learn how the hospital was using the \$250,000 Energy Efficiency Grant it received in December from the DEP. That grant, which was made possible through the Federal American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (federal stimulus grant), is being used to improve the hospital's lighting, air handling and boiler systems and is expected to save the hospital about \$64,000 a year in utility costs. Work on this project was expected to begin last month.

In addition to touring the facility, Secretary Hanger held a news conference in the Hospital Auditorium.





Consider getting on the Bandwagon; let's just have some fun!



Taxes, Taxes! By Thomas Michielsen

It's April, and you're once again burning the midnight oil, poring over stacks of paperwork or small pieces of paper with little or no explanation on them, trying to file your Income Tax Return on time. If you're rushing to complete your Return, you may be making costly mathematical errors, overlooking important deductions or missing tax credits you might qualify for. Yes, you might be one of those people in the TV ads who overpay their taxes each year. Why are we so stupid to subject ourselves to this torture year after year? Each year we tell ourselves and our spouses that next year will be different but we do nothing to make our lives

Taxpayers nationwide have until Thursday, April 15, 2010, to file their 2009 Returns and pay any taxes due.

If someone else claims you as a Dependent, you may still be required to file your own Tax Return.

Whether or not you must file a Return depends on several factors, including the amount of your unearned, earned or gross income, your marital status, any special taxes you owe and any advance Earned Income Tax Credit payments you received.

If you are a Dependent, you may not claim an exemption. If someone else such as your parent - claims you as a dependent, you may not claim your personal exemption on your own Tax Return.

Your Spouse is not Your Dependent

On a Joint Return, you may claim one exemption for yourself and one for your spouse. If you are filing a Separate Return, you may claim the exemption for your spouse only if they had no gross income, are not filing a Joint Return, and were not the Dependent of another taxpayer. If You have Tots and Teens

Got Kids? They may have an impact on your tax situation. Listed below are things for you to consider if you have children.

 Dependents - In most cases, a child can be claimed as a Dependent in the year they were

2. Child Tax Credit - You may be able to take this credit on your Tax Return for each of your children under age 17. If you do not benefit from the full amount of the Child Tax Credit, you may be eligible for the Additional Child Tax Credit. The Additional Child Tax Credit is a refundable credit and may give you a refund even if you do not owe any tax.

3. Child and Dependent Care Credit - You may be able to claim the credit if you pay someone to care for your child under age 13 so that you can work or look for work.

4. Earned Income Tax Credit - The EITC is a benefit for certain people who work and have earned income from wages, self-employment or farming. EITC reduces the

The Chapter has Candidates for all of the Degrees. There are several Brothers who need the Holy Royal Arch Degree and there are Brothers who are just starting on their journey in the

The Rite is a journey that has been designed to help a Mason build upon the lessons of the first three Degrees. Our Ritual, ceremony and historical lessons of the Rite are intended to be the completion of the 3rd Degree. Or that is the intent. There is much to be learned about the development of the Holy Royal Arch Degree and its prerequisites, the Mark Master Mason, Past Master and Most Excellent Master.

When the Royal Arch was originally developed, it was intended to be conferred after the 3rd Degree. The Ancient Grand Lodge of England was the first Grand Lodge to accept the Royal Arch Degree. The Modern Grand Lodge did not approve of conferring the Degree in its Chartered Lodges, so it agreed to the development of a separate Grand Chapter. The Ancient Grand Lodge approved of the Royal Arch being a part of the workings of a Lodge.

This was a point that needed to be resolved when the Modern and Antient Grand Lodges decided to consolidate. The final solution was the statement in the United Grand Lodge constitution stating "ancient Craft Masonry consists of three Degrees only, including the Holy Royal Arch." Now this is a conundrum that every Companion should consider solving for themselves, or at least investigate.

It is interesting the Masonic historians know more about the development of the Scottish Rite, or the Ancient and Accepted Rite, as it is known in England, than they know about the development of the York Rite and its Degrees. This means there is more work to be done to develop the history of the Rite. Therefore, there is more to our Rites than meetings and Ritual. We should all get to work to learn more about the Rite.

Let us hope that Spring is here and the weather is improving. Companions, enjoy Spring and attend Chapter meetings to share our personal experiences with the Rite.

The Council of Troyes By Alan Butler

The evidence put forward to what Bernard had to say withcommentator, suggests that it was in the year 1118 that Hughes de Payen, a member of the verting the rule of St. Benedict, lesser nobility from Champagne, presented himself, with a number of companions, before the throne of Baudoin II of Jerusalem. After 1118 comes the mysterious period, about which we know so little. What was the embryonic Knights Templar doing in Jerusalem? Were they really intent on keeping the roads clear for pilgrims and if so, why were there only about a dozen of them? Is it possible that they had some other reason, such as digging below the Temple Mount? This is speculation and represents possible intrigue covered in other articles and it is fair to say that the first genuine date we have for the

which time the Templars officially came into existence.

It is suggested that at some period prior to 1128, Hughes de Payen wrote to Bernard, later St. Bernard of Clairvaux, by this time the leading light in the Cistercian Order and a force to be reckoned with in the Catholic Church. Hughes is supposed to have asked St. Bernard if he would consider sponsoring the embryonic Order and perhaps create a "Rule" for what would be essentially an institution of Holy Knights.

Bernard of Clairvaux, the shining star of monasticism, was prevailed upon to take the embryonic Templar Order under his wing, to regularize it and to seek an official recognition by the Pope. In preparation for the event, Bernard penned a long document entitled "In Praise of the New Knighthood.'

Bernard's championing of the Templars was not without opposition. Cardinal Harmeric, a man close to Pope Honarius II, wrote to Bernard saying "It is not fitting that noisy and troublesome frogs should come out of their marshes to trouble the Holy See and the Cardinals. With customary humor, Bernard defused the critics by a show of humility, virtually demanding that the Cardinal "order" him to stay out of papal affairs. By so doing, he made the Cardinal look rather stupid and, on the way, gained the attention of the Pope. Beneath the humility, there was a barbed threat. Bernard was close kin to the ruling house of Champagne - a powerful elite with whom the Pope would not wish to provoke an argument.

As in all matters to do with the creation of the Templars, there are more questions than answers, but it is a fact that the Pope convened a Council in Troyes, the capital city of Champagne, in the year 1128. The purpose of this Council was to settle disputes regarding the Bishops of Paris and to deal with other Church matters relevant at the time. Bernard high-jacked the Council, using it for his own purposes. How was he able to do this? Almost certainly it was quite easy, since the Council was being held in the heartland of Champagne, only a few miles counts as to the actual "found- from Bernard's own flourishing ing" of the Poor Knights of abbey of Clairvaux. The Pope by Guillaume de Tyre, a later out directly insulting the Count

of Champagne. Bernard had been busy conalready adapted for the Cistercians themselves, to a form that would fit the Templar Order. By the time the Pope sat down to convene the Council of Troyes, he was faced with a fate accompli. He simply could not risk offending the rulers of Champagne, who were also blood tied to the kings of Jerusalem. In addition, the apparent intention of the Templar Order probably impressed the Pope, since this armed group of knights, which would certainly grow exponentially, as the Cistercians had done, would be responsible "only" to the Pope. With an eye for the future and living in dangerous times, Honorius II might have consid-

Templar Order is that of 1128, at ered the formation of what amounted to his own private army no bad thing.

As Bernard of Clairvaux was to do on many occasions during his life, he had "stitched up" the papacy, ensuring that the Templars would not simply exist, but that they would be headed by factions drawn directly from Champagne and from his own family. The rest, as they say, is history. When Honorius II died in 1130, against all the odds, Bernard managed to have Gregorio Papereschi, a man with a dubious claim at best, elected as Pope Innocent II. This Pope, and his successors, was deep in debt to Bernard, who left no stone unturned to have more and more papal declarations made to consolidate and promote the Templar Order.

However, the Council of Troyes of 1128 was the turning point of early Templar fortunes and could be considered amongst St. Bernard of Clairvaux's greatest victories.

The WALK and Family Picnic are being held to raise funds to support the tutoring program at the Rochester Learning Center and to raise awareness in our community of the problems children with dyslexia encounter. With greater awareness, more children can be diagnosed and treated. Our goal at this year's WALK is to raise \$10,000, and with your help and support, WE CAN DO IT!

The Center provides free tutoring for children suffering from dyslexia, a neurological disorder that impedes reading and writing. As the children gain the skills to overcome their reading roadblocks, their selfesteem is restored and they can succeed in the normal classroom setting. Instruction is individualized and one-on-one, a program of far greater intensity than can be offered within the public schools. This professional tutoring service costs approximately \$5,000 per child per year, and is provided at no cost to the children or their families. In addition to helping students, public and private school teachers are being trained, free-of-charge, in the Orton-Gillingham approach of tutoring at the Learning Center.

These skills are transferable into the teacher's classroom.

Grand Historian

This month I will whisk you back to the evening of April 18, 1775. Revealing the name of the horse ridden by Paul Revere in the poem written by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow in 1862. It started: "Listen my children and you shall hear of the midnight ride of Paul Revere

All children still read the poem in school. Here are some of the facts you may not know. Paul owned a horse in the early 1770s, but didn't own one in 1775. On the early evening of April 18th, Doctor Joseph Warren, Master of St. Andrew Masonic Lodge, sent for Paul Revere. He gave Paul the task to ride to Lexington, Massachusetts, alerting Samuel Adams and John Hancock that the British regular troops were marching into the countryside to arrest them.

Paul had plans already in place. He assembled some lifelong friends and Masonic members of the Sons of Liberty and the Committee of Safety to help execute it. Robert Newman would set two lanterns in the upper window of the tower of the Old North Church, "One light by land, two by sea." and displayed the light. (Those lanterns set the Revolutionary War into motion.) At 10:15 p.m., Paul proceeded to the Northern shore of Boston, where he kept a row boat.

Once the lanterns were seen, associates Joshua Bentley and Tom Richardson rowed him across the Charles River to Charlestown. The two-year-old chestnut mare was saddled and waiting. Revere later said "She was a very good horse." At 11:00 p.m., Revere mounted and rode west into a full-moon night, and Lexington. It was cool,(mid-forties) On the way he stopped at each house alarming the countryside, "The regulars are coming out!" Near Medford, a hard run to avoid the King's mounted infantry.

Near Lincoln, he was captured by the British and his horse confiscated to replace a tired sergeant's weary horse. To keep my story short ... we all know the tale ... Paul was joined by William Dawes, as well as Dr. Samuel Prescott. It was said there were as many as forty rid-

ers also alerting the population.

Lest I forget, I did say I would reveal the name of the two-year chestnut mare that was loaned to Paul by Deacon John Larkin. The horse was owned by his father Samuel, who owned other horses and had a stable. The horse was never returned by the British and believed died during the war. The horse, made famous by Longfellow's poem, was "Brown Beauty," said to be the fastest in the Colonies. Her value was \$60 at 1775 prices, but that was, as you know, 235 years ago.



Blackjack. There were more cabins constructed as time went on and an outdoor Chapel was constructed, where it is still located today, based on the design of a Lodge Room. DeMolay Degrees were conferred there upon new members of the Chapter.

After World War II, Anderson Lodge was constructed. About 1962, the original "bunkhouse" was built over weekends by members of DeMolay and Frank L. Simes Lodge. Lumber was donated by Rochester Lumber Company. DeMolay Chapters have used and helped maintain the Camp over the years.

The Camp was turned over to the Masonic Service Bureau in 1996. As property appraisals rose steeply in the 90s, the Town of Sodus Point re-appraised it as high-end Lakefront Property and the property taxes were overwhelming.

Camp DeMolay was a labor of love for the entire Anderson family and many families and youth groups continue to enjoy and benefit from its existence. Robert Anderson's memory lives on in the Beech trees, shoreline and waters of Camp DeMolay. God bless this wonderful man.

also give you a refund.

5. Adoption Credit - You may be able to take a tax credit for qualifying expenses paid to adopt an eligible child.

6. Children with Earned Income - If your child has income earned from working they may be required to file a Tax Return. 7. Children with Investment Income - Under certain circumstances a child's investment income may be taxed at the parent's tax rate.

8. Coverdell Education Savings Account - This savings account is used to pay qualified educational expenses at an eligible educational institution. Contributions are not deductible, but qualified distributions generally are tax-free.

9. Higher Education Credits - Education tax credits can help offset the costs of education. The American Opportunity and the Lifetime Learning Credit are education credits that reduce your Federal income tax dollar-for-dollar, unlike a deduction, which reduces your taxable income.

10. Student Loan Interest -You may be able to deduct interest you pay on a qualified student loan. The deduction isclaimed as an adjustment to income so you do not need to itemize your deductions.

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
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
