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Cameron Community Ministries benefits from Masonic Events

The Valley of Rochester, Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite, sponsored a Decorating Party at the Shrine Center on Friday, December 11th. Persons who came to help were offered a Spaghetti Dinner, with the price being an un-wrapped toy for a child. The All-Masonic Bodies Children's Christmas Party commenced at 11:00 a.m. on Saturday the 12th. Again, those attending were asked to bring an unwrapped gift for a child, in addition to the present Santa would give to their child.

The intent of this solicitation was to benefit the United States Marine Corps "Toys for Tots" Program. The Marines were expected to be represented at the Saturday event to receive the donated toys from the children and parents who brought them.

No one showed. After several attempts to arrange for a time for the toys to be picked up failed, a back up plan was put into affect.

Cameron Community Ministries is an ecumenical urban community center in an area of high poverty around Lyell Avenue in Rochester. While they are faith based, they do not proselytize. They have been a recipient of grants from the Masonic Service Bureau's Charity Committee distributions. A call was placed to them to see if they could use these items.

Cindy Harper, the Executive Director, came right over in a Mini-Van and accepted with enthusiastic gratitude the gifts. The CCM volunteers were in the process of wrapping presents for their Santa Party, and contemplating a shopping trip to procure the additional gifts they would need to supply all their guests. She hoped the approximately 75 gifts we pro-vided would eliminate that need!

In addition to the toys, \$60 in cash, which had been donated by individuals who attended but had not purchased a gift, was given to her, as well. In a letter received from Cindy, she penned this note, "Thank you for all the toys as well - our Santa party had 238 children yesterday, up from 150 last year!"

I wanted those of you involved or participating in these events to know the outcome. The decision to change recipients came about in conversations and email messages with Sublime Princes Phillip Hurwitz and Donald Tubman, who were coordinators of part of the program for the Valley of Rochester, so we would not lose the opportunity to have the toys distributed for the holidays. My thanks to all who supported these events.

What About the Bells?

Have you ever heard a church tower with a dozen bells when they all start ringing? Well, it happens on Sundays and special occasions all across England and used to happen in Buffalo, too. It happens every Tuesday, as well as Sundays, in Toronto; Wednesdays in Quebec; Saturdays in Brewster, NY, and Kent, CT, Trinity Church on Wall Street and the Post Office in Washington, DC, too!

There are over 35 bell towers in the USA. All of them welcome experienced ringers and arrangements are frequently made for trips around the country at the Annual Guild Meeting in September and at the area meetings all year long.

Local Ringers

There is a bell-ringing group here in Rochester. We rehearse using hand bells after church on Sundays and as often as possible we travel to cities with towers to practice and perform. We have traveled to Kalamazoo, Miami,

DC, Marietta/Atlanta and we have sent ringers to England, South Africa and Australia for "ringing tour vacations."

We are raising money to hang a "ring" of bells across the street from Eastman School of the practice to have the donor's Buffalo. They stopped ringing host Council. during WWII and now no one remembers which church they are hanging in!

Ringing on hand bells is fun. There is no "melody" as there is with hand bell choirs in churches. Instead, the bells are rung as though they are tower bells.

Instead of a 1,500-pound bell rung on a rope, the heaviest hand bell (called the tenor) is usually the middle C bell, which weighs less than two pounds. We sit in a circle and ring the

Editor's Corner

As I proofread articles of subscribing organizations for publication in the Masonic Times, I have noticed many Lodges expressing the need for, or thanking, Brothers from other Lodges to assist (for assisting) in the Conferral of Degrees. The good news is there are many Brothers in all the surrounding Districts who are qualified, able and willing to give of their valuable time to

The sad news is, I believe, there are Brothers within the Lodge who could perform this duty but are unwilling. Some of the older members, who in their prime were learned individuals in the Ritual, may be house-bound, ill or infirm. They cannot be used as an example of an unwilling Brother.

Many others, however, who could perform valuable service to their Lodge are, frankly, unwilling to participate. I ask them, Why did you join the Fraternity? Why don't you want to assist in the most important aspect, and primary reason for the Lodge having a Charter, that of conferring the three Degrees?

Many Lodges are having difficulties. With some, it is financial problems; others, declining membership and Officer Candidates. Nine of the thirteen Monroe District Lodges have Masters this year who are re-treads.

They have agreed to step in to help keep the Lodge functioning, and should be

lauded for those efforts. But, they still need support and help from YOU.

Twenty-three percent of the Masons in the Monroe District, who are on our mailing list, have permanent addresses outside our immediate delivery area and probably are unable to attend their Lodge meetings or functions. I'm guessing another 30% fall into the category of elderly, infirm or house-bound. That leaves about half the members of a Lodge who might be available, at least once in awhile. Are you in that category?

Resolutions

I'm not a particularly good example of a person who makes and keeps resolutions. I don't even try anymore! However, it is the beginning not only of a new year, but a new decade.

How about YOU making a resolution! Attend a Lodge meeting or two or three and reacquaint yourself with your Brothers. If you are unsure of the entrance procedures, contact the Master or one of the Officers or Brothers (or even a friend in another Lodge) for assistance. All of us know how easy it is to forget names and telephones numbers. Should Ritual be any different? I'd think quite the opposite. Don't let that "fear" keep you away.

Call the Master or Secretary of your Lodge and OFFER to help on some project or program ... don't wait for the call from them. Once the shock wears off, they will be very appreciative of the fact that you have come forward. Too many times the same people volunteer because no one else will. Why not be one of the first to change.

Our goal is to be good enough to ring a peal, or at least a quarter-peal. That means going through all the bells and all the mathematical permutations possible before getting back to the original pattern.

Generally, a peal in tower takes about 4 hours. During that four hours, the ringers stand and pull on their sallies and the neighborhood gets a free concert.

In handbells, it goes a little faster, since it is easier to swing 2 pounds than 800. But the the cost of the book! sound doesn't carry. We are currently satisfied with just ringing a disrupting error. Usually, when Rochester rehearses, the bells cannot be heard outdoors.

There are melodies that rise to the surface to let us know we | are ringing correctly. And there is a mathematical beauty to all the permutations.

Interested in exploring? Contact Bob Crystal. We may be able to come to your organization and give a demonstration. Maybe we can have a ring of bells named for the twelve ruffians, or the Star Points plus the Matron! x




A Dining Idea

The word Mentor, according to the Encarta Dictionary, means an experienced adviser and supporter. A Mentor is somebody,


usually older and more experienced, who advises and guides a younger, less experienced person.







New Member




Our new Shrine Band, playing under the direction of Noble Frank Russell, will provide entertainment. Please join us for a night of good food and fun.


Schedule Changes

When the 2010 East-West Shrine Game teams take the field at the Florida Citrus Bowl in Orlando on January 23rd, it will be the final event in the players' weeklong "interview with the NFL."

A Time to Shine

For the players, an invitation to the East-West Shrine Game is a chance to showcase their abilities to play in a professionallevel game before representatives of all 32 NFL teams. The professional level of the event is reinforced by the presence of an NFL-affiliated coaching staff, NFL officials and rules, ESPN network television coverage and even official NFL footballs..."Just Like on Sunday."

"The East-West Shrine Game is an interview, an audition. This is a very, very important game to NFL Scouts, who have a chance to see the players up close," said Doug Williams, Director of Pro Personnel for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers and a member of the East-West Shrine Game Hall of Fame. Williams is just one of many NFL greats who played in the East-West Shrine Game; the list includes Brett Favre, Tom Brady, John Elway and 62 NFL Hall of Famers.

"Coming from a small school, the Game was a stage for me; an opportunity to show what I could do," said Williams, who played in the 1977 East-West Shrine Game and was a first-round Draft pick for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 1979.

The East-West Shrine Game provides that same opportunity today. The 2008 Game's Offensive MVP, Josh Johnson, is now a quarterback for the Buccaneers.

For the NFL, the East-West Shrine Game is a resource.

"All-star games are vital to our clubs," said Ron Hill, Vice-President of Football Operations for the NFL. "Scouts get a week to look at and visit with the players and see how they react in a different setting."

Career Opportunities

All 32 teams will have at least three to five scouts at the Game; several General Managers and Head Coaches will also be on hand.

"All the General Managers should be there, unless their teams are still playing," said Hill. "I'm looking forward to being there for the practices. It's important. If this game was on the moon, the NFL would be there.

"The quality of the players invited is very, very high. The game is very important to the NFL and to the players it's another chance for them to show their ability and an opportunity for our Scouts and Coaches to spend time with them and see what we need to see," said Hill.

What they see is a lot of potential.

In April 2009, 90 percent of players from the 84th East-West Shrine Game - played on Jan. 17, 2009 - were either drafted or signed as free agents by NFL clubs.

The League provides significant support to the Game, including assistance assembling the coaching staff. Both the East and West teams wil! have one head coach and eight assistants with NFL affiliation.

Agents are aware of the benefits of the Game for their clients, as well.

"And, it has a premier relationship with the NFL that makes it a little larger than life. We have a player in the game - I'm ecstatic. The game is a platform for him to demonstrate he has the mental and physical abilities to excel at the next level."

It's for the Kids

The cause behind the Game is important to everyone involved, as well.

"Every year, we hear from the players and the coaches that the highlight of the week is going to the Hospital to be with the kids," said Hill. "We're absolutely excited that the Game supports Shriners Hospitals for Children; we're pleased to be part of it and to help make it a success."

Shriners Hospitals for Children is an international health care system of 22 hospitals dedicated to providing pediatric specialty care, innovative research and outstanding teaching programs. Children up to age 18 with orthopaedic conditions, burns, spinal cord injuries, and cleft lip and palate are eligible for care and receive all services in a family-centered environment, without financial obligation to patients or their families. The organization depends on the generosity of donors and funds raised by special events, such as the East-West Shrine Game.

Game History



PERRY SHRINE CLUB

After a dinner meeting at the Lumberyard Restaurant in November, Bob Anderson spoke about the Shriners Hospitals for Children, in general, with emphasis on Erie. He pointed out that our Shriners 22 Hospitals treat orthopedic, burns, cleft lip and palate and more. The budget for 2010 will be nearly \$2 million per day or around \$700 million per year. This money is raised from donations (\$250 million), investment income (\$250 million), and the remainder from realized gains on our investments.

Budget Solutions

As you can see, there is a problem ... we are dipping into our endowment fund. At the Erie Hospital, which treats orthopedic problems for children without charge to them or their families, we are taking steps to reduce our \$11 million (2009) budget.

For 2010, we have reduced our budget by 5% to \$10.5 million and, in recognizing that medicine is going to sameday surgeries, we have proposed to move to being an ambulatory surgery and clinic facility. This reflects the fact that less than 10% of our current surgeries require overnight hospital stays (our average patient stays 1.7 days - well under the system average of 3.5).

In order to do this and continue to treat our children, we are going to partner with Hamot Hospital, a local Erie hospital. We will do our overnight surgeries at their facility. All care will be done by Shriners' doctors. This will allow us to expand the usage of our facility by turning the unused, overnight patient rooms into clinic facilities for other pediatric subspecialty secondary and tertiary care rooms. By renting that space to our partnering hospitals and providers, we can make our clinic facilities, operating rooms, radiology facilities, therapy rooms and gait lab available to more patients.

This will mean that more children will be treated at our facility at a reduced expense to the Shriners' endowment. In addition, we, and the Shrine system, are taking steps to take advantage of the insurance that covers 70% of our patients by arranging to bill those insurance companies. At Erie, we will first have our medical professionals bill for their services. We will cover the necessary copays and uncovered costs. With all of these efforts in place, we may be able to continue to reduce the outlay that Erie demands from the Shrine endowment.

We discussed Christmas donations to Erie Hospital. They do not need toys and animals. They really need monetary donations toward several of their specialized programs such as "Timmy's Day Out," Wheelchair Program and Adaptive Sports.

Timmy's Day Out

Timmy's Day Out is a special Summer program that takes patients with spina bifida on excursions into the community to help them learn skills needed for their personal independence. Such excursions include visits to the zoo, museums, bowling, fishing and airplane rides. The kids have lunch out, a nutritionist teaches them about healthy choices and they are given money to purchase their own lunch. Many of these children have never been on outings like this. What an experience for them!

Wheelchair Seating Program

The Wheelchair Seating Program is obviously expensive. About 21% of the kids aren't covered for wheelchairs and justification letters must be written to find funding. It takes over 3 hours to fit a child to their particular chair—taking into many considerations such as their drive-

way, housing, height, weight, how their condition will progress, etc. A "regular" wheelchair costs between \$2,000-\$7,000 and will hopefully last 3-5 years. The Power chairs cost up to \$26,000 and usually last 16-18 months. Remember these children are still growing and changing so their chairs must be changed.

Adaptive Sports Programs

The Adaptive Sports Programs include bowling, sled hockey, wheelchair basketball, adaptive sailing programs, etc.

All of these programs (and more) are so important for these children to lead a happy and productive life. The Hospitals always need our support. Should you choose to send a check to Erie or give one at a Perry Shrine Club meeting, be sure and make a notation in the memo field of the check, which program you would like to sponsor. Let's help make their year a special one.

Christmas Party

What a wonderful turnout we had at the National Hotel with 31 people attending the party. The food was delicious and the reindeer antlers on the waitresses were interesting. Glad I didn't have to wear one! It was nice to have Gary Burke in attendance, as usual. It is nice to see someone from the Divan.

We also thanked Ed Hollwedel for his years as President and all his hard work. Thank you also goes to Russ Gillett for being Treasurer for many, many years. Where would we be without our volunteers?

Perry Shrine Club voted to donate \$500 directly to Shriners Hospital for Children-Erie for Timmy's Day Out Program. We also raised another \$265 from a raffle and other donations. People at Perry have a wonderful charitable attitude that all of us should have toward the Hospitals. After all, it is ALLABOUT THE KIDS! Bob will deliver the money in January when he is at the Erie Hospital. Thank you so much!!

Excerpts from Fall Report to Hospital Representatives:

The "Joint Boards" have just concluded a most successful Fall Board Meeting. Many progressive initiatives are moving forward...but first, some wonderful news.

On November 4th, we began seeing "Burns" children again in our Galveston Hospital. These were our first children there since Hurricane Ike came through Galveston on September 12th, 2008. We once again have our "Burns Presence" in the South Central United States. My heartfelt thanks to our Houston Hospital Board of Governors and Staff for the help they gave the Galveston employees, while they were doing our "Burns Mission" in our Houston Hospital, on a temporary basis.

New Strategies

The Joint Boards' recommendation is for the Erie Hospital to become the first "Ambulatory Model." (See adjacent article for more on the Erie Hospital.)

The next three hospitals are "Works in Process." Spokane Hospital is going to be our first hospital to have Price Waterhouse Cooper do a Gap Analysis.

Shreveport Hospital is continuing discussions with our affiliated partner LSU Medical School about a potential integration of the School into our building.

Springfield Hospital is also continuing to have discussions with Bay State Medical Center about an integration of Bay State's "services" into our building. Proposed ideas are to have SHC Springfield remain a hospital, but only be open 5 days a week. There is also a proposal to do the complex surgeries at Bay State Medical Center.

We are continuing to look for other Potential Lease Opportunities for the purpose of Revenue Generation in all our hospitals, which includes on-going negotiations with six other hospitals to see if a "Modified Care Presence" will work.

Erie Shriners Hospital Announces Plans to Transition Inpatient Care and Expand Outpatient Services

Shriners Hospitals for Children-Erie, is embarking on an exciting journey that will ensure its patients continue to receive the highest quality medical care available for years to come. SHC-Erie has announced a cooperative integration with Hamot Medical Center in Erie to deliver Inpatient care at Hamot.

Under this new arrangement, any Shriners patient that requires true Inpatient surgery (not same-day-surgery), will have that surgery performed at Hamot Medical Center. The surgery will be performed by Shriners' doctors, nurses and other OR staff. Their post-surgical recovery will occur in Hamot's pediatric unit that will also carry the "Shriners Hospitals for Children" brand. Shriners Hospital will continue to provide full coordination of the patients' overall care.

Over the past several years, the Erie Shriners Hospital has become much more focused on Outpatient care. Today, most of the hospital's patients are treated on an Outpatient basis. Therefore, these changes will impact only a small portion of Shriners patients who need the type of Inpatient care that will now be delivered through this cooperative arrangement with Hamot.

The target date for the Inpatient integration to occur is April 30th, which gives both hospitals ample time to prepare for a smooth transition.

With these changes, the Erie hospital will transition itself into an Ambulatory Care Facility and expand its Outpatient services including physician clinics, sameday surgery, rehabilitation therapies, radiology and motion analysis. The hospital expects to see its Outpatient services increase in the years to come.

The Erie Shriners Hospital is currently working with local and regional health care providers to look at ways to enhance pediatric sub-specialty care in Erie, using the Erie hospital as a base for these pediatric providers.

Specialized Care at No Cost to Families

Shriners Hospital patients who require Inpatient surgery at Hamot Medical Center will continue to receive their care at no cost to their families. If the child's family has insurance, Hamot will bill that insurance carrier, however, Shriners

Hospitals for Children will cover co-payments, deductibles and other expenses directly related to the surgery. Shriners Hospitals will also continue to cover the costs of any child who does not have insurance. Shriners Hospitals for Children-Erie has become the first hospital in the system to begin moving toward an Ambulatory Surgery Facility model of care. The Shriners' Joint Board approved this move at its November meeting. The savings that the Erie hospital will realize as a result of these efforts can be used to further support Outpatient and Ambulatory Surgery services, and reduce Corporate funding.



Let's get those Petitions in and make this a banner year for reMembering our Forest. We can initiate "Short Form" at any meeting. We usually confer the Degrees in October.





Taxes, Taxes, Taxes!

Four Tax Incentives

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act provides tax incentives for firsttime homebuyers, people purchasing new cars, those interested in making their homes more energy efficient and parents and students paying for college. Here are four things the Internal Revenue Service wants you to know about tax incentives for individuals:

1. New Vehicle Purchase Incentive - Qualifying taxpayers can deduct the state and local sales and excise taxes paid on the 2009 purchase of new cars, light trucks, motor homes and motorcycles. The deduction per vehicle is limited to the tax on up to \$49,500 of the purchase price of each qualifying vehicle and phases out for taxpayers at higher income levels.

2. Tax Credit for First Four Years of College - The American Opportunity Credit can help parents and students pay part of the cost of the first four years of college. The new credit modifies the existing Hope Credit for tax years 2009 and 2010, making it available to a broader range of taxpayers. Eligible taxpayers may qualify

"Taxes are what we pay for for the maximum annual credit of \$2,500 per student.

3. Certain Computer Technology Purchases - The Act allows 529 Plans to add computer technology to the list of college expenses that can be paid for by a qualified tuition program, commonly referred to as a 529 plan. For 2009 and 2010, the law expands the definition of qualified higher education expenses to include expenses for computer technology and equipment or Internet access and related services.

4. Energy-Efficient Home Improvements - The credit for non-business, energy-efficient improvements is increased for homeowners who make qualified improvements to existing homes. The new law increases the credit rate to 30-percent of the cost of all qualifying improvements and raises the maximum credit limit to \$1,500 claimed for 2009 and 2010 combined.

The credit applies to improvements such as adding insulation, energy-efficient exterior windows and energy-efficient heating and air conditioning systems.

To qualify as "energy efficient" for purposes of this tax credit, products generally must meet higher standards than the standards for the credit that was available in 2007.

Manufacturers must certify that their products meet new standards and they must provide a written statement to the taxpayer such as with the packaging of the product or in a printable format on the manufacturer's website.

Qualifying improvements must be placed into service after December 31, 2008, and before January 1, 2011.

The improvements must be made to the taxpayer's principal residence located in the United States.

Taxpayers must claim the credit on the Tax Return for the year that the improvements are made.

Homeowners who have been considering some energy efficient home improvements may find these tax credits will get them bigger tax savings this year.

Electric vehicles that are eligible for the qualified plug-in, electric-drive motor vehicle credit include low-speed vehicles, passenger vehicles and light trucks. The amount of the credit is equal to the sum of \$2,500 plus \$417 for each kilowatt-hour of traction battery capacity in excess of four kilowatthours. The maximum credit can range from \$7,500 to \$15,000, depending on the gross vehicle weight rating of the vehicle.

It is unique in the York Rite, and in much of the rest of Freemasonry, in that it celebrates the completion of a project, namely the completion of King Solomon's Temple. The Degree celebrates the completion and dedication of the Temple. No other Degree celebrates a completion like the Most Excellent Master Degree. The Degree is the last step in the construction of King Solomon's temple that starts, Masonically, in the 3rd Degree and continues in the Chapter Mark Master Mason Degree. It also celebrates the dedication of the temple and all activities that needed to be

accomplished for its dedication.

I think the deeper meaning of this Degree sometimes gets lost between the Mark Master Mason Degree and the Royal Arch Degree. Without the Most Excellent Master Degree the keystone found in the Mark Master Mason Degree would not find its rightful place in the Temple, it being the key to completing the main arch of the temple.

The MMM Degree does not place the keystone, just discovers it. The Royal Arch Degree is about the building of the second temple and the finding of what was lost when the original temple was destroyed. Without the MEM Degree the meaning of the Mark Master Mason Degree and the relevance of the Royal Arch Degree would not be present. It is, therefore, incumbent on each Companion to spend more time looking into the lessons taught by the Most Excellent Master Degree.

We could work at explaining our interpretation of the Degree, but that is not how Masonry works. Each Degree attempts to build a basis for the individual Mason to determine the significant meaning for his own life. Isn't that one reason we are Masons, to learn how to improve ourselves and become better men.

Musings

It will be the goal of the Chapter in the coming years to build' a meeting structure where all the Companions will find enjoyment, education and Companionship with a reasonable time for ending our meeting. We want to assure that no Companion is bored or uninterested at a meeting. In addition, it will be our goal to do our Degree work in the best and most efficient way, while not changing the Ritual.


We are looking forward to a good year and invite all our Companions to come to our Convocations for education, information and Companionship.



Legion Historian Clowns Caldron

Some time ago I reported in this column about the money spent on cigars and drinks after our Grotto meetings in our early days, as reported in the Minutes and the Treasurer's accounts.

As this is the season for convivial customs, allow me to revisit the same subject in the Masonic Community in Colonial Days; the drinking of wine and spirits was universal. Even Ministers drank to excess, not infrequently, to the point where the "influence" was plainly evident at church meetings in both speech and conduct.

New England, in spite of its Puritan traditions, consumed vast quantities of Jamaican rum, and looked upon the West Indies trade in that commodity, and in the molasses from which it was distilled, as an essential factor in its commerce.

And the Colonial cities imitated London in organizing a surprising variety of clubs for convivial purposes. The social life of men in both the Old and New Worlds then centered chiefly in taverns. There were upwards of 200 Lodges at work at the time of the American Revolution, meeting in the principal towns and cities.

The Table Lodge

From records of the Grand Lodge Of Massachusetts, serious matters were discussed in the lodge room, holding little attention to levity.

There was far more evidence that men stayed away from the meeting because of the serious nature of the proceeding than that they came to eat to excess or drink.

Some appeared to have 'supped' before the meeting. Other members repaired after lodge to the long room of the tavern for refreshments. In many cases it seemed at the call to refreshment, tables were laid upon trestles upon the floor of the lodge, steaming punch bowl was brought in, pipes were lighted, and conviviality was the order of the hour.

Both eating and drinking took place in the Lodge Room. The 'cost of the evening's entertainment' was commonly met either from the Lodge Dues or by dividing it, each Brother paying his share. Time of refreshment was fixed in the By-laws. When ten o'clock arrived, the Jr. Warden would notify the Master.

The Call from Labor to Refreshment was literally interpreted. All drinking up to that hour was common cost, glasses being "charged" or "fired" from time-to-time in response to a series of toasts. Some of the wealthy Lodges could afford to order a special cooked meal.

Smaller Lodges were content with light refreshments. The purchase of supplies of biscuits, cheese, ham, lemons, limes, pickles, sugar, pipes and tobacco, as well as port, rum, gin and various

wines and spirits, were often listed in Lodge Minutes.




