A few years ago, we established the gmail email address for the Masonic Times. We have asked that articles and photographs for publication be sent to: masonictimes@gmail.com. Some have decided that this is the email account for the Masonic Service Bureau. Not true! The original email addresses are where general correspondence should be directed. Why? Because of the newspaper's deadline of the 5th of the Month prior to the date of publication.

We start checking the gmail account around the first of the month. First, we send out the Reminder Message, and just to be clear, Jan does this most of the time. From that notice, through about the 12th of the month, we check on a fairly regular basis. Believe it or not, we do have some people submitting information for publication EARLY. We also have writers who are habitually late! We know it, and we still try to accommodate them. It has not always been possible.

For the next few days, we will complete formatting the articles and have proofreaders come in to check accuracy. That is followed by the layout and assembly of pages, with the final layout being sent to the printer. During this period, we are NOT checking the gmail account. Second, if something comes in late, we may not be able to fit it in the layout, and I am not going to re-arrange articles and pages unless there are extraordinary circumstances that require action. We hope that doesn't happen.

Healthcare Equipment Loan Closet

The Masonic Service Bureau maintains a "Loan Closet" of home healthcare equipment needed, usually on a temporary basis, by those who are challenged with a medical situation. We service an eight-county area.

Equipment most commonly used includes walkers, canes, crutches, shower/ tub seats, toilet rails, commodes, wheelchairs, transport chairs and rollators. Miscellaneous items include ice pumps, foam wedges, air casts, surgical boots, braces, IV poles, rolling bed tray tables, "hip kits" and many other donated items.

Most of the items are donated and because of the 501(c)(3) status of the maintain this service.

Masonic Service Bureau, a letter is sent to the contributor so they may use it for tax deductions.

When the Webster Senior Center re-located to a new facility, they gave the Service Bureau all of their equipment, leaving the MSB Loan Closet the only local source. Sometimes local ambulance and fire departments have a few items available, but we are full-service. Most loan closets in the area service residents of the town in which they are located; the MSB services an eight-county area.

There is a lot of work to maintain the equipment ... cleaning, numbering for inventory, documenting each item and cleaning again. Many clients are unfamiliar with what's available to suit their needs, so much counseling is done to equip them with items that will help them the most.

The Loan Closet is open 9 a.m. - 12 Noon, Monday through Friday, except holidays. Most people are unaware that these items are available free-of-charge. A refundable deposit is requested for wheelchairs, transport chairs and rollator walkers. If you have questions or want to check availability of equipment, call

Cognitive Stimulation

Number three on the list of successful components to aging is Cognitive Stimulation. We need activities to keep our minds sharp. As I get closer to the end of my journey as District Deputy Grand Master, I reflect on all I have learned and all that lies ahead for me and for our beloved Fraternity. I have often made the comparison between Freemasonry and medicine; both verse bless you and your loved ones. a being applied sciences. Medicine uses biology, chemistry, physics, pharmacology, pathology, physiology and psychology as its basic sciences, with the purpose of curing disease and relieving the suffering of patients. Freemasonry uses the seven liberal arts; grammar, rhetoric, logic, arithmetic, geometry, music and astronomy, as well as the five senses of human nature; hearing, seeing, feeling, smelling, tasting, and the tools it borrowed from our operative Brothers.

Freemasonry's purpose is to make good men better. The 3rd Degree of Masonry teaches us our duty to ourselves. We need to show these Brothers the meaning behind that Ritual. We need to take them under our wings and ensure we are Raising active members who will help our Lodge and Fraternity to flourish for years to come. We need to show them our own dedication and excitement. I fear that By Phil Hurwitz apathy and fatigue is too often competing with our dedication and involvement in the Lodge and its programs.

I take this opportunity to encourage the current Senior Wardens to start working on their Trestleboards for next year and to consider themes of education, family involvement and involvement in the community as an integral part of such Trestleboard. I challenge every Lodge leader and every active Mason to make it a personal goal to re-kindle the enthusiasm in each and every Mason in the Monroe District.

What good is a Master Mason who can memorize the whole Cipher book, but does not apply any of the teaching of Masonry in his daily life? Our Ritual remains empty words written in old English which no one even uses until it is really and truly "deciphered." The words we say in Lodge remain as dead as the old language they were written in until we give them life. When the Ritual is applied, it rises like our GMHA and lives in our deeds and actions. Freemasonry should be made to similarly rise and live through our actions, otherwise it dies like the language of its Ritual, and our Cipher historical section of old bookstores.

My charge to you, my Brothers, is that the next time you read the Ritual in your Cipher book, or you are asked to memorize a part for a Degree, take a moment to reflect on the meaning of the symbolism you are reading and memorizing. Most importantly, reflect on how you could apply its lessons in your daily life.



The Community Open House will include a special recognition of the volunteer Shrine Drivers who transported patients to and from the Erie facility during the past year.



#### What's Happening

Well, Companions, I have just returned from the Convocation of Grand Chapter Royal Arch Masons of New York. It was a very interesting time in Albany. I met Companions I know and many I did not. An answer to this question, if attempted without limitation, would soon bog down in a myriad of details. In the intricacies of each Body's Rituals, for instance, there are hundreds of differences.

First, the overriding similarities should be noted. Both groups are Ma-

I need to stress to all Companions that sonic organizations dedicated to the benefit of society through improvement of the individual. By morality lessons and peer association, they promote behaviors which civilize the man and strengthen his society. This is consistent with the Blue Lodge lessons which teach a man to be In closing, I am re-asking all our a better husband, father, son, neighbor, churchgoer and citizen.

It is in the focus of their objectives that the two organizations can most easily be seen to differ. Scottish Rite Masonry is the champion of individual freedoms and citizenship rights as well as responsibilities. York Rite Masonry, in its concluding Orders, is the champion of Christianity. A man must pledge to defend Christianity to become a Knight Templar Freemason in the York Rite. Good men of other religions (Jews, Moslems, Hindus, etc.) believing in Deity may become Scottish Rite Masons, and in the York Rite Royal Arch Masons and Cryptic Masons.

York Rite Freemasonry has three separate and autonomous bodies. These are Royal Arch Chapter, Cryptic Council and Knights Templar Commandery. Each have different Rituals and conduct their own separate meetings. The Officer Lines are not much different from Blue Lodge, but with differing titles. The top Officer in the three Bodies is respectively and formally called Excellent High Priest, Illustrious Master and Eminent Commander. As the title Brother is used in the Blue Lodge, the title Companion is used in the Chapter and Council; the title Sir Knight is used in the Commandery.

Another noticeable difference from Blue Lodge is the attire sometimes worn by the ordinary members. Most striking of these are the uniforms worn by a York Rite Commandery of Knights Templar. The uniforms are reminiscent of what was worn on formal occasions by Naval Officers - complete with ceremonial swords. The chief characteristic is a large, folded-brim hat, called a chapeau, with white ostrich plumes. The other two York Rite Bodies use modern blazer jackets, red for Chapter and purple for Council.

The Scottish Rite limits its non-Ritual attire to a hat with ornamentation including the symbolic double-headed eagle and gold-colored braiding. The hat is of the pillbox type without bill or brim. Black is the basic color of the hat that can be worn by the majority of the Scottish Rite members who are 32° Masons. Yel-

Two honorary hat colors are representative of a Meritorious Service Award recipient, red, and a Dedicated Service Award recipient, blue. The supreme honorary recognition of 33° Freemason is identified by a white hat. The white Scottish Rite hat is rare representing slightly over 1% of the membership. In even smaller numbers are the purple hats worn by the 33° Active Members of The Supreme Council.

Both of the Rites practice charity and have their favorite projects. York Rite Masons have several charities, among them the Royal Arch Masons Auditory Research Assistance Program and the

Knights Templar Eye Foundation which makes it possible for needy persons with sight problems to get medical help. The Knights Templars also support a Holy Land Pilgrimage Program which sends clergy on tours dedicated to the locales important to Jews, Christians and followers of Islam. Scottish Rite Freemasons support their 122 Childhood Learning Disorders Clinics, Centers and Programs treating children with learning disabilities. All groups practice local charity and usually sponsor educational scholarships.

In the final analysis, both groups are champions - like Blue Lodge Masons of Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth. "
