



A very special acquisition

Computer is being loaded

A library computer software package has been located. We are studying the "preview" disk and should be ordering the full software package soon. It is specifically designed for smaller libraries such as ours. It is the Auto Librarian Library Server 4.0 and it handles circulation, book searches, reports and labeling.

Livingston Library update

We have been in contact with Thomas M. Savini, Director of The Chancellor Robert R. Livingston Masonic Library of Grand Lodge.

Former Director, Wil Moore, has moved to Massachusetts and we are told an exciting position has developed for him.

Director Savini provided us with the "Classifications of the Literature of Freemasonry and Related Societies" by William L. Boyden. Boyden was Librarian of the AASR, Southern Jurisdiction, and his classification system was published in 1915. There have been annotated additions since that time, of course. We plan to use as many of those classifications as we can so we are compatible with our own Grand Lodge Library. They have been given the green light by the Trustees of the Library for selecting computer equipment and software so they can now join the electronics age.

Director Savini sent us a listing of Masonic books which are available to establish active Masonic Libraries to consider as additions to their collections. We qualify! We are expected to pay some shipping and handling charges for those we select, but otherwise we



Housing Law Tidbits

Even the sexual revolution has its limit. NYS law prohibits a landlord from discriminating against a person because of their status. In other words, a landlord cannot refuse to rent to someone because they are single, married, separated, divorced or widowed. A landlord can legally refuse to rent to a couple who aren't married to one another. New York law prohibits landlords from discriminating against individuals because they are unmarried. Landlords are permitted to discriminate against individuals, married or unmarried, who want to live with a non-spouse. In other words, a landlord doesn't have to rent to people "living in

When you rent an apartment, the landlord usually requires a security deposit. This deposit is used to secure your promise to pay the rent. It's also used to offset any damage to the apartment, above and beyond normal wear and tear. The security deposit belongs to the tenant. The landlord holds it in trust. This means that the landlord can't co-mingle your security deposit with his own money. He has to maintain it in a separate bank account. The bank has to be located in NYS. The landlord must notify you what bank the money has been deposited into. If the money is depos-

ited into an interest bearing account, then the interest belongs to you. The landlord is entitled to charge an administrative expense of 1% against the principle held in the account. The interest itself can either be held on account or paid out each year.

If an apartment contains six or more separate rental units within, then the landlord must deposit the security deposit in an interest bearing account and account for the interest; that is keep it on account or pay it to you each year.

Circumstances might require that you leave the apartment earlier than your lease provides. In otherwords, you have been transferred, but have another six months to go on the lease.

NYS law allows a tenant the right to sublet his apartment, provided the landlord agrees. This provision only applies to apartments containing 4 or more dwelling units. If the landlord unreasonably withholds his consent, then the tenant can either be released from the lease or go ahead and sublet the apartment. In order to perfect your rights to sublet, written notice of your intent to sublet must be sent by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the landlord. The notice must contain specific information, as required by law.

The landlord then has 10 days to request information from the tenant about the proposed subtenant. Within 30 days after mailing the notice to sublet (40 days if a request for information is made), the landlord must notify the tenant whether he will approve the sublet or not. Silence on the landlord's part is deemed consent to the sublease.

Regardless of how the sublease is approved, the prime tenant remains responsible for the rent. This means if your subtenant defaults on the rent, then the landlord can come after you. Your only remedy is to sue the subtenant for indemnification. If the landlord reasonably withholds his consent, then the tenant cannot sublease.

If you are 62 or older, or will turn 62 during the term of the lease, and have been accepted into a health facility, adult home, and the like, then you can legally breakyour lease before the end of its term. All that's required is written notice to the landlord, and proof of your acceptance into a facility. The landlord's notice must be mailed within 30 days after the date the next rental payment is due. The law deems the notice delivered 5 days after being mailed. For example, a notice mailed on March 5th is deemed received by the landlord on March 10th. Rent is due April 1st. The lease termination won't become effective until May 1st.

If you rent an apartment under a monthly agreement (monthto-month tenancy), either you or the landlord can terminate by giving notice at least one month "before the expiration of the term of his election to terminate." An example helps to explain. You want to leave (or your landlord wants you out of) the apartment by March 1st. Notice has been given no later than January 31st. If notice is given on February 1st, then the tenant is entitled to stay until April 1st. Of course, March's rent has to be paid.

If the lease provides that the landlord can recover attorney fees if you breach the lease, then the law implies a reciprocal obligation on the landlord. If the landlord sues you, and you hire an attorney to represent you, then you, too, can recover your attorney fees if the landlord loses.

If you pay your rent in cash or by money order, the landlord has to provide a written receipt showing: date paid, amount paid, identity of apartment, and signature and title of person receiving the

Every lease, whether in writing or not, contains an implied promise that the apartment is habitable. This is called the warranty of habitability. This warranty requires every landlord to guaranty to the tenant that the apartment, and the common ar-

eas (e.g. hallway) are fit for human habitation. Obvious examples of a breach of this warranty are: leaky ceilings, nonworking toilets, vermin. Not so obvious examples are other tenants whose behavior jeopardizes your health and safety. If the landlord doesn't take care of the problem, then you may be able to sue him for damages. A breach of this warranty may entitle you to break the lease and go elsewhere without liability to the landlord.

A landlord cannot refuse to rent to people who have children, unless the apartment is owner occupied, and only one other apartment is being rented; or the apartment was specifically built and financed with taxpayer money for the use of senior citizens only. "

Caution

One prudent, laconic and reserved beginning more often will statistically reach a successful conclusion faster than many overconfident attempts.

Stock Market "Sale"

Last month I introduced the first of the core principles Harry S. Dent, Jr., presented in his recent book, "The Roaring 2000's", which is to save at least 10 percent of your pretax income. Principle two tells us what to do with this accumulating capital: "Use Buy and Hold Strategies to Stay Invested in Fundamental Bull Markets".

We have enjoyed an unprecedented bull market and economic boom for the past five years, but how many of us truly stayed invested during this time? How many of us changed horses (sold mutual funds) in the middle of the race only to fall behind? We sometimes try to time the market by switching mutual funds or moving from stocks to bonds or money market funds, but history shows us that no one can consistently, over long periods of time, correctly anticipate the market's short-term direction. In the long run we know where it's headed-higher as always. The hard part is sticking to the diet of

Time is our great friend when investing in stocks, especially when sudden corrections and volatility give us indigestion or

send us on an emotional roller coaster. Successful investing should be as exciting as watching paint dry or grass grow. In the decade of the 90's, the S&P 500 had an average annual growth rate of 17.5 percent. If you had missed the best 40 days during that ten-year period, your gains would have been just 3.9 percent. Since 1982, no correction has lasted more than six months, so anytime you see the market decline by 10 or 20 percent, you should think of it as a stock market "sale" and fill your portfolio with stocks just like you'd fill your pantry with tuna when the grocery store slashes its price. The real risk in long term investing is not being in the market, but in being out of the market and missing the sudden upward advances.

Buy-and-hold strategies work best for the overwhelming majority of investors. Find a few consistently good mutual funds across a spectrum of large and small, domestic and foreign, growth and value stocks and hang on for the long term. Only rarely should you think about and act on your desire to switch things around. One financial planner did a simple study based on "Money" magazine's recommended mutual funds. He found that buying the top mutual funds recommended in February of every year would have returned only 10 percent annually versus 16 percent in the S&P 500. More revealing, however, was what happened when you changed the funds each year for the newly recommended list of funds. The result was a disappointing 2 percent annual return. Picking last year's hot mutual funds and trading in and out of funds doesn't work.

As always, if you need some help formulating a strategy or deciding which funds fit your objectives, ask a few people for a referral to a financial planner or investment professional and find a trusted advisor who can help you now and in the future with specific and unique circumstances.




December 19th Gift Distribution at the Canandaigua VAMC

The next School of Ritual will be held on Thursday, March 30th, at Union Star Lodge in Honeoye Falls. The School starts at 7:30 p.m. The work for the evening will be the 1st Section of the 3rd Degree. The Lodges exemplifying the work will be ERAC and Etolian. The School of Ritual is the best place to learn how the Ritual should be conferred or to confirm your interpretation of how it should be conferred. We will also answer questions on any other Degree or ritualistic matter. Come and support your Lodge's effort to win dance Banner. It should be noted that Charlotte/Corinthian did not get the most number of attendance points at the School in January.

The Ritual

In recent days questions have been raised about the Ritual for the three Degrees. The questions have revolved around what is required and what is optional. The answers can be found in the "Standard Work and Lectures of Ancient Craft Masonry in the Jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons in the State of New York" printed by the Grand Secretary and dated 1996. However, many Masons have not taken the time to read the book, so here is our response.

For the 1st Degree, as with all the Degrees, the 1st Section in its entirety is required. Now for the

2nd Section, this Section is broken into three parts. Part one is the Lecture of Forms and Ceremonies, i.e. the Questions and Answers. This is required at the time the Degree is conferred. The 2nd part is the Lecture of Reasons, i.e. the Why's and Wherefore's. This is required at the time the Degree is conferred. The 3rd part is the Historical Lecture, i.e. Lantern Lecture. This Lecture is a required part of the Degree, but the Master is given permission to defer the Lecture to the next communication. Take note, Brethren, the Lantern Lecture must be given. It can not be ignored. The 3rd part of the 2nd Section is the Charge. The Charge must always be given at the end of the conferral of the

The 2nd Degree, 2nd Section, contains the Middle Chamber Lecture which must be given at the time of the Degree or the new Fellowcraft is not considered as having completed the Degree. The Lecture of the Forms and Ceremonies is also to be given at the time of the Degree. There is also a charge for the 2nd Degree. This is to be given at the time of the Degree conferral!

The 3rd Degree, 2nd Section, is the raising of the new Master Mason. However, the 3rd Degree has a 3rd Section. It contains the Historical Lecture and the Lecture of Forms and Ceremonies. The Historical Lecture can be given at the conclusion of the 2nd Section. It can also be broken into two parts, one given before the start of the 2nd Section and the 2nd part after the 2nd Section. Lastly, the Historical Lecture can be given at a subsequent communication, but it must be given in one of three ways. The Lecture of Forms and Ceremonies is the only part of the Degree that is truly optional. The Charge is to be given at the conclusion of the conferral of the Degree.

I know that your concern now is that "we do not have anyone that knows all these Lectures or Charges". Well, that is where your District Officers and AGLs come in. Call these Brothers for assistance in finding a Brother to do the Lectures, etc. The Lodges in the Districts should work together when needed. We are all Brethren, regardless of Lodge affiliation. Dan and I are always ready to help, as are the District Deputy and Staff Officers.

Why should the candidate for the Degrees be presented with all the Lectures? Since one of the tenets of Freemasonry is to make good men better, we need a method to do this. The Lectures are the 2nd step in the process of teaching new Brothers the principles of our institution. Although the symbols and their meanings are not fully defined in the lectures, the Lectures present a large amount of information.

The new Brother is not expected to assimilate the information on first hearing it. All Brethren should listen to the Lectures when given as they will, by reflection, find new meaning and instruction for their own life. Freemasonry's teachings are not prescriptive, but are reflective. By contemplating the Lectures, a Brother can find his own meaning and shape his path through life by the meaning found.


"Great, I'm sure the Master could use the program. Why don't you get in touch with him," replied George.

Biting the bullet or Lodge merger, ugh

Let's face it, Lodge consolidations are tough. Traditions go down the tubes, the way we used to do things are gone, we may lose our building, what is going to happen to all the specific charities a Lodge gives to and what happens to the Lodge assets? Yes, all these things and many more must be considered in a Lodge merger.

However, for many Lodges and their members (and let's face it, without members we don't exist) the time is now. Officer lines are difficult to fill, finding members to do the work is a difficult job, money is short, nobody wants to do the Secretary's, Treasurer's or Trustee's jobs, and that building is costing more and more every year, even if the money is there.


Now you may come up to me and say, "Joe, what do Lodge mergers have to do with membership retention?" Well, membership retention is a lot more than trying to get Brothers not to drop for non-payment of dues. Membership retention covers Masonic Education, Long Range Planning, Awards, Widows, Lodges and Temples, just to mention a few. In this case, Lodges need to come together to do a better job for their members. The better we do the job, the more apt we are to keep Brothers in the

Let me bore you a bit with some numbers for your consideration. In 1950, Monroe County had 31 Lodges and 11,699 Masons with an average of 377 Brothers per Lodge. Today we have 19 Lodges and 3400 Masons with an average of 126 Brothers per Lodge. One of the things this says is that we have fewer to draw from for leadership in our Lodges than we had 50 years ago.




Association elections

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



considering leaving Masonry. the circumstance under which you were brought into it. Receiving all three Degrees in one day may have made for a good show, but I doubt if you remember much of what happened. Especially since you haven't had any instruction since. If you should leave, you should know, that there is a process for doing this. It is called a demit. As long as your dues are current you can request a demit from your Lodge. You will receive a paper that states you left in good standing and as such, you can petition for reinstatement at any time in the future. It will also be helpful if you wish to petition to join another Lodge in the future. Your Lodge Secretary can give you the particulars on this.

That said, I would ask you to reconsider your decisions, especially if you are considering it for religious reasons. Freemasonry is not a religion. Sectarian and political discussions are strictly forbidden in a Lodge. Masonry only asks that you believe in one true God. It encourages all men to worship God at an altar of their individual choice. A "Brotherhood of man under the fatherhood of God". Masonry does use Biblical oriented and other historical stories in allegory to teach its principles similar to the reading of a fable when you were young to teach a moral. Masonry has as its principle tenets the virtues of Brotherly Love, Relief, and Truth. Brotherly Love, to reily; Relief to those in distress, and Truth to be thruthful in all we do. It is an educational process of continual learning to better ourselves in life and in so doing become a better member of the human family.

I know that there are personal experiences in your life that would make you believe that Masonry is hypocritical. Masonry is not, men are. Though we try to learn and better ourselves, we will falter along the way. A Mason knows that he has the strength of his Brothers to help and guide him when he does falter. We do not forgive because we can not. We do not have that power, only God has that. We do, however, understand, support, and teach.

Please, do not turn away from this beautiful Fraternity until you have given yourself a chance to understand it. I will be sending you some reading material and a source of other materials. 
Merger

The Opportunity

Back in September, 1999, I shared with you my thoughts and some of the details regarding the "Valley of Rochester Strategic Plan 2005". You have now had time to digest my comments and think about the Plan's implications. If you did not obtain a copy of the Plan from the Scottish Rite Office at that time, I certainly invite you to do so now. It is my intention as your Commanderin-Chief to use that document as a blueprint for laying out my trestleboard and use it as the basis for our activities. I expect the Officers of all Bodies within the Valley to understand and support this effort. It is the common ground that we will use as we move forward in the 21st Century. Understand that the Plan is a living document that is flexible enough to accommodate future needs, yet firm enough to provide a good basic foundation.

In the September article I discussed two key concepts that must be understood for the plan to be successful. The first concept was/ is that of having a vision to be shared. The vision is that of how the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite fits into the grand scheme of things. To me that vision is clear. Let me try to share that vision with you now and in the months to come in this column. Freemasonry has as its objective making good men better. As a Concordant Body, the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry has a role which has sometimes been illustrated in the form of a pyramid with each Degree (or lesson) representing a step forward. Each Degree or step advances the candidate one step further in his search for light. Each step builds upon the base provided by the lessons that came before. Each step is a part of the path of the journey. It is not an end point or even a way station. In a certain sense, the journey is continuous. A station or rank or title does not make the end. We are measured by how we live our lives, not by the honors or awards that we win.

In the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry we have theorganization, the where-withall, the lessons, and the Brothers to provide an opportunity for all Master Masons seeking "more light". For other Master Masons to take advantage of the opportunity we offer, we must invite them to take the next step in their quest. You have the opportunity to help a Brother in his journey by guiding him through the process of becoming a member of the Valley of Rochester.

When you are a first line signer for a Master Mason candidate for the Degrees of the Scottish Rite, you have the responsibility to ensure that your candidate gains all that he possibly can from the experience of our Scottish Rite Reunion. You should be there with him through each and every Degree. You should help him gain a fuller understanding of the lessons taught by encouraging him to continue after the Reunion to participate in activities, programs and the fellowship of the Valley. Your concern for him will help exemplify the vision by showing him that good men can do better. When you demonstrate your caring he will then have an

The Feast of the Paschal Lamb was instituted by the Scottish Rite as the proper Ceremony to be used to honor the memory of our Brethren who have departed this earthly existence during the last year. It was traditionally held on Maundy Thursday, but in deference to the Rites of Christian and other congregations it will be held two weeks before Maundy Thursday this year.

The Feast is neither the Feast of the Passover, celebrated by the people of the Jewish faith, nor is it the Last Supper, revered by the people of the Christian faith. It is, however, linked to these events as the blood of the paschal lamb, used to mark the lintels of the



houses of the Israelites at the original Passover. The lamb's blood was a symbol of the redemption of the captives in Egypt. It was during the commemoration of Passover that Jesus of Nazareth instituted the sacrament of communion, revered by Christians.

Our Ceremony rehearses the history of the Feast of the Passover and its significance to the Jewish faith. It explains how Jesus used it to further his teachings, including the new commandment to love one another. This commandment is the center of the Degrees of the Chapter-

We honor our departed Brethren through the reading of the Mystic Roll and the presentation of a rose to the members of our departed Brother's family. This presentation is used to help us understand our hope in the immortality of the soul. The rose was, in ages past, a symbol of the immortality of the soul.

The Mystic Banquet is our way of teaching the duty of all mankind to those less fortunate. This is not the Christian Eucharist although the elements are similar. The sharing of the bread and wine teach us the basic concept of brotherly love through charity. Charity is not just the giving of alms, but the compassion for our fellow man and the help we can give to those in need. Masons are always taught to give aid as liberally as their ability permits.

The last part of the Ceremony, the extinguishing the lights demonstrates how the world is affected by the evil acts of man and the effects of bigotry, hatred, ignorance, and intolerance by man against man. However, by following the new law of love and charity, man can come back into the light. 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





I had the opportunity to hear R.·.W.. Thomas Jackson speak at the "Seekers of Truth" forum at the end of January and found his remarks particularly relevant to Cryptic Masonry. A major theme was the need to restore Freemasonry to its original status as an "elite" fraternal organization. His argument suggested that a key element in the notion of "making good men better" was the need to focus on the question of what constitutes a "good" man.

Jackson was not arguing for the financially favored, the naturally gifted, nor the highly skilled performer. Rather, he emphasized that one must look for the internal virtues of tolerance, decency, and being of good report. Given this baseline of character, Freemasonry was particularly well poised to provide opportunities to extend personal beneficence to the Craft and to the community.

Speaking from the unique perspective as Executive Secretary of the World Conference of Grand Masters, Jackson reported that around the world, Grand Lodges are not experiencing the kinds of problems that are regularly reported throughout American jurisdictions: declining membership, lack of initiations, NPD's. He supposes that these other jurisdictions lack these problems because they have upheld the original high standards of Masonic membership. These include petition fees that are 10 to 20 times what is typical of American jurisdictions.

In the Town Meeting during lunch, one Brother raised the question of reconciling the "elite" perspective with that of the American "egalitarian" outlook. I don't think the question got a decided response, but did in fact reflect the dilemma that American Freemasonry has faced since the days of the Revolution, and may be a root cause of those problems today which cause so much concern throughout the American Craft.

It stands to reason that a fraternity cannot lose 200,000 members in a generation if it only has 25,000 total to start with. Either fraternal model will have problems unique to its size and mission. Problems associated with the larger fraternal group may have a lot to do with cycles of expansion and shrinking. Smaller groups may have difficulty with arena of impact. It is possible that either group can learn from the other's lived experience.

Most importantly, Jackson pointed out that flailing at problems with ill conceived solutions can do as much damage to the Craft as completely ignoring the problems at hand. As usual, determining the problem is always the key to an effective solution, and characterizes much of the discussion we have today about "what is needed to improve the

As a member of a Masonic "elite" organization (Doric Council), I do understand the thinking and value of Jackson's comments. But I also know that American Freemasonry has made, and continues to make, a substantive contribution to the lives of all citizens as it has done since the early days of the Republic. So here we roodrich, K
