National Guard Birthday

The National Guard is celebrating its 376th birthday this year. On December 13, 1636, the Massachusetts Bay Colony divided its citizen-soldiers, or militia, into the North, South and East Regiments. The Massachusetts Bay Colony was seven years old in 1636. About 5,000 men, women and children had made the two-month voyage to the New World, leaving the relative comfort and safety of England behind.

In Massachusetts, they confronted a wilderness of dense forests, wild animals and suspicious Indians. The colonists needed a military force for protection, but they had no money to hire a mercenary army, which was common practice in Europe at the time. So, they turned to the English tradition of the militia - citizensoldiers who gathered for military training and who could fight when needed.

In Massachusetts, all able-bodied men between the ages of 16 and 60, were required to join the militia and have their own equipment. By 1636, the militia of the Massachusetts Bay Colony was large enough to be divided into three separate regiments.

Today, the military lineage of these 1636 regiments is carried by the 101st Engineer Battalion, the 101st Field Artillery, the 181st Infantry, and the 182nd Cavalry, which are all still part of the Massachusetts Army National Guard. These four units, in one form or another, have been in continuous service since 1636, and are the oldest units in the U.S. Army. Not many military organizations can claim 376 years of unbroken history. The National Guard as it stands today is made up of all 50 States and four U.S. Territories which add up to over 350,000 Citizen Soldiers at home and deployed around the world.

Did you know that we can present a program in conjunction with the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children (NCMEC)? They have speakers who will come to your Lodge and provide interesting programs on Child Safety.

Some Facts

How many cases of missing children have the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children (NCMEC) helped re- year's Grand Lecturer's Convention was solve? Since 1984, NCMEC has assisted law enforcement with more than 187,800 missing-child cases, resulting in the recovery of more than 175,200 children.

How many calls does the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children's Hotline (1-800-THE-LOST®) handle? In the last Quarter of 2012, the Hotline handled an average of 580 service-related calls per day. Since its 1984 inception, the toll-free Hotline has handled more than 3.5 million calls.

How many children have been recovered through AMBER Alerts? Since 1997 through March 2012, the NYS AMBER Alert Program has been credited with the safe recovery of 572 children. To date, there is a network of 120 AMBER Plans across the country.

 In 2010, the Register received 20,309 reports of children missing from New York State, an increase of four percent from the previous year. In addition, 20,017 cases were cancelled during the year, and 2,322 cases were active at the end of 2010.

 Nearly all missing children cases were reported as suspected runaways (94 percent). Abduction cases accounted for approximately 1 percent of the total reports, with abductions committed by family members as the most frequent form of abduction. There were two reports of a child abducted by a stranger in 2010. [Note: The number of non-family (stranger or acquaintance) abductions reported to the Register may be undercounted. One reason for this is that abduction cases are sometimes initially entered as "circumstances unknown," especially if no one actually witnessed the child being abducted. Even when subsequent investigation determines abduction is the cause, the case type turer's Convention Attendance Banner. may not be revised on the Register by an investigating law enforcement agency.]

· Every county in the State, except Hamilton, reported at least one missing child during thank all Brothers who came out to par- Sullivan, has stressed the importance of the year, and approximately half the counties reported increases in the number of new cases as compared to 2009. Of the 28 counties reporting increases, 20 had double-digit increases. Reports of missing children were concentrated in the State's largest urban areas. Excluding New York City counties (which are not reported separately to the Register), Westchester County reported the highest volume of cases (2,160) followed by Suffolk, Erie, Albany and Monroe counties.

 Controlling for the under age 18 population by county, three counties in the Capital Region (Schenectady, Albany and Rensselaer) had the highest rates of case reporting in the State (21.1, 19.0, and 10.3 per 1,000 children, respectively). These counties were found to have unusually large numbers of repeat cases involving children who ran away from foster care or other facilities. The statewide rate of reporting was 4.4 missing children cases per 1,000 children in 2010.

 Ninety-five percent of the children reported missing were age 13 or older, 59 percent were female, and 44 percent were white. The single largest group of cases by age and gender was white females 13 years and older (25 percent of cases reported).

 Approximately 27 percent of the 20,017 cases closed during 2010 were resolved by the child voluntarily returning home. Law enforcement efforts were involved in the return of 20 percent of the cases. Five children who had been reported missing were found deceased. Exact circumstances associated with the recovery of missing children were not reported to DCJS by law enforcement in 53 percent of the cases closed during the year. The median number of days between the reporting and cancellation of a case on the Register was six days.


While this news is encouraging, it is evident that vigorously promoting child safety will always be necessary. Parents and guardians play the most prominent role, by talking to their children in a calm and reasonable manner, being careful not to over-emphasize the frightening details of what might happen if safety guidelines are not followed. It is important to strike a balance between avoiding the issue and instilling a sense of fear in your child. The goal is to instill a sense of caution.

It is also clear that whenever a child is missing, parents must act decisively and the law enforcement investigation must be immediate, thorough and well coordinated.

This is what the Masonic Safety Program is about ... This is why we do it and this is your reminder that we need your help!!!! We want to make greater use of the ID equipment by having events supported by each Lodge. We want to process ID packages for more than 2,000 folks!!! It is possible with your support and help.

We have identified several Masons with American Sign Language skills who have agreed to help with our deaf program outreach to have some successful programs with the deaf community. If you posses such skills, we can always use your Degree. Keep watching the AGL column help. Contact us at the numbers listed below so we can set up additional events to serve the deaf community!!!

One thing that will be missing - no Brass Rubbings as in past years.









Shriners Facilities Change Patient Application Process

A new process has been put in place that eliminates the need to fill out the complex two-page form that previously needed to be sent to the hospital and processed before a patient could be considered for treatment.

There are now several ways you may refer a patient:

- · Provide the family with the Shriners Hospitals for Children referral card that has been provided to your temple and inform the family to call the toll-free Patient Referral line for an appointment. There is a place on the card to write the (if applicable).
- Direct the family to the Shriners Hospitals for Children® internet site where they will be able to locate the phone number for the nearest Shriners Hospital:

When speaking to the public about how to refer a patient to Shriners Hospitals for Children®, please eliminate the terminology "apply for care" or "application." Our goal is to remove the per-

ceived barrier of "applying" for care; instead use the term "refer a patient."

All Shriners Hospital facilities, in-Hospitals for Children* website, check cluding Erie, have distributed referral cards with their toll free number and website information to their affiliated temples. These referral cards include a space for each Shriner to write his name and temple for patient referral purposes (if applicable). Hospitals will ensure that additional supplies of these referral cards are available as needed at affiliated temples. Additional patient referral/ recruitment materials may also be provided when available.

> Please do not use these referral cards as mass handouts at health fairs, community booths, etc. These are for families who need to call the hospital. If you need information to hand out at community fairs in mass quantities, please order the general referral information cards that are available through the Shriners Village website.

U.S. News Names Erie Doctor Top Physician



During the first three months of the campaign, some two billion impressions have been viewed by the targeted audiences.

Other results of the national "Love to the Rescue" Campaign include 59,000 new "likes" on the corporate Facebook page, a 22% increase in second quarter donations (and an average donation increase of \$11.41) and a 92% increase in visits to the Shriners Hospitals website. The campaign will continue to increase in scope in the years to come.

Erie Movement Analysis Lab Assists with University Research

Research conducted in part at the Shriners Hospitals for Children Erie facility Movement Analysis Lab (MAL) played a significant role in a Mercyhurst University Study on managing spinal cord injuries in football. That study is under the direction of Bradley Jacobson, Chairman of the Eric University's Sports Medicine Department, who is working with Sports Medicine Concepts and the National Football League (NFL). Jacobson and Graduate Student, Jacob Gdovin, spent the Summer presenting their research on proper protocols for managing the on-field care of football players with apparent cervical cord injuries to medical staffs of NFL teams. Working with Mike Cendoma, CEO of Sports Medicine Concepts of Livonia, NY, they presented to the New York Giants, Houston Texans, New York Jets, Dallas Cowboys and Indianapolis Colts.

The day-long sessions were directed at team neurosurgeons, orthopedic surgeons, athletic trainers and paramedics. Jacobson is also the lead author on an article recently accepted for publication in the Journal of Athletic Training titled "Cervical Spine Motion during American Football Equipment Removal Protocols: A Challenge to the All-or-Nothing Endeavor." The article is based on two years of research, completed in part at the Movement Analysis Lab of the Shriners Hospital for Children®-Erie facility in collaboration with Kevin Cooney, PT, John D. Lubahn, M.D., an Orthopedic Dustin Bruening, Ph.D., and Cendoma.

The next meeting of the Wayne County Shrine Club will be January 17th at a location to be announced.



Ingredients ... Cake:

1 cup chopped, toasted pecans or

1 18-1/2 ounce yellow cake mix One, 3.4-oz pkg (4-serving size) 4 eggs

1/2 cup cold milk or water

1/2 cup vegetable oil 1/2 cup Bacardi dark rum

instant vanilla pudding mix

Glaze:

1/2 cup butter 1/4 cup water

1 cup sugar

1/2 cup Bacardi dark rum

Preparation:

Cake: Preheat oven to 325 degrees F. Grease and flour 12-cup Bundt pan. Sprinkle nuts on bottom of pan. Combine all cake ingredients. Beat for 2 minutes on high with electric mixer. Pour into prepared pan. Bake for 1 hour. Cool in pan. Invert on serving plate. Prick top with fork. Drizzle glaze over top of Bacardi Rum Cake. Use brush or spoon to put extra dripping back on cake.

Glaze: Melt butter in saucepan. Stir in water and sugar. Boil 5 minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and stir in rum. Note: The rum will cause steam. Be careful not to burn yourself.

Yield: 12 to 16 servings







ALS is more often called Lou Gehrig's Disease named after the well-known Hall of Famer who played for New York Yankees in the 1920s and 1930s.

Say for instance, if you Haldoupis and his Crew hosted the want to make a fist, your brain first sends Young Firefighters from West Webster. signals through upper motor nerves to the area in your spinal cord that controls your hand muscles. Then lower motor nerves in your spinal cord signal the muscles in your hand to move and make a fist. Over time, Lou Gehrig's disease causes these motor nerves in the brain and

spinal cord to shrink and disappear, so that the muscles no longer receive signals to move. As a result, the muscles become smaller and weaker. Gradually the body becomes paralyzed, which means that the muscles no longer work. Yet, someone with ALS, even at an advanced stage, can still see, hear, smell and feel touch. The nerves that carry feelings of hot, cold, pain, pressure, or even being tickled, are not affected by Lou Gehrig's disease. In some people with ALS, the parts of the brain that allow us to think, remember and learn also are affected by the disease.

The emblem worn by the Most Excellent Grand Master is the Cross of Salem. The Cross of Salem is a symbol both ancient and shrouded in mystery. Today it is most commonly associated with the Pope of the Catholic Church but this triple barred cross may date back well before the days of Popes. Its three arms Son and The Holy Spirit, and as such it serves as a beautiful Trinitarian state-

Holy Spirit. In addition it has been said such a symbol was once used to represent Salem, the Royal City of Melchizedek, and future place of Jerusalem, and even that it serves as a representation of the Tree of Life.

Facts are rare when it comes to this symbol of our faith, and stories are conflicting, but what we know for certain is that this cross has been long used in conjunction with ultimate mortal leadership within Christendom and is a fitting emblem of the leader of all Knights Templar.
